### Lots to celebrate as Texas milk production booming

During June - National Dairy Month - Texas dairy farmers and Texas dairy lovers deserve to be toasted with an extralarge glass of milk. Our state is poised to pass Idaho to officially become the third largest dairy producing state in the nation, just over a year after we unseated New York to capture fourth place.

Certainly, Texas dairy farmers deserve to be thanked and honored for their 24/7/365 hard work that achieved this milk milestone. But, on behalf of the Texas Association of Dairymen, which represents those farmers, we recognize that it also wouldn't have been possible without the consumers, whose love of and appetite for both milk and other dairy products keep our state's dairy herds busy.

Texas dairy industry has come a long way in the past two decades. In 2002, it produced almost 613.4 million gallons of milk. Last year, milk production topped more than 1.8 billion gallons of milk. While we've sadly seen many dairies close, the remaining dairies are getting bigger and cows are producing 10% more than they did a decade ago, thanks to advances in nutrition, animal care and technology.

All that additional milk translates into jobs and a boost to local and state economies.

The news of Texas' improved ranking is especially celebratory after the past two years. Like many individuals and businesses, Texas dairy farmers endured pandemic challenges, which for them included tough economics, low milk prices and a record winter storm.

Challenges still remain in 2022. While milk prices are up for



dairy farmers, elevated costs of feed, fuel, labor and fertilizer are eating away at profits. Mother Nature also has done her part; so far this year dairy farmers have battled heat, wildfires and an ongoing and worsening drought. And a nationwide shortage of truck drivers threatens to impact the availability of transporters to get milk from farm to processor to retailer.

Still, the future generally looks bright for the Texas dairy industry. Milk output should continue to grow. We are currently producing more milk than processors in the state can handle, but new plants are in the planning stages or about to come online. Also, as technology has matured, more Texas dairies are exploring adding equipment to harvest methane gas from dairy waste, enhancing our industry's commitment to be good environmental stewards.

Texas dairy farmers hope you agree that there's much to celebrate during National Dairy Month 2022 and that you'll enjoy our wholesome milk, ice cream, cheese and other dairy products during this special month and beyond.

#### Higher gas prices for Memorial Day

Average gasoline prices in Texas have fell 4.8 cents in the last week, averaging \$4.22 per gallon. Prices in Texas are 37.6 cents per gallon higher than a month ago and stand \$1.50 per gallon higher than a year ago. The price of diesel has fallen 4.0 cents nationally in the past week and stands at \$5.50 per gallon. According to GasBuddy price reports, the cheapest station in Texas was priced at \$3.49 while the most expensive was \$5.72 per gallon.

"After several weeks of soaring gas prices, last week saw prices nationally slow down ahead of Memorial Day, but I'm afraid the good news ends there," said Patrick De Haan, head of petroleum analysis at GasBuddy. "While gasoline demand has been seasonally soft, the large decline in refining capacity over the last few years has meant that refiners are struggling to produce even lower amounts of refined products. This has led inventories to struggle to see any gains, boosting concern that they won't be able to catch up. Coupled with continued talk that the EU is still working on sanctioning Russian oil, even though Hungary is a hold out, oil markets are quite on edge."


De Haan added, "As a result of the continued decline in gasoline inventories in recent weeks, wholesale gas prices surged last week, which will likely boost prices at the pump in short order. Motorists in the Great Lakes could see prices jump early in the week to new record highs, and the rest of the nation will follow. Odds are rising that we'll eventually see the national average reach that dreaded \$5 per gallon."

GasBuddy data is compiled from more than 11 million weekly price reports covering over 150,000 gas stations across the country.

The vibrant, clear gospel witness we are to be carrying to our neighbors and to the nations, is often non-existent in the North American church due to fear of failure and not wanting to be weird to those we are witnessing to. In light of this reality, Elliot Clark has written Evangelism as Exiles: Life on mission as strangers in our own land. This 150 page book is filled with personal stories of his experiences sharing the gospel, as well as encouraging and convicting truth from scripture about telling the gospel message. The encouragement is that our task is possible because of Christ's work through his people, and that any suffering or persecution or embarrassment we will endure is only temporary in light

of eternity. Sadly, though, Clark notes that "For many of us, when it comes to personal evangelism, comfort has usurped our calling," (p50). His point is that most Christians in America have made an idol of comfort, and when the Lord leads us out of our comfort zone for the sake of telling others about Jesus, we shrink back and dare not do anything that would create unease or potential friction with another person who may not agree with the gospel message.

Although the book discusses the failures in our lack of personal evangelism, it is a call to live out an evangelistic lifestyle in obedience to the Lord and for the sake of the lost around us. This comes though fearing God more than others, being intentional in evangelism, holy in our lives, and hospitable in our homes with the purpose of telling the gospel. For those struggling with evangelism or for those unsure how to tell Jesus to others, this book is a terrific read for you.

People reached out to me, asking me how I was, and I said words like heartbroken, speechless, sad, mad, and it is the reasons for being angry that

I want to write about. I just wanted people to leave Uvalde alone. I didn't want the media there. I didn't want celebrities like Meghan Marricle there; Mike and Matthew McConaghey can come anytime, because they grew up there. I didn't want President Biden there. I just wanted the families of the victims and the community to be given the opportunity to get over the shock and digest what happened; to let them spend time with their families and friends; to let them get the help they needed, especially spiritually; to let the healing start as soon as possible. As you know, I didn't get what I

wanted.

The media rushed into town, every network wanting to be the first to report something, anything. I quit watching the news because they got things wrong. I will just depend on "The Uvalde Leader News" for my news.

The last thing I wanted was for the law enforcement to be blamed for ANYTHING! I don't know if any mistakes were made. I have heard criticisms; I heard one report that they did what was right. I really don't know so I am NOT going to judge them until more facts come out. I do know that Uvalde County law enforcement is stretched to the limit because of the border crisis, the high-speed chases through Uvalde that have put the schools on lockdown 48 times, all because of human smuggling and trafficking and drug smuggling. Did you know that 344 million lethal doses of fentanyl have been seized at the border? That is enough to kill nearly every American. I wonder how much has made its way into the

**United States?** Politicians and President Biden use tragedies like this to push gun control. You could have 50 million gun control laws, and this still would have happened. This kid planned this, and no matter what, he would have found a way to carry it out.
