

Maintenance takes ATC honor

The 64th Flying Training Wing's maintenance complex will represent Air Training Command in competition for the 1983 Air Force Daedalian Maintenance Trophy Award. This announcement came from Brig. Gen. Richard F. Gillis, ATC's deputy chief of staff for logistics.

Reese's maintenance complex won the ATC Outstanding Maintenance Effectiveness and Efficiency Award for achieving the highest overall maintenance ratings in the command, according to ATC officials and thus is able to compete for the Air Force Daedalian Award.

The 64th FTW maintenance complex continued to provide outstanding support during fiscal 1983. The complex generated 78,396 flying missions during 1983 while accumulating more than 94,000 accident-free flying hours. In many areas the organization made significant changes or improvements.

There were no Class A or B accidents.

Reese maintenance units

maintained the lowest ground abort rate in the command for both T-37s and T-38s. In addition, the Reese occurrence rates were the lowest in the command for both aircraft.

The fully mission capable rate for T-38s was second to none in ATC and that same category put Reese T-37s in at second best in the command.

Maintenance and operations shared the Frank P. Lahm Trophy for showing the greatest improvement in the base's flying safety program.

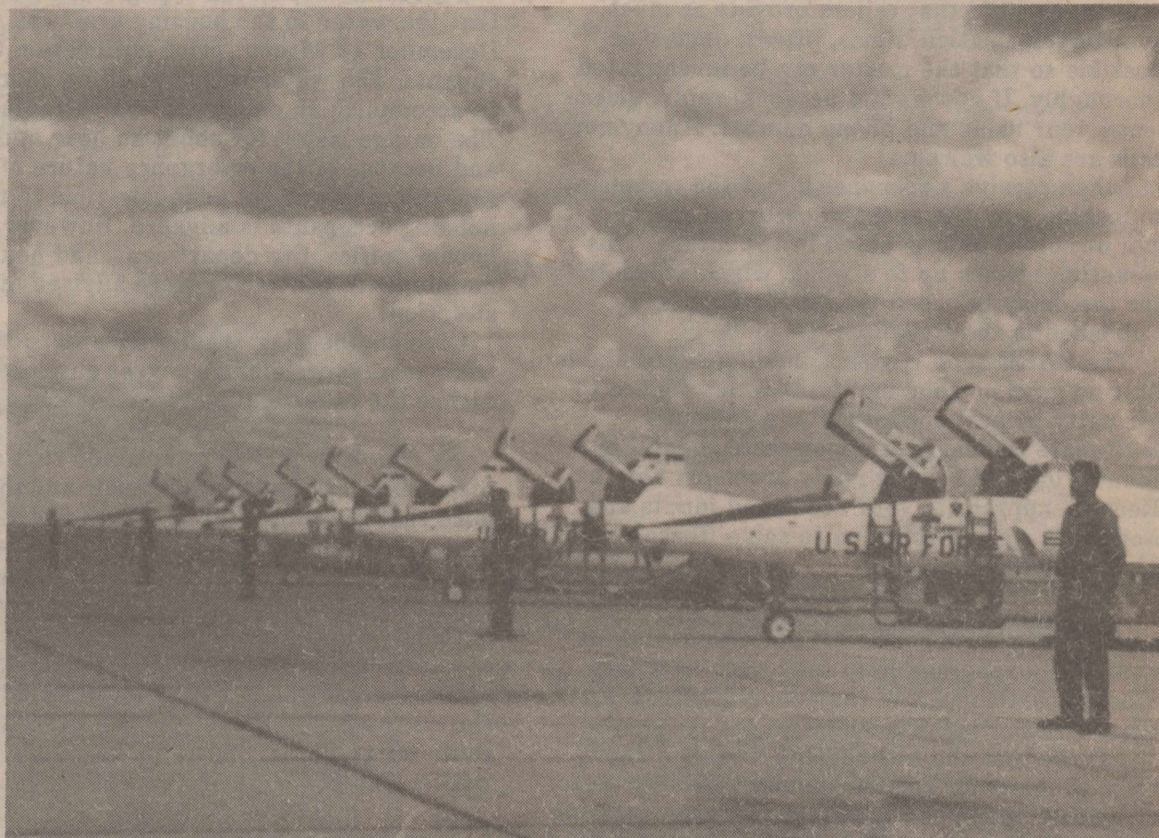
A 100 percent pass rate for career development course end of course tests was achieved by enlisted maintenance troops.

The complex recorded 163 suggestions, 30 of which were adopted, netting the Air Force a savings in the realm of \$472,000.

The Maintenance Transient Alert Branch added a 13th consecutive Rex Riley Award to its credit.

The 64th Field Maintenance Squadron's Propulsion Branch joined in an Air Force

Under the new system those airmen having additional children will have to save and maintain items such as the baby bath and afghan because they will not be included in subsequent Project Stork packages.

CARE Line

The CARE Line is prepared by Col. John R. Hullender, 64th Flying Training Wing commander, on a weekly basis. All information provided to the CARE Line will be held in strict confidence. Callers are urged to give their name and duty telephone number so that a personal reply may be made; however, neither are mandatory. Callers should use the CARE Line only after all possible means to air their views or complaints through the chain of command have been exhausted. The CARE Line number is 885- (Ext.) 3273.

Every so often I like to explain how the CARE Line works. The CARE Line is a direct line to a telephone answering machine in the Public Affairs office. Each day all calls are transcribed from the tape onto paper. They are then sent to the commander of the unit that caller has addressed his complaint or concern about. That commander will look into the matter and try to contact the caller with a personal reply if possible.

It is essential that callers provide as much specific information (times, places, names) as possible so that the matter can be investigated thoroughly. If you want a personal reply, please leave your name and phone number. Anonymous calls are also welcome.

I then receive a response about the complaint to include why the problem occurred and how it can be solved or prevented in the future. This sometimes takes up to a week, which accounts for the delay between your call and it being published in the *Roundup*.

The CARE Line is your sounding board and is only as good as your inputs. It is not a place to air petty gripes, but rather to point out legitimate issues. It has been instrumental in identifying and solving many problems here at Reese. I appreciate your continued inputs and hope that we can continue to solve Reese's problems together.

A gym patron called to object to having to move his belongings from his locker to accommodate participants in the annual Christmas Classic Basketball Tournament.

I agree that the tournament creates a short-term problem for regular patrons, with the participating teams using both of the large dressing rooms. While some people may find the inconvenience annoying, the benefits from the three-day

tournament are enormous, both for Reese and the participating high school teams. Reese has the reputation of conducting one of the best high school tournaments in the state and providing first class facilities is one of the major factors.

We apologize for the inconvenience to our regular gym patrons and thank you for your cooperation in making the Ninth Annual Christmas Classic a smashing success.

A resident of Reese Village was concerned that the water to the housing area was shut off December 12 without prior notification to the occupants. The water was shut off on short notice to accomplish an emergency valve replacement. The outage lasted for about an hour and a half and because of the emergency nature of the repair, there was not adequate time to notify housing occupants in advance. However, the housing office, fire department, and housing maintenance contractor were advised of the situation.

The IG — there if needed

The Air Force has an excellent complaint system; one which you can get help quickly and fairly when needed. Individuals may make a complaint at any level without fear or intimidation of reprisal. Your supervisors may not apply pressure or take corrective action against you just because you initiated an IG complaint. Therefore, experience has shown that complaints are best and most quickly resolved through the chain of command. Discuss your problems first with your boss and commander. Then if not satisfied escalate the issue.

The Inspector General Complaint program is described in AFR 123-11. The regulation explains how to make a complaint, and who you should talk to. There are some matters which the IG complaint program does not address. Assistance is available from other sources and these are listed.

As the wing inspector, I am also the focal point for the Air Force and Air Training Command Fraud, Waste and Abuse Prevention and Detection Program. Identifying, preventing and reporting FW&A is a base-wide responsibility. Report incidents to me or call Ext. 3273 to identify suspected deficiencies.

My office is located in Building 800, Room 203, Ext. 3409. My door is always open.

(AFSINC) — In a Veterans Day speech, Secretary of Defense Caspar W. Weinberger addressed the issue of deterrence by saying, "today we must live with the terrible knowledge of nuclear weapons — knowledge that cannot be banished, nor left to those nations which are least appalled by its prospect.

"And that means we must work to ensure that nuclear weapons are never used, by maintaining the forces necessary to convince any adversary that the costs of aggression would be far higher than any possible benefit.

"This strategy is called deterrence, and since the dawn of the Nuclear Age it has preserved the peace.

"This administration is seeking to preserve deterrence in the face of a tremendous Soviet nuclear buildup by modernizing our own strategic forces. At the same time, we are seeking genuine, mutual arms reduction agreements — agreements that do not, as in the past, merely codify the build-up of nuclear weapons, but instead produce a significant build-down of the most destructive weapons ever to threaten mankind.

"... We and our NATO allies have agreed to remove 1,400 nuclear warheads from Europe: One more signal of our desire, indeed determination, to reduce nuclear arsenals."

Three Reese pilots get Air Staff Training duty

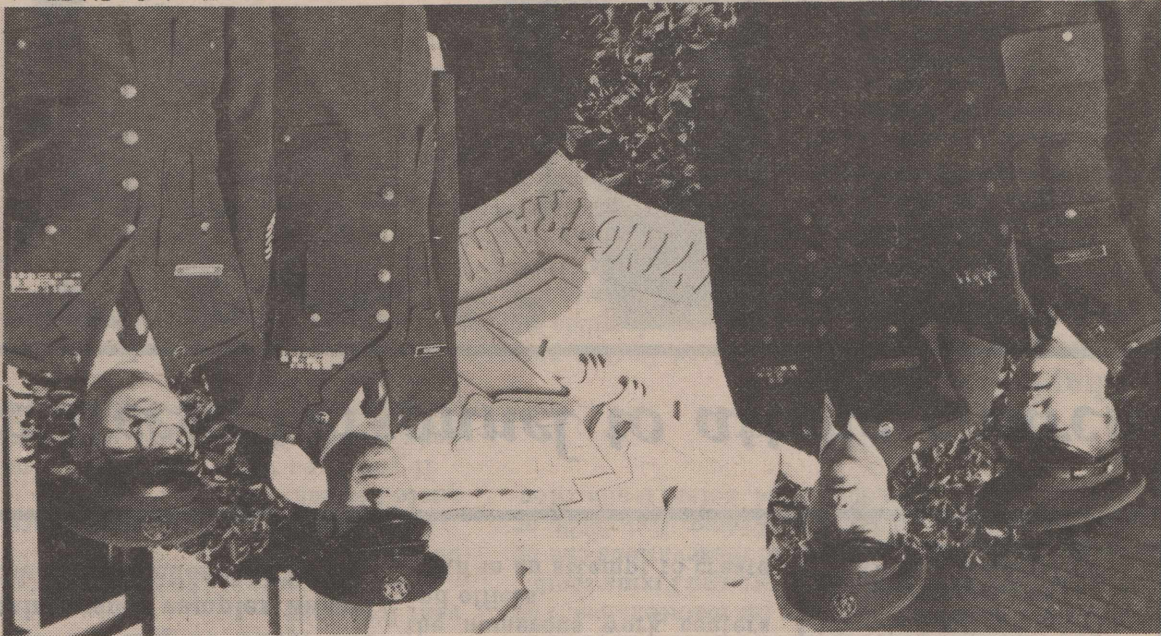

Maintenance kept the Reese trainers in the air obtaining 99.2 percent delivery rate. The complex's launch reliability rate exceeded 90 percent and their scheduling effectiveness peaked at 95.5 percent.

The number of on-the-job injuries per 100 sorties was a low .0077 percent.

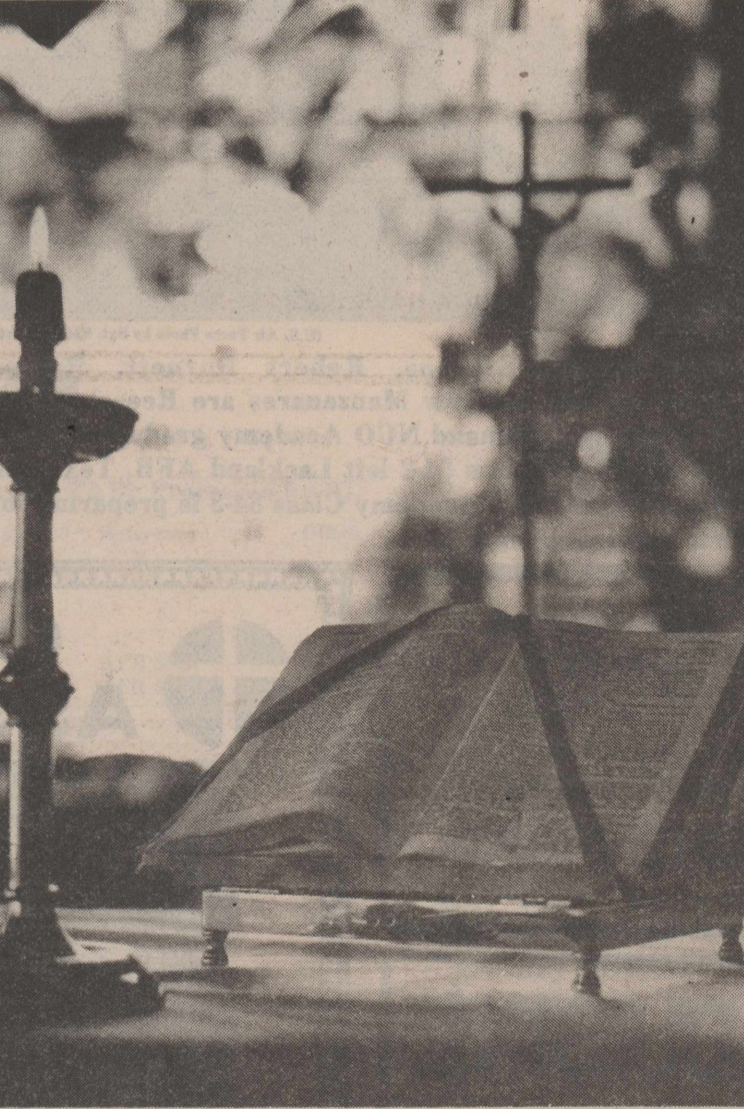

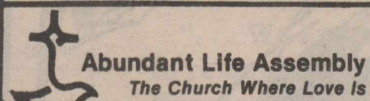

Avoid the broken pipes

During the recent extreme cold weather numerous Village units suffered frozen and in some cases broken water pipes. Family Housing Management Branch Chief Mark T. McMahan has suggested that residents can prevent and minimize damage from unusually cold weather by taking these preventative steps:

Turn on a couple of faucets (high enough to prevent freezing);

Open the doors to the laundry room and cabinets under the sinks;

Check the thermostat and be sure there is adequate heating;

If you have to be away, have a neighbor check your home frequently and notify housing authorities who you have asked to watch the home by calling Ext. 3913;

And, when the pipes do break turn off the water immediately so the water damage will be minimum.

Remember, you must notify All-Pro Maintenance of any maintenance problems you experience at (during the duty day) 885-4900 or (at night) 796-8180.

Rights of Representation

Pursuant to Section 7114 (A) (3) of Title 5, U.S. Code, as added by the Civil Service Reform Act (Public Law 95-454) and Memo-of-Agreement between Reese and Local 1810 (Article 3, Section f), this is to inform you that the inclusive union must be given the opportunity to be represented at any examination of an employee in the bargaining unit by a management representative in connection with an investigation if:

The employee reasonably believes that the examination may result in disciplinary action against him or her, and,

The employee requests representation by a Local 1810 steward or official.

When to make first dental visit

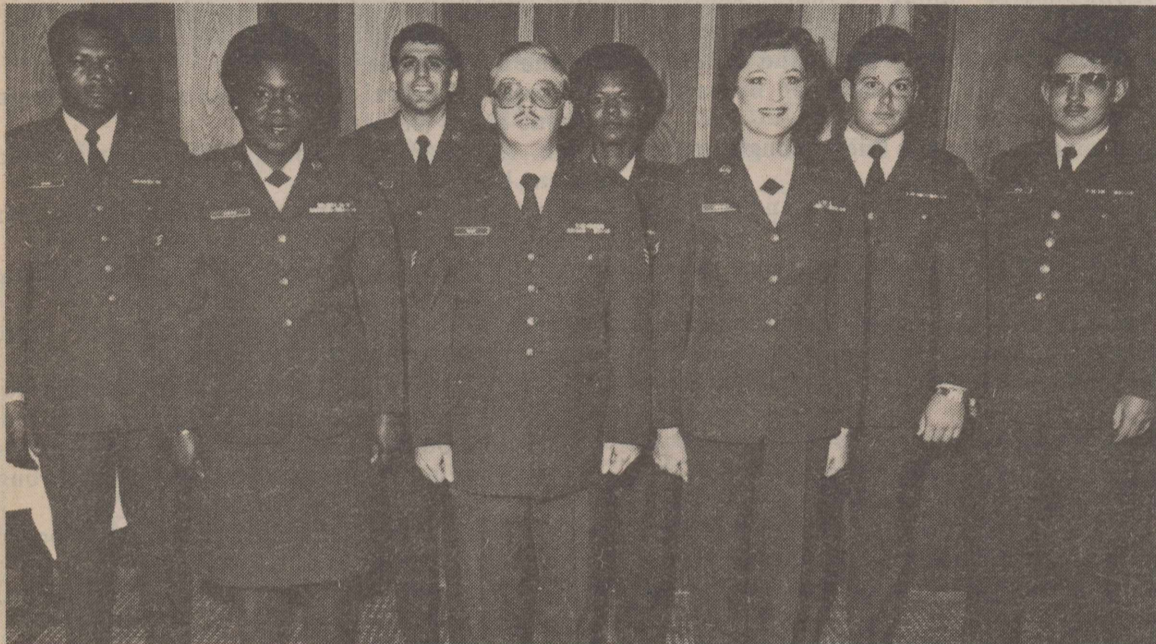
When should I bring my child for his first dental visit? Can they have dental work done on base? These are two frequent questions that need to be cleared up.

A child's first visit to a dentist should take place between ages two and three, before all of the 20 baby teeth have come into the mouth. Ideally, this is a "get-acquainted" visit and should be a pleasant experience for both child and parent. Prepare your child by talking about the visit beforehand. Explain that the dentist is a friend and he wants to help them keep their teeth and mouths healthy. A positive attitude on your part will help develop confidence in your child and prevent the type of fear that keeps patients away

from dental offices.

Although you will need a civilian dentist for most of your children's dental care, your base dental clinic does offer several types of treatment for children. The most important is our dependent children's preventive dentistry program. All dependent children ages five and over are eligible for yearly cleanings and fluoride treatments along with a screening type exam by one of our staff dentists. We can also provide x-rays if you come with a request from your civilian dentist. And, we are always available to treat emergency or accident situations.



Through ILL patrons seeking books checked out or not located in the base library can get the library to borrow them from the Lubbock libraries, any of the universities, and just about anywhere else within Texas.

In Category I (large populations 5,000 or more): Chanute AFB, Ill., won first and \$500 and Randolph AFB, Texas, finished second earning \$300.

Category II's second place library belongs to Vance AFB, Okla., who earned \$300.
