Commissioners receive annual fire reports

Parmer County Commissioners Court met in regular session on Monday December 12, 2022 at 10:00 a.m. in the County Courtroom of the Parmer County Courthouse in Farwell, Texas. The meeting began with prayer and the Pledge of Allegiance to the American Flag and Texas Flag.

There were no comments from the public during the open forum. Minutes from the November 28th meeting were read and approved. Commissioners approved the payment of the accounts payables as presented by County Treasurer Sharon May. The Treasurer's Payroll Report was also approved.

Daniel Kaltwasser of the Farwell Fire Department and Weldon Kube of Farwell EMS presented requests for ARPA funds to purchase needed equipment. For the Farwell Fire Department, Commissioners unanimously approved \$20,033.00 for the purchase of bunker gear (personal protective equipment used by firefighters) and a special washing machine to clean the gear. For the Farwell EMS, Commissioners unanimously approved \$19,323,12 for the purchase of a CPR mamer County. Bovina Fire Department responded to 37 calls; Farwell Fire Department responded to 69 calls; Friona Fire Department responded to 81 calls; Lazbuddie Fire Department responed to 27 calls; and the Rhea Fire Department responded to 12 calls. All of the fire departments, except Rhea, will be reimbursed by the County at a rate \$186.92 per call.

Parmer County Sheriff Eric Geske informed the Court that the Parmer County Law Enforcement Center is currently housing 37 inmates of which 8 are paying customers from Deaf Smith County and 8 are paying customers from Dawson County. A new vehicle for the SO arrived last week and is being outfitted for service.

In other business, requests from county employees for payment on unused vacation hours was approved. Also, Judge Trey Ellis said that the Lazbuddie 1 Wind Project appears to be picking up steam. He noted that requests for road use policies is a strong indication that the project is moving forward.

Friona will receive a \$53,697.04 tax allocation payment for December

Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar announced last week that he will send cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose districts \$1.1 billion in local sales tax allocations for December. The amount is a 12.4 percent increase over the total distributed in December 2021. These allocations are based on sales made in October by businesses that report tax monthly.

The City of Friona will receive \$53,697.04 in sales tax allocation for the month of December. This payment is a 25.52% percent decrease compared to the \$72,101.66 received in December of 2021. However, the year-todate total of \$746,053.21 is 20.37% higher than the \$619,750.69 received last year during the same time frame.

The Friona Economic Development Corporation (FEDC) will receive \$13,424.26 of the allocation for its operating budget.

as Farm Credit Services board since 2015 and the Great Plains Ag Credit board from 2009-14. He also serves on the boards of the Parmer County Hospital District and Parmer Medical Center. He holds a degree in agricultural economics from Texas Tech University.

Floerke has served on the Farm Credit Bank of Texas board since 2017 and has been its vice chair since 2021. She also serves on the bank's audit and compensation committees

and is a member of the Tenth District Farm Credit Council. Floerke raises cattle and hay in Lampasas County, and co-owns Agro-Tech Services. In addition, she serves on the Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Leadership Advisory Board for Lampasas County and is a member of the Texas Agricultural Cooperative Council board.



A Friona Star Interview Jose (Joe) Mejia

Faith, Family, Friends, & Friona

When Joe Mejia first arrived in Friona in 1972 one of first things he noticed was a sign that encouraged travelers to "Visit Friona...Stay Awhile". Joe took that advice to heart and this November marks 50 years that he has called Friona home. The "old-timer" dropped by the Star and reminisced about the past half-century and what Friona means to him.

[FS] How did you find your way to Friona?

In 1972 my mom, Dora Mejia, moved our family from California to Texas hoping that the Texas panhandle would bring endless opportunities for her children. Even though she was a widow and illiterate, she knew that education was the key to success.

We lived with a relative at Black when we first arrived and then moved to 1307 Walnut in Friona which became our family homestead.

[FS] Who have been the biggest influences in your life?

No logré mis metas solo. I did not achieve my goals alone. I had help. In 1974 Robert Neelley and Gary Brown took a chance on a young high school graduate and hired me to work at Friona State Bank. That job gave me a steady income and helped me earn a banking degree. My 21 years at FSB gave me the skills necessary to later own and operate Pepitos Burritos for 13 years, SACAME Bail Bonds for 10 years, and currently JSM Financial & Joe's Income Tax. Also, Baker Duggins, Cecil Maddox, Raymond Adams, and W.D. Buske were there at the right place and time to provide me with financial and

emotional support. My friends from St. Teresa's Church and Friona Noon Lions Club also contributed to my benefit and growth. One of my favorite Bible verses is Philippians 4:13 which states, "I can do all things through Christ which strengthens me."

[FS] What are some of your favorite memories from the past 50 years?

Sometimes things change and we just take them for granted. For example, the "new" St. Teresa Catholic Church and the "new" hospital. It took a lot of hard work to make those dreams a reality. Also, the new Primary School, Post Office, Library, and two new Allsup's stores didn't just happen. A lot of effort has been expended to make Friona a nicer place to live and I appreciate those who have done the heavy lifting.

[FS] Where does your passion for education come from?

Two main sources. First, it was my mom's awareness of the importance of education that inspired her to bring us to Texas. Second, it is the first-hand experience of how education can improve your life. I am living proof that education

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Oatmeal Muffins

December 19th is National Oatmeal Muffin Day. This recipe has blueberries, because I can't resist a good muffin recipe with blueberries. The oats are just a bonus.

Blueberry Oatmeal Muffins www.sallysbakingaddiction.com

Ingredients

1 cup (240ml) milk
1 cup (80g) old-fashioned whole rolled oats
1 and 1/4 cups (156g) all-purpose flour (spoon & leveled)
1 teaspoon baking powder
1/2 teaspoon baking soda
1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup (115g) unsalted butter, melted and slightly cooled
1/2 cup (120ml) honey
1 large egg, at room temperature
1 teaspoon pure vanilla extract
1 cup (190g) fresh or frozen blueberries (see note if using frozen)

Instructions

Combine milk and oats. Set aside for 20 minutes so the oats puff up and soak up some moisture. This is crucial to the recipe! (I usually melt the butter now so it has a few minutes to cool.) Don't do this the night before as that's too long for soaking. If you find the oats haven't soaked up any moisture after 20 minutes, give it a stir and wait 10 more minutes. Preheat oven to 425°F (218°C). Spray a 12-count muffin pan with nonstick spray or use cupcake liners. Whisk the flour, baking powder, baking soda,

cinnamon, and salt together in a large bowl until combined. Set aside. Whisk the melted butter, honey, egg, and vanilla extract together in a medium bowl until combined. Pour the wet ingredients into the dry ingredients, stir a few times, then add the soaked oats (milk included, do not drain) and blueberries. Fold everything together gently just until combined. Spoon the batter into liners, filling them all the way to the top. Top with oats and a light sprinkle of coconut sugar, if desired. Bake for 5 minutes at 425 then, keeping the muffins in

the oven, reduce the oven temperature to 350°F (177°C). Bake for an additional 16-17 minutes or until a toothpick inserted in the center comes out clean. The total time these muffins take in the oven is about 22-23 minutes, give or take. (For mini muffins, bake 11-13 minutes at 350°F (177°C).) Allow the muffins to cool for 5 minutes in the muffin pan, then transfer to a wire rack to continue cooling. Muffins stay fresh covered at room temperature for a few days, then transfer to the fridge for up to 1 week.



Holiday motorists will see lower prices

Average gasoline prices in Texas have fell 5.0 cents in the last week, averaging \$2.66 per gallon, according to GasBuddy's survey of 13,114 stations in Texas. Prices in Texas are 39.8 cents per gallon lower than a month ago and stand 19.5 cents per gallon lower than a year ago. According to GasBuddy price reports, the cheapest station in Texas was priced at \$2.09 while the most expensive was \$4.49 per gallon.

The national average price of gasoline has fallen 14.4 cents per gallon in the last week, averaging \$3.21 per gallon. The national average is down 56.5 cents per gallon from a month ago and stands 11.0 cents per gallon lower than a year ago. The national average price of diesel has fallen 14.9 cents in the last week and stands at \$4.91 per gallon. "Not only has the decline in gasoline prices lasted five straight weeks, with again every state seeing a weekly decline in its average, but average diesel prices have fallen in 49 states over the last week as well. The relief is saving Americans roughly \$20 per fill-up compared to six months ago," said Patrick De Haan, head of petroleum analysis at GasBuddy. De Haan added, "On the previously hard-hit West Coast, average prices have fallen nearly \$2 per gallon since October. Fifteen states now have average gasoline prices of \$2.99 or less, with several more to join this week. We remain on schedule to see the national average gas price fall below \$3 by Christmas, with diesel set to fall 50 cents to \$1 per gallon over the next six weeks or so. While the Keystone Pipeline shutdown has been getting some attention, motorists need not worry much about the oil-carrying pipeline for now. There is no expected impact to gasoline prices as of now." GasBuddy data is compiled from more than 11 million weekly price reports covering over 150,000 gas stations across the country.



Years ago, while preparing a talk for a Walk to Emmaus, I spent quite a bit of time thinking about the difference between happiness and joy. I came to the conclusion that being happy is temporary; you can be happy one minute, and then sad, unhappy, angry the next; jov is everlasting. Pope Francis said, 'To be happy is good, yet joy is something more. It's another thing, something that does not depend on external motivations, or on passing issues: It is more profound. It is a gift".

Hope Bolinger reminds us that Biblical joy comes from God alone. When I think about what God has done in my life, I feel joy. When I think about God giving us a Christmas Eve grandchild, I feel joy. When I think about the way I came to accept Jesus as my Lord and Savior, I feel the joy and wonder I felt when I knew God was choosing me to be His child. These are just a few examples of joy that I have not earned; that I did not deserve; that I never knew would mean so much to me, but they were given to me by God. And, when God gives you joy, He doesn't take it back; John 16:22 says no one can take joy from us. We may, for whatever reason, decide to lose our joy, but that is

a choice we make.

This is the third week of Advent, and after two weeks of introspection, contemplation of our sins, repentance, and getting our hearts right with God, we are getting closer and closer to the celebration of the birth of Jesus. Methodist minister Kathy Brumbaugh points out that the closer we get to the celebration of the Nativity, "the songs and hymns sung in churches across the world become more and more joyful and expectant. Each week, as we draw closer to celebrating Christmas with family and friends and invited guests, it is joy that should be leading the season."

It is this week that the rose pink Candle of Joy was lit in churches and homes. It is also known as the Shepherd Candle, because according to Bolinger,"this candle reflects the joy that comes through Jesus' arrival, and through the salvation He has gifted us...It is an eager anticipation about wonderful things to come. The shepherds experienced this as they ran to Bethlehem to see Jesus."

There are several reasons why this candle is pink rather than purple. First of all, pink is a liturgical color for joy or rejoicing. Brumbaugh offers that, "In the Catholic church and Anglican Communion, it is known as Gaudete (rejoice) Sunday, because it is representative of the beginning of the mass in which the priest enters saying, 'Rejoice! Rejoice in the Lord always! Again, I say rejoice!" (Philippians 4:4).

Brumbaugh notes the pink candle marks the halfway mark of the Advent Season, and it is a "time to be joyful in the coming of the Christ."

Bolinger makes the point that, "Joy is essential to the Christian experience. We cannot get far without it, and we need it as we, like the shepherds, anticipate the coming of our Savior."

According to Brumbaugh, rather than worrying about getting ready for Christmas, we need to take a break in this Advent season to be joyful about the many ways God has blessed us this year. We need to remember God's love is an eternal love based on His goodness and mercy, no matter what the circumstances are, and that should always bring us joy!!!

Take care, everyone, and I hope you are filled with more and more of God's joy as we near the celebration of the birth of Jesus and anticipate His Second Coming!!! Website-<u>www.thevictory.tv</u>

Retiring senator named Secretary of State

Retiring state Sen. Jane Nelson, R-Flower Mound, has been named the next secretary of state by Gov. Greg Abbott. She replaces John Scott, who announced his resignation effective at year's end.

Scott was the third nominee for the post not confirmed by the Senate. He was appointed in October 2021, and the Legislature has not met since then. Nelson, who is completing 30 years in the Senate, should be a strong candidate for approval because of her lengthy tenure there. A new legislative session convenes in January.

The secretary of state's office, among other duties, oversees the state's election process.

"I look forward to this new chapter of public service and appreciate the confidence Governor Abbott has placed in me to serve as Secretary of State," Nelson said in a statement. "Voters expect fair elections with accurate, timely results, and I am committed to making that happen. Texans with all political views should have faith in our election system."

TikTok banned on all state-issued phones

Abbott last week ordered all Texas state agencies to ban use of the social media app TikTok on any government-issued device, saying it risks allowing China to gain access to "critical U.S. information."

The popular video-sharing application is owned by a Chinese company and is used by an estimated 85 million people in the United States.

TikTok maintains the Chinese government has never tried to access the data of its users, the Austin American-Statesman reported.

Abbott said he is prepared to work with state lawmakers to make the ban permanent during the next session, and to extend the ban to devices issued by local governments, such as cities and counties.

"We must work together to stop the Chinese government's efforts to collect, store, and distribute Texans' data and personal information," Abbott wrote in a letter to Lt. Gov. Dan Patrick and House Speaker Dade Phelan.

Calling All Panhandle Residents: Newly Released Fcc Maps Need Public Input By January 13!

Region 16, The City of Amarillo, Amarillo Area Foundation, Connected Nation, local businesses, vested business partners, and nonprofit organizations have been working together in "the Panhandle Spirit" to build what we call "Panhandle Connected." We understand that everything works together as an ecosystem. We need to attract, train, and maintain local talent, but we can't do this unless there are strong business development and educational oppor-Furthermore, tunities. business development and education opportunities can't exist without modern means of connectivity which is why we need to work together for the benefit of all. The goal of "Panhandle Connected" is to ensure that all students and cities in the Panhandle of Texas have access to sustainable, low-cost, and equitable internet connectivity.

On November 18, the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) released the first draft of a new National Broadband Map, that displays where broadband internet services are - and are not - available across the country.

Why Is Public Input So **Important?**

The recently released National Broadband Map will help the federal government decide where it should direct many millions of federal dollars under the national Broadband Equity Access and Deployment (BEAD) program. Identifying inaccuracies in the maps produced by the FCC will help Texas get its full share of funding. The National Telecommunications and Information Administration (NTIA) is encouraging entities and individuals to submit their challenges before Jan. 13 to give the FCC time to process them and to make sure they are included in the final version of the map that will be used to set funding allocations for states-which will be announced June 30. Community voice is critical

as the process for submitting challenges.

Understanding the Map & Challenge Process

To improve the accuracy of these data sets, the FCC created the challenge process for states, local communities, and the general public to challenge both the accuracy of the physical map and service availability data.

Since Sept. 12, the FCC has been accepting feedback on the data from providers and state, local, and Tribal governments. How-

ever, the FCC's newly published map does not yet include results from these location challenges and is now taking input from all community members. We have already heard feedback from communities that these maps contain multiple

errors. Once challenges are resolved, the updated data will be distributed to providers before the next round of reporting, which starts on December 31.


