# Hale's Commitment Is **Held Up For Two Weeks**

### King of the Osage Hills Gets Life Term Again in Federal Trial At Pawhuska.

W. K. Hale, "King of the Osage so-called because of his wide dealings in cattle in the vicinity of Pawhuska, was given a life sentence in Federal Court at Pawhuska Saturday of last week by a jury in the third trial he has had since government operatives began trying to solve the mystery of the killing of the Osage Indians three years ago.

Commitment on the verdict of the jury was delayed for a period of two weeks, however, by the judge of two weeks, however, by the judge of the court to await hearing on a mo-tion for new trial made by attor-news for Hale. news for Hale.

The charge on which Hale was tried was complicity in the death of Henry Roan, Osage Indian. His alleged accomplice is now serving time in the state penitentiary on the charge. Wide publicity has been given trial on account of the prominence of the defendant and red suspension type. the strong fight he has made in his own behalf. The first trial of Hale resulted in a hung jury. In the second trial, held at Guthrie, Oklahoma, he was given life sen-tence and has actually served near-

ly two years time. His third trial was obtained after a fight of more than a year by attorneys.







PROTECTION FORESTS ON PRIVATE LANDS IN FRANCE In accordance with the provisions of a law enacted April 28, 1923, and known as the Chauveau Law, 25,882 ectares of forest on privately owned land in France has been classified as "protection forest" and put under regulation to protect it from avalanches, erosion, and the encroachment of water and sand. In addition, 24,505 hectares have been listed for classification, making a total of 53,387 hectares. About two-thirds of the total (34,156 hectares) is in the The law region of the Pyrenees. requires the forestry authorities, while making sure that the wooded condition of the land is preserved, to exercise care not to impose on prorietors any measure that will diminish the revenue from the forests and has a provision for indemnities in case of loss to the proprietors. The business has been handled in such a way that so far no proprietor has made application for such indemnity. TOAD GOURMANDS FEAST ON INSECTS, STINGERS AND ALL Toads are commonly creatures that inspire dislike on the part of the beholder. Nevertheless, the Biological Survey of the United States Department of Agriculture finds that toads are distinctly useful in fields and gardens and deserve protection. Their usefulness depends on their appetite. They are gourmands, and eat all sorts of insects in great quantities. True it is that they eat some useful insects, but they eat so many more of harmful insects that the balance is much in their favor. One of the peculiarities of the toad is its habit of eating stinging or poisonous insects and allied creatures as ants, bees, wasps, rose chafers, blisters beetles, millepeds, and poisonous spiders. While they may cause the toad some slight dis-



COTTON FARMER MILKS COWS TO FREE HIMSELF FROM DEBT

A "cow and cotton combination" of farming established last spring

The cattle-fever tick was the "bugaboo" that kept Mr. Pender from success with cows for so many Early attempts to suppleyears. ment his cotton farming by raising a few cows were unsuccessful; and with no cattle he was forced to borrow money each fall to pay his debts and to make his cotton crop. Then he made his pasture tick free and tried again, but a stray tickinfested animal got into his pasture and in a short time his herd died. He quit raising cattle. 

When tick-eradication work started in Red River County last spring under the direction of the United under the direction of the United States Department of Agriculture a banker offered to loan him money to buy four milk cows and a cream separator. He arranged to sell the cream at a community store, and soon had enough cash to buy some pigs and chickens to consume the skim milk. All through the year the cream brought him from \$5.50 to \$7.50 cash each week, enough to enable him to make his crop this year without borrowing money. Mr. Pender, according to a report received by the Department of Agriculture, states that with the aid of the income returned directly and indirectly by his four cows he has paid all his debts, has sufficient

paid all his debts, has sufficient cash left to join a purebred bull association, and can make his crops next year without borrowing any money for that purpose.



#### **SKUNKS LIKE BEES**

An unusual call for help came to the Biological Survey of the United States Department of Agriculture during October, addressed to its leader of predatory-animal control work in Arizona. This was a request from an apirist for assist ance in eradicating the skunks that were eating his honeybees. He was instructed how to mix ground-pork cracklings and strychnine and given information regarding its use. The first night four skunks were killed, and later seven others. All these skunks were killed in an area that had been worked with poison each winter for several years, but evidently they or their progenitors had escaped.

The leader of control work for this district gives an interesting ac-count of how the skunk catches as they were seen on two bright moonlight nights. The skunk came to the front of the hive and commenced tapping with its front feet and claws. When the bees, cold and sluggish, came out to investi-gate, they were easily lapped up by the skunk as fast as they appeared in the opening. The stomach of one skunk examined contained 265 bees that could be identified, and the remainder of the contents con-sisted of partly digested bees. Skunks have been known entirely to exterminate bee colonies in Arizona

#### WIRE CYLINDER PROTECTS **ORCHARDS FROM RABBITS**

The organization of farm communities in accordance with the principles of the science of human lationships was urged by Dr. C. J. Galmin, Bureau of Agricultural Eco-nomics sociologist, United States Department of Agriculture, addressing the North Dakota Agricultural College, Fargo, North Dakota, Janu-Declaring that discriminations against farmers have resulted in nany communities which have been "allowed to shift for years like a flock of untended chickens," Doctor Galpin said that "the farmer must now convert himself, as he converted himself to modern dairying, to the science of community life, and learn exactly how good communities grow and grow better and better and keep good. "A community must be large It must have people enough. enough in it, families enough, farms enough, property enough. A basic principle of modern community life demands that any group of farm families setting itself up as a com-munity to carry on the basic mat-ters, enterprises and institutions which every family must have, but which no family alone can provide for itself, must have people and property enough—people enough to fill the enterprise or institutions, and property to support them. "Many farmers in the United States apparently take their small, inadequate communities as an unchanging decree from Heaven. The cience of human groupings for certain purposes demands a change
