If the taxpayer has these kind of deductions, it would then be to their

advantage to itemize, said officials.

They also explained that different people have different tax situations. Those taxpayers with special deductions, tax credits, investments or other specific items should consult a tax expert. April 16 is the filing deadline.



ATC earns almost \$4 million for CFC

RANDOLPH AFB, Texas (ATCNS) - Three million nine hundred two thousand three hundred ninety dollars were contributed by people assigned to Air Training Command's 13 bases to this year's Combined Federal Campaign.

That figure represents 139 percent of the combined goal of \$2,846,515 for all ATC

Laughlin AFB, Texas, for the second consecutive year set the pace for the command with the highest percent of goal collected. Laughlin peo-

ple gave 187 percent of their target. In terms of dollars, they gave \$112,481 with a goal of \$60,000.

Lackland AFB, Texas, had the second highest percent of goal with contributions totaling 175 percent. They also have the distinction of giving the highest dollar amount of \$1,410,014. Lackland is the only ATC base that topped the \$1 million mark.

All ATC bases exceeded their goals and the total amount collected this year exceeds last year's donations by \$191.000.

CARE Line

The CARE Line is prepared by Col. John R. Hullender, 64th Flying Training Wing commander, on a weekly basis. All information provided to the CARE Line will be held in strict confidence. Callers are urged to give their name and duty telephone number so that a personal reply may be made; however, neither are mandatory. Callers should use the CARE Line only after all possible means to air their views or complaints through the chain of command have been exhausted. The CARE Line number is 885- (Ext.) 3273.

A caller asked why the stocking cap is not authorized to be worn on base east of Hangarline Road. The watch cap may be worn with the fatigue uniform and other functional uniforms anywhere on base from Oct. 1, through March 31. It may also be worn when traveling to and from base, however, other headgear must be worn if the individual is making authorized essential stops off-base. In addition, the installation commander may authorize the cap to be worn when extreme weather occurs outside the authorized wear dates.

The project managers of all base contracts are thoroughly briefed on base regulations, including the speed limit, prior to beginning the contract work. They understand that violations of the regulations could jeopardize their contract. If the caller had given a description of the speeding vehicle, a license number, or even the area the individuals were working in, our contracting division could have pinpointed the problem. As it stands, a contracting division representative notified the project managers of the complaint and requested they re-emphasize the speed limit to their employees and subcontractors.

Security police patrol Reese Village and issue tickets to anyone, military or civilian, violating traffic laws on base. Selective enforcement is periodically conducted in the family housing area to identify speeders.

Complaints about base housing contractors may be directed to Sherry Nance, Ext. 3822. Callers should provide as much information as possible about the incident and contract workers involved so the problem can be handled effectively.

More individual support is needed to make conservation here work

The 1983 Energy Conservation Incentive Award Program (\$100,000 for first place and \$50,000 for second) has ended with Reese finishing well out of the money for our category in fifth place, ahead of only Goodfellow and Laughlin.

Reese missed its facility energy goal for fiscal 1983 by 5.8 percent finishing the year with a 9.2 percent savings versus a goal of 15 percent. A portion of our failure to meet our goal can be blamed on record-breaking weather and the failure to complete any major energy conservation projects in fiscal 1983. If we really want to find the biggest culprit, however, we have to look no further than ourselves. Each and every individual that is a part of Reese can look back on fiscal 1983 and remember instances when we didn't turn out

or disconnect unnecessary lights, correct erroneous thermostat settings, or report obvious energy abuse and misuse. We can also look back and see many instances where we treated the symptoms with stopgap fixes (electric space heaters, etc.) rather than submitting proper paperwork to civil engineers to identify and correct the real energy problem. Reduction of energy consumption has never been, and never will be, easy. West Texas weather will continue to set records in all seasons. Energy conservation projects will continue to be approved and implemented and will continue to help reduce consumption as newer, better energy conservation processes are applied to our energy uses. However, in the midst of all these different areas of change and technological advances, there remains only one constant in the entire energy formula.

That constant is you and me, the individual energy user. After more than two years experience in the energy conservation business, I am convinced that our energy program will never be any better than the individual who uses it each day. Each of us holds the key to success and must be an integral part of the Reese Energy Conservation Program.

Reese has again begun a new fiscal year in the hole in the facility energy area as a result of record breaking cold weather in December. Our facility energy goal for fiscal 1984 is a 17.5 percent reduction in energy usage from the base year of fiscal 1975. Our cumulative reduction through the first quarter of fiscal 1984 was 9.6 percent or 7.9 percent short of the fiscal 1984 target. Individual involvement and participation is an absolute must if we are to make up the current





JAG says security deposit is not the cost of renting

by Maj. Edward Kingsford staff judge advocate

A security deposit is not the price you pay for leasing a residence. It is the money a landlord holds to protect him against the damage you may purposely or accidentally cause to his property. If a tenant does not cause any damage to the lease property, and fulfills his legal and contractual obligations, the landlord must report the tenant's security deposit. That's the law.

Revised Civil Statutes sets out the legal rights and obligations of the landlord and tenant regarding security deposits. Before moving, a tenant must:

•Give the landlord proper

•Fulfill the lease agreement and cause no damage over "normal" wear and tear; •Leave the lease premises

cleaned; ·Give the landlord a for-

warding address in writing; •Return the key.

A landlord is obligated to return your security deposit and give you a written itemized list of the deductions for repairs and cleaning within 30 days after you move out. If you have provided a forwarding address, and the Article 5236e of the Texas landlord fails to send you a written list of deductions within the required time, he must return the entire deposit without deducting anything and cannot collect for damages.

If the landlord refuses to

notice of termination in give you your deposit back, or if you do not agree with the amount or reasons for his deductions, you can sue for your deposit. If the landlord keeps the deposit in "bad faith," you can sue for \$100 plus three times the amount of the deposit wrongfully withheld and attorneys' fees.

The best way to protect yourself is a check-in, checkout list, witnessed by someone not living on the property, or the landlord or manager. Let the manager or landlord know what damages there are to the property when you're ready to move out, and even take pictures if you want to have extra proof.

If you should have a landlord-tenant problem, contact the Lubbock Consumer Protection Division of the Attorney General's Office.





Generators get good, bad marks

It's been 25 months since Reese began testing the potential of electric wind generators on the West Texas plains. The results of the test period reflect good and bad.

The pair of generators, the wind velocity meters and the

cost around \$87,000, according to Joe Hassell, the project engineer. For the test period, the generators siting and inhouse maintenance capabilities were of key interest.

When deciding where to place the generators, engineers had to consider the clear zones and the fall zones (clear of the Reese flight pattern, yet in a position that if knocked down they would cause no damage). "We've found that these machines can be easily maintained with minimum in-house training," Hassell added.

In production, the electric generators have not deviated more than 20 percent from the rated output specified by the manufacturer. The electricity that is produced by the modern windmills is fed back into the Reese electrical grid and then the base electrical system.

In an average month, the levices generate approxmately 3,200 kilowatts of

Keep those teeth; just brush, floss

(February is National Children's Dental Health Month and as such, the Reese Dental Clinic in conjunction with the American Dental Association will provide dental information to all parents and child guardians through articles published during the month.)

If you're a parent, you know that brushing and flossing you child's teeth daily can help your child have healthy teeth and a happy smile. But do you know why?

Inside the mouth, the average person has about 80 different bacteria. Only a few of these bacteria are responsible for dental caries (tooth decay) and periodontal (gum) disease, but that's more than enough to make the incidence of dental disease second only to that of the common cold. These harmful bacteria live in dental plaque, a thin, almost invisible film that constantly forms on our teeth. The sugars and starches in our foods provide food for the bacteria. In turn, the bacteria produce acids and other irritating waste products that attack our teeth and gums.

The idea that the bacteria in people's mouths cause den-

bacteria on her teeth. She was not convinced. To prove his point, he took a sample of the plaque on her teeth and let her see the living bacteria under the microscope. The sight so horrified her that the next day she went to the dentist and had all her teeth pull-

tal disease is comparatively new and was first suggested by Dr. W.D. Miller about 1890. Not everyone believed it at first. The story goes that one dental researcher, wanting to show off his new microscope, told his housekeeper that she-like everyone else-had harmful

She got rid of dental plaque the hard way. Someone should have told her that she could have a healthier mouth and teeth simply by brushing and flossing daily.

Brushing removes plaque from the outside, inside, and chewing surfaces of the teeth. There are a number of effective methods of brushing the teeth. Here's one that is currently recommended: Put the head of the toothbrush beside the teeth, with the bristle tips at a 45 degree angle to the gums. Move the brush back and forth in short strokes, using a gentle scrubbing motion. Brush the outside surfaces of the teeth, the inside surfaces, and then the chewing surfaces. Tilt the brush vertically to clean the inside surfaces of the front teeth. Finally, brush the tongue to freshen your breath.

But brushing alone can't remove all the plaque from the teeth. The teeth should be flossed daily, to clean out plaque that collects under the gumline and between the teeth. If you don't know how to floss, ask your dentist or dental technician to show you.

You should start brushing and flossing your children's primary (first) teeth have appeared, around age 2 to 21/2. Because children's teeth are more susceptible to decay than those of adults, they should be brushed after every meal with a fluoride toothpaste and flossed daily.

When your child is small, you will have to clean the child's teeth yourself. As he or she gets older, you can teach the child how to brush and floss alone. Children do not have the coordination needed to brush their own teeth until age 4 or 5. They cannot floss by themselves until about age 8. Whatever your child's age, set a good example by caring for your own teeth daily.

Most children start out in life with strong, healthy teeth. With a little effort, you can help make sure your child's teeth stay that way.


forms? A vast majority of Americans have come in contact with corrective lens of one sort or another during their life times—some early, others later on.

The Optometery Clinic can help you. Down the hall through Primary Care, Optometrist Dr. (Capt.) Robert Lemieux and optometery specialist Sgt. Jerry Forsythe can look at your eyes, refer you to eye disease specialist in Lubbock, and fit you in glasses.

The Reese Optometery Clinic handles approximately 90 patients per week. Their duty day begins at 8 a.m. like the rest of the hospital, however for an appointment patients can call in to 885-3338 on the second and last Fridays of the month. Sergeant Forsythe pointed out that patients in need of emergency care did not have to wait to make an appointment.

All together the Reese clinic can get a patient in and out within a half hour. That includes the check-in, determining the patients prescription and allowing the doctor to examine the patients inner eye.

Those with signs of optic diseases are referred to Lubbock specialists when there is an apparent danger to the patient's eye.


