Third Court of Appeals Rules in Favor of **Rural Telecommunications Providers**

Austin, Texas - The Public Utility Commission (PUC) must immediately restore over \$200 million in past-due support to rural telephone providers from the Texas Universal Service Fund (USF), a state program designed to ensure reliable and affordable telecommunications nectivity in rural Texas, according to a judgment from the Third Court of Appeals issued June 30, 2022.

The Court ruled that the PUC "acted without legal authority" when it stopped paying more than 70% of its TUSF obligations in January of 2021. Justices said the PUC's interpretation of the law would lead to an "absurd result."

"For two years, rural Texans have faced the uncertainty of whether their local phone companies would be able to ride out the financial storm created when the Public Utility Commission stopped funding universal communications services for rural areas of the state —

and whether they might face dramatic increases in their phone bills or lose service altogether as a result," said Rusty Moore, General Manager and COO of BBT Telecom and Board President of the Texas Telephone Association. "Today we are thrilled the court has agreed with us — USF is a fundamental building block of a connected rural Texas."

Moore described the Court's ruling as the first step to restore needed funding for rural communications and committed to working with the Texas Legislature to ensure stable and appropriate funding for the future. USF is funded through a surcharge on telephone services and is not part of the state's general budget.

The USF was created in 1987 because costs to build and maintain the telecommunication network over large rural areas are much higher than in densely populated urban areas, meaning many rural Texans could not afford service without a cost balancing mechanism.

Almost 4 million rural Texans rely on USF to support their affordable access to the telecommunications network, which enables voice and broadband service and powers rural cellular service.

"We look forward to working with the new commissioners at the PUC to quickly follow the court's directions, recoup the money owed to these companies, and move on with the business of providing reliable and affordable telecommunications to all of Rural Texas," said Moore.

About Texas Telephone Association 43 Rural Texas telecommunications providers comprise the Texas Telephone Association. Its members include telephone cooperatives and both privately held and publicly traded companies that serve over 3 million rural Texans across almost half of the total landmass of Texas (145,000 square miles an area the size of Montana).

Not only was he a captain and a doctor of philosophy, but most of all, David was a great husband and father. He coached his sons' soccer teams from early elementary to high school. He encouraged their continued academic success, and he supported their interest in music by sharing his experience as a trombone player in the marching band. He enjoyed spending time with his family hiking and skiing both in Red River, New Mexico and the adjacent Sandia Mountains, where he would never admit to getting lost. State Sales Tax Revenue Totaled \$3.7 Billion in June

Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar announced that state sales tax revenue totaled \$3.68 billion in June. This total represents a 16.4 percent increase over the June 2021 amount. The majority of June sales tax revenue is based on sales made in May and remitted to the agency in June.

As a result of a sustained period of historically high revenues, later this month Hegar will provide an update to the Certification Revenue Estimate published in November 2021. That update will result in a significant increase in estimated revenue available for the 2022-23 biennium.

"State sales tax collections surged in June, outpacing inflation, with strong growth in receipts from all major economic sectors," Hegar said. "The strongest growth was in sectors driven primarily by business spending, with receipts from the mining sector nearly doubling collections from last year, and with receipts from the manufacturing, wholesale trade and construction sectors also up sharply.

"Receipts from restaurants and the services sector were strong once again in June, as consumers continue to spend more on live events with entertainment options becoming available that were not available the last two years. "While receipts over-

all from retail trade were strong, receipts from furniture and home furnishings stores, as well as sporting goods and hobby stores, declined from year-ago levels for the third straight month, another indication consumers are switching spending from goods to services."

Total sales tax revenue for the three

months ending in June 2022 was up 12.5 percent compared to the same period a year ago. Sales tax is the largest source of state funding for the state budget, accounting for 59 percent of all tax collections.

Texas collected the following revenue from other major taxes: (1) motor vehicle sales and rental taxes — \$584 million, down 1 percent from June 2021; (2) motor fuel taxes — \$323 million,


up 3 percent from June 2021; (3) oil production tax — \$679 million, the highest monthly collection on record, up 87 percent from June 2021; (4) natural gas production tax — \$439 million, the highest monthly collection on record, up 176 percent from June 2021; (5) hotel occupancy tax — \$67 million, up 24 percent from June 2021; and (6) alcoholic beverage taxes — \$150 million, up 9 percent from June 2021.

Congressional Medal of Honor Society Website Worth a Visit

"Your Name is the most precious possession you have."

--Hershel W. "Woody" Williams, Congressional Medal of Honor Recipient, when speaking to young people

Last week, the passing of Mr. Williams did not register as much attention as the Heard/Depp verdict. As the final WWII Medal of Honor recipient to pass away, Williams was one of only 472 U.S. service personnel to have received this medal recognizing courageous actions from the 1941-1945 global conflict.

According to the Congressional Medal of Honor Society website, an individual receives the prestigious recognition by distinguishing himself or herself conspicuously by "gallantry and intrepidity at the risk of his/her life above and beyond the call of duty"

--while engaged in an action against an enemy of the United States; --while engaged in military operations involving conflict with an opposing foreign force; or

--while serving with friendly foreign forces engaged in an armed conflict against an opposing armed force in which the United States is not a belligerent party.

Naturally, eyewitness accounts must accompany the nomination process, which must take place within three years of the action itself. Williams' bravery at Iwo Jima on February 23, 1945, provided more than enough reason for the Medal of Honor to be draped around his neck.

The Medal of Honor website is a treasure trove of information regarding our country's highest military honor (www.cmohs.org). On it, viewers can pull up any past recipient (they prefer not to be called "winners").

The website includes short videos, viewable at any time. Williams, in one such clip, spoke candidly about what mattered to him.

"All of us have circumstances that happen in our lives that we have absolutely no control of. It's what we do as a result of those circumstances that is the most important thing. If something happens that is good, then we need to multiply that. If there is something that happens that is going to have an effect on our lives, then we must learn how to adjust to that. The most important thing to do is maintain our character. We must have character."

The Congressional Medal of Honor Society website offers free on-line training for accessible classroom teacher resources (www.cmohs.org). It is user friendly for anyone wishing to learn more about the history of the MOH, stories and some videos of its 3,511 recipients since its inception in 1861, as well as the previously mentioned training information.

After Williams passing, only sixty-three living recipients remain.

National Baked Beans Month

It just happens that July is National Baked Beans Month and Kristina mentioned at church she had a favorite recipe she likes to use. She agreed to share it with us. She said the recipe is multi-stepped, but it is worth it in the end.

Baked (Barbecued) Beans

Ingredients

6 slices bacon, divided use

1 Cup minced onion

½ Cup minced green bell pepper

2 cloves garlic, minced

1 Cup packed dark brown sugar ½ Cup molasses

½ Cup ketchup or tomato sauce

2 T mustard 2 T apple cider vinegar

1 T liquid hickory smoke (optional)

½ Tsp crushed red pepper flakes

¼ tsp pepper

2 tsp salt, or to taste

1-pound cooked navy beans, plus 3 cups cooking liquid OR 3 cans (15.5 ounces each), undrained

Instructions

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Cut 3 slices of the bacon into 1-inch strips. In a skillet, cook the cut bacon until browned and crisp. Use a slotted spoon to remove to paper towels to drain.

In the same pan, sauté the onion, bell pepper and garlic over medium heat until tender and the onion is translucent, about 5 minutes. Stir in the brown sugar, molasses, ketchup, mustard, vinegar, liquid smoke (if using), red pepper flakes, pepper and salt. Mix well. Cook over medium-low heat until the sugar is dissolved, about 1½ minutes. In a large bowl, combine the beans, their liquid, the sauce, and the cooked bacon. Pour into a 9-by-13 baking dish, or a 3-quart casserole dish. Place the remaining 3 slices of bacon on top of the beans. Cover and bake 45 minutes. Uncover, increase the oven temperature to 425 degrees, and bake 15 minutes more to brown the bacon slices.

NOTE: We found the beans to be more liquid than we liked, so next time I will cut back on the "bean liquid". I also cheated and used the canned beans.

ALSO: I cut the remaining 3 slices of bacon and placed them around on top because both James and I figured it would be easier to dish up instead of trying to cut through the whole slices when dishing up a spoonful for your plate.

Gas prices continue downward trendBy GasBuddy

Average gasoline prices in Texas fell 15.6 cents per gallon last week, averaging \$4.36 per gallon, according to GasBuddy's survey of 13,114 stations in Texas. Prices in Texas are 19.2 cents lower than a month ago and stands \$1.55 higher than a year ago. According to GasBuddy price reports, the cheapest station in Texas was priced at \$3.69 while the most expensive was \$5.69 per gallon.

The national average price of gasoline has fallen 10.4 cents in the last week, averaging \$4.78 per gallon. The national average is down 7.2 cents from a month ago and stands \$1.66 higher than a year ago. The price of diesel has fallen 6.3 cents nationally in the past week and stands at \$5.72 per gallon.

"As expected, and for the third straight week, average gasoline prices have fallen to their lowest level in over a month. The price of wholesale gasoline has plummeted, providing price relief as millions of Americans hit the road for the holiday weekend," said Patrick De Haan, head of petroleum analysis at GasBuddy.


De Haan added, "While we may see prices decline into this week, the drop could fade soon if oil prices reverse, especially with strong demand over the holiday. For the time being, Americans are spending nearly \$100 million per day less on gasoline than when prices peaked a few weeks ago, and that's well-needed relief at a time when gas prices remain near records."

GasBuddy data is compiled from more than 11 million weekly price reports covering over 150,000 gas stations across the country.



Friends, don't let the past keep you from seeing old friends and forming new friendships. When you don't go, Satan wins and you


lose! Please don't let that happen to you!






