

Memorial Day 1984

Memorial Day, a day for reverence and remembering. But where did this 116 year-old holiday get its start?

Historcial resources indicate that Decoration Day, as it was originally called, began May 30, 1868. Its creator; Commander of the Grand Army of the Republic Gen. John A. Logan. It is now a legal holiday in most of the United States, the only exceptions are a handful of states in the south.

Memorial Day now marks the tribute paid

by Americans to the dead of all wars involving the United States. For most, the day is observed through military and civilian parades and memorial exercises.

During the memorial exercises flowers are used to decorate the graves of American servicemen, here and overseas. Water services are held for those who died at sea.

Most familiar to Americans; however, is the ceremony at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier in Arlington Cemetery, Va. Flags everywhere are flown at half mast until noon in honor of those who gave their lives protecting the freedoms Americans continue to enjoy.

Until 1971, Memorial Day was observed every May 30. The traditional holiday is still May 30, but today federal employes, and certain private enterprise employees, too, now take off the last Monday in May in observance of the holiday honoring American's fallen patriots.

CARE Line

A resident of the new dormitory, Building 230, asked why no pay phones are installed there.

Since all pay telephones belong to, and are installed by, the General Telephone Company of the Southwest (GTE) at no cost to the government, they are the only ones who approve or disapprove all requests for such service.

Even though they have always been very cooperative in honoring our requests, there have been instances when this service has been denied. This could happen when service has been removed previously due to malicious damage, when insufficient revenue makes it less than cost effective to provide the service, or when other pay telephones are available nearby that can handle the traffic.

The request for a pay telephone for Dorm 230 was submitted to GTE April 26 and is currently awaiting heir approval.

A caller was frustrated when she was put on hold for 12 minutes by the hospital appointments desk answering system, and was then told that the clerk could not wait a minute for her. The customer needed the time to get her husband's identification card so she could give the clerk his social security number. Seems a little unfair? Well, here's the background and solution.

The appointment phones have five incoming lines, and the system puts calls on hold in the order they are received. So, if the caller is number four or five, the delay could be a little length:

A gym patron said he and his friends were playing basketball and were asked to clear the court by a member of the Morale, Welfare and Recreation Division staff, but another group of 10 basket all players were allowed to play. He wanted to know why.

Jack Hood, chief of the MWR Division, tells me that the 10 players were playing full-court open play basketball and had taken a short water break. Four other players then took to the court, but were told that another game was in progress.

Hood offers these reminders about open play: The first game will consist of players chosen by team captains. For each subsequent game played, the new team will consist of players from the sign-up list. These rules are posted in the gym and are enforced by the gym staff.

A hospital patient said the noisy, distracting behavior of a hospital worker is the last thing a sick person needs when waiting in the lobby and she wanted to bring it to our attention. She also pointed out that this is not the normal conduct of the rest of the hospital personnel.

Thank you for your concern. The hospital staff is also concerned about providing a quiet atmosphere, particularly around the patient lobby. Patients can help the staff by contacting the person in charge of the clinic in question. Corrective action can then be made on the spot.

A CARE Line caller was concerned that operations and maintenance funds were being used to pay for secretaries to attend a secretarial enhancement course. He asked if this was fraud, waste and abuse. No, it's not.

The course referred to is a one-day seminar to be conducted in Lubbock by a private-sector company. Regulations permit O and M funds to be used for this type of civilian training if the training is job related. It's up to each functional area supervisor to determine if training is needed. The supervisor is also responsible for disbursement of O and M funds.

Laughter The natural way to feeling good

Recently I read a magazine article entitled "Laughing Fit:" The article pointed out that laughter has a therapeutic affect on people and can be better than medicine.

The ancient biblical writer wrote: "A merry heart doeth good like medicine." (Proverbs 17:22)

The trouble begins when laughter goes out of life. Comedians do us a service by making us laugh.

When a person laughs, the chest, thorax and abdominal muscles as well as the diaphram, heart and lungs contract.

A good belly laugh can make systolic blood pressure soar from an average 120 to a hypertensive 200 and double the pulse rate from 60 to 120 beats per minute.

Laughing also pumps extra adrenalin into the bloodstream, and stimulates a rush of endorphins—the body's natural pain killers—to the brain. After a good laugh, all systems return to normal or a little below normal. This results in less stress and fewer hypetension and muscle-tension headaches. Laughter causes an all-around good physical feeling.

So, go ahead and laugh out loud. It will probably make you feel better. It is certain to bring joy to those around you.

Good clean humor which provokes laughter is a lot cheaper than medicine and psychiatrists' fees. Someone once said, "We are the only creatures on earth who laugh and the only ones with enough problems to need it."

Today America honors those who have died in the service of their country. The voices of fallen friends and loved ones still echo in our ears, and the wounds left by their passing have yet to heal.

As Reese's civilian personnel officer Brown is responsible for 700-800 civilian years, Brown came to Reese employees here; not to menand supervisors he works with.

A man in his position gets his authority from the base commander. Brown's job is primarily to manage the local civilian personnel program in a way that recognizes employee rights, meets the needs of base management and is consistent with the law.

The new personnel chief began his civil service career as a food service workerwage grade 1 (the lowest bluecollar grade possible) - and is proud to have worked his way up to his present position.

The one thing he seemed to think had helped him most throughout his federal service career is his concern for the customer. A strong believer in communication, Brown says his boss' always noted his ability to work with customers finding workable solutions to their problems.

"I'm glad to be here," he said citing the Model Installation Program as Reese's lure to him. In the past when he and his peers ran into problem situations they were restricted as to what they could do; MIP, he believes, will alleviate some of those restrictions.

Memorial Day 1984—It's a holiday for most, but a tragic day for others. During this first of the summer three-day weekends hundreds of Americans will die in motor vehicle accidents thanks in part to "the other guy."

How can you avoid that other guy? There are two means of dealing with the notorious "other guy." Every driver that puts rubber to the road this weekend can survive the fatal mistakes of other drivers by being alert and taking defensive driving measures.

In at least 50 percent of the fatal accidents, alcohol is a contributing factor, according to the National Safety Council. Alcohol is a tough opponent.

The really loaded driver weaves from lane to lane, drives too fast or too slow and stops at the wrong places in an intersection, but that's not all they'll do, there are other erratic behavioral signs.

Then there's the driver with one or two drinks under the belt. They are harder to spot. Their reaction time is slowed, they make slower decisions (less accurate too) and are usually ready to take chances they wouldn't normally consider. There's one ma-

jor problem though—these drinking drivers are not usually found until it's too late.

Other holiday hazard drivers include those that think traffic devices apply to everyone except them. They're the drivers that can stop on a dime. You know 70 to zero in seconds. You can beat him by preparing to let them pass through the intersection. After all, should death really be the penalty for failure to yield the right of way?

Then there's the infallible speeder; "the I can handle speed" drivers. They're easy to spot, defensive drivers should just be ready to brake or swerve to avoid hitting another vehicle or being run off the road. Pay close attention to the environment ahead and behind you when you drive.

There's still those bumper lovers. You know the people who think they have to see inside your car trunk. If one of these drivers gets behind you make sure there is plenty of stopping space between your car and the vehicle ahead, and if possible slow down or stop to force the bumper lover around you.

Remember, to the other guy on the highway... you're the "other guy." Drive defensively and survive this Memorial Day holiday and the remainder of the 101 critical days.



Child care losses must halt; center fees increase July 1

Child care centers throughout Air Training Command are losing money forcing the command to raise fees and take other actions to get the centers back to a break-even opera-

Increased fees and new policies will become effective at the Reese Child Care Center on July 1. To explain the changes and seek feedback from child care center users, Col. Ralph R. Rohatsch, air base group commander, has scheduled a town meeting for 7:30 p.m. Tuesday in the rec center. All members of the Reese community, especially those who use the child care center, are invited to attend.

Colonel Rohatsch will start the meeting by explaining the Reese Child Care Center's financial problems. He then will open the meeting to questions from the audience pertaining to any apsects of Reese life that attendees wish to discuss. Light refreshments will be provided.

"Command-wide, the centers have lost nearly a half million dollars since 1981. We require child care centers to be self-sufficient. That is, operating costs are supposed to be covered by fees charged the users," said Colonel Rohatsch.

Child care center losses are being subsidized by using money from the Central Base Fund. The Reese Child Care Center has been given \$104,142 from the CBF since 1980. This has affected other Morale, Welfare and Recreation programs which also use those funds. During 1983, the child care center accounted for 20 percent of the CBF losses base-

ATC officials found at least three common factors driving the losses. First, Air Force ratios for caregiver (staff)-to-child were lowered, meaning that more caregivers had to be on duty per number of children. The lower ratios helped double the payroll costs

Second, centers now have to pay for meals and snacks which were formerly subsidized by the U.S. Department of Agriculture food program. While the USDA cut back, both on the number of children eligible and on the amount subsidized for each meal, the child care centers did not pass the added cost on to

Third, the Air Force told local child care centers to hold the line on increasing fees dur-

ing 1979 and 1980. These were years of hardship for many military members as inflation ran high while pay raises had been capped.

During this period the Air Force partially offset the losses. However, now these funds have run out and local central base funds cannot afford to absorb child care center losses and still maintain other MWR programs.

We've got to get back to a break-even operation in the child care center," said Colonel Rohatsch. "We're going to adopt the ATC policy changes, effective July 1, and do everything possible to keep the fees down and the service high quality.'

The command-wide policy changes include: •The child care center will set fees and manage resources to produce a break-even operation. Local fees will increase from \$30 to \$35 per five-day week for children over six months of age. Children six weeks to six months will be charged \$50 per week. The preschool rate will become \$17 per week per child for a five day week. And the hourly rate will be increased to \$1.40 daytime and to \$1.60

• Family discounts will be discontinued. The second and subsequent children wil be charged the same as the first child. That's because each child creates a payroll and services expense. Before, fees charged smaller families were actually subsidizing the discount fees charged larger families.

•All meals will be charged the user at a rate to cover the cost of food and preparation. However, children still eligible for the USDA subsidy will receive the authorized reduced

"Quality child care is important to the members of our base community," said Colonel Rohatsch. "That's why we sponsor child care centers. When one considers the training we have for caregivers, the quality programs, the hyigene, safety and convenience of our center, I believe it will compare favorably with any child care operation in the area."

A local MWR survey of child care enters revealed that even with the proposed fee increases, the base child care center is lower in price than similar off-base centers. The survey may be reviewed at the MWR offices, or the child care center, where the complete, detailed list of proposed fee may also be reviewed.


Adherence to flightline driving speed restrictions will eliminate some of the potential hazards between moving vehicles, taxiing aircraft, and flightline personnel.

Doctor agrees to repay government \$700,000

In what is being called the largest civil health care fraudrelated settlement in U.S. history, the former part owner of a psychiatric hospital in Fayetteville, N.C., has agreed in federal court to pay back the government \$700,000. He also has agreed not to submit - or medically supervise anyone who does submit-any claims to the Defense Department's CHAMPUS health benefits program for psychiatric or psychotherapy services for the next 10 years.

Jacob R. Fishman, M.D., who was part owner of Cumberland Psychiatric Hospital until recently, also agreed as part of the settlement with the U.S. government not to treat any patients for whom claims might be submitted to CHAMPUS by any other CHAMPUS-authorized provider of care. In addition, he admitted committing civil fraud in billing for psychiatric visits not rendered, and in billing both the CHAMPUS program and other insurance plans for care provided to some patients.

Fishman had earlier agreed to reimburse the government \$1.25 million in hospital charges, for a total pay-back of more than \$2 million.

About \$194,000 of the \$700,000 will be used to repay the improper claims filed with CHAMPUS by Fishman. The rest of the money will go for penalties and interest.

The overcharges and improper billings were uncovered during an examination of the hospital's medical records by the CHAMPUS Office of Program Integrity. The CHAMPUS office also provided audit support to the U.S. Attorney in Raleigh, N.C., in developing the case.




