Reese IP ATC's best

Capt. R. Dave Witchey is the Air Training Command's Instructor Pilot of the Year. The Reese instructor is assigned to the 54th Flying Training Squadron.

Captain Witchey earned the right to represent Reese and the 64th Flying Training Wing earlier this year. He was selected by a board of officers who examined every detail of the pilot's career at Reese.

The officers' made their Reese selection based on the "whole-man" concept as 2nd Lt. Liz Spraggins explained it in January.

Captain Witchey had the qualifications to be the wing's IP of the Year, and it looks like he had the qualities ATC was looking for too, said Maj. James E. Elliott, the captain's supervisor. "I think it's outstanding."

"He's very deserving of the honor. During his relatively short time in the Air Force he's demonstrated that he possesses the qualities of a ranking officer," the major added.

Captain Witchey is now at Squadron Officers School, Maxwell AFB, Ala., but the Reese Junior Officers' Committee is trying to get the captain back for the junior officers' awards banquet April 13.

JOC Awards banquet

AF officials fight allowance cuts

WASHINGTON (AFNS) — Air Force officials are concerned that a trend to cut military pay and allowances will result in an exodus of talented people from military service.

To stem the flow, Air Force officials are sending words of caution to Congress. Air Force testimony in March before Senate and House subcommittees warned that proposed changes to the military compensation system may cause problems for future recruiting and retention.

"Unless positive steps are taken to counter the impact of lower unemployment rates," Air Force officials cautioned, "The Air Force and all of the services could be faced with another hemorrhage of talent similar to that experienced in the late 1970s. We know that

as unemployment falls, the services, particularly the Air Force, will find it more difficult to recruit and retain high-quality people."

This warning came March 14, in a report to a House Armed Services Subcommittee by Tidal W. McCoy, assistant secretary of the Air Force for Manpower, reserve affairs and installations, and Lt. Gen. Kennedy L. Peek Jr., deputy chief of staff, manpower and personnel.

Maj. Gen. Robert C. Oaks, the Air Force's director of personnel plans, sent a similar message March 22, in hearings before a Senate subcommittee.

"The emerging threats and already imposed reductions to many of our compensation programs are a concern to our

Fighting for pay, allowances

officers and airmen," General Daks said.

Secretary McCoy and General Peck and Oaks agree that a direct relationship exists between unemployment rates, pay that keeps pace with the private sector and re-enlistment rates. Despite sound Air Force manning now, Secretary McCoy and General Peck report that "recruiting and retention rates could crumble as quickly as they have risen."

Military pay fell 7.8 percent behind the private sector in 1979 and "tremendous personnel and experience losses ensued," according to General Oaks. Pay increases in the next two years brought the military pay comparable to the private sector. This resulted in an improved manning picture, he said.

Since 1981 two pay raises have been capped by Congress. Although pay improvements in the fiscal 1985 budget will not entirely cover the ground lost since 1981, the projected 5.5 percent military pay increase for fiscal 1985 is a positive step," said General Oaks.

If military pay continues to lag the private sector, Secretary McCoy and General Peck warned that personnel losses will degrade readiness. "The nation should provide its military people a standard of living commensurate with the demands and uniqueness of military service," they added in their report.

Housing is another issue Secretary McCoy and General Peck discussed in their report. They said they are concerned that housing allowance restrictions could negate measures to improve servicemembers' quality of life. Of particular concern were changes in the variable housing allowance — changes that have placed more finan-

cial demands on Air Force people, they say. The variable housing allowance was started in 1980 to help members cope with drastic differences in the cost of housing in the continental United States. Basic pay and General Peck emphasized. Officials also objected to proposals aimed at reducing status of military housing allowances. The Treasury Department is reviewing an out-of-pocket housing expense equal to 15 percent of BAQ, explained officials. Revoking the tax-exempt status would increase the amount of military housing allowances from \$800 to \$3,000 annually, according to General Oaks. About 270,000 military members own homes, he said. Officials said such a ruling also would create excessive demand for military family housing and force members to live in out-of-pocket housing. This year out-of-pocket housing expenses will be an amount equal to nearly 30 percent of BAQ.

"Furthermore, \$600 and \$800 housing allowance ceilings will penalize approximately 1,800 military officers ordered to duty in the nation's highest cost of living areas," said General Oaks. Each of these officers will lose \$1,500 because of the ceilings, he said.

"Unless this trend is reversed," the general continued, "the services will face the risk that talented people will leave the military to avoid assignments to other-

duce." "The increased recruiting and training costs expended on replacing those driven out of uniform service by this ruling could totally offset the added revenues it would produce."



VHA survey can only help

Recently more than 1,600 Reese airmen received a variable housing allowance survey. Airmen who get the survey may or may not choose to fill them out, however, finance officials do point out that the amount of money paid to personnel in this area through VHA depends upon the information made available to Air Force finance personnel.

Once the survey is complete, return it to DPM-QA/13 as soon as possible. They have a deadline for getting the Reese results turned in.

Hospital no-shows hurt

Hospital appointment no-shows — a big waste of Air Force benefits. No-shows, and cancellations 15 minutes prior to an appointment, force medical practitioners to spend time without seeing a patient and the hospital staff to reschedule the original appointment.

If you must reschedule notify the hospital as far ahead of time as possible. By doing so it is possible that another patient may be scheduled.

Please do not call . . .

Captains are urged not to call ECI Professional Education Support Branch to verify that their completed PME has been posted to their promotion records.

The branch is working with the 1984 majors board due to convene May 14. The EDOP gets a list of all eligible officers three days before extraction of the officer selection brief.

The EDOP screens all PME graduate listings, from all sources, and forwards their findings to the promotion board via CRT message. This process continues daily until that particular promotion board ends.

For example, a captain, who completed a PME course May 15, meeting the majors board will be considered. However, the completed course may not be in local records for up to three weeks later.

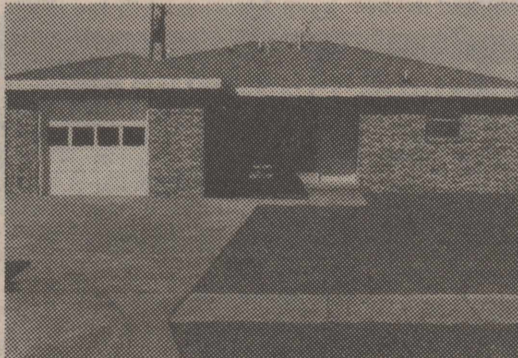

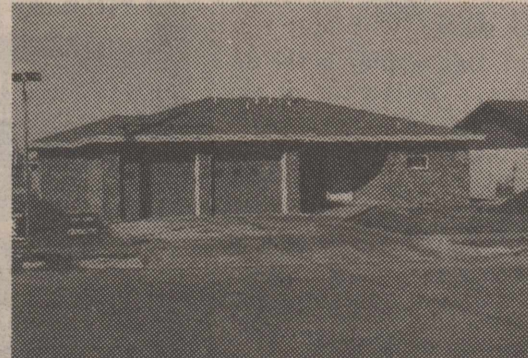

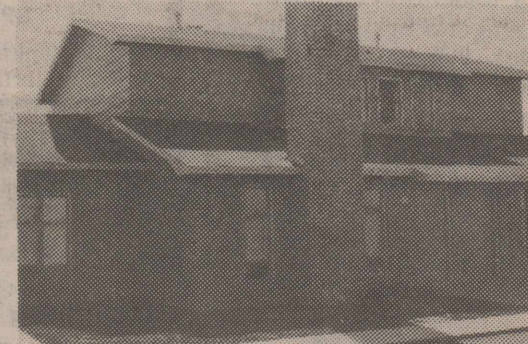

Energy awareness to get help from younger crowd

Energy detectives are going to be recruited from the ranks of Air Force elementary school-aged children during the 1984-85 academic year, according to Sam Lanham, Reese energy conservation manager.

Those young detectives will be joining forces in the Energy Detective Program. The program is geared to create energy awareness in young military dependents living in family housing units, indicated Col. Jerry A. Smith, Air Force Engineering and Services Center vice commander, Tyndall AFB, Fla.

Each participating student will do a simple energy audit on their home for one week. On the audit forms provided, children will compete to amass enough points to win an energy detective decal.

Children who get a decal can then place it on a front window of their home as a constant reminder to conserve energy.

To help students remember the audits the Air Force will provide dark blue, number two lead pencils to each participant. The children can use the pencil for their audit and as a reminder that they too are an energy detective helping the Air Force conserve energy dollars spent in family housing units.

During the audit children will check to see that doors close tightly when the heating or air conditioning is on. They will also watch for lights, TVs and radios left on when no one is using them.

In all it should be a week of fun for the children, but most importantly, a week of in-

creased energy awareness by the children — tomorrow's leaders, said Lanham.

Energy tips can help cut utilities

Electric and gas companies throughout the country are working for you. Their research is the basis for many of the energy saving tips they provide to their customers.

Utility companies recommend that once a month:

- Clean dirty filters. Check for loose or badly fitted filters that may allow dirt to get into the system.

- Inspect fan belts for wear, cracks or splits. Fan belts should fit tightly and should not slip while on pulleys.

- Clean off dirt or grease buildup on the fan blade.

- Brush off and vacuum evaporator coils. Also, brush off dirt and dust on the condenser coils and wash them with a high-pressure spray of water or cleaning solution.

Their once every three month recommendations include:

- Lubricate the bearings on the fan motors according to the manufacturer's specifications. A motor with properly lubricated bearings will run smoothly and quietly. Loud, rough-running motors may need lubrication.

- Look for cracks in the equipment housing and check to be sure that the motorized dampers move freely. Check the linkages at each connection point, and inspect the electrical connections for the motor and the wiring.

- Check the insulation on the supply air ducts. It should be in good condition, without gaps, tears or holes.

Command pilot to speak here

Brig. Gen. Richard F. Gillis will be the guest speaker for Undergraduate Pilot Training Class 84-04 set to receive their wings this morning at 10.

General Gillis, 47, is the deputy chief of staff for logistics at Air Training Command Headquarters, Randolph AFB, Texas.

This August will mark the 27th year of General Gillis' Air Force service, but not his 27th

year as a commissioned officer.

General Gillis first enlisted into the Air Force in 1954 and worked as a control tower operator until his selection for the aviation cadet training program in 1956.

The general earned a bachelor of science degree in occupational education from Southwest Texas State Univer-

sity at San Marcos, Texas, in 1977.

At the time the general entered the service, an enlisted member could be selected for the aviation cadet program, and if they passed, they were promoted to second lieutenant.

After earning his wings, General Gillis flew five months at Moody AFB, Ga., completing advanced all-weather training in the F-86D. Since

then he has flown at assignments across the U.S., in Newfoundland, Okinawa, and the Republic of Vietnam and Thailand.

His assignments have developed his career as a fighter-interceptor pilot, a maintenance officer and most recently a logistics officer.

As a logistics officer, General Gillis was the deputy program manager for the A-10, and later director of

logistics for airlift and trainer systems. He also managed the logistics portions of C-5, C-17, C-18, T-46 and HH-60D acquisitions.

The general is an accomplished command pilot with more than 4,200 flying hours and military decorations that include the Legion of Merit, Meritorious Service Medals and Air Force Commendation Medals to cite but a few.

84-04 launches 42 new careers

Forty student pilots from across the U.S., one from Saudi Arabia, and another from Honduras join the ranks of military pilots this morning during Undergraduate Pilot Training Class 84-04's graduation ceremony.

The formal end to an almost year-long curriculum begins at 10 a.m. at the Reese theater as the family and friends of the students settle in to watch.

Brig. Gen. Richard F. Gillis, 47, deputy chief of staff for logistics at Air Training Command Headquarters, Randolph AFB, Texas, will be the key graduation speaker.

The senior class began pilot training in April 1983, when each student was taught how to properly use and land with a parachute. Also during their first weeks of instruction, came the physiological training unit, or altitude chamber. Hospital staffers took the students up to altitudes equalling 35,000 feet.

In the chamber, one student removes the facemask demonstrating the physiological effects that occur at 35,000 feet; a second student will do the same at 30,000 feet; and then the rest of the class, except the first two, will remove their masks to feel the effects at 25,000 feet.

At 18,000 feet the students are taught that even low altitude flying without oxygen is dangerous. Each undergoes a visual acuity demonstration with colored cards — masks off, the colors begin to blend together, but with oxygen and their masks the colors are clearly separated.

Ready to master jet flight, the student pilots began learning in the T-37. In the 75 flight hours they spent in the Tweet, each student passed the three required check flights. The basic knowledge of jet flight instilled, they moved on to the T-38 Talon.

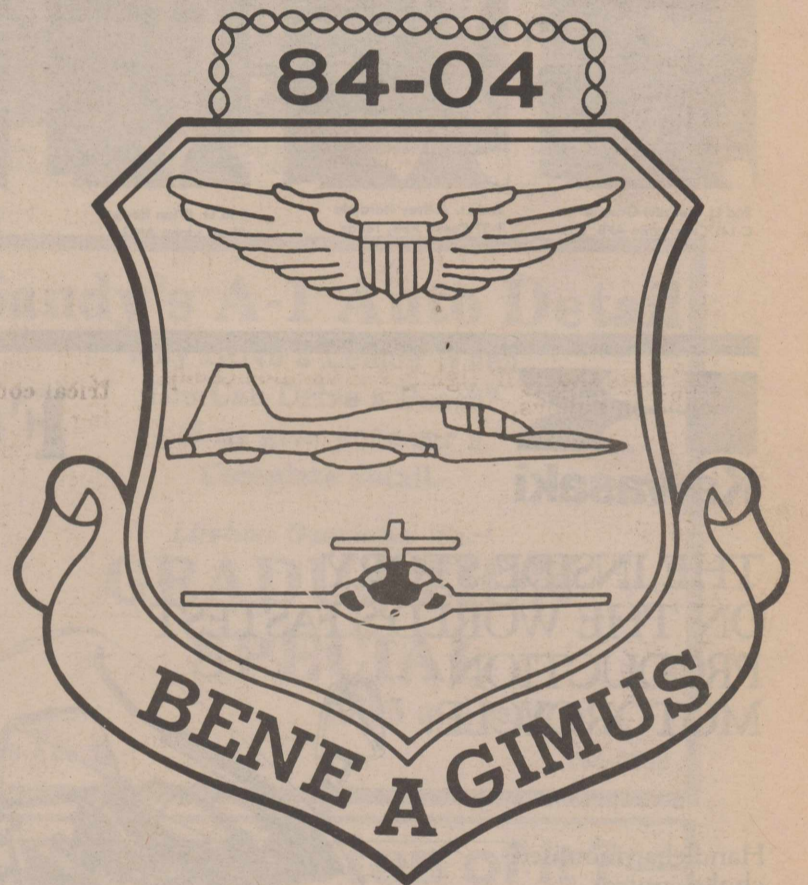
The T-38, affectionately known as the "white rocket," is the Air Force's supersonic jet trainer. It is capable of Mach 1.2 speed (more than 800 miles per hour) and altitudes above 50,000 feet.

Like the basic flight training program, each student is required to pass three check flights in the T-38. UPT students must fly 100 flight hours in the T-38 before they can graduate Air Force pilot training.

Their tenure at Reese, however is not all flying, each of the students must attend classes on flying academics, flight planning, weather, aircraft systems operations, accident prevention and instrument procedures.

Following this morning's graduate ceremony, there will be a luncheon at the officers' club for the new pilots and their families. During the luncheon 2nd Lt. Brian Hedges will be honored for his quick thinking during a T-38 solo flight. His aircraft developed inflight problems, but he recovered and landed safely.

After the luncheon the 64th Student Squadron will host their "red carpet" tour for the families and friends of UPT Class 84-04 through the flight training facilities at Reese.

84-04's year at Reese

In late April 1983, a small band of young men gathered at a desolate spot in the high plains of northwest Texas. The place had been an army air field during the war, but since had been converted to a proving ground for U.S. Air Force - not of machines, but of men. During the next year these men would be tested and trained to become America's elite — Air Force pilots. The place became known as Reese AFB, and the men as the class of 84-04. When they arrived on base they were simply a group of individuals from all across the country. The experiences they would share during the next year would cement them together into a unit whose accomplishments would earn them the respect and admiration of everyone on base.

After arrival, they spent several weeks in classrooms where their perseverance and humor were tested for long periods at a time with endless slide shows and bad jokes. Once they had proven their ability to stay awake for long hours at a time while listening to the drone of instructors, they were advanced to the 35th Flying Training Squadron. While at the 35th their physical and mental tolerance were tested time and time again

as they sat in a super heated room and sold candy bars to passers-by. They also had a chance to display their creativity and manual dexterity by painting the squadron and typing up flying orders. In between these important activities there was time to try out their skills in the fuel-to-noise converter, referred to by the Air Force as the T-37.

Flying the T-37 was quite exhilarating and many members of the class lost their lunch on the first few rides. Training in the T-37 continued for some time, and after they had learned enough to become competent they were sent up alone to test their mettle. Miraculously all the members of the 84-04 survived their solo flights and even more miraculously, they all survived the parties which followed.

Once the basics had been mastered in the T-37, they learned of the excitement of aerobatics, the challenge of instrument flight, and the thrill of flying in formation. Just as they began to feel proficient in the T-37 they moved to the 54th Flying Training Squadron to do it all over again in a craft known as the "white rocket" or the T-38. Here they were confronted with an aircraft with very little lift but awesome thrust. In this airplane they would fly farther and faster than many had thought possible

as they were challenged to think and fly at the speed of heat.

Throughout the program the men had to withstand aggravation from many sources, however, there were also many benefits enjoyed by members of the class. Most of these came in the form of solo rides in which they had the opportunity to fly beyond the supervision of their instructors. They also had the opportunity to visit many of the air bases around Texas on their cross country flights.

Now 84-04 is graduating. They have worked hard against stiff odds to earn their wings. Undergraduate pilot training is a strenuous year-long program designed to mold qualified young men and women into Air Force pilots. Some of those qualified for UPT were unable to meet the challenge of the rigorous training. Those of us who survived have grown close and have become good friends. We've flown together and studied together, shared each other's victories and defeats. None of us is likely to forget our year at Reese. We can be proud of what we've accomplished together as a class and of what we are . . . Air Force officers and pilots.

His enthusiasm for body building began five years ago and it's gained momentum since. Just since January 1983, Odum has been actively involved in three other contests.

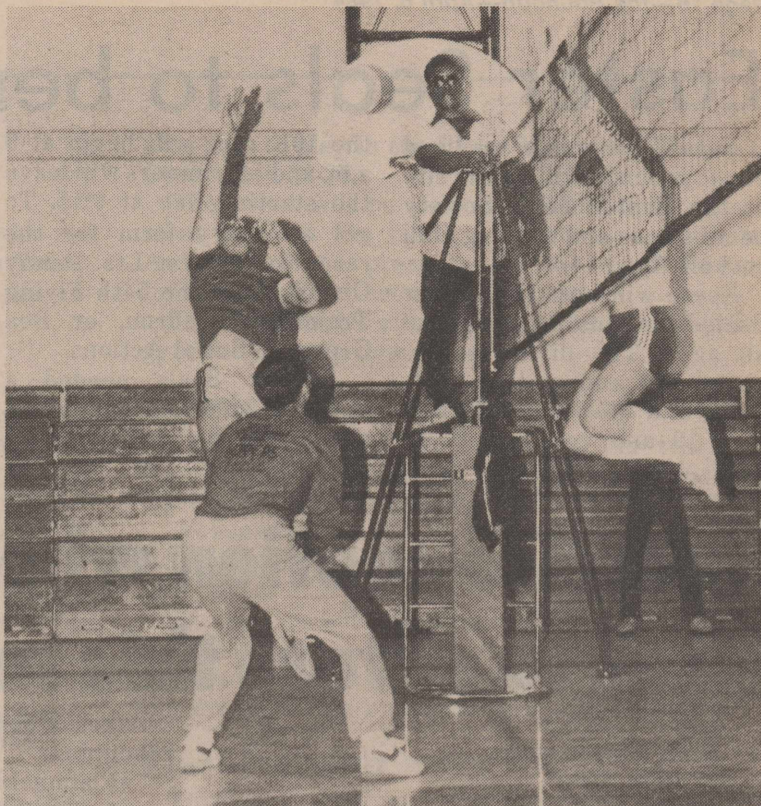
His first 1983 competition was the Second Annual Body Building Championships at Lackland AFB, Texas, where he placed fifth.

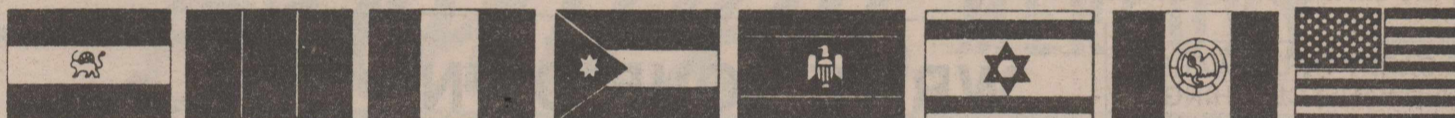

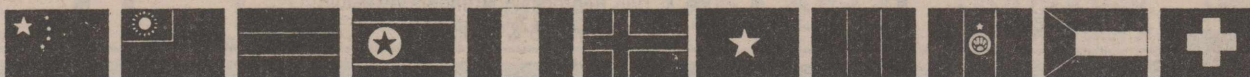

Exercise caution when getting back to nature this season

Are you planning a camping trip this spring? Your back to nature trip, plus a few modern conveniences.

MWR Supply has many items that can be checked out to make your camping trip enjoyable. Being out for the weekend, away from the telephone, the four walls that start to close in on you, or other stressful situations we encounter, can be most enjoyable.

To help ensure this fabulous weekend think about the following points:

•Cutting tools top the list of equipment that causes injuries. To be effective they must be sharp. A dull axe will give you a coronary before you get the log cut in half. Keep the blade covered (sheathed) when not in use. If you're using a hand held hatchet, its best to be on your knees when you swing it. And, ensure it's another piece of wood the hatchet

strikes, if not, it may glaze off of what you are chopping.

•Flammable liquids have caused many a camper painful burns because of this thoughtfulness. Don't have any flammable liquids inside your tent. Flammables and tents should be kept apart. Fire starter made from sawdust, paper and candle wax are recommended rather than white gas or Coleman fluid and the reasons are obvious. Paper starter will not explode or cause the fire to become uncontrollable.

•Another item that has ruined many a camp is alcohol. The intoxicated camper, like the intoxicated driver, may do things they later regret. Many parks prohibit drinking.

•Prepare for emergencies: Where is the nearest hospital? The nearest phone? Do you have a first aid kit? A flashlight, an extra blanket, and a tarp? Does someone know where you will be camping? Even the best of planning unwanted situations can still occur.
