Dust Greets Dawn

Blowing dust darkened the sky early today in the Abilene and San Angelo areas after a deep surface low pressure system over Kansas generated daylong high winds across West Texas Monday.

The winds had died down before dawn except in northern sections of Panhandle, but the dust clouds remained

Forecasts called for mostly pleasant weather statewide. Skies were to be mostly cloudy in southern sections of the state and clear to partly cloudy across the remainder of Texas.

Storm Threatens More Homes

With a new storm on the way, the Pearl River's springtime rampage threatened to swamp still more homes today in Louisiana and Mississippi, where swollen rivers have already caused "a great deal of damage" and forced the evacuation of 700 families.

"Some of the people who got hurt very bad last year will be hurt again," Slidell, La., Civil Defense spokesman Ansel Kern said Monday. Meanwhile, a storm front that closed roads, knocked out power and dumped as much as 48 inches of snow in the Rockies moved into the Great Plains where ranchers struggled to save newborn calves.

A third storm soaked the Northeast with wet snow and rain.

A-It doesn't buy a car.

Automobile firms for years have furnished cars for driver education classes without cost to the school and a car for the superintendent's use on school business under a lease agreement at little more than a token fee, and these cars are replaced every six months by the automobile firm. It enables the school to provide transportation for the superintendent to use on school business at a cost of around six or eight cents per mile, and the past year this car was driven less than 10,000 miles. For his personal use, the superintendent furnishes his own car a his own expense.

welfare for military

Not long ago the idea of finding a Marine family on food stamps was unthinkable. Of all the branches of the military the United States Marine Corps has always stressed self-reliance. So, it is a sad day when a major general in the corps suggests that his men apply for federal assistance orginally intended to help

A few weeks ago Maj. Gen. Joseph Koler Jr., base commander of El Toro, Calif., and Maj. Gen. Leo LeBlanc Jr., head of the 3rd Marine Air Wing, issued a statement to their men supporting the efforts by those who were eligible for the tederal food stamp program. The generals said food stamps are not charity and compared the program to social security. They suggested that many situations develop in military life that require "outside help." Has the whole world gone haywire?

If the food stamp program is not charity, then what is? Kood stamps are subsidies by the taxpayers of the food hills for those able to get their hands on the stamps It was intended as charity and it is charity. The eligibility of Marines for food stamps calls into question the standards of the food stamp program, the pay level of the marines, or both.

Marine Pfc. Jimmy Garza qualified for food stamps Garza has a \$750-a month income, a pregnant wife, and an 8-month-old daughter. After all their living expenses are taken out, the Garza family has only \$100 left. Food stamps will increase that figure to \$150.

The life of a Marine Pfc, has never been an easy affair. That is the reason most young marines hold off marriage until their rank and pay has increased. Clearly the choice of having a wife and a family was made by Pfc. Garza, and if that means he has only \$100 left at the end of the month, that was part of the choice he made. We do not argue with his choice. Instead? we suggest there is seniothing seriously wrong with the program.

There are those who argue that this country's armed forces are drastically underpaid. They contend that many men and women in the military could make more money by becoming civilians and going on public assistance. That may be true, but that is not a justification for encouraging Marines to go on food stamps. Perhaps the welfare system, including food, stamps, provides too much money and eligibility standards are too low. Whatever the answer, it is not a good idea to have military families supplementing their incomes from the public dole.

The military lately has been having a hard time attracting and keeping good men and women. Formerly - although the pay was low - people looked at the military as an option they could take for a few years while deciding what to do with the rest of their lives, serving their country at the same time

Until recently the option of not working was not available, so many young people opted for the military. Some liked it so much they decided to stay If people today are going to leave the military to go on welfare, it isn't time to give the military welfare. It's time to take a second look at welfare - including food stamps. Maybe if it weren't so easy to live without working there would be less of a military recruiting problem.

The best story I ever heard about the worst job of breaking bad news was brought to town by Justin Wilson.



This has been a bone of 9 contention in Washington for years. Advocates of eliminating the federalemployee pension system include those interested in cutting federal expenses as well as those desirous of infusing the ailing Social Security syustem with substantial federal-worker contribu-

However, federal employees and their unions bitterly oppose any such move. In fact, federal employee unions reportedly have raised a \$3 millionplus war chest to fight any such attempt - and any presidential candidate who dares to advocate it.

minute? That's right. 'What'd you finish? Fifth? Sixth? You gave it all you, had, didn't you? That point you got is just as important as any other point anybody got today

You realize your team beat that other school by a point? That was your point that did it. Without it this team would be just another also-ran. You're something special. You believe that, because it's the

LIKE FOOTBALL'S OFFENSIVE line, athletes who turn in those fifth and sixth places at a track meet seldom get much publicity. Running backs, receivers, first place winners - those are the glory guys, drawing oohs and ahhs from the fans.

There's really no sense in apologizing for it. It seems - to be a rule in sports, and no one can pretend they don't deserve it.

IT IS FORTUNATE Snyder has a number of blue-ribbon quality athletes. But Snyder High School's success lies deeper than that. Maybe it's good coaching or unbringing. It could be a combination of

All I know is, Snyder kids usually hang in there when a lot of others don't.

TAKE TRACK, FOR instance. The guy or girl who constantly turns in a fifth or sixth place finish has to have a lot of character: Every week he or she travels to a meet some 100 miles or so away. He knows when he gets on the bus that he isn't going to win. He's going to do his best, hopefully better than he did last week But the competition is tough and his chances of winning are slim. It's a hard fact to get down. Some weeks he might turn in a second or third place.

But most of the time he or she is going to be circling that track, fractions of a second or seconds behind the winner - and come in fourth, fifth, or sixth, or maybe not place at all. He realizes it. My saying it here is not make any difference
