Energy conservation continues as an all-out individual effort

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wing energy conservation manager .We are rapidly approaching the time of year to turn off the heat and turn on cooling systems in our facilities.

Due to a drastic contrast in weather patterns in West Texas at this time of year (it may be 40F one day and 85F the next) we will again forego a strict "no-heat/no-cool" perriod as we make the transition from cold to hot weather.


Many of our facilities that have no windows and few outside entrances were just simply not designed to have both the heating and cooling systems off at the same time. Most of our newer facilities were designed to operate most efficiently by leaving both systems on and allowing automated controls to initiate the system that was needed to keep the facility at the correct temperature. The majority of our facilities, however, still have heating and cooling systems that are controlled by individual thermostats located in the work areas.

Building managers have the total responsibility for controlling thermostats in their facilities. It is imperative that they insure that the proper settings are maintained. However, building managers can only be successful if we, the individual users, become concerned enough about conserving energy to give them our total support.

If each individual would help the building managers by leaving the settings at the correct position, and quickly reporting deviations, we could continue to further reduce our present daily energy consumption. For every degree below the summertime setting of 78F that we set our thermostats, we increase the cost of energy usage by an average of 10.5 percent. (Increases range from a plus eight percent at 77F to plus 63 percent at 72F). As you can see, individual involvement can and will make the difference.


The Energy Conservation Program at Reese needs your help and involvement. Record breaking cold weather this past winter has again caused us to fall far short of our facility energy goal of minus 17.5 percent below the usage in the baseline year of fiscal 1975. Through March 1984, we were minus 8.5 percent or less than half way to our fiscal 1984 goal. We don't anticipate any help from the weather during the remaining months of fiscal 1984. We must ensure that we do all the small, simple things (shutting doors and windows, setting thermostats correctly, turning off unnecessary lights, etc.) possible if we are to continue to reduce our energy usage and costs.

Energy saving projects, in progress and in various stages of design, will help in our efforts to reduce consumption, but you and I, the



individual energy user, must become a major factor if we are to continue to be successful with our energy conservation efforts.

Energy conservation measures were not intended to make work areas unbearable or working conditions miserable, and we certainly don't want them to cause undue hardships here at Reese. We do, however, want to identify and correct energy problems wherever they occur. We need to remember that it is our tax dollars that pay the energy bills at Reese. Let's become conservative energy users instead of wasteful energy abusers. It's up to you. No one else can do your part.





The Traffic Management Office, in addition to arranging the movement of personal property, provides transportation services for official travel. That includes airline tickets, government travel requests and rental cars.

TMO is a satellite of the Sheppard AFB Texas SATO (scheduled airline ticket office), the Reese staff can use their capabilities to find the most economical fare available for official travel. As a satellite, TMO has a ticketing machine that prints tickets after coordination with the Sheppard SATO. All business is conducted over the telephone and changes and rebooking ties up the passenger clerk for long periods.

With only a one deep passenger section, it is imperative that the traveller determine his or her travel dates and times before arriving at TMO with valid travel orders. Ticketing will be made according to the needs of the Air Force, and then the personal needs of the traveller. As such, travellers should request tickets in the following manner:

• "I would like to leave (arrive) in the morning, preferably before 10 a.m."

• "I would like to leave (arrive) in the afternoon, preferably after 2 p.m.'

• "I would like to leave (arrive) in the evening, preferably around 7 p.m.'

TMO will try to satisfy personal preferences, but if a more economical flight is available, and it meets

the Air Force mission requirements, it will be used. For example, the person requesting morning, could expect and have to live with, any flight issued not meeting their personal preference, such as 11 a.m. instead of 10, as long as the requirements of his official orders are met. This is, after all, official travel.

The travel section of TMO is dedicated to customer service and will make every effort to satisfy your needs within the perimeters of the official requirement. However, we cannot afford to play travel agent, because you wanted to leave at 8 a.m. and the only flight we could get leaves at 10:30 a.m. and you want us to look for something else. Please help us to help you, but be flexible.

Another confusing area is fares charged to the government. People ask why TMO issues tickets for "X" amount when they could get it cheaper directly from the airline? The answer is that the government contracts with the airlines for certain fares and in doing so assures that the same fare will be available for a certain period of time. In the long run the government saves money by doing this. Those "super saver" fares are not applicable to official travel and so cannot be used.

Remember, the Traffic Management Office is a service organization designed to serve the base populace in arranging the movement of people, their possessions, and freight. Educating our customers in why we do things the way we do helps us to serve them better. For more information call Passenger Reservations at Ext. 3837.

AFA drive 1984 Donations shatter record


RANDOLPH AFB, Texas (ATCNS)—Air Training Command members donated \$951,004 to this year's Air Force Assistance Fund drive, shattering the previous command record set last year.

This year's total represented 216 percent of ATC's campaign goal of \$440,044. In 1983, ATC people contributed \$876,826, or 191 percent of the goal, to the AFAF.

Command personnel officials say they're especially pleased with the record amount of money collected, They were Goodfellow AFB, Texas, with 229 percent, Vance AFB, Okla., with 209 percent, and Lowry AFB, Colo., with 205 percent.

The biggest beneficiary of this year's command effort will be the Air Force Aid Society, which will receive \$657,186 of the funds collected within ATC.

Command contributors also designated \$177,343 for the Air Force Enlisted Men's Widows and Dependents



Home, while \$108,632 was earmarked for the Air force Village.

ATC also collected an additional \$7,843 in undesignated cash donations, which will be divided among all three AFAF affiliate agencies.

People owning pets in the Village must insure their pets, which may be domestic types only, have rabies tags and are on a leash, within immediate voice control or pinned up.

Recently, a house cat belonging to a Reese Village family was victimized by an unknown animal. The resulting wounds were best described as horrible. The cat had gashes in its back where patches of fur were now missing.



In this case, the veteranarian fees have continued to mount, because the cat will have to return to the vet's office for checkups.


When stray pets are found by the Reese security police they are brought to the base animal shelter for five days, and then if not claimed turned over to the Lubbock Animal Shelter. Pet owners that claim their pets must pay a \$5 a day fee, and if the animal is properly tagged, the base police can get in touch with the owner immediately.

Reese is not like other Air Force installations in that it is not totally enced in. The result is numerous more stray animals roaming the base nousing facility.

The security police admit there are some Village pet owners that they see more frequently than others, but they stressed "not all the animals roaming the Village belong to Village residents. We get strays from everywhere."



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
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
