Friona to receive \$64,229.18 in sales tax allocation for October

Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar announced this week that he will send cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose districts \$1.06 billion in local sales tax allocations for the month of October. This represents a 17.4% increase over the amount distributed in October 2021. These allocations are based on sales made in August by businesses that report tax monthly.

The City of Friona will receive \$64,229.18 in sales tax allocation for the month of October. This payment is a 33.56% percent increase over \$48,088.07 received in October of 2021. The year-to-date total of \$636.902.20 is 31.15 % higher than the \$484.858.20 received last year during the same time frame.

The Friona Economic Development Corporation (FEDC) will receive \$16,057.30 of the allocation for its operating budget.

Ironically, the meeting was cut short when the fire alarm sounded and everyone had to exit the building. 




Drought conditions expected to return

A warmer and drier September and the continued presence of La Nina conditions mean drought conditions are likely to return to the parts of Texas that got some relief in August, according to Dr. Mark Wentzel, a hydrologist with the Texas Water Development Board.

At the end of September, drought conditions covered 61% of the state, Wentzel wrote, which was down 15 percentage points from the end of August.

However, the National Weather Service expects a third straight fall and winter of La Niña conditions, meaning below-average rain and above-average temperatures across Texas during the fall and early winter. Those conditions are expected to dissipate early next year, hopefully bringing drought relief and possibly complete recovery by the end of next spring.

Avian flu shows up in backyard poultry flock

The highly contagious avian influenza was recently detected in a backyard poultry flock in Dallas County, prompting health experts to recommend owners of domestic birds to limit all unnecessary contact with wild birds. The virus is easily transmitted not just by actual contact but through contaminated equipment, clothing and even shoes of caretakers.

include Symptoms diarrhea, incoordination, lethargy, coughing, sneezing and sudden death, according to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

Game bird hunters are urged to wear gloves when disposing of carcasses, and disinfecting tools with a bleach solution. Those who find birds who have signs consistent with avian influenza should contact their local TPWD biologist, whose contact information can be found on the agency's website.

New ERCOT chief vows grid stability

The new CEO of the Electric Reliability Council of Texas said at a press conference last week that one of his main duties is convincing Texans they can stop worrying about the electric grid.

"The key is going to be continued reliable execution," Pablo Vegas said. "Achieving reliable operations over extreme conditions. weather

that's how you continue to build trust."

He made the comments at a press conference held jointly with Peter Lake, chair of the Public Utility Commission. Both Lake and Vegas said improvements and operational changes made since the February 2021 freeze have made the grid much more reliable.

They pointed out there were no systemic outages during one of the hottest summers on record, which spurred a record demand for power, the Austin American-Statesman reported.

"We continue to be tested, (and) we continue to pass those tests," Vegas said.

COVID-19 cases drop

The number of CO-VID-19 cases reported in the past week in Texas by the Coronavirus Resource Center at Johns Hopkins University decreased slightly to 13,442, with 92 deaths reported. Texas Department of State Health Services reported 1,147 lab-confirmed COVID-19 hospitalizations across the state, also a slight drop from the previous week.







National Pumpkin Month

October is National Pumpkin month and includes national days for Pumpkin Pie on the 12th, Pumpkin Festival on the 13th, and Pumpkin Day on the 16th. Here is a great recipe to help celebrate the pumpkin this month.

Pumpkin Pie Thumbprint Cookies

Ingredients

Filling:

1/2- Cup Libby's 100% Pure Pumpkin

1/3- Cup NESTLÉ® CARNATION® Evaporated Milk

1- Egg White

3- Tbsp Honey

3/4- tsp Pumpkin Pie Spice

1/2- tsp Vanilla Cookie Dough:

2- Sticks Butter room temperature

2- Cups All Purpose flour

1/4- Cup Honey

1/4- tsp Salt

1- egg yolk

Instructions

First things first get your oven preheating to 325oF. To make the filling you can use an electric mixer or mix by hand. Combine your pumpkin and honey and mix thoroughly. Add in your egg white, pumpkin pie spice, vanilla and evaporated milk and continue mixing until everything is well incorporated. In the bowl of a stand mixer or with an electric mixer mix your butter until it's light and fluffy, add in your hon-

ey, and egg yolk. Gradually add in your flour and salt and mix until well and you have a nice thick dough. Now you're going to scoop your dough out (I love my dough scoop for this, you can also use a spoon.) Roll your scooped dough into balls and place them on a cookie sheet, they don't spread out much but leave about 2 inches between them. Now we're going to make indentations in them, these are called thumbprints so you can use your thumb if you'd like, I use a wooden spoon handle though. Dip it in flour and push into the center of your dough balls. Now you're going to pop the cookies in the oven for 6 minutes. Then pull them out and push in the center again. This time you really don't want to use your thumb! Pop them back in for another 6 minutes. Now spoon your filling into the center of each cookie and put them back into the oven for another 5-6 minutes or until slightly golden brown and filling is mostly set. Let your pumpkin pie thumbprint cookies cool, if you can, and then enjoy!! Keep them in an airtight container if you have any left to store that is! Enjoy the fact that these sweet treats help balance out the other holiday goodies in the most delicious way pos-

Gas prices lower, diesel higher

Average gasoline prices in Texas have rose 1.3

cents in the last week, averaging \$3.25 per gallon, according to GasBuddy's survey of 13,114 stations in Texas. Prices in Texas are 9.8 cents per gallon

higher than a month ago and stand 30.6 cents per gallon higher than a year ago. According to Gas-Buddy price reports, the cheapest station in Texas was priced at \$3.28/g yesterday while the most expensive was \$4.49 per gallon.

The national average price of gasoline has fallen 5.4 cents in the last week, averaging \$3.86 per gallon. The national average is up 20.6 cents per gallon from a month ago and stands 56.6 cents per gallon higher than a year ago. The national average price of diesel has increased 18.7 cents in the last week and stands at \$5.06 per gallon.

"After a sharp rise in the national average over the last few weeks, we've seen an abrupt, yet expected decline as refinery issues have eased in the West and Great Lakes, overpowering some increases elsewhere. Though at the same time, diesel prices have soared," said Patrick De Haan, head of petroleum analysis at GasBuddy.

De Haan continued, "We'll see a continued sharp drop in gas prices on the West Coast, including areas like Las Vegas and Phoenix, which are supplied by refiners in California, as refinery outages have been addressed. The Great Lakes will see prices drift lower as BP's Whiting refinery is soon to complete maintenance. In addition, oil prices have cooled off slightly after OPEC+'s decision to cut production, and that should slow increases elsewhere. Diesel and heating oil prices are likely to continue to rise as extremely low inventories of middle of the barrel products like these two push prices higher."

Why do bad things happen?

A few Wednesday nights ago I conducted a Bible study with the title, "Why do bad things happen?" and it just so happened that two days earlier the church building had a major water leak cutting off water for over a week to half of the building. Thousands of dollars later and after much inconvenience suffered, I am glad to report that all the building has running water, but I also have to grin at the timing of the title of the Bible study and the major plumbing problem experienced. Does God have a sense of humor? I'd say that he does, and that week was a reminder that he does, and that we live in a world that is a mess. In all reality, if a major water leak was the worst thing that happened this year to any of us, that would be wonderful, but the truth is that much worse things happen, which begs the question, "Why do bad things happen?"

God's Word in the Bible answers this with crystal clarity, and the biggest reason bad things happen is because we live in a world that is broken because of sin. In the beginning God created this world and everything in it with pristine perfection where everything was very good (Genesis 1-2). 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

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Legally blind, 84-year-old hits first hole-in-one

Cotton Renner has played golf for 70 years. Seventy years of pars, bogeys, birdies, an occasional eagle and one miracle.

Renner, on July 30 while playing a foursome at Twin Oaks Country Club in Winnsboro, experienced a miracle. Renner hit his first hole-in-one.

As a legally blind 84-year-old, Renner is lucky to be out on the course, much less still stroking the ball that well. But, that is what he does as often as he can; he plays golf with a little help from his friends on the course.

"All my boys I play with always watch where it goes because I never see where I hit it," Renner said. "They all went to hollering 'bounce right, go in the hole, go in the hole, go in the hole.' I was looking at them, and they were jumping up and down and clapping, so I figured it must have went in."

Renner's "boys" are his two sons, Darcy and Robin, and any of the Club's regulars. They are all his "boys" to the longest standing Twin Oaks Country Club member.

"All these boys belong to me one way or the other," Renner said.

According to Darcy, who recently won the club's tournament senior division championship, his boys have lovingly nicknamed his father, "Where Did It Go?"

"After the shot he always asks 'What did it go?" Darcy explained, laughing.

When asked how the hole-in-one felt, Renner said, "It was pretty strange actually. My youngest son was playing in the foursome with me, and my other son was playing right behind me, so he was watching too. It was quite a feat."

Renner suffers from macular degeneration which causes loss in the center of the field of vision. In dry macular degeneration, the center of the retina deteriorates. With wet macular degeneration, leaky blood vessels grow under the retina.

Renner's condition does not stop him from enjoying the game he loves. He has learned to work through it. He describes the effects of macular degeneration as "spider webs" in your eyes.

Macular degeneration gradually fills the spider webs in. "So, you have to find where the holes (in the spider webs) are," Renner said.

The eye disease affects Renner's frontal vision, although he still has peripheral vision.

"When I cock my head just right, I can still see the ball," he said, lowering his head to the side. "I have to keep my head still because the ball disappears."

"Medically, he can't see, but he can hit it in the hole," Darcy said.

It's not just macular degeneration that slows Renner down. He also has two artificial knees and an artificial hip, but Renner stays on the course swinging away. It is where he wants to be.

"Not much left to go wrong with me," Renner said.

A lifelong passion

Golf has been a lifelong passion for Renner and his family.

He started playing golf at 13 when his brothers dug holes, sand traps and greens in a cow pasture near their west Texas home.

"We learned to play on that golf course," he remembered. "I played on that until I graduated high school"

He went into the service after high school. After serving his country, he returned to Texas and spent 20 years in the golf business managing golf courses. During that time, he received his Professional Golfer's Association (PGA) card.

In 1980, he moved to northeast Louisiana to start an irrigation business with his brother but golf remained an integral part of his and now his family's lives.

"My boys grew up on the golf course," Renner said. "I've had something to do with golf my whole life"

Darcy and Robin play golf and own a Liddieville turf farm. His wife, Kay, is also an avid golfer, and she has more hole-in-ones.

"She's not but 81, but she has six (hole-inones)," he said.

When asked how long he expects to play, Renner didn't have an exact answer.

"Golf is a sport that you can play from the time you are 10 years old until you are 84 at least," He advised, saying. "I don't know how much longer I'll keep playing. As long as I keep an eye on the ball, I'll keep playing."

He said golf can bring your family together.

"I just like everybody to realize that golf is something you can do with your family or friends," Renner said. "Any level you want to take it to. You can be a social golfer, a serious golfer, a competitive golfer. You can choose what you want to do. It's a great sport. You can tell the character of anybody you want to find out by playing golf."

Renner, his wife and boys will continue to play the sport they love together as a family.

"The moral of the story is you just got to keep trying and never give up," Tim Ford, one of Renner's adopted boys, said. "He is a super senior. At his age, he still hits the ball very well."

The storied Texas Rangers tracks its history to 1823, when Stephen F. Austin, the "Father of Texas", gave them the name while the territory was luring colonists from all over the country.

According to the Texas Department of Public Safety, "There was no regular army to protect them, so Austin called the citizens together and organized a group to provide the needed protection."

It wasn't until October 17, 1835, that Texas approved a resolution officially recognizing the Rangers as a corps of armed and mounted lawmen designed to "range and guard the frontier between the Brazos and Trinity Rivers." The province proclaimed its independence from Mexico in 1836. Nine years later, Texas became America's 28th state.

According to The Texas Department of Public Safety, "The Rangers [now] oversee the department's tactical program and operations, which includes the DPS SWAT Team, six Regional Special Response Teams, a Ranger Recon Team, an Explosive Ordnance Disposal Team and crisis negotiators."



October is Breast Cancer Awareness Month

Cancer Overview

Cancer is a broad term for a class of diseases characterized by abnormal cells that grow and invade healthy cells in the body. Cancer cells can then invade surrounding tissues or spread (metastasize) to other areas of the body.

What Causes Cancer To Develop?

Cancer begins in the cells which are the basic building blocks that make up tissue. Tissue is found in the breast and other parts of the body. Sometimes, the process of cell growth goes wrong and new cells form when the body doesn't need them and old or damaged cells do not die as they should. When this occurs, a build up of cells often forms a mass of tissue called a lump, growth, or tumor.

Understanding Breast

Breast cancer occurs when malignant tumors develop in the breast. These cells can spread by breaking away from the original tumor and entering blood vessels or lymph vessels, which branch into tissues throughout the body. When cancer cells travel to other parts of the body and begin damaging other tissues and organs, the process is called metastasis.

Facts

- In 2022, an estimated 287,500 new cases of invasive breast cancer will be diagnosed in women in the U.S. as well as 51,400 new cases of non-invasive (in situ) breast cancer.
- 65% of breast cancer cases are diagnosed at a localized stage (there is no sign that the cancer has spread outside of the breast), for which the 5-year relative survival rate is 99%.

- Although rare, men get breast cancer too. In 2022, an estimated 2,710 men will be diagnosed with breast cancer in the U.S. and approximately 530 men will die from breast cancer.

• Breast cancer is the most common cancer in American women, except for skin cancers. It is estimated that in 2022, approximately 30% of all new women cancer diagnoses will be breast cancer.

Early Detection

According to the American Cancer Society, when breast cancer

is detected early, and is in the localized stage, the 5-year relative survival rate is 99%. Early detection includes doing monthly breast selfexams, and scheduling regular clinical breast exams and mammograms.

Treatment

In general, there are five treatment options, and most treatment plans include a combination of the following: surgery, radiation, hormone therapy, chemotherapy, and targeted therapies. Some are local, targeting just the area around the tumor. Others are systemic, targeting your whole body with cancer fighting agents.
