Friona to receive \$49,852.04 in sales tax allocation for July

Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar announced that he will send cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose taxing districts \$1.03 billion in local sales tax allocations for July, 15.3 percent more than in July 2021. These allocations are based on sales made in May by businesses that report tax monthly.

The City of Friona will receive \$49,852.04 in sales tax allocation for the month of July. This is a 7.87% increase over the \$46,210.73 received in July of 2021. The Friona Economic Development Corporation (FEDC) will receive \$12,463.01 of the amount for its operations.

The 2022 year-to-date total of \$448,427.79 is 36.69% higher than the \$328,056.35 received last year during the same time frame.

Commissioners renew health insurance

Parmer County Commissioners Court met in regular session on Monday July 11, 2022 at 10:00 a.m. in the County Courtroom of the Parmer County Courthouse in Farwell, Texas. The meeting began with prayer and the Pledge of Allegiance to the American Flag and Texas Flag.

Minutes from the June 27th meeting were read and approved. Commissioners approved the payment of the accounts payables as presented by County Treasurer Sharon May. The Treasurer's Payroll Report was also approved.

Commissioners heard a presentation on the CSI Plan from Texas Association of Counties representative Stacey Bruington. Guidelines to motivate employees to practice more preventative medicine through incentive programs (i.e. gift cards, extra vacation) was discussed. Next, TAC Employees Benefits Specialist Kathy Davenport presented a mid-year review of the county's insurance policy. Insurance rates for Parmer County only increased 4.2% which was far below most Texas counties which saw double digit increases. Commissioners later approved a renewal of the insurance policy with Jerry Killion Employee Benefits Associates Insurance Company of Lubbock. The new county insurance plan will cover 53 employees at a cost of a \$1,014.00 per month each with a \$250 deductible. Last year's premium was \$973 per month.

An agreement between Allegiance Behavioral Health Center of Plainview, Hale County and Parmer County was renewed. The LLC, dba Freedom Behavioral Hospital of Plainview, will handle all of the mental health cases for Parmer County.

Commissioners approved the use of the Courthouse lawn for Bordertown Days and also approved a water line under a county road in Precinct 4.

Parmer County Sheriff Eric Geske reported that the Parmer County Law Enforcement Center was currently housing 39 inmates. Of those, 17 are paying customers from Deaf Smith County. Three bids were considered concerning the new HVAC and Negative Pressure Cell for the Law Enforcement Center. WTC Heating and Air Conditioning was awarded the bid for \$566,000 which will be paid for with funds from the American Rescue Plan Act.

All meetings are open to the public. Information in this article is only a summary. Any questions concerning specific actions should be directed to the Commissioners Court.



There was reason for shooting people in those shows. Cheaters at poker got lead in the gut. So did cattle rustlers and horse thieves. In general, the use of a gun to secure justice in the Wild West was accepted, understood, and at times necessary. The western setting demanded guns for protection from animals as well as to hunt for food supply. All of this made perfect sense to me without my parents having to explain how guns were used then and how they were used in the 1960s when I was an impressionable kid.

I miss the Wild West when a person wore his or her holster and gun into the saloon, general store, or on the streets

to change. If we grow numb and do not bear witness to the events that have unfolded in the United States in the past two decades, we all lose.

Texas Republican Senator John Cornyn is trying to bear witness, sponsoring legislation that recently passed both houses of Congress. It is the first major gun legislation in over 30 years.

"While the discussion surrounding this topic causes emotions to run high, and I understand why," Cornyn, "doing nothing is an abdication of our responsibility as representatives of the American people here in the United States Senate," he added, while stressing he "would not support any provisions that infringed on the rights of law-abiding gun owners."

[The legislation will enhance background checks for potential gun buyers under the age of twenty-one, re-

quiring for the first time that authorities have time to examine juvenile records, including mental health records beginning at age 16. It provides millions of dollars for states to implement so-called red flag laws that allow officials to temporarily confiscate guns from people deemed in court to be too dangerous to own them, and other intervention programs. And it strengthens laws against straw purchasing and trafficking of guns. In addition, the measure pours more federal money into shoring up mental health programs across the country, and toughening security in schools. And the bill tightens a federal ban on domestic abusers buying firearms, including recent or current serious dating partners, to close what has come to be called the boyfriend loophole]. - NYTimes, 6/24/2022



Pina Colada

July 10th is National Pina Colada day. The middle of summer is probably the best time for this cold concoction. Here is a recipe where you can enjoy the flavors of the pina colada without the rum, if that is more to your liking.

INGREDIENTS

3 cups all-purpose flour 1/2 cup sugar 1 tablespoon baking powder 1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon 1/4 teaspoon salt 3 large eggs slightly beaten 1/2 cup 1 stick butter, melted 1 can 20 ounces crushed pineapple, undrained 1 can 15 ounces cream of coconut 2 tablespoons Greek yogurt

Topping

remaining cream of coconut 1/2 cup coconut flakes sweetened or unsweetened 1/2 cup sweetened coconut flakes toasted

INSTRUCTIONS

Preheat oven to 350° F. Grease 4 mini loaf pans with

non-stick cooking spray. Combine flour, sugar, baking powder, cinnamon, and salt in a large bowl. In a medium bowl, combine eggs, melted butter, pineapple, and its juice and 2/3 cup of cream of coconut and Greek yogurt. Stir until blended. Add to flour mixture, stirring just until moist. Divide evenly among the 4 pans and bake for 35 to 40 minutes or until a toothpick comes out clean. Cool loaves in pan for 10 minutes. Remove to wire rack and let cool before cutting and serving.


For Topping

In a small bowl combine cream of coconut, coconut flakes. Spread over cooled loaves. Sprinkle with toasted coconut, if desired.

NOTES: To toast coconut: Spread coconut evenly on a baking sheet. Place in oven at 350° F, until golden brown. Stir several times. Bake for 5-7 minutes.

Gas prices decline for fourth straight week

Average gasoline prices in Texas fell 17.7 cents in the last week, averaging \$4.20 per gallon, according to GasBuddy's survey of 13,114 stations in Texas. The cheapest station in Texas was priced at \$3.52 while the most expensive was \$5.29 per gallon.

Prices in Texas are 45.0 cents lower than a month ago and stand \$1.36 per gallon higher than a year ago. The national average price of diesel has declined 8.5 cents in the last week and stands at \$5.65 per gallon. The national average price of gasoline has fallen 12.8 cents in the last week, averaging \$4.66 per gallon. The national average is down 34.4 cents from a month ago and stands \$1.54 per gallon higher than a year ago. "The national average has declined for 27 days straight, or four weeks, the longest decline in average gas prices since the pandemic started in 2020. Average gas prices are down nearly 40 cents, with Americans shelling out \$140 million less on gasoline every day than they did a month ago," said Patrick De Haan, head of petroleum analysis at GasBuddy. "We may see the trend last a fifth week, as long as oil prices remain cooperative and don't surge beyond \$105 per barrel, and as long as refinery production of gasoline remains strong. But we're not completely out of the woods yet - we could also see a sharp reversal in the decline. There remains the risk of a spike in prices that could send us to new record levels in August, should any disruptions occur. It could be a wild ride, but for now, the plummet at the pump shall continue." GasBuddy data is compiled from more than 11 million weekly price reports covering over 150,000 gas stations across the country.

A Battle Won

Last month was a monumental month in our country as the United States Supreme Court ruled to strike down previous court decisions in Rov v Wade and Planned Parenthood v Casey that legalized abortion across our entire country. The decision from the Dobbs v Jackson case that overturned the legalization and the federalization of the abortion industry is a key battle victory in the cause to protect unborn babies from being murdered in their mother's womb, but the war is definitely not over. In fact, the Supreme Court decision now returns the abortion issue to be handled by each state as they see fit and right. In conservative states, this is good news because abortion will become banned, but in many liberal states the opportunities for aborting unborn babies will sadly abound. 





These days, a gallon of gas costs \$5.00 or more, but for Ernst Pfenninga dentist from Chicago, IL-the price was just a few pennies. On July 15, 1903, he became the first person to purchase an automobile from the Ford Motor Company. According to History. com, it was "an \$850 two-cylinder Model A automobile with a tonneau (or backseat). The car, produced at Ford's plant on Mack Street (now Mack Avenue) in Detroit, [and] was delivered to Dr. Pfenning just over a week later.

"Designed primarily by Ford's assistant C. Harold Wills, the Model A could accommodate two people side-by-side on a bench; it had no top, and was painted red. The car's biggest



selling point was its engine, which at two cylinders and eight-horsepower was the most powerful to be found in a passenger car. It had relatively simple controls, including two forward gears that the driver operated with a foot pedal, and could reach speeds of up to 30 miles per hour (comparable to the car's biggest competition at the time, the curved-dash

Oldsmobile)."






