

Hart Family goes to Austin

Dale and Laura Hart traveled to Austin last week with family members to attend the 47th Annual Texas Department of Agriculture's Family Land Heritage Ceremony. The event was held on Wednesday, October 19, 2022 in the historic House Chamber of the Texas Capitol. A complementary BBQ lunch was served on the southwest lawn of the capitol prior to the main ceremony. Texas Ag Commissioner Sid Miller congratulated all the honorees for 2022. Dale Hart Farm & Cattle received a Certificate of Honor along with 42 other honorees.

The Family Land Heritage program recognizes family farms and ranches engaged in continuous agricultural production for 100 years or more. The program began in 1974 and over the past four decades, has honored more

than 5,000 Texas family farms and ranches. Red Steagall provided the entertainment for the attendees and Dale & Laura also enjoyed a tour of the capitol.

Hart Farm & Cattle History

Lyman Henry Hart was born in Illinois in 1856. He married Lucy E. Hart and moved to Parmer County in 1919. They purchased 160 acres of land located 2 miles north of Friona on December 1, 1919. L.H. and Lucy had five children, Ida, Leon Henry, V.E., Charlie, and Lucy. They raised milo, sorghum, and other crops and raised their family on the Hart family farm.

After his parents' deaths, Leon continued to live on the Hart farm with his wife, Daisy Lee. Leon and his siblings acquired title to the land and later bought

out his siblings. Leon and Daisy had two children, Othelia and Dale.

Dale acquired title to the land in 1972 and his father died in 1978. Dale and his wife, Laura Lee, married on October 8, 1954, and have four children. Karene (Hart) Bass, Holly (Hart) Campbell, Evelyn (Hart) Romero, and Jeremy Dale Hart.

Dale, age 90, and Laura, 85, continue to live on the original Hart land. Current farming and ranching operations include Registered Shorthorn Cattle, CRP, and native grassland. Their daughter, Holly (Hart) Campbell and husband Danny also live on the property. Dale and Laura feel very blessed to be able to call Friona home and live on the homeplace.







Business leaders predict DACA end will cause crisis

Dozens of business leaders, including several in Texas, are urging Congress to protect young immigrants who came to the U.S. as children, warning that the end of the Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals program would exacerbate workforce shortages.

In a report published in The Dallas Morning News (originally in CQ-Roll Call), the leaders released a letter sent to congressional leaders and published as a full-page ad in The Morning News and other newspapers. They warn of serious workforce issues if a ruling by the U.S. Court of Appeals for the 5th Circuit gutting DACA protection holds.

The ad included the logos of about a dozen Texas-based businesses or business organizations, including private equity firm TPG, the North Texas Commission, the Texas Restaurant Association, the Texas Nursery and Landscape Association, the Texas Retailers Association and the Texas Association of Business.

If the work permits of DACA recipients expire, the business leaders said, the U.S. could lose more than half a million workers.

"The worker shortage will get worse for the United States if hundreds of thousands of critical workers are stripped of their legal ability to support themselves and their families," the business leaders wrote. "That is the situation

we currently face if this ruling becomes final, and it is the reason for our request today."

The U.S. House has passed a bill that would put DACA recipients and other young undocumented immigrants on a path to permanent residency, but the Senate has not taken up the measure.

PUC: No water disconnects during extreme cold

The Public Utility Commission of Texas last week adopted rules that prohibit non-municipal water and sewer utilities from cutting off service to customers during extreme cold weather emergencies.

"The new rules put the health and safety of Texans first during extreme cold weather emergencies," said PUCT Chairman Peter Lake. "This means Texans can focus on their family's safety during extreme cold and work with their water or sewer utility to make sure they pay their bills in a timely fash-

Extreme weather in Texas is defined as "periods beginning when the previous day's highest temperature in an area did not exceed 28 degrees Fahrenheit and the temperature is predicted to remain at or below that level for the next 24 hours according to the nearest National Weather Service reports for

The new rules came after passage of Senate Bill 3 in the last regular legislative session, in reaction to the disruption caused by Winter Storm Uri in February 2021.

More than 79,000 dead on Texas roads since 2000

It is a grim statistic. Not a single day in Texas since Nov. 7, 2000, has passed without a traffic fatality. Since that date, more than 79,000 people have died in traffic crashes, according to the Texas Department of Transportation. That is roughly equivalent to the entire population of Cedar Park. For the past several years, about 10 people die daily in crashes across the state.

Texas Transportation Commissioner Laura Ryan and others are championing TxDOT's #EndTheStreakTX campaign, saying every Texan must do their part to drive safely and care about others.

"With the knowledge that, since the pandemic, people don't seem to view others around them as part of a community, and, that they care less about those around them, we are starting to identify the problem," said Ryan. "If we know there is a problem and we can identify that a big part of the problem is a lack of caring or apathy, then we also know the solution -- we must care more about those around us."

National Candy Corn Day

You either love candy corn or you don't, and if you do love it, this is the season when you can easily find this candy. October 30th is National Candy Corn Day and here is a fun recipe for you to try.

Candy Corn Fudge

Ingredients

- 4 1/2 Cups White Chocolate Chips -Divided into 3-1 ½ cup portions 34 Cup Heavy Cream - Divided into 3- ¼ cup portions
- 3 tsp Vanilla Divided into 3-1 tsp portions
- 3 Tbsp Real Honey Divided into 3-1 Tbsp portions Yellow Gel Food Coloring Orange Gel Food Coloring

24 Pieces of Candy Corn

Instructions

Line a 9x5 loaf pan with aluminum foil leaving some hang over the edges, this makes it easier to remove the fudge when it is done. Butter foil or spray with cooking spray. In a small or medium sauce pan over low to medium heat combine 1 ½ cups white chocolate chips, ¼ cup heavy cream, 1 teaspoon vanilla, and 1 tablespoon honey. Stir frequently until everything is well incor-

porated and melted smooth. Add in yellow food coloring a little at a time until desired color is reached (I used about 1/8 of a teaspoon) Stir until the color is consistent throughout the mixture. Pour the yellow fudge mixture into your prepared pan, spread it evenly, and refrigerate for 30 minutes. Repeat the same process again but for the second layer add orange food coloring. Pour the orange mixture over the refrigerated yellow first layer, spread it evenly across, and place back in the refrigerator for another 30 minutes. Repeat the process again for the white layer. Spread the white mixture evenly across the refrigerated orange layer. Place in the refrigerator for 15 minutes. Remove from the refrigerator and arrange candy corn in 6 rows of 4 across the top of the white layer. It will still be soft so you can gently press the candy corn into the fudge so that it stays in place. I like to leave about ½ an inch around the edge of the baking pan so that it can be trimmed off to create nice, neat edges for the fudge. Arranging the candy corn like this allows for each square to have a piece on top of it. If you want to cut the fudge into smaller pieces you can arrange more candy corn across the top. Place the pan back in the refrigerator and chill for at least 2 hours. When you are ready to cut the fudge remove it from the refrigerator and allow it to sit at room temperature for about 15 minutes. Use foil handles to lift it from the pan. Place on a cutting board and unwrap the foil. Use a sharp knife to cut the fudge. To get clean cuts wipe the knife with a damp cloth or rinse it between cuts. Cut into 24 squares and enjoy! Store in an airtight container in the refrigerator.

My siblings and I had strong bonds with our parents' siblings. Our aunts and uncles wrote letters, flew or drove to Texas for visits, and hosted us on our family vacations. I learned from the best how to nurture this special family dynamic.

My nieces and nephews are more than physical extensions of my brothers and sisters. Christopher and Michael have been the boys I did not have. I spent their youngster time at ballparks or golf courses or halftime shows and

drove cross country with each on epic road trips when they were college students. Our golf games, though few, are now famous for brotherly smack talk and their aunt pretending to be an Irish PGA commentator in the middle of their back swings. But the mundane history we share is my favorite. I am the one who taught them how to go to the back yard when everyone is in the front yard saying good-bye after a big holiday meal and hurl leftover burned rolls over the roof to land on the unsuspecting relatives. Gas prices lower, diesel higher

Average gasoline prices in Texas fell 8.6 cents in the last week, averaging \$3.17 per gallon according to GasBuddy's survey of 13,114 stations in Texas. Prices in Texas are 7.0 cents per gallon higher than a month ago and stand 13.8 cents per gallon higher than a year ago. According to GasBuddy price reports, the cheapest station in Texas was priced at \$1.37 while the most expensive was \$4.49 per gallon.

The national average price of gasoline has fallen 9.3 cents in the last week, averaging \$3.77 per gallon. The national average is up 10.2 cents per gallon from a month ago and stands 41.2 cents per gallon higher than a year ago. The national average price of diesel has risen 4.0 cents in the last week and stands at \$5.30 per gallon.

"Average gas prices have declined for the second straight week with significant declines in the West and Great Lakes having an oversized effect on the drop in the national average," said Patrick De Haan, head of petroleum analysis at GasBuddy.

De Haan added, "With oil prices struggling a bit after reaching \$93 after OPEC+'s decision to cut production, many regions could see falling gas prices again this week as demand continues to decline seasonally, especially if more data points to a significant economic slowdown. While gasoline prices have seen a large drop, diesel prices have been somewhat mixed, with prices heading higher in the Northeast as inventories drop to extremely tight levels ahead of the heating oil season."

GasBuddy data is compiled from more than 11 million weekly price reports covering over 150,000 gas stations across the country.

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Beer is on the Ballot

Do you remember back when our state legalized the lottery system in the early 1990s. It was supposed to create windfall revenues for Texas education, thereby allowing the kids to have a better educational experience. Thirty years later, the Lottery has not raised the bar of education in Texas, or created an unlimited treasure trove of money for schools. In fact, what the lottery has done is fleece the poor with the enticement of striking it rich, and ruin the lives of many winners who did hit the jackpot, only to end up worse off than before.

In a very similar manner, alcohol sales in Friona is being pushed and promoted as a wonderful thing that will bring money back to town that is spent elsewhere, allowing businesses to profit from sales and the city to benefit from the sales tax revenue. One postcard I received proclaimed a Yes on issue one on the ballot in Friona would be a YES for kids and our community! Ironically, this flier that pushed voting yes for issue one on the ballot, neither mentioned that the vote was on alcohol sales, but used pictures of kids in a classroom and a football scoreboard to show that one's Yes vote would help the community tremendously. In reality, a Yes vote to legalize the sale of alcohol will not affect kids as the postcard picture portrayed, but will allow some kids an easier opportunity to obtain alcohol, sadly some kids will be abused by a drunk or alcoholic parent, and now it will be much easier to give Coors or Budweiser a portion of a family's income, instead of spending on needs of the kids

As beer is on the ballot for Friona residents, understand that a Yes vote won't be all it is cracked up to be. Just like Obamacare was not the savior of healthcare, the Texas lottery was not the silver bullet for education funding, the legal sale of alcohol in Friona will NOT be an amazing blessing for our community. The easier access to alcohol may make a few folks some money, but it will aid in the destruction of families, wreck havoc on marriages, plunge someone deeper into depression and addiction, or even lead to the untimely and tragic deaths of your kid or grandkid. You may not know of Dustin Campbell, Rex Thackerson or Belinda Miles, but chances are you do know people whose lives were ruined by alcohol or cut short just like theirs. Some mistakes cannot be undone, and alcohol is a great facilitator to help destroy lives, families, hopes and dreams, leaving loved ones with a massive wake or grief, what ifs and unanswered questions.

In all honestly, people will choose if they want to drink alcohol, which is not sinful if done so in careful moderation, but scripture is also very clear on the serious dangers of alcohol. Proverbs 20:1 says "Wine is a mocker, strong drink a brawler, and whoever is led astray by it is not wise." Friona residents will get to vote Yes or No to inviting alcohol sales into Friona. 
Squaws in Playoffs!!!



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


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Obituaries



Commissioners approve requests for ARPA funds

Parmer County Commissioners Court met in regular session on Monday October 24, 2022 at 10:00 a.m. in the County Courtroom of the Parmer County Courthouse in Farwell, Texas. The meeting began with prayer and the Pledge of Allegiance to the American Flag and Texas Flag.

There were no comments from the public during the open forum. Minutes from the October 11th meeting were read and approved. Commissioners approved the payment of the accounts payables as presented by County Treasurer Sharon May. The Treasurer's Payroll Report was also approved. The District Attorney's Forfeiture Report, as presented by Charlotte Marrufo, was approved.

Rhonda Wilkins, representing the Senior Citizen Fellowship Center in Friona, addressed the Court regarding the financial difficulties the Center is having. Earlier in the month the group had asked the Friona City Council for financial assistance. The Council pledged \$600 per month and the waiving of water and sewer fees. The Commissioners Court approved the use of ARPA funds in the amount of \$28,000 for a 2-year period beginning November 1st. The Senior Center will have to provide receipts in order to receive payments.

Danny Campbell, Fire Chief of the Friona Volunteer Fire Department, presented a request for ARPA funds in order to purchase 2 thermal imaging cameras for use in fire fighting and rescue calls. The current camera is not reliable and could put firefighters in danger. Commissioners approved \$16,736.00 in ARPA funds to purchase the cameras.

In other business, the Treasurer's Quarterly Report by County Treasurer Sharon May was reviewed and approved. Consideration of a burn ban for Parmer County was tabled until the next meeting. Currently there is no burn ban in effect for the county.

Parmer County Sheriff Eric Geske informed the Court that the Parmer County Law Enforcement Center is currently housing 22 inmates of which 9 are paying customers from Deaf Smith County. A contract with Justice Benefits Inc. for the SCAAP Program was approved. The company will monitor and facilitate reimbursement for Parmer County regarding the housing of federal prisoners including illegal aliens. The contract must be approved annually and can be modified every two years. As stated in the contract, Justice Benefits Inc. will receive 22% of the funds it collects for the county.

Next scheduled meeting is Monday, November 14th.

All meetings are open to the public. Information in this article is only a summary.
