chief helps keep 'em flying Maintenance

"Keep 'em flying-safely" is the motto that sums up the mission for aircraft maintenance people, the new deputy commander for maintenance

"Those four words tell why we're in the business," says Col. Robert R. Dale Jr. He lives and works by the motto that has seen him through an aircraft maintenance career that began in 1963.

"Exciting" is the single word Colonel Dale uses to describe his assignment as head of the Reese maintenance complex-the best in Air Training Command for 1983. "I'm impressed by the professionalism and the sense of pride and achievement throughout the base," he says.

That sense of pride and achievement is evident in the maintenance complex, which is now competing with two other bases for the Daedalian Award, signifying the best in the Air Force. "There's always room for improvement," says the maintenance chief. "I've told my staff not to change things just because they have a new DCM, but to always be alert as to how to improve and do things better. It's those new ideas that keep an outfit alive and vital."

But Colonel Dale says new ideas won't be his major concern. "My biggest problem will be getting out of the way," he said with a smile, referring to the people in his organization who make things happen instead of waiting for them to happen.

That enthusiasm, he says, is reflected in the various self-help projects he's seen during his short time on base. "People here work hard, but they have a lot of fun at it, too," the colonel says.

Colonel Dale's career also has been filled with a lot of hard work and fun, he says.

He brings with him to the job experience gained through the ranks of the aircraft maintenance officer. "I've held every job you can hold in aircraft maintenance-from shift worker to maintenance control to squadron commander to DCM, and all the jobs in between."

In addition to maintenance experience in Strategic Air Command, Pacific Air Force and ATC, Colonel Dale served a career broadening tour at the Air Force Academy from 1968-72. His assignment to the Academy came after a year-long stint with General Dynamics in Fort Worth, Texas. The assignment, in the Education With Industry program, gave him the opportunity to work in production of the F-111.

In 1982 Colonel Dale finished a short tour as the chief of maintenance at Taegu Air Station, Korea, and was assigned to the 12th Flying Training Wing at Randolph AFB, Texas, where he served as assistant DCM until his arrival here last month.

"Reese has a real sense of 'family' and 'community'," says the colonel. He and his wife, Diane, have two daughters who are college students. Rebecca is a graduate student at the University of Texas at Austin and Catherine is a freshman at Southwestern University at Georgetown, Texas.

Colonel Dale says that even during his short time on base he has identified the keys to Reese's sense of 'family' and 'community.' "It's loyalty, integrity, pride and teamwork," he says. "People are loyal to their fellow workers and their bosses. They are honest about mistakes and immediately set about correcting them and they are proud of themselves and their work.

"All this adds up to teamwork, he says, and I'm proud to be a member of the Reese team." The part of the team that "keeps 'em flying-safely."

WASHINGTON (AFNS) - A major step will be taken this summer to try to fill manpower shortages in America's individual ready reserve, announced Department of Defense officials.

The present six-year military service obligation for all service members will be extended to eight years beginning June 1. The decision was made by Secretary of Defense Caspar Weinberger Feb. 15 in response to projected shortages of 250,000 to 400,000 people in the individual ready reserve, said Reserve affairs officials in Washington.

This change also will increase the manpower of the inactive National Guard Ready Reserve, officials clarified.

People joining the military after May will have the option of four-and six-year enlistment plans followed by individual ready reserve obligations to complete their eight-year commitment. All initial active-duty, guard or reserve enlistments and officer commissionings will be affected.

Presently, about 422,000 members are in the ready reserve. This manpower could not meet mobilization requirements in the event of a fullscale war or national emergency, service officials reported.

"The extended service obligation is expected to increase manpower by 150,000 each year starting in 1990," explained Maj. Robert Norton, Assistant Director for Manpower and Personnel with the Office of the Assistant Secretary of Defense for Reserve Affairs.

"In 1978, the manpower in the individual ready reserve and inactive National Guard reached an all-time low of 342,000," said Major Norton. "The Department of Defense has been able to raise the numbers only slightly over the last few years.

"This number of people will never be enough to meet mobilization needs in a full-scale conflict like World War II," he said.

A manpower requirement report presented to Congress in February estimated peak shortages for a major mobiliation at 165,000, Army; 112,000, Air Force; 42,000, Navy; and 18,000, Marines.

"Last year, service representatives asked Congress for the authority to increase the cadre in the individual ready reserve and inactive National Guard," explained Navy Capt. Louise Wilmot of the Office of the Assistant Secretary of Defense for Military Personnel and Force Management.

"The fiscal 1984 defense authorization bill gave the Secretary of Defense the option to change the service obligation from six to eight years," Captain Wilmot added.

Officials seek historical information

Reese officials are trying to contact base employees-military or civilian-and local citizens aware of past base operations which may have involved disposal of hazardous

The inquiries are part of an intensive records search to be conducted at the base next week by Radian Corporation. The private engineering firm from Austin, Texas is under contract with the Air Force to identify any former disposal sites located on the installation that may contain hazardous materials. The visit is part of an Air Forcewide program to identify the location and status of any inactive waste disposal sites. Studies have already been made at many Air Force bases, with all installations programmed for visits by 1985.

The search conducted by the team will be as intense as historical records will permit, and will also include interviews with people who may have knowledge of past base operations. Local citizens aware of any operations which may have involved disposal of hazardous waste should contact Capt. Gene Smith, base environmental coordinator, at 885-3150. Base officials emphasize that persons who provide information or were involved in past disposal practices will not incur personal liability.

The team will also contact various federal, state and local offices to gather any pertinent data that they may have available.

Should the team identify any disposal sites of potential environmental risk, base officials will request follow-on assistance to determine the exact nature and magnitude of any potential problem. Should an actual problem be identified, the Air Force will initiate actions to decontaminate, contain, or correct the pro-

was received, Colonel Bluford has had to cancel his visit, but fellow astronaut Col. Frederick D. Gregory will be featured at the dining out. Everyone is invited to hear Colonel Gregory speak at 7 p.m. March 28 in the Texas Tech University Center. Admission is free.

Two callers complained that a local pizza place that advertises delivery on base will not deliver to the hospital.

The Roundup publisher has contacted the restaurant and was told by the manager that several people who had ordered pizza had not been available to take delivery. Possibly workers order the pizzas and then get called away from their stations. This has caused the restaurant to repeatedly lose money on deliveries to the hospital.

wing FOD prevention manager

Some New Year's resolutions are better than others. Usually, within the first couple of weeks of January, we come to realize which goals are realistic and attainable and those goals which were just "wishful thinking

A careful study of foreign object damage (FOD) to jet aircraft engines over the last three years has stimulated a very realistic and attainable goal for 1984.


Compared to 1981, both 1982 and 1983 were relatively good years in this area of FOD prevention. In 1981, Reese spent \$83,105 to repair or replace damaged jet engines due to foreign object ingestation. A greatly improved wing FOD Program in 1982 created a FOD awareness environment that cut the dollars spent on FOD by 49 percent, down to \$42,453.

The program was even better in 1983. Although we spent \$42,607 in 1983, we cut the total number of incidents from eight in 1982 to three in 1983. In September 1983, we learned that a moment of inattention on the flight line could cost us \$22,963 when a brake fluid reservoir door was ingested into a J-85 intake, destroying the engine. We were very lucky that time, and no one was injured. Next time the cost could be much higher than mere dollars.

Traditionally, February and March are Reese's worst months of the year for FOD. Many factors contribute to this, not the least of which is the weather. Rain, wind, snow, and numbing cold can create all the conditions necessary for a major incident. Let's not let the cold numb our brains as well as our hands.

All supervisors need to pay particular attention to the work being performed by their units on or near jet aircraft. Every agency on base that comes into contact with aircraft, whether operations, maintenance, or support, needs to be aware of the dangers inherent during this time of the year. Each and every person on the base needs to concern themselves with the problem. If we utilize the FOD prevention equipment such as sweepers, magnets, crew chief pouches, and FOD containers on and off the flight line, and if we take the added time to dispose of foreign objects properly, then Reese stands a good chance of meeting its goals for 1984.

In 1984, our resolution is to spend zero dollars on major FOD incidents, i.e., greater than \$5,000. In addition, we want to spend less than \$20,000 on all other minor (greater than \$1,000) incidents. Well, that's it. Now it's up to you to make this year's motto really mean something. FOD, No



HAMPUS — Your benefit, resp

During your assignment at Reese, there will be occasions when routine or emergency care required by your dependents will not be

available at the base hospital. Depending on the seriousness of the medical problem when this happens, you will have to make a choice of using another

military medical facility or

the Civilian Health and Medical Program of the Uniformed Services, commonly known as CHAMPUS.

If you decide to use another military facility, let your provider know and we will assist your dependent in making an appointment at that facility, and in some cases we may be able to assist with aeromedical transportation. Keep in mind that the nearest military medical facility is about 200 miles from Reese and in an emergency situation your only choice will be to obtain care from a civilian provider or hospital under the CHAM-PUS Program.

Generally, CHAMPUS will cost-share most health care that is medically necessary. When your dependent uses the out-patient portion of the program, they must pay a yearly deductible of \$50 for one person or \$100 per family. The fiscal year runs from Oct. 1 through Sept. 30. Once you meet your deductible, active duty dependents pay 20

percent of the allowable charge and CHAMPUS will pay 80 percent. If you are a retiree or a dependent of a retiree, you pay 25 percent of the allowable charge and CHAMPUS will pay 75 per-

For inpatient care at a civilian hospital the cost for active duty dependents is \$6.80 per day or \$25 total, whichever is greater. For retiree's and their dependents the cost is 25 percent of the bill. Also, remember to check with the Health Benefits Advisor at the base hospital in regard to a nonavailability statement before your dependent is admitted to a civilian hospital.

Because you are referred for care by the base hospital, don't assume that the provider/hospital will accept assignment under the program. It is your responsibility to ask if they will accept you as a patient under the CHAMPUS Program and accept your cost-share plus the fees the program allows as

full payment.

If your provider/hospital does not participate in CHAMPUS and you choose to have them provide your care, you will be responsible for paying the difference between the allowable charges and the actual charges in addition to your CHAMPUS cost-share.

As you can see, CHAM-PUS is not free. You must pay part of your medical costs when you use the program. Because of this you may want to purchase other health insurance to supplement CHAMPUS. Stop by the Patient Affairs Office at the hospital and pick up a list of organizations you can write for information about supplemental insurance.

CHAMPUS has many special benefits and certain limits. Also there are claim filing and appeal procedures. Information about CHAM-PUS or the base hospital is available by calling Ext. 3581 or stopping by the Patient Affairs Office.

ATC wins safety awa

Speed, safety, fatigue, safety, helmets, safety, seat belts, alcohol, MOST Plus, safety, safety, safety. It's a broken record.

But that same broken record saved lives in Air Training Command last year and won ATC recognition for having the best ground safety program in the Air Force.

The Chief of Staff Special Achievement Award was presented to the command last month for its 1983 safety program. ATC was the only command in the Air Force to improve on its 1982 safety record.

Safety officials noted this is the first time this award has been used to recognize a ground safety program.

ATC equaled the fewest number of ground mishap fatalities in its history during 1983. Last year's 17 fatalities was half of the command's 1982 death toll. Traffic and sports and recreation deaths were also cut in half, from 21 to 10, and 12 to 6 respectively. Reese had no traffic deaths in 1983, a drop from one death in the previous year. During both years Reese had no sports and recreation deaths.

ATC military and civilian injuries also dropped in number from the previous year. Government motor vehicle mishaps were nearly 30 percent lower than in 1982. Reese motor vehicle mishaps droppped to zero in 1983 from a 1982 total of two.

Air Force safety officials at Norton AFB. Calif., also praised the command's unique motorcycle safety training program, MOST Plus. 1983 was the first full year for the program which combines classroom and hands-on motorcycle proficiency training.

Comparing the 18 month periods before and after the start of the program, command motorcycle injuries were cut by one-third and fatalities were cut in half.

In a message congratulating ATC wings and centers, Gen. Andrew P. Iosue, ATC commander, said, "In addition to commanders, safety staffs and supervisors, we are also very proud of the individuals in ATC-undoubtedly the key links in the safety chain."

The Reese library was among five Air Training Command base libraries which earned cash prizes in the 33rd Annual Air Force Library Publicity Contest, held at Randolph AFB, Texas in January.

Judging was based on scrapbook entries which highlighted the library's effort to publicize local programs and activities during the past year. Competition categories were determined by the number of shelf-listed volumes in each library.

Taking second place in the small library category was Vance AFB, Okla.

Chanute AFB, Ill., earned third place in the category for large-size libraries. An honorable mention went to Goodfellow AFB, Texas, in the same category.

Lackland AFB, Texas, earned ATC's other award - an honorable mention in the extralarge base library category.

First place winners in each category received \$500 to use in enhancing local library programs. Second place winners earned \$300; third place finishers, \$200; and honorable mentions, \$100.

Fifty-nine Air Force bases submitted entries in this year's contest.

ATC's winning scrapbooks and a videotape entry form Keesler AFB, Miss., will be

entered in a nationwide library public relations awards contest to be held in June.

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
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ase nets 86% of AFAF goal
