U.S. House passes Wildlife Legislation

On Tuesday, the U.S. House of Representatives passed the *Recovering America's Wildlife Act*, to fund locally-led conservation projects to prevent wildlife from becoming endangered. If the bill is also passed by the U.S. Senate, Texas will receive around \$50 million per year to help more than 1,200 species of concern, including Texas Horned Lizards, Guadalupe Bass, and Bobwhite Quail.

"This is the most important piece of wildlife legislation in the past fifty years," said Janice Bezanson, Senior Policy Director with Texas Conservation Alliance. "Wildlife in Texas and across the country are in serious need of help, and this commonsense bill will tackle the problem at an effective scale, without new taxes or regulations. The yes votes from U.S. Representatives from Texas is a legacy they can be proud of."

Funding from the Recovering America's Wildlife Act would be used to implement the Congressionally-mandated state wildlife action plans, which have identified more than 12,000 wildlife and plants across the country in need of conservation assistance.

Bezanson notes that the bill could be particularly beneficial for a private lands state like Texas. "This funding could provide more technical assistance for private landowners who want to conduct wildlife studies or improve native rangeland, benefiting livestock as well as wildlife on working lands."

Through new regional conservation projects, the legislation will create new jobs for wildlife management, tree planting, river restoration, and wildlife reintroductions. It would also connect more Texans and children to outdoor recreation, nature education, and wildlife watching opportunities.

"Nature tourism is huge in Texas," continued Bezanson. "People from all over travel here to see iconic landscapes and wildlife such as migratory birds. Unfortunately, much of the fish and wildlife that our outdoor recreation economy depends on is declining. We're also losing animals that are essential to agriculture, like bees that pollinate our crops and bats that help control insect pests. And there are three billion fewer birds in our skies than there were 50 years ago."

The bill now heads to the U.S. Senate where it has 35 cosponsors and strong bipartisan support.

"I want my grandchildren to be able to hear the whistle of the Bobwhite Quail and see Monarch Butterflies in their backyard, the way I did growing up. I hope that Senator Cornyn and Senator Cruz will support this historic legislation and help get it over the finish line this summer," said Bezanson.

Check Your Mirrors

When my granddaughter Lillie cried during swim lessons, her parents handled the situation really well. They explained, simply, that swim lessons were about safety. Her mom and dad prioritized why it was important to learn water safety.

If Lillie did not learn to swim, she might fear water.

If Lillie did not learn to swim, she might miss the joy of swim parties.

Trips to the beach to see Aunt Julie's ocean would be more fun if she knew how to swim.

Teaching/parenting/leading with common sense.

My mother once explained the Ten Commandments in the same way. If a person follows those ten things, their lives will go smoother. They represent structure and order, not control. Mom told me the guidelines are the blueprint for living our best lives. Adhering to them increase the chances we can manage life's ebb and flow. (Mom was right.)

Could we apply this method to classroom instruction? Congressional legislation? Corporate eth-

I used to tell my students that unless we studied adjectives, they would be unable to tell their parents what kind of pizza they wanted, which place to order it from, and how many to order. Studying adverbs meant they could tell

Wouldn't corporate boards have higher company productivity if they chose common sense policies (such as parental leave) that improved employee morale, thus leading to more profit?

A receptive audience awaits when we can answer the question "why" with truth and good sense.

Gas prices down

Average gasoline prices in Texas fell 1 cent in the last week, averaging \$4.64 per gallon, according to GasBuddy's survey of 13,114 stations in Texas. Prices in Texas are 35.6 cents higher than a month ago and stand \$1.89 per gallon higher than a year ago. The price of diesel has risen 2.6 cents nationally in the past week and stands at \$5.80 per gallon.

According to GasBuddy price reports, the cheapest station in Texas was priced at \$3.89 while the most expensive was \$5.69 per gallon.

The national average price of gasoline fell 4.2 cents in the last week, averaging \$4.97 per gallon. The national average is up 37.3 cents from a month ago and stands \$1.92 per gallon higher than a year ago.

"Finally some relief! For the first time in nine weeks, gasoline prices have fallen, following a broad sell-off in oil markets last week, pushing the national average back under the \$5 level with most states seeing relief at the pump," said Patrick De Haan, head of petroleum analysis at GasBuddy.

De Hann continued, "I'm hopeful the trend may continue this week, especially as concerns appear to be mounting that we may be on the cusp of an economic slowdown, putting downward pressure on oil. But the coast isn't yet entirely clear. We could see the national average fall another 15 to 30 cents, if we're lucky, by the time fireworks are flying, barring any unexpected shutdowns at a time when the market is extremely sensitive to such."

GasBuddy data is compiled from more than 11 million weekly price reports covering over 150,000 gas stations across the country.

PULLED PORK TACOS



Ingredients

For Pork:

- 2 pounds boneless pork loin roast
- 2 tablespoons brown sugar
- 1 tablespoon ground ginger 2 garlic cloves, smashed
- 1 small white onion, coarsely chopped
- ½ cup orange juice
- 2 limes, cut in half

For Tacos:

- 12 (6-inch) soft corn tortillas
- 1½ cups shredded reduced-fat Colby
- ½ cup nonfat sour cream
- 1 teaspoon cumin
- 2 scallions, trimmed and chopped
- 1 (8-ounce) bag shredded red cabbage
- 3/4 cup fresh salsa

Instructions

Trim excess fat off roast. In a small bowl, combine brown sugar and ginger; rub generously over roast. Place in slow cooker with garlic, onion, and orange juice. Cook on low heat for 8 hours (or high for four to six hours.) Remove pork to a large bowl and shred with forks. Strain pork liquid from the slow cooker and pour over pulled pork to moisten. Squeeze lime juice on top and mix well. Divide into 12 servings. In a small bowl, combine sour cream, cumin, and scallions.

For each serving, cover the corn tortilla with two tablespoons of cheese; microwave for 20 seconds. Top with pulled pork, two teaspoons of the sour cream mix, 1½ tablespoons shredded cabbage, and one tablespoon of salsa. Fold and serve immediately.

Eye to Eye

"Don't one of you fire until you see the whites of their eyes!" said American General William Prescott to his rag-tag squad of amateur soldiers; on June 17, 1775; they were about to confront a squad of Great Britain's professional armed forces at the base of Bunker Hill, MA. When the Redcoats were approximately 120 feet away, they "let loose with a lethal barrage of musket fire," according to History.com.

The Englishmen, commanded by the experienced, battle worn General Thomas Gage, were caught off guard; they retreated and reconstituted; attacked again, and withdrew.


General Gage, who was not about to surrender, guided his



troops into a third confrontation. By then, Prescott's revolutionaries-low on ammunition- were forced to stand their ground and engage the enemy in head-to-head, handto-hand combat. The rebels were unvielding against staggering odds and, though the Americans lost the Battle of Bunker Hill, it "was a morale-builder for the Americans, convincing them that patriotic dedication could overcome superior British military might," as reported by History.com.
