Whatever it's called, a celebration of communities in western Deaf Smith County is scheduled for Saturday, September 17 at the Hereford Civic Center when the Walcott, Westway and Bippus reunion gathers.
Such an observance has occurred only twice in the last century according to organizers Adair Melton Murillo and Mary Ruth Weaver Baird, who invite anyone who lives or has lived in these far west communities to attend and share stories and memories.
Activities on September 17 get underway at $10 \mathrm{a} . \mathrm{m}$. and will include lots of visiting, and a brown bag bring your own lunch. Participants will gather at the Civic Center at "a.m. to mount up for a tour of the "Little School on the Prairie" at Walcott, prior to returning to the Civic Center for lunch. Joe Weaver, former Deaf Smith County librarian and noted story teller, will give a presentation rich with Deaf Smith County history. Activities will continue through 7 p.m. A drawing for door prizes will be held. Details on the event can be obtained by contacting Adair Melton Murillo at 806-928-1013 or Mary Ruth Weaver Baird at 806-2400744.

Chronicled in the pages of Deaf Smith County: The Land and Its People 1876-1981, the history of the communities involved in the reunion includes:

## WESTWAY

Appropriately named, Westway was the lane by which pioneers reached a large expanse of prairie land west of Hereford. With roots dating back to the Tierra Blanca Camp of the XIT Ranch, Lewis Arnold, working for the XIT, became the first settler in the Westway community. The first school in the community was taught by Watsie Thomas at Tierra Blanca Camp at the camp house. Eventually the syndicate gave the Schneider house for school use and it was eventually moved to a place owned by O.J. Christy and later Grady Wilson. In 1919 a little school house was built west of the Christy place, called Tierra Blanca In 1923 Tierra Blanca school was moved to

Westway and the school was fittingly named West Way to show the direcion from town, preceding the current one-word use of the name. Two south ooms were added to the building affer it was moved. East and west bus routes were operating in 1927. A total of 50 students were enrolled in 1939, later there were more. First through ninth grades were taught. The school ninth grades were taught. The school was con
1947.
In 19

In 1919 a Sunday School was organized at Tierra Blanca School. Union Sunday School was held until 1930, when R.A. Kelly helped organize the Baptist church in the community. In 1960 a Baptist church was built a halfmile east of Westway. In 1934 a Meth odist Church was organized, and in 961 it disbanded with members mov ing to First Methodist Church of Hereford. A non-denominational group started services in 1974 in the Community Building, and by 1978 moved o a new building in Hereford.
Phineas Short started a store in 1927, sold out two years later to R.M. Gunn, who operated it for 17 years, selling to Elmer Combs in 1946. After a succession of owners the structure eventually became a hamburger bar and ceramics store, and by 1981 was home to the County Kitchen Café.
The Westway of the 1980s included the Baptist Church and parsonage, the former school serving as the community building, a fertilizer plant, an elevator, and a roping arena, all still evident today.

BIPPUS
Located in far northwestern Deaf Smith County, the Bippus community has generally known the ups and downs of rain-challenged country and was at one time a part of the XIT Ranch. George Bippus Sr , who came to the US from southern Russia in 1886 ta four came to the northwist Deaf County area in the pring of 1910 from County area in the spring of 1910 from ie and sons his daughte, Er Curt, evon Th, Fre, Bob, Bert, and home with a basement about 1911 .
Following harvest of a crop in South Dakota Mrs. George Bippus Sr., Mr. and Mrs. George Bippus Jr. and a daughter, Lillie, and his sisters Helen and Tillie came to Endee, New Mexico by train bringing livestock and belongings.
While several families tried north west Deaf Smith County for a time, all except the Bippuses had left Deaf Smith County by 1925, but a number of new families gave the area a try. Many of the family names familiar to that area at the time still persist in northwestern Deaf Smith County in the modern era.
A school was eventually moved to a site donated by George Bippus and named for him, giving the community is present name. The Bippus, Rutter, Samuelson, Daniel and Swasnik chil
dren attended the school. Eventually a new one-room school was built about half a mile south of the old school, still on Bippus land.
The Bippus community reached a zenith in the late 1920s and early 1930s when a new community house was built two miles east of the school. Numerous dryland famers moved into the area, sowing wheat crops and run ning cattle.
Sunday school and church were disbanded in the 1930s, but reorganized in 1946 with a number of visit ing preachers. Eventually fifth Sunday singings were held for a time and from 1967 until 1978 Gene Brock served pastor until regular services were dis continued.
However, the general Bippus com munity still gathers for special occa sions in the old church building, now the community building, and holds an every other year Homecoming event to celebrate the heritage of northwest Deaf Smith County and the hardy folks who still make homes and a living in that area near the New Mexico border. WALCOTT
Remaining as the only school dis trict with the exception of Hereford in Deaf Smith County, this community is primarily identified with its education institution, aptly called by former KVI TV Meteorologist Steve Kersh "the Lit te School on the Prairie." Most of the land in Walcott was part of the historic XIT Ranch until its breakup shortly fter 1900 with the sale of land to set lers, and the ongoing saga of farmer and ranchers enduring and surviving midst drought and market ups downs since.
The present Walcott School Distric derives from the Walcott, Bippus, and Messenger school districts, all formed rom other smaller school districts in he rural countryside. The first Walcot School was 13 miles northwest of Her ford amidst the Walcott, Platt, Arnold and O'Brien ranches, in a $20 \times 20$ build ing. Later the school was torn down and relocated closer to the Arnold and O'Brien ranches. In 1928 a new wood en building was constructed on Dam eron Ranch land.
Most Walcott area families were farmers in the 1920s and 1930s, with some being absentee "big wheat farm ers."
When the Walcott, Bippus and Messenger schools consolidated in 1950 newbrickbuilding with four rooms and an auditorium was build and opened in 1951 with 34 pupils and four buses. Additions have been made since that ime, with two more classrooms and a bus barn built in 1968. The district cov ers about 500 square miles.
Walcott School remains viable with numerous bus routes and a steady enrollment, and also serves as a gath ering point and community center for ering point and community center for

First Maize Days - In the 1950s, the City of Friona celebrated its birthday in September/October with plenty of activities including a pony express horse race, cooking events, and a parade with tons of floats. This tradition culminated in 1956 as Friona celebrated its 50th birthday. However, in 1957, the emphasis shifted from a birthday celebration to a celebration of harvest and thus "Maize Days" was born. Agriculture exhibits and a "Maize Queen" contest were added to the list of activities and the rest is history.

The Harvest Moon - The full Moon that happens nearest to the fall equinox (September 22 or 23) always takes on the name "Harvest Moon" (see photo on front page). Unlike other full Moons, this full Moon rises at nearly the same time-around sunset-for several evenings in a row, giving farmers
several extra evenings of moonlight and allowing them to finish their harvests before the frosts of fall arrive. While September's full Moon is usually known as the Harvest Moon, if October's full Moon happens to occur closer to the equinox than September's, it takes on the name "Harvest Moon" instead. In this case, September's full Moon is referred to as the Corn Moon.

## Friona will receive $\mathbf{\$ 5 1 , 7 5 0 . 9 3}$ in sales tax allocation for September

Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar announced this week that he will send cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose districts $\$ 1.04$ billion in local sales tax allocations for September. The total disbursements represent a 13.1 percent increase over the amount paid out in September
2021. These allocations are based on sales made in July by businesses that report tax monthly. The City of Friona will receive $\$ 51,750.93$ in sales tax allocation for the month of September. This is a modest $0.35 \%$ increase over the $\$ 51,567.78$ received in September of 2021. Howev-
er, the 2022 year-to-date tota of $\$ 571,672.87$ is still a whop ping $30.88 \%$ higher than the $\$ 436,770.13$ received last year during the same time frame.
The Friona Economic Development Corporation (FEDC) will receive $\$ 12,937.73$ of the allocation for its operating budget

## Cinnamon Raisin Bread

National Cinnamon Raisin Bread Day is celebrated on September 16th. Cinnamon Raisin Bread is a guilty pleasure of mine. I don't
usually like things with raisins, but for some reason raisins in cinnamon raisin bread just works. It is especially delicious toasted
with butter Here is a recipe to try in case you want fresh, home made bread rather than the store bought.

## NGREDIENTS

$1 / 2$ cups milk
1 cup warm water (must be between 110-115 degrees)
2 (1/4 ounce) packages active dry yeast
3 eggs
/2 cup white sugar
1 teaspoon salt
12 cup unsalted butter, softened
cup raisins
8 cups all-purpose flour
2 tablespoons milk
1 cup white sugar
3 tablespoons ground cinnamon
2 tablespoons butter, melted (approx.)

## DIRECTIONS

Warm the milk in a small saucepan on the stove until it just starts to bubble, stirring occasionally. Remove from heat. Let cool until lukewarm, about 120-125 degrees. Dissolve yeast in warm water and set aside until yeast is frothy, about 10 minutes or so (make sure your water is at the correct temperature or the yeast won't activate.) Then mix in eggs, sugar, butter salt and raisins (stir in the cooled milk slowly so you don't cook the eggs.) Add
the flour gradually to make a stiff dough. Knead the dough on a lightly floured surface for a few minutes until smooth. Place in a large, buttered, mixing bowl and turn to grease the surface of the dough. Cover with a warm, damp cloth and let rise (I like to let my bread rise in the oven with the light on. It has just the right amount of heat and keeps the bread out of drafts.) Allow to rise until doubled, usually about $11 / 2$ hours. Roll out on a lightly floured surface into a large rectangle $1 / 2$ inch thick. Moisten the dough with 2 tablespoons milk and ub all over the dough with your hands. Mix together 1 cup of sugar and 3 tablespoons cinnamon and sprinkle mixture evenly on top of the moistened dough. Roll up tightly (the long way). The roll should be about 3 inche in diameter. Cut into thirds, and tuck under ends and pinch bottom together. Place loaves into well- greased (you can use Crisco or butter for this) $9 \times 5$-inch pans and lightly grease tops of loaves. Let rise in warm place, uncovered, again for about an hour. Bake at 350 degrees for 45 minutes or until loaves are lightly browned and sound hollow when tapped. Remove from oven and let cool on rack. Take melted butter and spread over tops of oaves. After about 20 minutes, lay loaves on their sides and remove from pans. Allow to cool before slicing

## Not Born to Be Queen

Of course, a history teacher is go ing to write about Queen Elizabeth II's passing. Even if you are not a monarchist, a fan of royalty history, or a Corgi lover (as was the Queen) he story of her ascension to the most enduring throne in the world is a once-in-a-lifetime story. She was never supposed to be the main character in Netflix's The Crown.
What if her Uncle Edward had not fallen in love with an American divorcee?
What if she had perished in The Blitz, the eight-month long bombng by the German Luftwaffe?
What if her father had not died relatively young from lung cancer, when Elizabeth was only 25?
When Elizabeth was ten, her uncle King Edward VIII gave up his title because Parliament would not consent to his marriage to the wice-divorced American socialite Wallis Simpson. The next year Edward and Wallis married, visited Germany, and proclaimed that "Hitler was not a bad chap." Would the outcome of WWII changed had Edward remained King and indeed been a Nazi sympathizer? Regardless, the stark contrast between his choices and what would become
his niece's trademark sense of duty reveal that fate intervened
During The Blitz, which lasted from September 1940 to May 1941, cities and towns suffered nightly air raids. Millions of children were evacuated to rural areas, parents hoping that their sons and daughters would be safer in remote locations. However, Princesses Elizabeth and Margaret would remain. "The children won't go without me. I won't leave without the King. And the King will never leave," said their mother.
Instead, the princesses were moved to Windsor Castle, which proved fortunate. On September 13, 1940, the Nazis bombed Buckingham Palace. Fate graced the accidental heir once again. Elizabeth went on to join the women's branch of the British Army, making her the first woman of the royal family to be an active-duty member of the British Armed Forces. She was only 18
These were compelling chapters in Elizabeth II's rise to the monarchy, but her "crowning" achievement came in a treehouse in Ke nya. Princess Elizabeth and her husband Philip were visiting on
official business. On February 6 1952, while she slept in a treehouse after a day of animal watching, her father King George VI passed away in England. Elizabeth was now the Queen-and would be for the next 70 years.
Many argue the monarchy is outdated and should be abolished What should never be abolished are the leadership qualities this remarkable woman exhibited.
"Resolute. Faithful. Intelligent. Funny. Curious. Spiritual. Committed. Involved. Selfless. Wise." World leaders described the Queen with these words last week Queen with these words last week. Through public family failures, Elizabeth II faced what many women, wives, mothers, sisters, and grandmothers experience. During these difficult times, she had to walk the tightrope balancing love and duty.
Her earthly reign ends, but the world would do well not to bury her spirit. She gave us the example of faithful devotion to the best traits of leadership. God Save the Queen.

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## Gas prices continue decline

Average gasoline prices in Texas fell 13.6 cents in the last week, averaging $\$ 3.10$ per gallon, according to GasBuddy's survey of 13,114 stations in Texas. Prices in Texas are 34.4 cents per gallon lower than a month ago and stand 28.7 cents per gallon higher than a year ago. According to GasBuddy price reports, the cheapest station in Texas was priced at $\$ 2.75$ while the most expensive was $\$ 4.73$ per gallon
The national average price of gasoline has fell 7.6 cents per gallon in the last week, averaging $\$ 3.67$ per gallon The national average is down 26.9 cents per gallon from month ago and stands 52.3 cents per gallon higher than year ago. The national average price of diesel has declined 5.5 cents in the last week and stands at $\$ 5.01$ per gallon.
"We continue to see the national average price of gaso line decline, now for the thirteenth straight week. Bu we're seeing drastically different price behaviors from coast to coast, with some areas seeing noticeable in creases while others are seeing decreases," said Patrick D Haan, head of petroleum analysis at GasBuddy.
De Haan continued, "Refinery issues in California are leading to increases in areas supplied by the state's refin eries, including areas of Arizona, Nevada, Oregon, Wash ington and of course, California. Gasoline supply remain tight for the East Coast with some modest moves up, while prices continue to edge lower in the Plains, South and areas of the Great Lakes. For now, I believe the dro in prices will overpower the increases, leading to poten tially another decline this week but we're in a very fragile time and certainly could see broader move higher in the weeks ahead." weeks ahead.

Based on our numbers, I couldn't use what I had learned in Friona. Everyone desperately wanted to help and serve, so they were offering to bring everything. While it wasn't organized, and at times it was a little chaotic, it worked!!!
Of course, we had more food than we needed, because isn't that the way it always is at church dinners?
So, why did we do this? Dorothy had not lived in Barksdale in years, so she had not attended church here in a long time. One of her sons belongs to our church, but he seldom attends. Our little church must have
meant a great deal o his mother, or she wouldn't have wanted her service to be here. I did not hear a single person question what we were doing or why. We did it because we love Jesus, and we wanted to be Him to this family and their friends. We were hop ing to show them His kindness and compas sion in their hour of need and sadness.
We are the smallest church in this area, but as I have said before, it is one of the most loving churches around God uses us to mee a definite need in the community. When you have willing hands and feet of God, it doesn't matter how large you are, because you can do anything!!!
How sad it would have been today if the doors on our church had been locked perma nently! Not only would this family have had to find another place for their mother's funeral 10 people would have missed an opportunity to serve Jesus! From pre$K$ through sixth grade, "Granny and Papa" would pick up Hannah each day after school, and Granny would go over the homework with Hannah. Most afternoons after the work was done, they would "play school," with Hannah teaching this time! Granny was not shy about telling her daughters that Hannah was her favorite!
Although she was especially fond of the "little ones," Mary loved people of all ages, shapes, sizes, colors, and backgrounds! She would stand for hours in the aisle of the grocery store, across the neighborhood fence, in the church foyer - visiting with friends, new and ld. She carried with her

their stories and prayed for their struggles.
Mary's love for people was also expressed in her faithful correspon her faithul dence to friends and family. She was an extremely gifted writer who also had textbookperfect penmanship. Her letters always began by recounting Hannah's current adventures and nd always ended with ords of encouragement, complete with a Scripture chosen just for that friend in that moment.
Mary's "love language" was service. She was always the first to bring a casserole to a ick friend or to voluneer to wash dishes after a fellowship luncheon. She loved to surprise her family and friends with things she thought they needed, but a gift to her would always prompt the same response, "You shouldn't have gotten me that! I don't need a thing!"
Mary was especially blessed by the "NESTers," a precious group of widow ladies from church who formed friendships that will last well past eternity. It was not known whether she enjoyed eating out or playing dominoes more laying dominoes more, but she sure looked forward to Mondays! Mary was quirky decked out in her signature color of bright orange lipstick and fingernail polish. She was always ready with a joke, although many times, the punchline eluded her. One Christmas, she was feeling especially herself. After a gift was opened, she would sneak to the back room and rewrap it, complete with a bow and name tag. When the lucky recipient would open it (again,) Mary would exclaim with great delight, "Now, you have TWO!" Mary loved to make people laugh, intentionally or otherwise. She was joyful, kind, compassionate, silly, strong, and generous. She held herself and others to a high standard.
Above all, Mary loved her Lord. Her well-worn Bible, which was missing its front cover and held together by packing tape, testified to her love of His Word and to her passion for writing His words on her
heart. She usually sat towards the back of the church service, but her singing voice carried throughout the sanctuary. Whether cooking, cleaning, driving, or just sitting in her chair resting, she could frequent y be found singing to herself and to her Lord. Her beautiful voice and the sound of her praises could be heard inside the gates of heaven long before she arrived.
Mary was a faithful Christian, wife, mother, grandmother, and friend. She kept the two greatest commandments well: "Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind. And your mind. And love your neighbor as yourself."
She would want us to remind you, as she did her doctors and nurses, friends and family, pass ing acquaintances and anyone who would lis ten: "I am blessed. God always takes care of me. I don't worry about anything because I know God. He is faithful, and His promises are true." One of her dear friends said, "She showed me said, She showed me that what we go through is nothing if we trust in God."

The American Revolution might have commenced April 19,1775, but by September 9 1776, the Continental Congress had officially changed the name of the country from the United Colonies to the "United States of Amer ica." The declaration stated, "That in all continental commissions, and other instruments, where, heretofore, the words 'United Colonies' have been used, the stile be altered for the future to the 'United States."'
"A resolution by Rich ard Henry Lee, which had been presented to Congress on June 7 and approved on July 2, 1776, issued the July 2 'That the U it colve That these United Col onies are, and of right ought to be, free and

independent States....' As a result, John Adams thought July 2 would be celebrated as "the most memorable epoch in the history of America." Instead, the day has been largely forgotten in favo of July 4, when Jeffer son's edited Declaration of Independence was adopted," according to History.com.
