Since then American women have served their country in peacetime and in conflict, in such places as Vietnam, Panama and the Middle East. Recently women were allowed to serve in combat for the first time.

Members of the General Federation of Women's Clubs have donated almost half a million dollars to the memorial cost. Gardetto's Recipe

GARDETTO'S SNAK CRAK-ERS

1 commercially prepared, refrigerated pie crust 2 tablespoons honey 1½ cup crushed Gardetto's

SNAK-ENS® 1/4 teaspoon cracked black pepper (optional)





SHS Art Dept. Busy Doing Different Things This Semester


The Stratford High School Art Dept has been busy doing many different things this semester. We started out with basic drawing techniques, studying line, value, and texture then moved on to drawing parts of the body. The students drew all of the facial features. From that point, they drew a face from a photograph as well as hands. After finishing the pencil drawing projects they went on to design projects. These were projects that tested their creativity more than their drawing ability. After finishing the design projects the students learned 1 and 2 pint perspective. They drew roads and railroad track with fences and telephone poles along side them for the 1 point perspective. In two point perspective, the students drew a street scene. They drew a cityscape as they would see it from the street corner.

The students have just finished working on Calligraphy. They studied and practiced 7 different styles of calligraphy and copied a poem on parchment paper using their favorite style of calligraphy. To finish out the semester the students will make paper, draw in pen and ink, scratchboard, and do

a picture using pen and ink and watercolor pencil.

Some of the advanced students have worked on various other projects. Finnan McClellan is in Commercial Art. Finnan does a lot of computer generated work. He works with other teachers, students, and the public to design fliers, brochures, and various other needed items to suit their needs. Aaron Rodriguez and Liliana Jacquez are working with Mrs. Wells English class to create a dragon head for a play the Junior Honors English class will put on. Todd Teig weaves rugs, place mats, hot pads, etc. and sells his work to the public. Annie Ortega is a Art 4 student and works on drawing and design projects that use the skills that she has leaned through the years. She is currently working on a stained glass piece. Some of the advanced students are also throwing pottery on the potter's wheel.
