

Texas gas prices lowest in nation

While gas prices nationwide dropped below \$4 per gallon average last week, the state boasts the lowest prices in the country at an average of \$3.49 — 50 cents below the national average, according to AAA Texas.

"Retail gasoline prices in Texas fell for the eighth consecutive week," said AAA Texas spokesperson Daniel Armbruster. "While gas prices will likely keep dropping in the near term, it is unclear how long the trend will last. Demand for fuel jumped seven percent across the U.S. this week and regional fuel supplies fell by around three percent."

Drivers fueling up in College Station are paying the most on average at \$3.72, while those in the Brownsville-Harlingen area have the cheapest fuel at \$3.19, according to a report by KWTX-Waco.

Voter registration deadline is Oct. 11

Eligible Texas voters must be registered by Oct. 11 in order to cast ballots in the Nov. 8 general election, according to Texas Secretary of State John Scott.

"Even though we're still two months away from the voter registration deadline, it's never too early to make sure you're registered, update your registration information if you need to, and prepare yourself to vote in the upcoming election," Scott said.

Texas law requires eligible voters to be registered 30 days before Election Day. Since the 30th day before Nov. 8 falls on a Sunday, prospective voters have two extra days to register this year.

Voters can visit the state's official voting website — VoteTexas. gov — for more information.

Drought conditions now into sixth month By the end of July, drought con-

ditions covered 97% of the state, up 11 percentage points from the end of June, according to Dr. Mark Wentzel, hydrologist with the Texas Water Development Board. July was drier and warmer than

normal, a familiar refrain in 2022.

Storage in the state's reservoirs is at 71% of capacity, which is 13 percentage points below normal for this time of year, Wentzel wrote. Still, the current drought is not as severe as the one Texans endured in 2011 for most of the state. However, South Texas is faring worse than it did in 2011 since it started the year with its water supply reservoirs already well below normal.

More state resources mobilized for wildfire threats

On Friday alone, Texas A&M Forest Service firefighters responded to 15 new wildfires that burned 540 acres. There are five active wildfires throughout the state, the largest being the Pine Pond Fire in Bastrop County, covering an estimated 700 acres and just 35% contained as of Sunday.

The Texas Division of Emergency Management at the direction of Gov. Greg Abbott has deployed additional strike teams, consisting of 32 firefighters and 10 engines.

"Communities across the state continue to be impacted by dangerously dry conditions that could lead to further spread of wildfires," said Abbott said.

Burn bans are now in place in 224 Texas counties, out of 254 total.

Scammer posing as **TDI** employee

If someone calls claiming to be a Texas Department of Insurance employee offering to meet at one's home to discuss insurance needs, it's almost certainly a scam. That's according to a TDI news release, which notes the agency only calls people who ask for assistance.

The agency's fraud unit received a report from a person who was contacted by someone claiming to be a TDI employee and offering to come over and review insurance needs.

"The individual who received the call did the right thing by not providing any personal information and contacting us," said Chris Davis, head of TDI's Fraud Unit. "This may have been an attempt at identity theft or other crime."

Anyone needing help with an insurance issue or suspecting insurance fraud can contact the TDI help line at 800-252-3439.

All state oil and gas records now online

Have you been wondering about that working pumpjack in the strip-mall parking lot in Longview? (Yes, there is one.) The Texas Railroad Commission has recently completed placing all historic oil and gas production records online.

The RRC database covers oil production dating back to 1931 and gas back to 1937. More than 1,300 rolls of microfilm containing about 2.2 million images in the RRC's central records were digitized.

"This is a significant undertaking and a historic moment for the Commission," Matthew Herzon with RRC, said. "Not only does it give the public quick and easy access to the information, but it can also save staff time that's spent researching for public information requests. Requesters can now get historical production information with the click of a mouse if they wish, and our staff can devote time for other tasks."

COVID-19 cases dip slightly

The number of new COVID-19 cases in Texas in the past week dipped slightly to 72,715 with 194 new deaths reported, according to the Coronavirus Resource Center at Johns Hopkins University. The Texas Department of State Health Services reported 3,174 lab-confirmed COVID-19 hospitalizations on Sunday, a slight drop from the previous week.

Sweet Iced Tea

I know you probably don't need an actual recipe for sweet tea. I mean you live in Texas, right. So you were most likely born with this knowl-

edge. However, this recipe has a little twist on making sweet tea; it uses the Instant Pot pressure cooker. Just give it a try. I don't think you will be disappointed. And I know you don't need a reason for a glass of iced tea, but August 21st is National Sweet Tea Day.

Instant Pot Sweet Iced Tea www.digitalmomblog.com

Ingredients

- 2 Quarts Water for your Instant Pot Iced Tea
- 2 Quarts COLD Water
- 3-4 Family Size Tea Bags (Lipton tea is our personal favorite tea brand)
- 1-3 Cups of Sugar (No judgement here.)

Pinch of Baking Soda

Ice

1 Gallon Pitcher

Instant Pot or another electric pressure cooker (but we love our IP!)

Instructions

Dump 2 quarts of water into your Instant Pot. Tie your 3-4 tea bags together and throw into the IP. Pour in the amount of sugar you wish to use. Drop in a pinch of baking soda. Set your Instant Pot to manual for 4 minutes (it will take more than 4 minutes but that is how much time it will pressure cook). While you are waiting for your Instant Pot Iced Tea to finish, fill a gallon pitcher with approximately 2 quarts of water. I personally like to throw in the ice into the pitcher as well but know that the tea will be HOT and melt it, so maybe wait. If you are in a hurry, you can quick release your Instant Pot after the 4 minutes for your Instant Pot tea is up. If you have time, let it brew longer and wait for your Instant Pot to natural release. Once your Instant Pot tea is ready, pour it into the pitcher of cold water. Since your tea bags are tied, they should be super easy to fish out! Pour you a glass of sweet Instant Pot iced tea and enjoy!

Gas prices continue fall

Average gasoline prices in Texas fell 9.1 cents last week, averaging \$3.41 per gallon, according to Gas-Buddy's survey of 13,114 stations in Texas. Prices in Texas are 64.2 cents per gallon lower than a month ago and stand 56.8 cents per gallon higher than a year ago.

According to GasBuddy price reports, the cheapest station in Texas was priced at \$2.97 while the most expensive was \$4.87 per gallon.

The national average price of gasoline has fallen 9.9 cents in the last week, averaging \$3.92 per gallon. The national average is down 63.7 cents per gallon from a month ago and stands 74.8 cents per gallon higher than a year ago. The national average price of diesel has declined 14.8 cents in the last week and stands at \$5.27 per gallon.

"For the ninth week straight, gas prices have continued to fall, but the streak is at great risk of being broken this week with wholesale gasoline prices having bounced back up some 40 cents per gallon as oil prices have rebounded," said Patrick De Haan, head of petroleum analysis at GasBuddy.

De Haan continued "That means the decline in average prices could wrap up soon, with some price increases possible as early as this week, especially in areas of the Great Lakes. While the West Coast and some areas of the Rockies may see prices continue to drift lower, I do believe the national average could tick higher this week as the better than expected jobs report last week likely means less demand destruction than anticipated."

GasBuddy data is compiled from more than 11 million weekly price reports covering over 150,000 gas stations across the country.

Piper spent 13 months in the hospital and two and a half to three years in therapy. At one point, while he was in the hospital, he was very frustrated with God. All he wanted was to be able to talk to someone who had been through what he was going through, but there was no one to talk to. No one had been through what Piper was experiencing since the FDA approved the halos on his legs only three weeks before his accident.

In one of his times of shaking his fist at God, God told Piper to get over his pity party and use what he had been given to help others. Wow! I felt sorry for Piper. Here he was in bed; he couldn't go anywhere or do anything; he was at the mercy of other people, and God was telling him to get over his pity party. It seemed pretty cruel of God to treat him like that.

While I was having my pity party over losing a stupid game, I remembered what God told Piper. I decided that if God could tell Piper to get over his pity party, considering the shape he was in, then I was being totally foolish, and I needed to get over my pity party.

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
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Shrinking cattle head could equal high calf, beef prices

The shrinking Texas cattle herd is likely to translate into higher calf and beef prices years beyond a break in the 2022 drought, according to a Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service expert.

David Anderson, Ph.D., AgriLife Extension econ-**Bryan-College** omist, Station, said Texas cattle producers have culled earlier and deeper than normal this year due to drought. He suspects the number of culls, and the small number of replacement heifers could mean post-drought herd recovery could be longer than the years following record drought in 2011. It could also drive calf prices toward records set in 2014.

"It's clearly bad out there based on the number of culls we've seen," he said. "Drought is forc-

ing the issue. Whether it is zero grazing, low forage stocks, high feed and hay prices, or running low on water, Texas ranchers are facing tough decisions right now."

Historically, Texas accounts for a big chunk of the U.S. beef cattle herd. Mother Nature's impact on Texas ranchers is likely to ripple into sale barns and grocery stores around the country years beyond the drought. The U.S. herd has been shrinking in recent years, and the Texas drought is further reducing cattle numbers. The U.S. beef cow herd was just over 30 million head in January, down 2% compared to last year, according to the U.S. Department of Agriculture. The total estimated inventory of Texas cows that had calved and heifers was 5.1 million head, down 3% compared to 2020.

Anderson said weather-related contraction is impacting producers negatively. There are no estimates available that quantify the economic hardship Texas' ranchers have endured so far in 2022, but livestock losses during the 2011 drought were estimated to be \$3.23 billion. The 2011 drought was a bad time for ranchers, but the years following included historic cow/calf prices as the Texas and U.S. herd numbers recovered.

"The beef cattle market isn't something that turns on a dime," he said. "It takes time. Cattle are a long-term cycle, and I suspect this will all play out similarly to the years following the 2011 drought."

It is a 432-year-old unsolved mystery: how did 100—or more-colonists disappear on Roanoke Island?

According to History. com, "The Roanoke... colony, the first English settlement in the New World, was founded by English explorer Sir Walter Raleigh in August 1585. The first Roanoke colonists did not fare well, suffering from dwindling food supplies and Indian attacks, and in 1586 they returned to England aboard a ship captained by Sir Francis Drake. In 1587, Raleigh sent out another group of 100 colonists under John White. White returned to England to procure more supplies,


