Daedalian team arrives

Members of Reese's maintenance organizations will put forth their typical best effort this week when a five-man Headquarters U.S. Air Force Daedalian Maintenance Award inspection team visits, Wednesday through Friday.

The inspection team will be headed by Brig. Gen. Gordon P. Masterson, the director of maintenance and supply for Headquarters Air Force. The team will evaluate Reese as one of the three finalists, out of 19 major command nominees, for the prestigious maintenance Daedalian award.

The Daedalian Award team will arrive at Reese after already evaluating the maintenance operation of the 21st Tactical Fighter Wing at Elmendorf AFB, Alaska. When they leave Reese, the inspectors will travel to Kadena AB, on the Japanese

island of Okinawa, where they will review the maintenance operations of the 18th Tactical Fighter Wing. The team will then return to the Pentagon and should complete their evaluations within a few weeks.

Each maintenance operation will undergo thorough scrutiny by all the team members for an eight-hour period. At Reese, that inspection will be taking place next Thursday. Virtually every facet of maintenance operations will be visited and observed by the Daedalian team starting with the maintenance staff functions and continuing through in-depth observation of the 64th Organizational Maintenance and the 64th Field Maintenance Squadrons. Items checked will range from aero repair through welding and will include avionics, engine maintenance, flight line support, pneudralics, fuels, and data management among other stops on the team's itinerary.

Reese's aircraft maintainers have arrived at

their present position as one of the Air Force's top three maintenance organizations following more than a year of hard work which saw many individuals and divisions recognized for their outstanding work. The hard work exemplified by these awards came together in December 1983 when Reese was named as Air Training Command's Outstanding Maintenance Effectiveness and Efficiency Award winner. This week's inspection will decide who has the best aircraft maintenance operation in the world.

General Masterson will be assisted in his inspection at Reese by four other officers from Headquarters Air Force, all of whom are experts in their field: Col. John W. Anderson, chief of Maintenance Policy Division; Col. John D. Duckworth, chief of the Aircraft Systems Division; Col. Edwin R. Offer, chief of the Supply Policy and Energy Management Division; and Col. Joseph B. Verna, chief of Munitions and Missiles Division.

grade point average of 3.0 may apply.

- Handwritten on separate sheet of paper, list activities and organizations you have participated in from the 9th grade. Briefly state and explain your major and career goals.

- Complete scholarship application forms.

The recipients will be selected by a board of educators whose children are not eligible. Their decision will be final.

A caller had made an inquiry in October about the possibility of replacing carport lights in the village with more efficient street lights and was wondering if anything had been done.

Reese is presently in the process of finalizing the design for a contract to replace or repair various lighting systems on the base. The caller's suggestion to improve the lighting in the carports is being considered as part of a follow-on project to continue more energy efficient lighting. Civil engineers are in the process of determining what lighting will be most efficient, both cost and energy-wise in the village.

I regret that this process is taking so long, but energy and cost studies must be done, the project must be designed, and then each project must compete for ever decreasing funds. Thank you for your concern and continued interest in making our base a better place to live and work.

A caller recently pointed out that an article in the January 13, *Roundup* stated that maintenance personnel had "helped Reese meet 99.2 percent of the wing's scheduled flying." He pointed out that this fact appeared to be inconsistent with our situation in being behind in student training and needing to fly on Saturdays to catch up.

There are three primary explanations for this apparent inconsistency. First, the figure cited in the news article was for fiscal 1983 (Oct. 1, 1982 through Sept. 30, 1983). On September 30, the student classes in training at Reese were an average of 1.8 days ahead of their forecast positions in training. Most of our problems accomplishing our training requirements have occurred as a result of abnormally bad weather since then.

Second, the news article related that Reese had flown 99.2 percent of our allocated flying hours in fiscal 1983. As Col. Willard Grosvenor, deputy commander for operations, pointed out in his article in the January 20, issue of the *Roundup*, training accomplishments are not measured by the number of hours each student has flown, but instead by the number of effective sorties he or she has flown. There is a relationship between hours flown and sorties flown, but inevitably, some of the sorties are ineffective. The percentage of sorties flown that are ineffective increases during the winter months due to bad weather, thus aggravating our current problem.

Lastly, it should be noted that the thrust of that news article was that maintenance personnel support the mission extremely well. As a wing, we cancel only between .7 and 1.2 percent of our scheduled sorties each month due to maintenance related problems. This is a very small portion of our total sorties cancelled. Most of our losses, up to 40 percent based on historical records, result

from bad weather. Clearly, the cancellations due to maintenance problems are almost insignificant by comparison.

A photo of Col. Thomas F. Sheffer, hospital commander, in the January 27, edition of the *Roundup* appeared backwards and a caller brought it to our attention.

Although the base newspaper is published by a civilian company through an agreement with the base, each phase of its production is supervised by people in the Public Affairs office. This, of course, includes assuring that the photos are placed properly on the page before printing.

After the final inspection and approval of the January 27, edition, the photo negative came off the page and was inadvertently replaced backwards by the pressman. When the papers were delivered to the base, the editor immediately investigated the situation and called Colonel Sheffer with an apology and explanation. The matter has also been called to the attention of the newspaper publisher.

It is the goal of the Public Affairs office to provide a high quality newspaper to the people of Reese and we realize that incidents such as this diminish the *Roundup's* credibility. We apologize for the error, and thank you for your concern.

Residents of Dormitory 230 are short of hot water and a caller asked why.

A new, larger water heater was installed in the dorm January 16 in an effort to keep the hot water supply ahead of the demand. The new water heater holds five times the capacity of the old one.

However, after the new unit was installed it was discovered that it had a defective electronic ignition which the manufacturer will replace. Until the control is replaced, the heater is operating on a standby pilot and hot water is being generated. Civil engineering personnel will continue to check the system periodically to ensure proper operation.

Please don't hesitate to report a lack of hot water to CE Customer Service, Ext. 3210, if the problem continues.

A dining hall patron said the facility had been closing at 6:30 p.m. instead of 7 p.m. as posted.

The quality assurance evaluators have discussed the complaint with the dining facility manager, Lester Majors. Although he was not aware of any problems of this nature, Majors will monitor the closing hours to ensure the facility provides the best service possible.

A caller asked why commissary employees were required to report to work during a recent snowfall when the rest of the base was closed.

Actually, the base was not closed due to inclement weather. However, civilian employees may have requested annual leave. In this case, as always, leave would have been approved or disapproved based on management's determination of the work load.

The caller also inquired about a rumor that a recently vacated position in the frozen food department would be held vacant until April.

The position will be filled promptly. A request for personnel action to fill the position was submitted January 11. Commissary management personnel are readily available to answer employee questions and concerns. Please give them a chance to respond to your questions.

The tattered condition of the base flag was the concern of a "CARE Line" caller.

We make every effort to ensure a serviceable flag is always flying and that we have a spare flag on hand to replace a flag that becomes frayed or tattered. However, sometimes the supply system does not flow as rapidly as we would like. In this case, we did not have a replacement flag when we needed it.

A new flag was obtained January 24 and placed in service January 5. Thank you for your concern.

New siding is a welcome addition to Reese Village houses, but a caller warned that newly installed siding may trap pets under the houses.

He said before the siding was installed there was an opening on the side of the house that many pets used to get under the building. Since the new siding has no opening, there's a potential for pets to literally get walled up under the house with no way to escape. He rescued a neighbor's cat which had been trapped under a house.

Closets in village housing units have openings that lead under the house. Residents should be on the alert for animals trapped under their house where the new siding has been installed. Thanks for the call.

Losing 'baby' teeth is a part of the growing up process

(February is National Children's Dental Health Month and as such, the Reese Dental Clinic in conjunction with the American Dental Association will provide dental information to parents and child guardians through Roundup articles in February.)

"Mommy! Daddy! My wiggly tooth fell out!"

If you're a parent, you're sure to hear this speech or one much like it from your child, usually when he or she is around age six. Children are excited about losing their primary baby teeth. They know it is an important step in becoming an adult.

As a toddler, your child had 20 small teeth that fit nicely into a child-sized jaw. As the child enters first grade, the primary teeth begin to be replaced by 32 larger, permanent teeth. This second set of teeth will have to last for the rest of your child's life.

Losing the primary teeth is a natural, painless process, part of growing up. When it's time for a particular tooth to be replaced, its roots slowly dissolve into the surrounding tissues. Without roots to anchor and support it in the jaw, the tooth becomes loose and falls out. In a few weeks, the gap in the child's mouth is filled by a new, permanent tooth.

You should be concerned, however, if your child loses a primary tooth too early. This sometimes occurs because a tooth has been knocked out by accident or has been

removed by a dentist because of an abscess or other problem. Whatever the cause, once the tooth is missing, the neighboring teeth on either side may tip and drift into the empty space. Because of these changes, there may not be enough room for the permanent tooth when it is finally ready to come in. That's why dentists sometime recommend that children use a space maintainer if a primary tooth has been lost too soon. Space maintainers are metal or plastic devices that can be used to hold the space for the permanent tooth.

The honor of being the first permanent teeth in a child's

mouth usually belongs to the "six-year" molars, which can appear as early as age five. These molars, located just behind the primary teeth, are often mistaken for primary teeth by parents. As a result, they often do not receive any special attention and are likely to be attacked by decay.

What can you do to help your child have strong, healthy permanent teeth? Encourage good dental health habits. Daily brushing and flossing, the use of fluorides, a balanced diet, and regular dental visits are important for everyone. For healthy teeth tomorrow, take care of your child's teeth today.

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Emergency room or medical 7-11?

"There were no appointments available." "I didn't have time to leave work (or school)." "My child has had a sniffing nose and a rash for several days, but I thought it would go away."

Sound familiar? All too many U.S.A.F. Hospital Reese emergency room patients are using these and other excuses when approaching this hospital facility. "Unconsciously, patients think of this as a medical convenience store," said one emergency technician.

On a slow night, the emergency room staff sees six to 10 patients, but a closer to normal figure would be in the 20-30 range, explained the duty physician.

The normal staff for the emergency room consists of two technicians and a doctor—none of these individuals may leave the confines of the hospital during their shift.

A recent night at the emergency room, may help to place the emergency staff's mission into perspective. During a two-hour period, a patient came in with an injured right leg, a mother brought in her daughter for flu symptoms (she had them since 10:30 a.m. that morning at school), and a father came in with his son (the boy had a rash on his stomach and back).

But, it was far from slow in those two hours, the emergency room staff had to be ready at a moment's notice to transport a woman in the delivery room to Lubbock

General Hospital. The baby was entering the birth canal with a prolapse cord, a situation in which the umbilical cord appears before the baby. A prolapse cord condition is the most dangerous problem that may arise during the child bearing procedure.

The condition demanded that the ER staff call in Dr. Cathy Temple, OB; SSgt. Chuck Owens, pharmacy; A1C Gerald Franklin, surgery technician; Capt. Bill Harbour, surgical nurse; Capt. John Adamo, nursing and anesthetist; and Dr. (Maj.) Connie Nepomuceno, pediatrician. The patient's condition required an emergency Caesarean section delivery, otherwise the baby (once in the birth canal) would compress the umbilical cord cut-

ting off the supply oxygen and blood.

It was an emergency situation. The baby could have died, suffered brain damage or respiratory problems, according to A1C Scott Allen, ER technician. Fortunately, the baby came through in fine condition.

One thing that frustrates ER technicians is being told there are no appointments available in Primary Care. Each morning, a Primary Care representative brings a schedule of available appointments to the ER.

Hectic as it is, the ER staff always attempts to remain courteous. "We enjoy our jobs in the emergency room," said Sgt. Cynthia Wilborn, ER technician. Patients, however, must realize that

they see only a small portion of what the ER staff is responsible for.

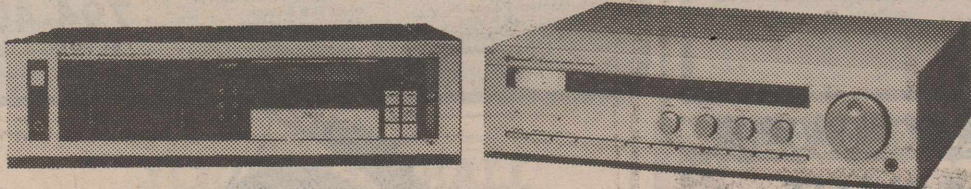
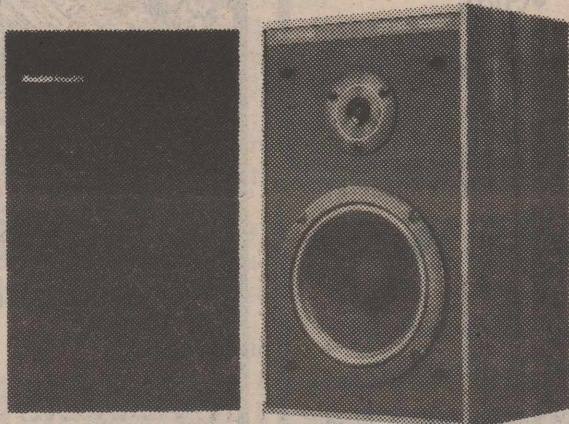
No matter how much they enjoy their work, it is still too apparent that many people have omitted the "emergency" and replaced it with medical convenience.

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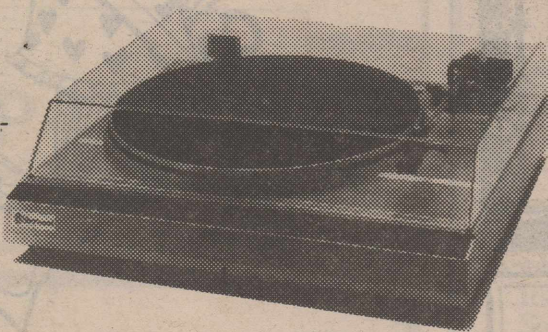

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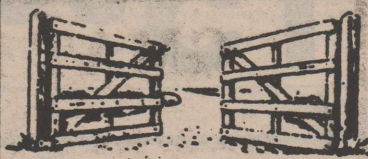
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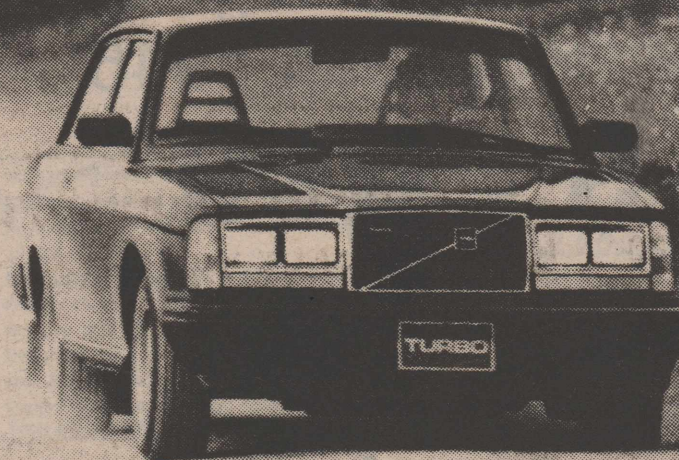
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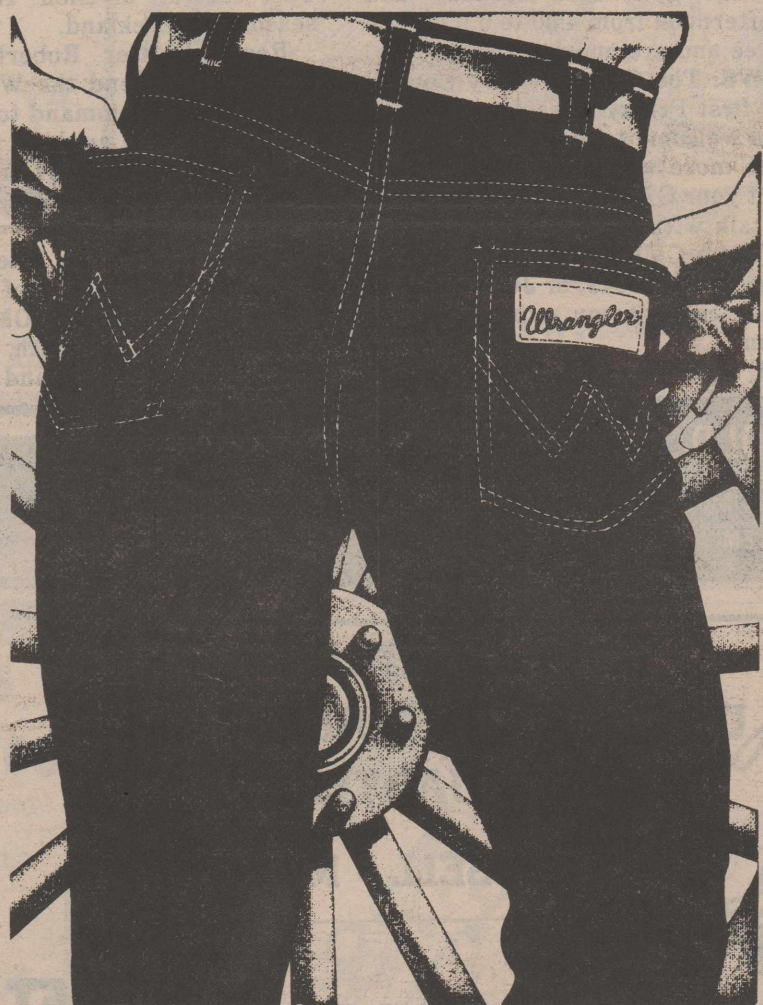
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Base squelches overpricing

"Zero Overpricing" is off to a good start. The wing has doubled fiscal 1983's price challenges with 27 since Oct. 1. Participation is well distributed among Reese organizations:

The 64th Field Maintenance Squadron, eight; 64th Resources Management, six; 64th Air Base Group, four; civil engineering, three; organizational maintenance, three; 64th Student Squadron, two; and communications, one.

Of these, one was the result of an alert person in the library, who challenged the \$17.34 price for two date plates. The correct price turned out to be \$3.52 each. Another came under the watchful eye of one of our civil engineering folks. In this case the challenge saved his unit the possible loss of \$1469.40 due to an error in loading the price of lawnmower housings in the supply computer. A third challenge was made by another sharp civil engineer. He challenged the \$1017 paid for six turnbuckles and saved \$854.10. Yet another challenge came from a responsible individual in MWR Supply,

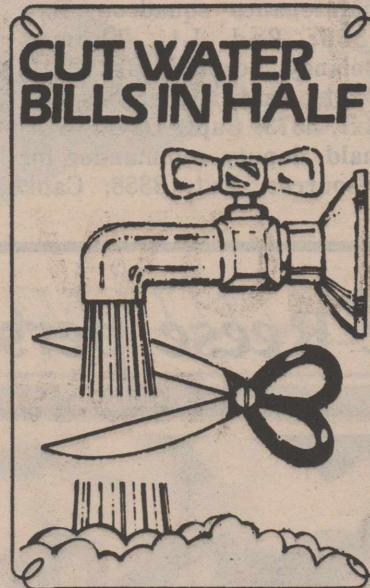
who refused to accept 144 racquetballs at \$13.62 each. As you may have guessed, the price should have been \$13.62 per dozen, thus saving a total of \$1743.12!

Although no dramatic overpricing has been verified to date (several challenges received so far are still being investigated), the probability is high that somewhere on Reese we have some item which is much more expensive than it has to be. You and I help pay for these, and it could be worth 10 percent of the excessive price through the Suggestion Awards Program to the person who identifies an item which the government is paying too much for.

Let's say you spot an item you feel is overpriced, what do you need to do? First, gather some facts; stock number or part number of the item suspected of being overpriced, the amount being paid, and what leads you to

believe it is overpriced—for instance having seen the same item in a store or catalog at a much lower price. Now, pick up the telephone and call Ext. 3279, or visit Supply Customer Liaison in Building 250, Room 3, and give the information to Bill McCoy the Supply Customer Liaison specialist. He will take your price challenge from there, and he will get back to you when the item has been completely investigated.

Conserving our resources is part of everyone's job. By challenging items you have reason to believe are overpriced you are doing your part.

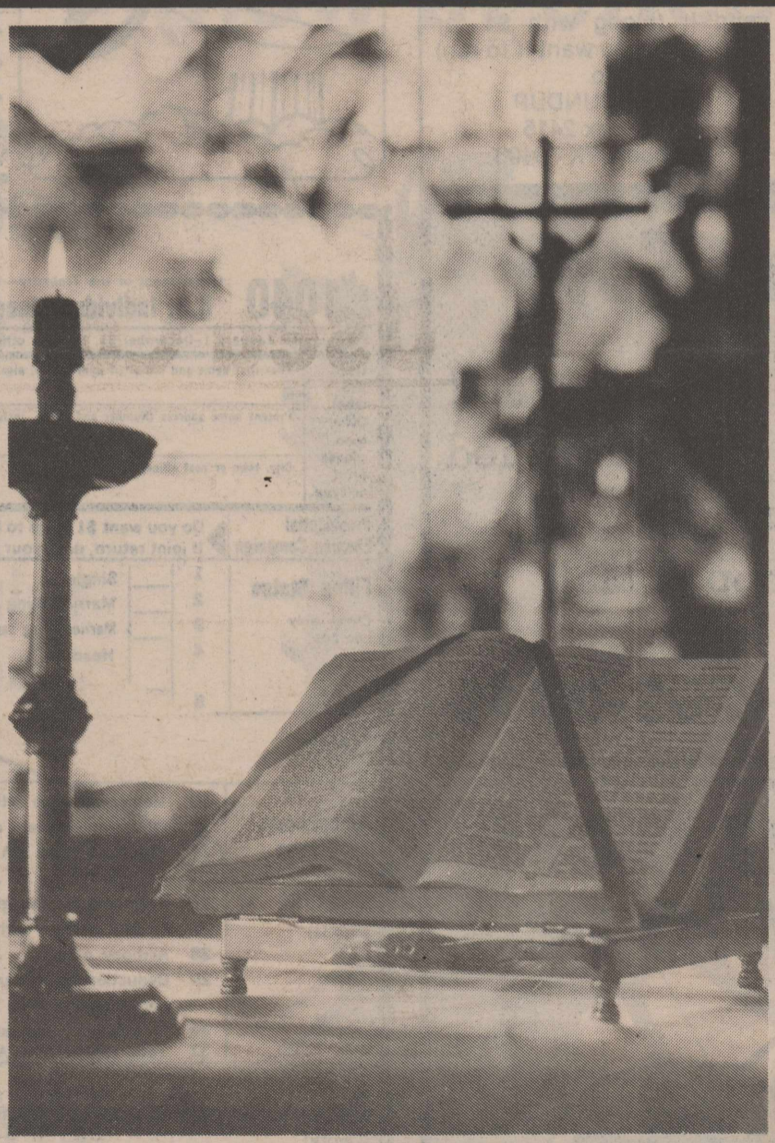

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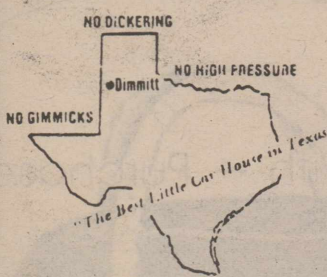

Georgia primary nears

WASHINGTON—The pace of the 1984 election year picked up following the opening round in New Hampshire. On the second Tuesday in March, there are six important primaries. Among them is the Georgia presidential primary.

Citizens of Georgia required to be absent from the precincts during the time of registration or, on election day, may vote by absentee ballot in the March 13, election.

The official absentee registration form in Georgia is the state registration card, which may be requested by completing a federal post card application or other written request. The state registration must be completed and returned to the Board of Registrars by at least 30 days before the election.

Two separate requests are required for the registration card and the absentee ballot. A political party preference declaration is mandatory when requesting a primary ballot.

Voter registration is cancelled if a voter fails to vote at least once in a three-year period immediately preceding the first day of January of each odd-numbered year, unless a person requests continuation of registration.

Georgia election officials will mail absentee ballots to applicants approximately 21 days before the election, and the voted ballots must be returned to the Board of Registrars prior to the polls' closing March 13.
