



School Board approves pay raises

Friona ISD Superintendent Jimmy Burns announced on Wednesday that the FISD Board of Trustees unanimously approved pay increases at their board meeting on Monday evening. Burns stated, "We as a board and administrative staff are so proud of the hard work our district employees have put in the past few years and are ecstatic about this decision. Thank you for making a difference in the lives of the students at Friona ISD!"

Input from Business Manager Dianna Wright, administrative staff, Superintendent Burns, and school board members was considered in approving the following measures for the upcoming school year.

The FISD Board of Trustees unanimously approved an above state base pay raise of \$3,000 for all FISD teachers, counselors, and nurses. All aides, secretaries, and non-administrative employees will receive a \$2000.00 raise in pay. Custodians starting pay was increased to \$10.00 per hour.

The FISD board also approved raising the money the district pays toward employee insurance from \$275.00 to \$300.00 per month. The pay increases will be effective on the September paycheck for 10 month and 197 day employees and the August paycheck for 11 month employees.

Superintendent Burns concluded, "We really wanted to recognize and reward everyone that has worked so hard through the pandemic. Now let's get out there and have a great year!"

A couple of weeks ago an agreement was reached with my former (and only) school employer to return to coach high school UIL Speech and UIL Social Studies. Field day to feature 180 potato varieties

The annual Texas A&M Potato Breeding Program Field Day, hosted by Texas A&M AgriLife Research and Barrett Potato Farms, will be Wednesday, July 27. Participants will assemble at Springlake Potato Sales, located off of Texas Highway 385 between Littlefield and Springlake, at 10 a.m. and then go to the field, said Isabel Vales, Ph.D., AgriLife Research potato breeder in the Texas A&M Department of Horticultural Sciences within the College of Agriculture and Life Sciences.

"We always look forward to the field day because it allows everyone

involved in the industry, including researchers, commercial and seed growers, processors and retailers, to exchange ideas and identify priorities," Vales said. "In addition, participants will have the opportunity of enjoying catered lunch and networking."

Tough growing season

This year there are 180 potato clones — russets, chippers, reds, yellows, purples, smalls and fingerlings — including Texas-released varieties, advanced selections and some advanced clones from other breeding programs.

"The Springlake loca-

tion is prone to abiotic stresses that usually reduce yield and quality," Vales said. "The yields are a little low this year, but the quality is good."

The growing season began with strong winds, and the crop experienced mild hail in the middle of the growing season, said Jeff Koym, senior research associate with AgriLife Research, Lubbock.

Vales said most Texas-released varieties and advanced selections are tolerant to heat stress since they have been selected under high-temperature growing conditions.

"Recently, we have conducted studies that


validate this fact," she said. "Industry members nationwide and internationally are encouraged to evaluate our clones to determine if they perform well under their conditions, especially in the context of global warming."

This year is special because it marks the 25th anniversary of the establishment of the Southwestern Regional Potato Cultivar Development Consortium, initiated in 1997 by Colorado State University, Texas A&M University and the University of California at Davis to meet the unique needs of the southwest potato industry.

Remembering the brave — For centuries, Japan and China laid claim on Korea. Japan annexed Korea, and following World War II,

the Allied forces liberated Korea, dividing it into separate occupied zones. The dividing line was named the 38th parallel, creating a Communist North Korea and a South Korean republic. On June 25, 1950, the first war of the Cold War era erupted when North Korean forces crossed the border into South Korea. The ensuing war would last three years, involving troops from around the globe, and costing 3 million lives including 33,665 U.S. service members.

Since the hostilities started as a state con-

flict, the media and civilians showed less initial interest in the Korean War. President Harry S. Truman never issued a declaration of war. When the soldiers came home, most were silent. Many had served in World War II, and some would go on to serve in the Vietnam War. The Korean War ended in a stalemate. This day was created in order to remember those brave soldiers who served in this often forgotten war.

National Hamburger Day

National Hamburger Day is July 28, but here in Friona we like to celebrate a little earlier in the month with the Cheeseburger Festival. By now most people have their own favorite burger recipe, but this one is a little different than I have ever tried. It sounds pretty good, but I'd love to hear if you try it and how it turns out.

Best Hamburger Patty Recipe (Grilled or Stovetop)

Ingredients

- 2 pounds ground chuck
- ½ cup crushed saltine crackers or Panko breadcrumbs
- 1 large egg
- 2 tablespoons Worcestershire sauce
- 2 tablespoons milk
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon garlic powder
- 1 teaspoon onion powder
- ½ teaspoon black pepper

Instructions

Set out a large mixing bowl. Add in the ground beef, crushed crackers, egg, Worcestershire sauce, milk, salt, garlic powder, onion powder, and pepper. Mix by hand until the meat mixture is smooth but stop once the mixture looks

even. (Overmixing can create a dense heavy texture.) Press the meat down in the bowl, into an even disk. Use a knife to cut and divide the hamburger patty mixture into 6 - 1/3 pound grill or skillet patties, or 12 thin griddle patties. Set out a baking sheet, lined with wax paper or foil, to hold the patties. One at a time, gather the patty mix and press firmly into patties. Shape them just slightly larger than the buns you plan to use, to account for shrinkage during cooking. Set the patties on the baking sheet. Use a spoon to press a dent in the center of each patty so they don't puff up as they cook. If you need to stack the patties separate them with a sheet of wax paper. Preheat the grill or a

skillet to medium heat. (Approximately 350-400 degrees F.)

For thick patties: Grill or fry the patties for 3-4 minutes per side.

For thin patties: Cook on the griddle for 2 minutes per side.

Stack the hot patties on hamburger buns, and top with your favorite hamburger toppings. Serve warm.

Notes: Homemade hamburger patties will keep well tightly wrapped in plastic wrap or in an airtight container in the fridge for up to 3 days, or in the freezer for up to 3 months. If you substitute regular dried breadcrumbs for the crackers or panko, reduce to 1/4 cup. They are denser and will create a "meatloaf texture" if you add the regular amount.

Extreme heat testing Texas dairies

As you well know, this summer is terribly hot and extremely dry. Over half the country is in a drought, and most of Texas is classified as in an extreme or exceptional drought.

Current conditions in our state recall those of the extreme heat of the summer of 2011 and the drought that year that went into 2012.

While Texans in general are complaining about the temperatures, those temperatures are more of a concern and matter of economic survival and food production for dairy producers

and others in agriculture. Forage cannot be grown, and hay is getting more expensive and being brought in by farmers from longer and longer distances.

Milk prices for producers are good, but the input cost of feed, fuel and labor continue to increase. The question then becomes, will milk prices be strong enough to cover the rising expenses of producing milk all year or even longer?

Dairy farmers can also suffer financially due to the extreme heat like we're seeing. Economic losses due to heat stress are estimated to be \$900 million in the U.S. dairy industry, according to an article by Texas A&M AgriLife Extension. These losses are due to reduced milk yield, decreased reproductive performance and increased culling.

Yet Texas dairy herds are continuing to give milk, even in this heat.

Our dairy farmers are more used to the heat

than those in some parts of the country and undertake cooling practices - such as shade, sprinklers, water and fans - to keep their cows comfortable and producing. But the summer heat has had some impact: Texas has fallen back to the fourth largest dairy producing state in the U.S. after several months ahead of Idaho in the third spot.

The Texas dairy industry is not alone in seeing a drop in milk production. The nation's milk supply is down for the fifth consecutive month and also is being hurt by intense heat and rising input costs. The USDA reports the nation's milk supply is down 0.7% from May 2021.

This will be a time of change for producers. Pray for rain and good milk prices for the year. Milk markets will change and continue to mature, but Texas dairy farmers have shown they can produce lots of milk and they will continue to raise the standard of the

milk produced.

In other recent dairy news, Dallas-based Borden announced the sale of its Texas operations to Hiland Dairy. Just like our Texas dairies continue to grow, so do the dairy processors. The milk processing industry continues to consolidate and get much bigger, just as our cheese plants have done. This is one of the last fluid milk processors in the state that uses independent milk to fill its needs. It will be interesting to see how the ownership change will address the independent shippers since the cooperatives are not taking on production from new dairies in this time of excess milk.

This will be a time of change for producers. Pray for rain and good milk prices for the year. Milk markets will change and continue to mature, but Texas dairy farmers have shown they can produce lots of milk and they will continue to raise the standard of the milk produced.

Average gasoline prices in Texas fell 19.5 cents last week, averaging \$4.00 per gallon, according to GasBuddy's survey of 13,114 stations in Texas. Prices in Texas are 64.7 cents per gallon lower than a month ago but are still \$1.16 per gallon higher than a year ago. According to GasBuddy price reports, the cheapest station in Texas was priced at \$3.30 while the most expensive was \$5.29 per gallon.

The national average price of gasoline has fallen 15.8 cents in the last week, averaging \$4.51 per gallon. The national average is down 47.9 cents per gallon from a month ago but is \$1.35 per gallon higher than a year ago. The national average price of diesel declined 10.8 cents in the last week and stands at \$5.54 per gallon.

"We've seen the national average price of gasoline decline for a fifth straight week, with the pace of recent declines accelerating to some of the most significant we've seen in years. This trend is likely to reach a sixth straight week, with prices likely to fall again this week. Barring major hurricanes, outages or unexpected disruptions, I forecast the national average to fall to \$3.99 by mid-August," said Patrick De Haan, head of petroleum analysis at GasBuddy.

De Haan added, "So far, we've seen the national average drop for 34 straight days, with over 25,000 stations now back at \$3.99 per gallon or less, and thousands more stations will join this week. In addition, we will see several states fall back under an average of \$4, the majority being in the south, but that could spread to more states in the weeks ahead."

GasBuddy data is compiled from more than 11 million weekly price reports covering over 150,000 gas stations across the country.



The Dawn of Liberty

On July 22, 1862, Abraham Lincoln rounded up his cabinet and advisors to divulge his intention to issue an Emancipation Proclamation that would abolish slavery.

“Attempting to stitch together a nation mired in a bloody civil war, Abraham Lincoln made a last ditch, but carefully calculated, executive decision regarding the institution of slavery in America. At the time of the meeting with his cabinet, things were not looking good for the Union. The Confederate Army had overcome Union troops in significant battles and Britain and France were set to officially recognize the Confederacy as a separate nation,” History.com reports.



Lincoln, however, waited until September 22, 1862, to release a preliminary Emancipation Proclamation, which freed all enslaved people in the rebellious states—as of January 1, 1863.
