The City of Friona is working to combat illegal dumping near the City Barn at 8th and Jackson. Illegal dumping is a crime and is of great concern to local governments. We have installed surveillance cameras in order to prevent people from dumping items that do not belong in the tree limb area. We have had issues in the past of people placing items in this un-permitted area which causes avoidable work for our city employees taking their attention away from other city duties.

If someone is caught on camera, they will receive a citation by the Friona Police Department. **THE TREE LIMB PILE IS FOR TREE LIMBS ONLY!!!** Wood products such as wooden doors, fences, chairs, etc. go into the roll-off dumpsters. Roll-off box to open up for waste items

The City will open up the roll-off box this Saturday, June 11, from 10:00 a.m. – 3:00 p.m. Please come by to dump those items that don't belong in your dumpster and do your part to help Keep Friona Clean!

Examples of items not allowed in dumpsters, but allowed in roll-off box includes: steel and metal, mattresses and furniture, refrigerators/AC units, paint cans (with or without liquids), electronics and appliances, drums/barrels, brick, wood and concrete, railroad ties.

The roll-off box is located at East 8th and South Jackson Ave. It is a free



service provided to Friona residents.

Items not accepted in the roll-off box are tires, oil and tree limbs. The area southeast of the softball field is designated for tree limbs only! Security cameras are in place and those who do not comply could face fines.

Local LEOs will attend prestigious course

Two local law enforcement officers were selected to attend the Digital Evidence Investigation course held in Hoover, Alabama taught by the National Computer Forensic Institute ("NCFI"). NCFI is the nation's premier law enforcement training facility in cyber and electronic crime forensics. The NCFI seeks to educate state, local, tribal, territorial law enforcement officers, prosecutors, and judges in the continually evolving cyber and electronic crime related threats, and educate, train and equip them with the tools necessary for forensic examinations to combat those crimes.

Its rare that officers from this area get selected, some law enforcement agencies have to wait years to be selected to attend. The officers that were selected were: Officer Jonathan Marquez from the Friona Police Department and Lieutenant Leonardo Aviles from the Muleshoe Police Department. They will be attending the course in June of 2022.

The officers will spend 5 days in Alabama being taught by a combination of nationally recognized subject matter experts and USSS agents.

This course will provide working knowledge in the identification, extrapolation and analysis of digital evidence obtained from computers and other electronic devices: cellphones, GPS units, and tablets; as well as hands-on training with forensic analysis tools, legal issues, and report generation techniques.

The Panhandle Regional Planning Commission (PRPC) organized Home on the Panhandle Plains, an event for cities to meet with local developers, builders, contractors, and real estate professionals to discuss housing needs and opportunities across Texas Panhandle communities at the Amarillo Civic Center on Tuesday, June 7, 2022.

The City of Friona attended the event as an opportunity to connect with area contractors to entice them to come to Friona to help with potential residential construction projects. There was also a presentation on the Fair Housing Act of 1968 before the networking event began.

Senior Year Re-imagined

Upon finishing one's junior year of high school, students would benefit from a life skills curriculum. The Texas State Board of Education should rewrite the TEKS for Grade 12, calling on input from teachers, counadministrators, selors, and community in planning a strategy that would see less senioritis and a more common-sense approach to educating those who are on the cusp of leaving home.

--Grade 12 will begin at 8:30a.m. and go until 12:30 p.m. (breakfast at 8 and lunch at noon)

--Grade 12 will include four quarters of education, not two semesters (nine weeks per quarter)

--Seniors will be released at 12:30 to work on campus, work at jobs off campus, or take college classes online or in-person if available before going to after-school extracurricular activities when

in season.

--Grade 12 curriculum will consist of classroom instruction/classroom participation/field trips/ final projects in each of the following areas. Each school district has the autonomy to decide what vocational skills are most suited for the demographics of their students (farming, ranching, oilfield, landscaping, trucking, service industries, etc.)

August-October: financial planning investing, saving, insurance, taxes, cost of living; home economic skills cooking, laundry, basic sewing, ironing, parenting classes

November-December: financial planning bank accounts, car purchases, renting and buying options, avoiding scams; career exploration employees of a variety of jobs talking to class, former student testimonials, internships, or on-the-job shadowing with interest-

ed companies/businesses/vocations

January-February: health and well-being mental/physical/emotional health instruction by professionals; genealogy studies to learn about family health history; do-it-yourself repair and maintenance vehicle, household appliances, small motors, etc.

March-April: gardening vegetable gardens and flower bed and lawn care; history/music/film/ art school approved texts/ songs/movies to inspire, inform, and entertain and provide opportunities to create art in one of these forms

May: community or country service one community service project completed to satisfactory standards before the Monday prior to graduation; individual projects only

Of course, developing this free-from-homework

curriculum would require a thorough logistical blueprint in terms of student accountability and organization. It would take a resolute staff to bring the idea to fruition. Parts of this idea are already implemented in larger schools and in FFA programs. Ideally, having the entire senior year focus exclusively on life skills could be one of few risks and optimal rewards.

Parents and students concerned about rigor and college prep would still have the afternoons open for academic enhancement through college classes and ample time for multiple college campus visits.

To fund this type of program throughout the state, I suggest dropping the over-emphasis on standardized testing and use that budget item to assist with creating a better curriculum model for our high school seniors. According to a Texas Tribune article in January 2021, TEA contracted with Cambium Assessment in Washington, D.C., and Pearson (a London-based company) to develop and administer the STAAR exams from 2021 to 2024to the tune of \$338 million.

Learning should be practical and fun. That's when the lessons stick. Providing students this type of academic schedule could be the catalyst for them to build and sustain healthy life choices.

Gas prices soar


Average gasoline prices in Texas have risen 33.7 cents in the last week, averaging \$4.56 per gallon, according to GasBuddy's survey of 13,114 stations in Texas. Prices in Texas are 61.1 cents per gallon higher than a month ago and stand \$1.84 per gallon higher than a year ago. The price of diesel has risen 11.5 cents nationally in the past week and stands at \$5.62 per gal-

According to GasBuddy price reports, the cheapest station in Texas was priced at \$3.99 while the most expensive was \$5.69 per gallon. The national average price of gasoline has risen 26.0 cents in the last week, averaging \$4.85 per gallon. The national average is up 56.0 cents per gallon from a month ago and stands \$1.81 per gallon higher than a year ago.

"After a blistering week of gas prices jumping in nearly every town, city, state and area possible, more bad news is on the horizon. It now appears not if, but when, we'll hit that psychologically critical \$5 national average," said Patrick De Haan, head of petroleum analysis at GasBuddy.

De Haan continued, "Gasoline inventories continue to decline even with demand softening due to high prices, a culmination of less refining capacity than we had prior to Covid and strong consumption, a situation that doesn't look to improve drastically anytime soon. Nine states have average gas prices that stand beyond the \$5 per gallon mark, with more set to join in the days and weeks ahead. In addition, diesel prices also stand at a record high, a second gut-punch to consumers which pushes prices of most goods higher."

GasBuddy data is compiled from more than 11 million weekly price reports covering over 150,000 gas stations across the country.



Last Saturday at Lowrey Field in Lubbock, newly minted Friona High School graduates and best friends Bryan Chavira and Jacob Bautista were afforded the opportunity to do what they do best — compete. The sport was football and the forum was the 17th Annual Red vs. Blue ASCO All-Star Classic. The game featured all-star senior football players (1A-6A) from all over the panhandle. As fate would have it, Bryan and Jacob were on the "red" team and wore the numbers that Chieftain fans are very familiar with, #1 for Jacob and #16 for Bryan.

Bryan's 15 yard touchdown pass to Mi-

chael Limon of Sudan was the only score the Red team could muster in the opening two quarters of the game and they trailed 33-6 at intermission. In the second half Jacob, Friona's all-time career rushing leader, scored on a 54 yard touchdown run and Bryan completed a pass for the 2 point conversion. However, the Red team still trailed 39-14 with 11 seconds to go in the third quarter.

That's when the magic began. Jacob scored his second touchdown on a 36 yard pass from Luke Houston of Abernathy who had received a lateral pass from Bryan at the start of the play. Early in the fourth quarter, Bryan threw a 41-yard TD pass to Kash Bradley of Bushland and also the 2-point conversion pass to Limon. The next touchdown was a 1-yard run by Bryan with five minutes to go in the game. Finally, the game-winning touchdown was a 75yard pass play from Bryan to Marc Ramirez of Wellington with three minutes to go in the game. Final score Red Team 43, Blue Team 39. State Sales Tax Revenue Totaled \$3.7 Billion in May

Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar announced that state sales tax revenue totaled \$3.69 billion in May, 8.6 percent more than in May 2021. Annual revenue growth of 8.6 percent suggests modest growth in underlying taxable economic activity, in view of the current inflationary environment with Consumer Price Index inflation at 8.3 percent in April.

The majority of May sales tax revenue is based on sales made in April and remitted to the agency in May.

"Strong, double-digit growth was seen once again in sectors driven primarily by business spending, with receipts from the oil and gas mining sector continuing to exhibit particularly robust growth compared to a year ago," Hegar said. "Receipts from the construction and wholesale trade sectors also continue to show strong growth. Receipts from the services sector posted another substantial gain compared to the same month last year. Spending at sporting events and concerts was especially strong last month as consumers continue to spend more on live entertainment after being restricted during the pandemic. Receipts from restaurants also increased compared to May 2021."

Texas collected the following revenue from other major taxes: (1) motor vehicle sales and rental taxes — \$603 million, up 9 percent from May 2021; (2) motor fuel taxes — \$319 million, up 1 percent from May 2021; (3) oil production tax — \$595 million, up 64 percent from May 2021; (4) natural gas production tax — \$413 million, the highest monthly collections on record, up 216 percent from May 2021; (5) hotel occupancy tax — \$69 million, up 44 percent from May 2021; and (6) alcoholic beverage taxes — \$154 million, the highest monthly collections on record, up 22 percent from May 2021.

State Capital Highlights

TEA directed to make schools safer

Gov. Greg Abbott has directed the Texas Education Agency to ensure school facilities are made safer in the wake of the killing of 19 children and two teachers at Robb Elementary in Uvalde.

In a letter to TEA Commissioner Mike Morath, the governor requested the agency:

- Instruct school districts to identify actions to make campuses more secure prior to the start of the new school year.
- Instruct all school districts to conduct weekly inspections of exterior doors to verify they are secure during school hours.
- Develop strategies to encourage school districts to increase the presence of trained law enforcement officers and school marshals on campuses.

The state has made an initial \$5 million investment to establish a Family Resiliency Center in Uvalde County. The center will provide psychological services, crisis counseling and other health services for those affected by the massacre.

To date, the governor has rejected calls for a special session to consider additional gun control measures. Instead, he has asked legislative leaders to convene special committees to develop recommendations on school safety, mental health, social media, police training, firearm safety and other issues.

GOP donors urge Congress to act on gun control

More than 250 major Republican donors in Texas signed an open letter published in The Dallas Morning News urging congressional action to increase gun restrictions. The letter was published as a fullpage ad on Sunday. It endorses the creation of red-flag laws, raising the age to purchase a gun to 21, and expansion of background checks.

"Most law enforcement experts believe these measures would make a difference," the letter reads. "And recent polls of fellow conservatives suggest that there is strong support for such gunsafety measures."

Texas Sen. John

Cornyn is leading bipartisan negotiations on possible gun reform measures.

"We are grateful that our Senator John Cornyn is leading efforts to address the recent tragedies in Uvalde and elsewhere across our great Country," the letter says. "He's the right man to lead this bipartisan effort, as he has demonstrated throughout his career."

Among those signing the letter are major financial supporters of Abbott.

Inflation increase is highest in 40 years

A report by the state comptroller's office notes that inflation increased to 8.5% nationally in March — "the highest year-over-year percent change in consumer prices since January 1982."

Food and energy prices were the leading contributors, with gas prices reaching record levels. The largest source of inflation in food products were in meat, poultry, fish and eggs, up 14.3% in the past year.

The comptroller's report said the increase in prices is likely a "confluence of economic pressures related to the coronavirus pandemic stemming from both the supply side and the demand side."

The pandemic disrupted production and transportation lines in the global supply chains, which are not expected to fully recover until next year. In addition, demand now exceeds production capacity, often leading to empty grocery shelves and nearly empty lots at car dealerships.

Finally, Russia's invasion of Ukraine and the subsequent sanctions on that country have contributed to driving up the cost of oil.

Inflation decreased slightly in April.

Emergency **SNAP** benefits again extend-

Once again, the Texas Health and Human Services Commission has received approval from the U.S. Department of Agriculture to provide nearly \$318 million in emergency food benefits under the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program for June.

All SNAP households

will get a minimum of \$95 in additional food allotments on top the regular allotment. More than \$6.9 billion in emergency benefits have been provided to Texans since April 2020.

"We're here to support families when they need us most," said Texas HHSC Access and Eligibility Services Deputy Executive Commissioner Wayne Salter. "Providing access to fresh, nutritious foods is essential for healthy families."

Vehicle deaths reach 41-year high in 2021

The number of people killed in vehicle crashes totaled 1.532 last year, with 6,493 major injuries — the highest level since 1981. More than a third of those deaths involved excessive speed, according to the Texas Department of Transportation. With a 16% increase last year in speed-related wrecks, TxDOT is urging drivers to slow down and drive to weather and traffic conditions.

"Speed is the number one factor in roadway crashes in our state, causing 1 out of every 3 traffic deaths," said

TxDOT Executive Director Marc Williams. "When you speed, you increase the risk of death and serious injury in a collision. By observing the speed limit and driving to specific weather and road conditions, Texans make our roads safer for everyone."

COVID-19 cases continue to rise

The number of new COVID-19 cases in Texas during the past week rose to 46,946, with 42 new deaths reported by the Coronavirus Resource Center at Johns Hopkins University. That is more than double the number of new cases reported a month ago. The number of labconfirmed COVID-19 hospitalizations across the state also rose to 1,168, according to the Texas Department of State Health Services.







Stars and Stripes

On June 14, 1777, the Second Continental Congress passed a resolution which stated: "the flag of the United States be 13 stripes, alternate red and white" and that "the union be 13 stars, white in a blue field, representing a new constellation," according to History.com.

But who designed the ensign that became America's symbol?

Everyone is taught that Betsy Ross was the architect of the first American flag, but is it fact or legend? Ross did not get any credit until thirtyseven years after her 1836 death. Finally-she was identified in an 1873 article that appeared in Harper's New Monthly.

The Betsy Ross saga is still a puzzle because historians have never been able to prove otherwise.

Nonetheless, according to the Department of Veterans Affairs "Both President Wilson, in 1916, and President Coolidge, in 1927, issued proclamations asking for June



14 to be observed as the National Flag Day. But it wasn't until August 3, 1949, that Congress approved the national observance, and President Harry Truman signed it into law."
