**Captain Witchey** Instructor Pilot of the Year

Capt. R. Dave Witchey, a 54th Flying Training Squadron instructor pilot, is the 64th Flying Training Wing's Instructor Pilot of the Year.

Captain Witchey received the 54th FTS nomination because in the 54th commander's view, Captain Witchey "has proven himself to be this squadron's best instructor and scheduler." However, before the captain would ascend to wing IP of the year, he would have to compete against the 64th Student Squadron nominee Capt. Michael B. Blemker and 35th Flying Training Squadron nominee 1st Lt. Jeffrey A. Lupinski.

"As the deputy commander for operations, I can tell you that competition for the IP of the year is tough. Each pilot nominated is the very best their squadrons have to offer - for that fact, the very best Reese has to offer," said Col. W. Bill Grosvenor.

Each instructor pilot nominated goes before a board of senior officers who reviews their records. The board of officers look at everything: their ability to do their duties, what they do in their off-duty time and such. It is done on the "whole-man" concept explained 2nd Lt. Elizabeth Spraggins, deputy

"Captain Witchey had the qualifications we are looking for in the Reese IP of the Year," Colonel Grosvenor added, "and since he is our IP of the year, he will represent Reese in the Air Training Command IP of the Year com-

petition." Captain Witchey, a Shelby, Ohio, native, graduated Ohio State University with a bachelor of science in aeronautical engineering via an Air Force ROTC scholarship. He delayed his entry into the Air Force for a year while he finished his master's.

He entered pilot training at Reese as a member of UPT Class 81-06 and graduated with two honors - distinguished graduate and outstanding second lieutenant. Since his pilot graduation Captain Witchey has been at Reese as an instructor pilot, but his ambition is set for greater things.

## Labor relations officer wins personnel award

The CARE Line is prepared by Col. John R. Hullender, 64th Flying Training Wing commander, on a weekly basis. All information provided to the CARE Line will be held in strict confidence. Several callers expressed concern about the adverse effect that weekend flying has on morale. Some of them pointed out that we passed up two opportunities to fly when we discontinued flying for a few hours to practice for the November change of command ceremony. One caller even suggested that operations was scheduling and flying fewer airplanes than maintenance could provide each day, and more aggressive scheduling would get us caught up without flying on weekends.

I'll address the last issue first. The flying schedule is a carefully coordinated agreement between operations and maintenance. Everyone's goal is to accomplish the required training in a five-day work week. The number of training sorties required each day is relatively constant throughout the year. Maintenance routinely provides operations with the maximum number of aircraft that can be committed on a continuing basis. However, the short winter days and limited daylight hours limit the number of training sorties that operations can fly with those aircraft. With normal weather losses, we have no make-up capability during the short winter days other than Saturday flying. But, you can be sure



that both operations and maintenance schedule the maximum sorties that conditions permit.

About the comments on discontinuing flying to practice for the recent change of command - flying continued during the practices. While there was reduced flying locally, we launched aircraft to other bases prior to the quiet period. Training sorties were then flown from those bases while parade practice was conducted at Reese. Secondly, we in the Air Force take our drill and ceremony seriously, yet practice it infrequently. If we had tried to perform the change of command ceremony without practice, it could have resulted in a very unprofessional performance. We chose to sacrifice a few sorties to insure the ceremony was one of which we could be proud.

The sorties lost to the parade practice were few and did not result in our recent Saturday flying. The recent requirement to fly on Saturdays resulted instead from unusually high weather losses over the last several months. The wing lost 2,358 sorties to weather in October, and another 2,530 sorties in November. These losses were significantly higher than historical data indicates is normal. As discussed above, the short daylight periods this time of year prevent us

from making up our actual weather losses during the week. Distasteful as it is to everyone, when the weather is uncooperative, we are required to work some Saturdays to graduate our students

Commissary shoppers may now carry other shopping bags into the store, thanks to the observation of a recent CARE Line caller. The caller was concerned that the service desk where commissary shoppers were asked to leave shopping bags was not manned, and she felt that shoppers were risking theft if they left them there.

Upon hearing the complaint, the commissary management changed store policy to allow sealed packages into the commissary. The service desk employee will have a stapler on hand to close the bags.

A resident of dormitory 230 called to say there had been no hot water there for a week, and he felt nothing was being done about the problem. Actually, the problem was reported to civil engineering Dec. 14. They found that the water heater was too small, and the demand for hot water at different periods of the day caused the reserve to be depleted.

Civil engineering immediately ordered a new, larger water heater, which arrived Jan. 13 and was installed that same day. The new water heater has a capacity five times greater than the old one, and Central Dormitory Management personnel tell me that the complaints of no hot water have stopped.

# Saturday ti

"Fly Saturday again? Surely there must be a better way!" Working Saturdays is distasteful to everyone; but sometimes the vargaries of weather make such action necessary.

An all too common viewpoint expressed by man base personnel when Saturday flying is scheduled is that, "with just a little extra effort, maintenance and operations should have been able to fly enough hours during the week to make up for whatever time was lost to weather without having to report to Saturday flying." We all wish that were the case. But there are two common misconceptions hidden in that line of reasoning.

The first misconception involves that much misused and often misunderstood word - "timeline." Its common use around this wing falsely implies that flying time, in and of itself, is the primary measure of how well this wing is performing its mission. The second misconception is that there is a large amount of unused reserve training capability that is untapped during a normal flying day. Both widely held beliefs are

In the business of training student pilots, there is no such thing as a timeline. Each student pilot, over the course of a year, must fly at least 137 effective "sorties" (a "sortie" is one complete flight, from takeoff to final landing). The UPT syllabus identifies specific maneuvers and training events that must be accomplished on each sortie. A student sortie is launched only when the student pilot has a reasonable opportunity to accomplish those events. If the required maneuvers are accomplished, the sortie is effective. If the prescribed events are not accomplished, whether because of

adverse weather, maintenance or facility limitations, the sortie is ineffective and must be repeated. It is not how much flying time a student pilot accumulates, but rather how many training events and effective sorties he or she accomplishes which determines his or her progress.

The flying time flown on an ineffective sortie is not wasted because the student pilot is able to polish or expand his or her skills. But neither does it result in the student completing one of the 137 plus flights required by the course syllabus. That happens only when he or she has accomplished the events required on that particular flight.

So, how do we get behind in the training of student pilots? With our current student load, the number of aircraft the wing possesses, and the size of our maintenance and instructor forces, there are only so many training sorties (flights) that can be accomplished during each short winter day. Using all available resources and given perfect weather, maintenance and operations effectiveness, we can manage to overfly each day's syllabus required sorties by only about 20 percent. Any time our losses exceed that excess capability, we start falling behind. For every full day lost to weather or some other factor, it takes five perfect or near perfect training days - days in which every sortie is effective — to recoup that lose.

We traditionally lose a few sorties every day due to aircraft systems malfunctions. However, those losses represent only a small percentage of our total winter losses and, by themselves, would be easy to accept.

We also lose a small number of sorties due to operational imperfections - a crewmember becomes sick and there is insufficient time to find a replacement, a student fails to complete a prerequisite for his or

her mission, personal equipment problems, and the like. But these losses also represent only a minor percentage of our total losses and do not constitute a major problem.

It is weather and weather alone that accounts for the vast majority of our training losses. Using the last four or five years as a basis, we can expect to lose around 40 percent of our sorties during December, January and February due to inclement weather-ice, snow, strong crosswinds, poor visibility, low cloud ceilings, and often weather related problems. Our weekly weather losses this December ran as high as 80 percent - far more than we could hope to recoup without having to resort to weekend activity of some sort.

The problem stems from the fact that on specific, "locked in concrete" dates that occur about once every six weeks, we must graduate another class of UPT pilots. A graduation date is an established deadline that must be met. Failure to finish a class by their graduation date would have a ripple affect on numerous "follow-on" training courses and could conceivably even affect the readiness of other Air Force units.

We currently have classes that are over 10 days behind in their training. It would take 50 near perfect flying days to get those classes back on track if we limited ourselves to weekday flying. During the winter months, we seldom have the luxury of even a few consecutive good weather days. To expect 50 in a row is out of the question.

So, how do we make up sorties so that we can graduate a class on time? We increase the number of sorties flown on cross countries, concentrate on flying those classes whose phase of training allows them to best use existing weather and, you guessed it, where necessary, fly

Saturdays. Each successful Saturday buys us as much, or more, in make up sorties than a full week of max effort under perfect weather, operations and maintenance conditions. The bottom line - if we get to a point where there are insufficient week days before a particular class' graduation date to complete the number of sorties that must be flown by each student, we have no other choice than to fly on days we would normally be standing down, like Saturdays.

Rest assured, neither operations nor maintenance wants to have to schedule Saturday flying. Saturday flying is scheduled only when it is the only realistic way to graduate our student pilots on time. The decision for Saturday flying is not made lightly. It is made with the full realization that we are asking for sacrifice and extra effort on the part of all who support the flying operation. Your continued support is crucial. Without it, the wing could not hope to meet its commitments.

Airman Bergherr's family includes his parents Mr. and Mrs. John Bergherr in Anoka, Minn., and four sisters and a brother.







# New personnel building open

The new personnel building (Building 920) opened for business in some areas this December. The remaining offices opened this week. The offices that have relocated include CBPO, TMO, PME, CCPO, and Education Service. Here is the breakdown of each:

The Consolidated Base Personnel Office located on the main and second floor. The CBPO's hours of operation are Monday, Tuesday,

Wednesday, and Friday 8 a.m. to 4:45 p.m.; Thursday 8 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. Access to the CBPO is through customer serv ice, located in the main lobby on the north side of the building. Personnel having appointments or wishing to visit an office within CBPO must sign in at customer service and be issued a referral slip. This is to control walk-in customers, plan work schedules better, and provide better service.

The Traffic Management Office is located on the main floor too in Room 208. The

hours of operation are Monday through Friday from 8 a.m. to 4:45 p.m. The services offered include personnel property shipment (both inbound and outbound) and passenger service.

The Pass and ID section of the security police division is in Room 213. Its hours of operation are Monday through Friday 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Their services include vehicle registration; military, dependent, reserve, and retired identification cards; and civilian passes.

The Professional Military Education is on the first floor in Room 109. PME duty hours extend from Monday through Friday 7:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. PME Phase I, II, and III are still offered.

The Central Civilian Personnel Office on the first floor too handles all civilian personnel matters. Their hours of operation are Monday through Friday from 8 a.m. to 4:45 p.m. The Classification Section is located in Room 124. Data and NAF sections

are located in Room 130A.

The civilian personnel officer and remainder of his staff can be reached through the main recpetionist in Room 132.

The Education Office is located on the first floor, Room 139, and is open from 7:30 a.m. to 4:45 p.m. The Test Contractor monitors testing Monday, Tuesday, and Thursday from 8 a.m. to 1 p.m. but only if five appointments have been scheduled. The education counselor and Education Services officer's hours are 8 a.m. to 4:45, Mon-

day through Friday. School coordinators hours are: South Plains College, 3 p.m. to 5 p.m., Monday through Thursday; Wayland Baptist University, 8:30 a.m. to 10:30 a.m. Tuesday and Thursday; Houston Baptist University noon to 2 p.m., Monday, Wednesday, and Friday.

The Suggestion Program Manager's Office is located on the main floor, Room 234. Hours of operation are 8 a.m. to 4:45 p.m. Monday through Friday.

## ATC ties safety record

They all came back alive in Air Training Command. ATC suffered no accidental deaths over the recent holidays. This feat helped ATC tie a record it set in 1976 for the fewest fatalities in one year.

Reese's contribution to this feat included a fatality-free year. ATC lost 33 persons to accidental deaths in 1982, but held to only 17 in 1983.

"I think we're finally getting serious about what it takes to keep us alive out there," said ATC Traffic Safety Manager L.C. Walls. And, officials predict that new, tougher DWI laws will mean even fewer highway deaths in 1984.

## Inpatient cost - share went up

Effective Jan. 1, 1984, the daily amount active-

duty families pay for inpatient care in civilian hospitals under CHAMPUS went up from \$6.55 to \$6.80.

This means that, for every day an active-duty family member spends as a patient in a civilian hospital under CHAMPUS, he or she will pay \$6.80— or a total of \$25, whichever is greater.

Military retirees and their families (and survivors of deceased active or retired military personnel) pay 25 percent of the cost of covered care in a civilian hospital. CHAMPUS pays 75 percent of the allowed charges for covered hospital and doctor bills.

## Many ATC careers damaged by DWI in 1983

RANDOLPH AFB, Texas (AFCNS) - The military careers of more than 200 Air Training Command members received a severe blow in 1983 as a result of drunk driving incidents.

During the first nine months of the year, 229 Articles 15 were given to command members for drunk driving. And one ATC airman was court-martialed for injuring five pedistrians in another drunk driving incident.

According to Maj. Thomas L. Strand, ATC's chief of military justice, the entire Department of Defense has taken a "get tough" stand on drinking and driving. "A military member who is caught driving drunk can now expect stiff punishment.

-A major at Vance AFB, Okla., who was reprimanded

-A sergeant at Columbus AFB, Miss., who was reduced to airman first class and ordered to forfeit \$200 per month for two months.

-A captain at Laughlin AFB, Texas who was reprimanded and ordered to forfeit \$300 per month for two months.

-A lieutenant at Mather AFB who was reprimanded and ordered to forfeit \$500 per month for two months.

Major Strand added that various forms of administrative discipline can also result from driving while drunk. These include unfavorable information files, control rosters, elimination from promotion lists, and suspension of on-base driving privileges. Drinking and drivreflected on performance or effectiveness reports, he said.

In a more serious case, an airman first class pleaded guilty during a general courtmartial for a drunk driving incident at Sheppard AFB, Texas, on May 8. She was convicted of injuring five pedistrians after losing control of her car on base near the main gate.

The court sentenced her to 45 days confinement at hard labor, loss of a stripe, and forteiture of \$200 per month for 12 months.






