



State Capital Highlights

Patrick lays out legislative priori-

Lt. Gov. Dan Patrick outlined his goals for the upcoming legislative session, calling them "general concepts," according to the Austin American-Statesman.

With an estimated \$27 billion surplus, the Legislative Budget Board voted last week to boost the Legislature's spending capacity by 12.3% — the largest increase allowed under the state constitution. But that still leaves the Legislature having about \$14.5 billion in the piggy bank above its spending limit.

Consequently, property tax reduction is one of Patrick's priorities. He is calling for a hike in the homestead property tax exemption from \$40,000 to \$60,000, as well as an expansion of personal property exemptions for businesses, the Statesman reported.

Other priorities include strengthening the state's power grid, boosting border security and law enforcement measures, such as increasing pay for sheriffs and a 10-year mandatory minimum sentence for anyone who uses a gun while committing a crime.

Patrick stressed that the Legislature has the ultimate say.

"So much of what I'm laying out today is not specific, because it's really up to the members to write the bills in the Senate and the House," Patrick said. "It's good that the Legislature is back. We have an extraordinary opportunity, like we have never had before, to chart the future of the state of Texas."

Rainy Day Fund, highways get boost from oil, gas revenues

A significant amount of the state's current surplus is coming from oil and gas industry tax revenues, with the latest contribution being \$7.3 billion split equally between the Rainy Day Fund and the State Highway Fund. A 2014 constitutional amendment mandates that 75% of oil and gas tax revenue that exceeds the amount collected in 1987 be split evenly between the two funds.

"Revenue from the oil and gas industry is what's in the Rainy Day Fund, accounts for billions to the State Highway Fund, and contributes to state funds that pay for schools, universities, and first responders," Texas Railroad Commission Chairman Wayne Christian said.

Report: Private border wall could collapse

A U.S. Department of Justice report kept secret for more than a year and produced by the global engineering firm Arcadis concludes a private border wall along the Rio Grande in Hidalgo County is in danger of collapsing if the area receives extreme flooding.

The report, obtained by Pro-Publica and The Texas Tribune, concludes the wall built by Fisher Industries doesn't meet basic international building code and industry standards. Its foundation is far shallower than previous border walls built by the federal government.

The feds reached a settlement with Fisher Industries last May requiring that the fence be inspected quarterly, that bollards be removed, and that a gate be maintained to allow for the release of floodwaters.

An attorney for Fisher Industries said the company "strongly disagrees" with the report. However, several civil engineering experts say the settlement ignores the report's conclusions. Alex Mayer, a civil engineering professor at the University of Texas at El Paso, said the agreement overlooks what he termed the wall's flawed design, as pointed out by the report.

"It just shows the shoddiness of the whole effort. It worries me even more," Mayer said.

The two news organizations spent 15 months trying to obtain the Arcadis report, which confirms their earlier reporting about the privately built wall's potential flaws.

Texas traffic congestion increased in 2021

Delays on the state's most crowded roadways grew last year, though they are still below pre-pandemic gridlock levels, according to the latest study by the Texas A&M Transportation Institute. The institute has conducted the study annually since 2009.

This year's "winner" for most gridlocked stretch is Houston's West Loop, which held onto the title it garnered the previous year. Rounding out the top five of roadways one might consider avoiding if possible are the Woodall Rogers Freeway in Dallas; Interstate 35 in Austin; and Houston's Eastex and Southwest Freeways.

Researchers say traffic delays cost

a ton of money in lost time and wasted fuel - more than \$3.8 billion on the state's busiest road sections last year, though that is about 10% lower than pre-pandemic levels.

Delays are not confined to the state's largest cities. Gridlock affects areas of all sizes, according to the institute, which has compiled a complete list of 1,860 road segments in 23 urban regions across Texas. The list can be found at mobility.tamu.edu.

Lawmakers sign NDAs to get Uvalde info

A half-dozen Texas lawmakers signed nondisclosure agreements to obtain investigative records from the Texas Department of Public Safety concerning the May shooting at Robb Elementary School in Uvalde that have thus far been kept secret from the public.

The Austin American-Statesman reported that state Sen. Roland Gutierrez, D-San Antonio, whose district includes Uvalde, was one of the six. Others include Sens. Royce West, Juan "Chuy" Hinojosa and Paul Bettencourt, and Reps. Dustin Burrows and Tracy King, according to the DPS. Most of the agreements were signed in June or July.

Since the shooting, which killed 19 students and two teachers, parents and others have fought for investigative records that might explain the failed law enforcement response at the school. A coalition of media outlets, including the Statesman, have sued seeking the public release of information from DPS.

COVID-19 cases rise in state

The number of COVID-19 cases in the past week in Texas rose to 21,026, with 43 deaths reported by the Coronavirus Resource Center at Johns Hopkins University. That is more than double the number of new cases reported the previous week. There are 1,750 lab-confirmed COVID-19 hospitalizations throughout the state — also an increase, according to the Texas Department of State Health Services.







National Brownie Day

Here is a recipe to help you survive National Brownie Day on December 8th. This looks like a good one. Hope you enjoy it.

Seriously Fudgy Homemade Brownies

Ingredients

3/4 cup (12 Tbsp; 175g) unsalted butter

one 4 ounce (113g) semi-sweet chocolate bar, coarsely chopped*

2 cups (400g) granulated sugar*

3 large eggs, at room temperature

2 teaspoons pure vanilla extract

1 cup (82g) unsweetened natural or dutch-process cocoa powder*

1 cup (125g) all-purpose flour (spoon & leveled)


1 teaspoon salt

optional: 1 and 1/4 cups (225g) semi-sweet chocolate chips

Instructions

Preheat the oven to 350°F (177°C) and grease a 9×13 inch pan or line with aluminum foil or parchment paper, leaving an overhang on the sides to lift the finished brownies out (makes cutting easier!). Set aside. In a microwave-safe bowl, combine the butter and 2 ounces of chopped chocolate. Melt in 30 second increments, whisking after each, until completely smooth. Whisk in the sugar until completely

combined, then whisk in the eggs and vanilla. The batter will be light brown and a little dull looking. Add the cocoa powder, flour, salt, remaining 2 ounces of chopped chocolate and the chocolate chips. Fold it all together with a rubber spatula or wooden spoon. Batter will be very thick. Spread evenly into prepared pan. Bake for 30 minutes, then test the brownies with a toothpick. Insert it into the center of the



pan. If it comes out with wet batter, the brownies are not done. If there are only a few moist crumbs, the brownies are done. Keep checking every 2 minutes until you have moist crumbs. My brownies take 31-32 minutes. Remove from the oven and place on a wire rack to cool completely in the pan before cutting into squares. Cover and store leftover brownies at room temperature for up to 1 week.

It Was Said

Podcast alert.

Audio blogs, as they were originally called, gained momentum in 2004 as broadband internet access increased. Podcasting in 2022 gives listeners shows about financial advice, history, true crime, self-help, current events, religion, commentary, sports cooking, and education. Some are just fun and funny. I've mentioned some I enjoy in a previous column, and now I'd like to give you another recommendation.

Before you older folks

think this medium is not for you, please reconsider. I am in that category myself and have found it to be user and listener friendly. Your smart phone probably comes with the podcast app. It is a purple icon. Click on it, do some searching involving your interests, and I bet you a podcast is out there to suit your fancy. Most are free; some are through a provider such as Wondery which might run you \$4.99 a month and is commercial or ad-free. I don't mind the ads, so I

listen for free.

My new favorite is one called It Was Said, hosted by Pulitzer-Prize winning writer/historian Jon Meacham. In this podcast, which is now into Season Two, Meacham narrates the stories and people behind some powerful speeches. Many of the speeches are not as wellknown as *The Gettysburg* Address or John F. Kennedy's inauguration address in 1961. Rather, Meacham highlights the orations of well-known world figures giving speeches that may not be in history books.

A good historian's lens is one of balancing objectivity with subjectivity. Meacham does not reflect a calculated bias but more of an appreciation for speeches that tell us what we need to hear. From Margaret Thatcher's unpopular economic policies, Meacham recalls her address called The Lady's Not for Turning. Lis-

teners hear Great Britain's first woman Prime Minister spell out the most concise argument for conservatism. Kennedy's 1962 speech at Rice University makes the Meachum cut, too. We Choose to Go to the Moon puts in motion a dream which becomes a reality. Words can do that.

Margaret Chase Smith and Nelson Mandela are included in Meacham's Season Two podcast, too. Smith, the first woman U.S. Senator, took on Joseph McCarthy in 1950 with The Declaration of Conscience. On another continent a decade later, Mandela told a jury *I Am* Prepared to Die before being sentenced to Robben Island.

A podcast's success depends on a good voice. Meacham carries that weight. But make no mistake that the real stars of the show are the words which mattered then and continue to resonate today.

Gas prices fall again

Average gasoline prices in Texas fell 11.3 cents last week, averaging \$2.71 per gallon, according to Gas-Buddy's survey of 13,114 stations in Texas. Prices in Texas are 43.5 cents per gallon lower than a month ago and stand 20.1 cents per gallon lower than a year ago. According to GasBuddy price reports, the cheapest station in Texas was priced at \$2.29 while the most expensive was \$4.49 per gallon.

The national average price of gasoline has fallen 15.8 cents in the last week, averaging \$3.36 per gallon. The national average is down 43.0 cents per gallon from a month ago and stands 1.5 cents per gallon higher than a year ago. The national average price of diesel has fallen 13.6 cents in the last week and stands at \$5.06 per gallon.

"For the first time in 670 days, the national average price of gasoline has fallen below its year-ago level, dropping for the fourth straight week to its lowest level since January," said Patrick De Haan, head of petroleum analysis at GasBuddy.

De Haan continued, "Every state has again seen average gasoline prices drop in the last week, and it remains very possible the national average could fall under \$3 per gallon by Christmas. There has also been a drop in diesel prices, which this week will fall back under \$5 per gallon, and could soon thereafter fall to their lowest level since March. However, despite all the good news about fuel prices, there may be some concerns coming as the price cap on Russian oil kicks in. Retaliation is possible, and while OPEC+ upheld production cuts from last month, they could always cut more production. For now, however, we'll likely see another week of declines at the pump in nearly all areas."

GasBuddy data is compiled from more than 11 million weekly price reports covering over 150,000 gas stations across the country.

According to Gail Rodgers, "Inner peace begins with a relationship with God, and it continues as we focus on His strength and trust Him to fill us...If inner peace is eluding you these days and anxiety is spilling over in your life, choose to trust God. You can choose to put your hand in His and draw from His patience through the maze of life if you ask Him.

Choosing to trust God with those blind corners in your life will take you down the road to inner peace. Choosing not to trust Him will take you down the road to stress and worry. Inner peace is there for the choosing."

For me, peace comes from reading the Bible. Bolinger says that, "Peace from God, biblical peace, allows us to trust in God's promises through restful, tranquil faith, despite the dark, scary world around us."

Biblical peace also "guards our hearts from the devil" (Philippians 4:7); "brings us joy" (Proverbs 12:20); "is a blessing from God" (Psalm 29:11); "assists us during dire circumstances" (Isaiah 54:10).

At the conclusion of her article, Bolinger asks God to, "keep us in perfect peace as our mind is stayed on the truth of Your powerful hand...Help us to trust fully in You and rest in the peace that you offer." May we all continue to focus on the birth and Second Coming of Jesus, and may we choose to trust God and rest in the peace that only He offers!
