A look at Reese—then, and now

Lubbock Army Air Corps Advanced Flying School was established by the War Department in June 1941, shortly after citizens of Lubbock County donated almost 2,000 acres of land in western Lubbock County to the federal government for the construction of a military air field.

The field began operating in late 1941, and the training of aviation cadets began Feb. 25, 1942, with Class 42-E. Subsequently the base became known as the Lubbock Air School, then Lubbock Army Air field, and Lubbock Army Air Base, before becoming Reese Air Force Base.

Class 42-E graduated April 19, 1942, after training in the single engine AT-6s. When Class 42-H graduated on Sept. 6, 1942, it was the first to train pilots in the AT-9 and AT-17.

The field was formally

dedicated during its first open house in June 1942. By the end of World War II 7,008 bomber, transport and fighter pilots had trained here. The base was closed Dec. 31, 1945, with the end of the war.

During the closure, Reese became a housing area for veterans and their families. National Guard units used the base for training.

The base was reactivated Aug. 1, 1949, as the 3500th Pilot Training Wing moved to Reese from Barksdale AFB, La. The wing was redesignated as the 64th Flying Training Wing April 14, 1972.

Reese was named in honor of Lieutenant Augustus F. Reese Jr., a Shallowater, Texas, native, during a Nov. 5, 1949, ceremony. Lieutenant Reese was killed in World War II fighting. He flew the P-38 "Lightning" until he was lost in

Cagliari, Sardinia, on May 14, 1943.

Many training airplanes have been used at Reese. In World War II, the AT-6 "Texan,"AT-7 "Navigator," AT-9 "Jeep," AT-10 "Wichita" and the AT-17 "Bobcat" were all flown here. Following reactivation, the T-28A was flown from January 1951 into early 1955.

Perhaps the best known training aircraft to fly at Reese was the TB-25 "Mitchell."The TB-25, flown from September 1945 through January 1959, was used as the only trainer from January 1955 to September 1955. The last TB-25 at Reese is displayed at the main entrance to the base. Reese was the last basic flight training school to use the plane.

The first jet trainer, the T-33A "Shooting Star," was introduced on Sept. 4, 1958. The second was the T-37B "Tweet," which entered the program March 13, 1961. The T-37 is used as the primary jet trainer even today.

Training went supersonic in September 1963, when the T-38 "Talon" replaced the "Shooting Star." The advanced flying stages of undergraduate pilot training is still taught in the T-38. Many of these aircraft now operate with more than 10,000 hours of flying time.

From 1965 through 1973, the T-41A "Mescalero," a military version of the Cessna 172, was used as the preflight trainer. These flights were flown from Lubbock International Airport. Today's students receive the training before they arrive at Reese.

The Air Force's first undergraduate pilot training instrument flight simulator Continued on page 8



became operational here in August 1977, when the members of UPT Class 78-06 began training in the T-37 simulator. UPT Class 78-07 was the first to train in the T-38 simulator here in February 1978. Students in 78-07 were the first to undergo the full UPT curriculum. The simulator facility houses eight T-37 and eight T-38 simulator cockpits plus the associated visual computer equipment.

The majority of instrument training is conducted in the simulator to reduce the number of flying hours required for UPT. The results are substantial savinas in fuel, aircraft wear and tear, and maintenance expenses.

The years have brought many changes to Reese. Silver wings have been pinned on more than 22,000 Air Force pilots since 1941.

That total includes about 200 sergeants who graduated during World War II as members of Classes 42-G, 42-H, 42-I and 42-J. Between August 1949 and Sept. 14, 1961, 4,005 aviation

Reese's first three women pilots, members of UPT Class students along with the men.

79-08, graduated on Sept. 21, Women have served along side 1979. Now, if not all, most classes include women as the first contingent of Women's

the men here continually since Army Air Corps personnel arrived at Lubbock Army Air Field in June 1943.

The three-phase program of preflight, primary and basic flight training, each taught at different bases, ended in 1961. As set up now, UPT is conducted in three phases over a 49 week period. These phases include ground preflight training, T-37 flying training, and T-38 flying training.

In the late 1980s, the T-46A "Next Generation Trainer" is scheduled to replace Reese T-37s as the primary jet trainer. Plans are also being discussed for replacement of Reese's T-38s with an executive-type jet trainer.

Reese can and will continue to concentrate on training pilots for the Air Force's fleets of tankers, transports, fighters and bombers into the next cen-







In the air since 1959, the T-38A "Talon" is the mainstay of the Air Force's supersonic jet pilot training. The T-38 was also the aircraft flown by the U.S. Air Force Aerial Demonstration Team "Thunderbirds" prior to the F-16.

Learning to fly the T-38A means supersonic speeds

The T-38 "Talon" was first flown in 1959, but didn't arrive at Reese until Jan. 11, 1963, when it was phased in to replace the T-33 "Shooting Star" as the jet trainer of undergraduate pilot

Flown today in the second phase of training, Reese's student pilots find the "Talon" is a twinengine, high-altitude supersonic jet trainer, more affectionately known as the "white orocket."

The "Talon" is used primarily by Air Training Command for undergraduate pilot and pilot instructor training. However Tactical Air Command, Strategic Air Command, Air Force Systems Command, Air Force Logistics Command and the National Aeronautics and Space Administration also use the jet in many various

Students fly the T-38A in pilot training to learn supersonic flight techniques, aerobatics, night and instrument flying, and cross-country navigation. More than 50,000 pilots have earned their wings in the T-38A to date.

The "Talon" is capable of rocketing as high and higher than 50,000 feet, yet it needs only a minimal 2,300 foot runway to take off. It can climb from sea level to 30,000 feet in 60 seconds. The "Talon" can also reach 812 miles per hour.

During training, the student pilots sit in front of the instructor, unlike the side-by-side seating in the T-37. Students spend 101 hours training in the T-38 during their undergraduate pilot training here.

Powered by two Continental J69-T-25 turbojet engines, the T-37B has been an intrinsical part of training operations for the 64th Flying Training Wing and the other pilot training wings since its introduction in 1957. Reese, however did not get the "birds" until 1961.

T-37 offers students road to the wings

Nicknamed "Tweety Bird," the T-37 became an intrinsical part of the Reese undergraduate pilot training program in April 1961.

Student pilots train in the 350 mph twin-engine aircraft in the first phase of pilot training at Reese. Students log approximately 90 hours of training in the T-37, while essentially learning to fly. The T-37's cockpit design allows student and instructor to sit sideby-side during the training flights.

The aircraft, built by Cessna Aircraft Corp., is often jokingly referred to as "the 7,000 pound dog whistle" due to the highpitched noise of its engines.

The aircraft measures 29 feet long, nine feet high and has a wing span of 34 feet. Weighing 6,600 pounds, including a 300-pound load of fuel, the aircraft is capable of climbing to 35,000 feet.

Student pilots are able to get a feel for handling larger, faster tactical jet aircraft used in the Air Force by training in the T-37.

There are more than 650 T-37s assigned to Air Training Command for pilot training. Of that 650, 77 are assigned to the 64th Flying Training Wing.

The T-37 is also used for the Accelerated Copilot Enrichment Program. ACE detachments are sponsored by pilot training bases. The aircraft commanders on such planes as the KC-135 aerial refueler are credited with the flying time while their aircraft is in the air. Through the ACE Program the junior pilots, copilots, can amass flying time too, while honing their proficiency as a pilot.

When the T-37 first arrived at Reese it was flown with the T-33. The T-37, the second jet trainer to go into training at Reese will be replaced by the T-46A "Next Generation Trainer," in the late 1980s. The T-46A will, however, begin operational service in 1985 at other ATC units.



Academy jumpers to drop in

precision parachuting team, is scheduled to perform at Reese's Open House 1984 Saturday at 10:30 a.m. and at 3

The Wings of Blue performed at 34 special events in 1983, before over two million spectators. Trailing colored smoke, the team members free-fall toward earth at 120 mph before opening their parachutes. The team performs a variety of maneuvers as their aircraft makes several passes over the drop zone.

The Wings of Blue was form-

Wings of Blue, the United ed in 1966 to give Academy States Air Force Academy's cadets the opportunity to learn the intricacies of free-fall parachuting. The team is comprised solely of cadets under the supervision of Air Force officers and noncommissioned officers.

Each member of the team is a qualified jumpmaster and an instructor in the Academy the basic free-fall course each parachuting programs.

The Air Force Academy, located a few miles north of Colorado Springs, Colo., has one of only a few military freefall parachute schools in the United States. It's the only school in the Air Force autho-

rized to award the coveted parachutist badge.

Jumping as taught at the Academy, is designed to familiarize future Air Force aviators with the basic skills needed to safely complete a free-fall parachute descent from a disabled aircraft.

More than 700 cadets complete year. Those who want advanced training must compete for selection. Selection for the Wings of Blue, is based on the cadet's maturity, ability, academic and military standing.—U.S. Air Force Academy

More than 400 earn their wings at Reese

United States Air Force pilots are among the best trained and most professional aviators in the world. More than 400 student pilots train and graduate at Reese annually.

Air Force pilots must enter pilot training prior to age

demics, officer development, cockpit familiarization trainer practice, and evening study.

Academic training includes performance computation, flight planning, weather, aerospace physiology, aircraft systems operation, aircraft accident prevention, applied



27-and-a-half, and they must also be commissioned officers.

Initial training is conducted in the twin-engine, subsonic T-37, a ruggedly fast aircraft equal in speed and maneuverability to most World War II fighters. Students get around 90 hours of flight instruction in the T-37 during the first phase of undergraduate pilot training.

While in the first phases of learning to fly, the student pilot and instructor are seated side-by-side and assigned specific practice areas.

The 80-minute training sessions teach students the characteristics of their aircraft, emergency procedures, take off and landing techniques, aerobatics, and formation flying. The students also practice night, instrument, and navigation flying; including the required cross country flights.

Once a student is capable of flying, he or she makes the transition to T-38 "Talon," the Air Force's first supersonic, faster than the speed of sound, undergraduate pilot training aircraft. Its twin jet engines boost the "Talon" to speeds in excess of 800 mph and altitudes above 50,000 feet. The T-38 is considered excellent preparation for the student's eventual transition to highspeed operational aircraft.

Of the 101 flying hours spent in the T-38, the student spends approximately 37 on contact missions, 17 on navigation flights, from 5-11 on instrument sorties, and from 37-41 in formation flying.

When the students are not flying, much of their 12-hour workday is filled with aca-

aerodynamics, flight instruments, and instrument procedures.

After almost a year of intensive training the student pilot realizes the dream and becomes an Air Force pilot. Students are presented with the silver pilot wings during a special graduation ceremony in their honor. There are eight classes that graduate during a year here. UPT Class 84-08 will be the next to be honored as they receive their wings Sept. 14.

Reese's Open House enjoy it the safe way

Everyone is invited to the open house, but when they're on the flightline ramp with the aircraft there are some simple rules, that if followed will make the day accident free and fun for all, said Reese Safety Manager John Morehead.

Cigarettes are out. Due to the fumes from the JP-4 jet fuel and the Confederate Air Force's highly flammable high-octane fuel a spark could destroy private and government property into the millions. But more importantly, said Morehead, lives could be lost.

The fumes are not safety's only concern, however, there is also the fuel that will very probably be leaking from CAF and Air Force planes that could ignite a fire.

An additional concern is photographers seeking to get a better vantage point by climbing upon buildings along the flightline—don't. There will be stands available for people to shoot their pictures from, said Morehead.

Safety pins in the landing gear of all aircraft must be left alone. There will be aircrews available at each of the planes on display to answer questions, but if they are busy, "please don't mess around with the aircraft," Morehead added.

For personal safety, Morehead and the Reese safety staff advised spectators to remember, school may have already started and summer seems over, but the bright, hot sun is still out. Visitors should wear sun glasses if it is a bright sunny day and put on a sun screening lotion to protect themselves from sunburn

In the West Texas heat it takes very little exposure to sunburn really bad, said Morehead. And probably less time to protect oneself with lotions.

Finally, Morehead encouraged the use of trash cans. The cans will be out there and if visitors would use them, it would sure help. Using trash containers not only cuts down the time someone will spend cleaning up afterward, but also reduces the foreign object damage risk.

FOD can occur with only a small stone or other small object.
FOD happens when an object is sucked into a jet's air intake system. What results can be staggering, said Morehead.
Remember, it's tax dollars that pay for the Air Force's FOD repairs so it's worth the effort to find a trash can.



Reese, Lubbock share in benefits

Reese and Lubbock have long benefitted one from the other both socially and economically.

Socially, many Air Force personnel assigned to Reese find themselves somewhat awe-struck by the friendly nature of Lubbock residents when they first arrive.

The Lubbock community seems to go out of its way to work with Reese and the base returns that spirit of cooperation.

For instance Camp Blue Yonder is a summer camp for children who otherwise might not get to go to camp to spend a week of their summer here. The camp is operated primarily by Reese personnel and some Lubbock residents.

The city has various outdoor and indoor malls which allow Reese employees and their dependents convenient shopping. With the malls and stores so readily available, it is no wonder that in fiscal 1983 base personnel spent an estimated \$74 million

Economically, Reese requires 3,638 military and civilian employees to get the job of training pilots and supporting those trainers done. Of the 3,638 jobs at Reese only 2,588 are held by military personnel, the remainder are filled by government civilian employees and residents of Lubbock and the surrounding communities working for government contractors.

Military retirees generate their share of Lubbock economic good fortune, too. Typically retirees settle in an area that like Lubbock is not too far from a military installation in order to use their earned benefits.

While living in Lubbock and area communities in fiscal 1983, the 1,587 known retirees received \$16,764,425 in retirement pay to spend as they pleased in Lubbock stores.

The military contracted for services, bought items not readily available through Air Force supply channels, authorized new construction sites on-base, and paid for necessary utilities to the tune of over \$8.5 million locally in fiscal 1983.

In the annual Combined Federal Campaign for 1983, federal workers downtown and at Reese gave \$115,935 to help area community services of the United Way.

To keep the public informed on their tax dollar expenditures, Reese conducted over 200 tours for more than 6,700 people and sent out more than 100 speakers to talk to more than 8,000 area

Reese and Lubbock will continue working and living together for many years in the future sharing both social and economical advantages of good community relations. The Air Force recently confirmed that, when it became known that the T-46A "Next Generation Trainer" would begin operations at Reese in 1989.

'Zip plus 4' becomes local reality

Nine-digit ZIP codes, known as "ZIP + 4," are being used to speed up Air Training Command's mail-Reese included.

Service, "ZIP + 4" is the current five-digit ZIP code followed by a hyphen and four more numbers. The new code is used to direct mail to a particular building, mailroom or organization.

The following organizations

Contracting - 5320; Supply-5350; Transportation - 5426; Traffic Management - 5270; Hospital - 5300; Library -5438; Base Exchange - 7428; Ac-Designed by the U.S. Postal counting and Finance - 5260; Publications Distribution Office (PDO) - 5280; and Civilian Personnel - 5436. All other base organizations, including tenant units, will use the add-

The Reese Postal Service Center has a list of the corhave their own add-ons here: rect ZIP + 4 codes for persons with lock boxes. If your add-on is not - 53XX, check for the proper add-on with the post office.

The add-on for general delivery for all Air Force bases is - 5360.

Add-ons for military family housing will be assigned by local postmasters.

ATC officials say the longer ZIP codes will reduce the number of times the mail is handled, thereby increasing

"ZIP + 4" also saves the command and the Air Force money. "The postal service will give large volume mailers almost a one cent discount on each piece of first class mail using "ZIP + 4". This could save ATC thousands of dol-lars each year," said MSgt. Sheldon K. Madsen, NCOIC of postal policy for ATC.

Sergeant Madsen said "ZIP + 4" codes should be used on both forward and return ad-

Officials said new official letterhead paper with the add-on will not be printed until present stocks are used. Until such time, add-on numbers should be typed on the present letterhead immediately following the fivedigit ZIP.

If outgoing first class mail arrives at distribution without the "ZIP + 4" code, BITS officials may begin returning mail to the sender, Sergeant Madsen said.

Depot repair done locally

Depot level repairs are not normally done at wing or base maintenance facilities, but a corrosion damaged T-38 here didn't have to wait for a depot team to arrive from Kelly AFB, Texas.

Instead, Jerry Howard, an aircraft sheet metal mechanic, Sgt. Hector Garcia, a member of the Aerospace Repair Shop, and Walter Brumit, also in the AR Shop, were given the goahead for the task and to work they went.

The aircraft's top skin area around the vertical stabilizer had become extensively corroded and needed replacement. The task required the maintenance team to pre-fit and pre-drill the new panel before installation.

The entire operation took roughly six weeks, Howard said. Sergeant Garcia and Brumit removed the vertical stab in order for Howard to get the corroded skin off and begin replacing it with the new skin.

Although the job is usually done at depot, "we took it as a challenge," quipped Howard. Howard and Brumit teamed up to get the aircraft's new skin in place. Once the job was done, Sergeant Garcia and Brumit had only to replace the vertical stabilizer.

The engines were replaced along with the boattail and the jet went back into service.

The job gave us a break from the routine, said Howard, "We were glad to do it."

Since the T-38s are totally field maintained, there is not an accurate means of figuring what the local repair saved the Air Force. It is, however, certain that the Reese trio saved at least the cost of sending the depot team to and from Reese, their lodging and the man-hours the team would have had to work on the jet.

Prototype bomber crashes

The Air Force has released the names of the dead and injured crewmembers of a prototype B-1 bomber that crashed near Edwards AFB, Calif., Aug. 29.


Dead is T.D. "Doug" Benefield of Marshall, Texas, who was the chief test pilot for Rockwell International. The injured members are Air Force Maj. Richard V. Reynolds and Capt. Otto J. Waniczek, both assigned to the B-1 Consolidated Test Force at Edwards.

The crash occurred about 10:30 a.m. PDT in the Mojave Desert, about 10 miles northeast of the Edwards AFB boundary. An "escape capsule" separated from the air-

craft shortly before the crash, officials said. A board of officers has been appointed to investigate the incident.

The plane was the second of four prototypes built in the B-1 Program. The bombers are being developed to improve U.S. strategic capabilities over the aging B-52, currently the mainstay of the Air Force's strategic fleet.

The plane's advantages over the B-52 include an ability to fly faster low-level missions while carrying a larger payload and requiring fewer crewmembers-four on the B-1 compared to six on the B-52. Only three crewmembers are used during the test program - Washington

Contacting General Telephone repairmen when you need to was the subject of another call. The caller expressed concern that when someone needs to contact a GTE repairman, they have to physically go and find them. The caller suggested radio pagers for the repairmen issued by the government or GTE.

Officials from the 1958th Communications Squadron have discussed the matter with GTE and the company has agreed to issue the pagers to their repairmen. To preclude confusion, however, the pager numbers are known only by communications personnel.

While the repairmen can be reached by pager, persons experiencing trouble with their lines should call the Reese operator as before to report the problem. The operator will relay the problem to communications personnel, who will screen the call before notifying the repairmen.

A Roundup reader called to express the collective opinion of members of his duty section

about the placement of a recent article. They thought the story in the Aug. 24 edition about 2nd Lt. Alonzo Babers' second Olympic gold medal should have been on the front page instead of the sports page and should have included a picture of the Air Force athlete.

The front page of the Roundup is usually reserved for news concerning Reese people that is prominent and not available through other sources. Lieutenant Baber's great accomplishment was certainly prominent, but the story was presented in the civilian media almost two weeks before it was made available to the Roundup through Air Force News Ser. No photo of Lieutenant Babers and his medals was made available to our newspaper.

Another caller wanted to complain about the apparent lact of attention his units flight shack air conditioner was getting from civil engineering. His concern was that the quality of work might drop due to the sweltering heat.

Checking into the situation, we found that the air conditioning unit was back in service within a week of the call. The action was not because of the CARE Line inquiry, but because CE had returned from Prime BEEF development and the ordered parts had arrived. The unit was fixed on schedule through normal channels.

Sometimes it just takes a little more cooperation and communication between the units to get the job done. After all, we are all here to support and train the best new pilots in the world.

Contracts here to serve

It can be seen when the Services Branch gets the new carpet you've been waiting for in-

stalled in a professional manner, or your lawn mower repaired quickly.

Each action is small, yet the total of these actions—done well—constitutes service to the Reese community. The people who live in Lubbock are here for all sorts of reasons, but the people at Reese are here in service to their country.

The people who make up the Contracts Division are here to "serve those who serve." Given the opportunity, we try hard to do this job very well.

Admitting, facing alcoholism

I'm an alcoholic.

The realization of that fact didn't come easy and it's certainly not something I wanted to be when I grew up. About seven percent of the United States' population are victims of the alcoholism disease. Most will die early because of it.

The results of this disease are well known, however, the cause is less understood than that of heart disease or cancer. I can't tell you how I "caught" alcoholism, or why alcohol affects me differently than you - I'm not even sure I want to know "how" or "why." I am an alcoholic, and that's what I must live and work with.

My alcoholism is not a result of being in the military - I brought it with me when I joined. In the 20 plus years since then, I saw it grow and kept it healthy with regular feeding while achieving an outstanding record in the Air Force.

There came a point though, when I ran out of "enablers." Who would excuse my behavior because of my performance when sober and not hungover? All alcoholics, if they are lucky, reach a point where the lies, the booze, and the denial quit working. In my case it was a concerned boss who forced me to acknowledge that truth and decide which way I wanted the rest of my life to go. Thanks boss.

How is it today? It's not easy and at times it becomes one minute at a time, but it's better now than it ever was before. The 28 days I spent in the Alcohol Rehabilitation Center were some of the roughest, most wonderful days of my life. I met airmen, dependents, general officers, and retired personnel who understood my disease as only an alcoholic can understand. I also met "me" for the first time in many years and came to like me again.

Today I'm recovering from alcoholism and will be until I die or take a drink. I may drink again, but not today and that's all any of us really has.

Air Force reduces stencils on aircraft weapons system

The Air Force has started minimizing comprimises in reducing the number sof stencil markings and decals on its weapon systems. The change does not affect Reese's air-

According to Air Force officials, more than 1,500 markings have been eliminated, ranging from panel markings to fuel and oil servicing instructions. Some markings have also been simplified by replacing three-color decals with flat black stencil markings, such as the national star and command logos.

They say the reduction reverses the trend of proliferating decal and stencil markings dating from the post-World War II era.

Those markings that remain are required by law, such as the national star and aircraft serial number; for safety reasons, such as emergency access and exit markings; or to bolster morale, such as pilot and crew chief names.

Air Force Logistics Command officials, who suggested the reduction, say combat readiness will be increased by reducing the number of hours an aircraft stays in maintenance for painting and by

aircraft camouflage paint schemes.

The reductions also eliminate more than 100,000 man-hours required to reappings on C-130 B and E models ly decals and repaint stencils,

saving some \$2.5 million an-

In addition, markings on the A-10 aircraft were cut from 681 to 95, while markwere reduced from 270 to 84.

Proper storeroom maintenance a must

A fire occurred in an Air Force dormitory storeroom, recently. No injuries were reported, but the potential for injury or even the loss of lives was highly probable.

The storeroom was being used to store dormitory occupants' empty stereo equipment cardboard boxes and styrofoam packing material. Although the boxes and styrofoam packing did not contribute to the start of the fire they did contribute to the

The room was supposed to be secured with access controlled by the dormitory manager, but was not. Also, the area had not been designated or posted as a no smoking or open flame area.

Fire prevention specialists have all been around long enough to know that any uncontrolled storage area without responsibilities specifically assigned soon becomes a haphazard conglomeration of everything under the sun. No order of storage is maintained and highly flammable materials become intermingled with other combustibles and empty stereo equipment boxes and suitcases.

This problem is not restricted to dormitories. It can and does occur in office buildings and maintenance work areas.

Check your area for unsafe storage areas, post "no smoking" signs in the appropriate places. If you have any questions regarding fire prevention requirements, contact the fire department.

Cut government expenses, turn a profit from moving

The "do-it-yourself" moving program could put money in your pocket when you make your next move, said Reese Traffic Management Officer 2nd Lt. Glen Lang.

The program is designed to put moving dollars in the hands of the member as opposed to the commercial carrier, while also saving the Air Force moving money.

Lieutenant Lang explained the program this way, TMO figures the cost of moving property via normal commercial means based upon an estimated weight. Twenty percent is taken from the cost immediately as government savings and the remaining 80 percent goes for paying the vendor for equipment rental and the individual making the DITY move.

The actual amount is based upon property weight tickets. That is the amount for which payment is made. The estimated weight is used only for planning purposes, the lieutenant added.

The lieutenant illustrated his point with three DITY move examples.

•A captain is going TDY to Squadron Officers' School. He owns a pick-up and is authorized 600 pounds of bag-

gage. TMO approves his vehicle, and the weight tickets verify he has 290 pounds to move. All moves under 500 pounds are based upon a 500 pound minimum. The officer gets paid for moving 500 pounds. The commercial cost would be \$368; minus the Air Force's savings, the cost is \$294.40. one way.

•A staff sergeant decides to move from Lubbock to Reese Village with 6,000 pounds of household goods. The commercial cost for such a move would cost the government \$720, but if the NCO moves himself, the government's cost drops 20 percent to \$576. The NCO can rent the necessary moving equipment for \$51.40 and pocket the remaining \$524.60.

• A second lieutenant moving to MacDill AFB, Fla., with 8,000 pounds of household goods will cost the government \$3,380. The lieutenant will save the government \$676 and make \$2,704 if he will move under the DITY Program and spend \$788.

The DITY Program has high dollar returns for both the individual mover and the government, said Lieutenant Lang, "It's worth checking in-

Election time... Just what are a person's rights

Suppose a military member is enthusiastically in support of one particular candidate. This supporter registers to vote and begins to express political opinions on the candidates and the issues everywhere. The enthusiasm leads to political club membership and attendance at regular meetings. The military member's enthusiasm wears off on a fellow-worker and he or she too gets involved.

Has the military member or second political enthusiast committed an illegal action? A general rule to remember when political questions arise

A member of the armed forces is expected and encouraged to carry out his obligations as a citizen, but while on active duty there are certain exceptions. The member is prohibited, in certain circumstances, from becoming a candidate for, or holding civil office, and in engaging in partisan political activities.

To determine whether or not the two fictitious military members violated any law, one must know the definition of partisan political activity.

Partisan political activity is conduct in support of or related to candidates representing, or issues national or state political parties and associated ancillary organizations.

Non-partisan political activity is conduct in support of or related to candidates not representing, or issues not specifically identified with, national or state political parties and associated ancillary organizations.

Issues relating to constitutional amendments, referendums, approval of municipal ordinances, and others of similar character, are deemed not specifically identified with national or state political


Prohibited partisan activities are outlined in Air Force Regulation 110-2. Any campaigning for a candidate of a popular party is partisan in nature and can be punished under Article 92, Failure to Obey a Lawful Order, or Regulation, under the UCMJ.

People are not prosecuted for non-partisan activities such as registering to vote, voting and expressing personal political opinions on the candidates and issues in that way. Joining a neutral political club is likewise nonpartisan and one may even contribute money to a political organization.

No one can use their official authority to influence an election, nor can anyone participate in partisan political


specifically identified with, management, campaigns or conventions. Contributions to partisan political candidates is also illegal.

MTI duty -- is it for you?

Women are needed to fill one of the most challenging and rewarding jobs in the Air Force. Sound like a recruiting pitch? Military training instructor duty at Lackland AFB, Texas, isn't for everyone, but it may be for you.

Lackland's Basic Military Training School has a serious shortage of women TIs. The school's goal is to have one female TI permanently assigned to each flight of female trainees. That

isn't possible now.

Maj. Ronald Browning, operations officer at the school, believes one of the reasons for the shortage is lack of knowledge of the benefits. SSgt. Linda English, however, is well aware of the benefits: an instructor for three of her eight years in the Air Force, she has just extended her tour.

"I like the job because I was placed in a supervisory position earlier than possible in most other career fields," she said. "I've learned to deal with all kinds of different people and their problems. Just when you think you've seen it all, a trainee

comes up with a new one.'

Sergeant English also takes advantage of the educational opportunities available. Several local colleges and universities offer on-base classes, and she takes two classes each semester. "If you use your time wisely," she said, "school's no problem."

She needs only 30 hours for her degree.

Career airmen especially can benefit from the irreplaceable supervisory experience gained at such an early stage in the career. Both Sergeant English and Major Browning emphasized the personal rewards of working with new recruits and watching them become productive members of the Air Force

"Working with a new flight of trainees is like watching a lump of raw dough turn into a beautiful loaf of bread," Sergeant English said. Major Browning added that instructor duty is a great opportunity to mold the future of both the in-

dividual trainees and the Air Force as a whole.

All TIs receive proficiency pay of up to \$100 a month. They are assigned to Lackland on a three-year controlled tour, with the chance to extend, and further opportunities exist within the basic training environment. Academic instructors, section supervisors, training superintendents and members of the standardization team are all former TIs, and many of the positions in BMTS headquarters require instructor experience, according to Major Browning.

"We keep training both men and women no matter what," Major Browning said, "but there are great advantages to having the desired number of women instructors. A major benefit is that trainees can immediately see the important place of

women in the Air Force."

Basic qualifications include good physical condition, a good speaking voice, high standards of conduct and appearance, integrity and good moral character, the ability to make decisions, the ability to lead and at the same time sympathetic, and a military record free of disciplinary action or financial ir-

Enlisted women holding the rank of senior airman through technical sergeant may get details on how to apply for TI duty at the customer service section of their base personnel office.

After screening, and approval from the individual's commander and medical experts, the application is sent to ATC headquarters at Randolph AFB, Texas. It is also reviewed by the Basic Military Training School before selection is made.

Those chosen to become instructors will be reassigned to Lackland. The three-year controlled tour begins with five weeks in the MTI school, also located on Lackland. Only one class of 20 to 40 students is taught at a time. Several months of close supervision follow, to ensure that each instructor lives up to the badge she wears





A pair of sport and recreation accidents took the lives of two ATC members in August, raising the command's 1984 ground death toll to 16.

A senior airman from Lowry AFB, Colo., was killed Aug. 18 while performing a skydiving maneuver before a county fair crowd. Two other non-Air Force parachutists were also killed in the accident.

The three, members of a Denver-area skydiving team, were performing a vertical "three-stack formation" when their parachutes became entangled.

Music Review Buckingham's "Go Insan

Lindsay Buckingham falls into the narrow category of the rock artist who uses his fame to try out new and experimental musical concepts. After rising to the top with Fleetwood Mac, Buckingham immediately launched off in a completely different direction than what made him famous. First, he was the main influence behind the Mac's strangest album, "Tusk." He followed that up with an offthe-wall solo record called "Law and Order" (1981).

The latest Buckingham album, "Go Insane," continues his trend in producing pop music that is in turn brilliant, weird, and totally title cut, a smooth melody which surrounds a multilayered harmony chorus with wanderig minstrel guitar chords. In the catchiness of that chorus, it's easy to miss the more subtle signs of genius, such as the softshoe percussion and spat-out rhythm guitar.

Each song on "Go Insane" is a challenging and individual piece which stands on its own. Take "I Want You," where a crazy monotone rap leads into a cute Caribbean synthesizer tune. Or "Slow Dancing," which rivets the listener's attention to its wailing, metallic-sounding electric

y tips that pay off

If every household in the United States lowered its average heating temperature six degrees over a 24-hour period, we would save more than 570,000 barrels of oil per day, said Reese Energy Conservation Manager Sam Lanham.

Heating and cooling homes accounts for most residential energy costs.

During both heating and cooling

Close off unoccupied rooms and shut the heat or air-conditioning vents; or turn off room airconditioners. This does not apply to heat pump systems. Leave it alone; shutting vents could harm a heat pump.

Use kitchen, bath, and other ventilating fans sparingly. In just one hour these fans can blow away a houseful of warmed or cooled air. Turn them off just as soon as they have done their job.

Keep the fireplace damper closed unless you have a fire going. An open damper in a 48-inch square fireplace can let up to eight percent of your heat out the chimney.

Don't turn the heat on until necessary. On cool evenings use the fireplace instead, and add a blanket at

With heating equipment:

With electric furnance heating, consider a heat pump system. The heat pump uses thermal energy from outside air for both heating and cooling. Costs for these pumps run from about

\$2,000 for a whole-house unit to about \$425 for room size. But they can cut the use of electricity for heating by 30-40 percent and also might provide some savings in cooling costs.

If buying a new gas heating system, ask the gas utility or public service commission about the savings potential of electronic ignition. Also ask about possibilities for retrofitting the

Consider the advantages of a clock thermostat for the heating system. The clock thermostat will turn the heat down automatically at a regular hour before the family retires and turn it up again before they wake.

Consider buying a properly sized furnace that incorporates an automatic flue gas damper. This device reduces the loss of heat when the furnace is off. Contact the gas utility or oil supplier for guidance.

Insulate heating ducts in unheated

Don't use the fireplace for supplemental heating when the furnace is on unless:

The warmth from a fire on the hearth generally doesn't radiate through the house; the heat gain is confined to the room with the fireplace. And when the furnace is on, too, a considerable amount of heated air from the rest of the house flows into the fireplace and goes wastefully up the chimney. Then the temperature in other rooms of the house goes down, and the furnance uses more fuel to raise it to the level controlled by the thermostat.

To lessen the heat loss, lower the thermostat setting to between 50 F and 55 F. Some warmed air will still be lost, but the furnace won't have to use as much fuel to heat the rest of the house to these temperatures as it would to raise the heat to 65 F.

Close all doors and warm air ducts entering the room with the fireplace, and open a window near the fireplace about 1/2-1 inch. Air needed by the fire will be provided through the open window, and the amount of heated air drawn from the rest of the house will be reduced.

When the heat is on:

Lower the thermostat to 65 F during the day and 66 F at night.

Keep windows near the thermostat tightly closed, otherwise it will keep the furnace working after the rest of the room has reached a comfortable temperature.

Have the oil furnace serviced at least once a year, preferably each summer to take advantage of offseason rates. This simple precaution could save 10 percent in fuel consump-

Clean or replace the filter in the forced-air heating system each

Check the duct work for air leaks about once a year if it is a forced-air heating system. To do this, feel around the duct joints for escaping air when the fan is on. Relatively small leaks can be repaired simply by covering holes or cracks with duct tape. More stubborn problems may require caulking as well as taping.

With oil heat, have the service man check to see if the firing rate is correct. Chances are it isn't. A recent survey found that 97 percent of the furnaces checked were over-fired.

Don't let cold air seep into the home through the attic access door. Check the door to make sure it is well insulated and weather-stripped, otherwise, it will be wasting fuel to heat that cool air.

Dust or vacuum radiator surfaces frequently. Dust and grime impede the flow of heat. And if the radiators need painting, use flat paint, preferably black. It radiates heat better than glossy.

Keep draperies and shades open in sunny windows; close them at night.

For comfort in cooler indoor temperatures, use the best insulation of all - warm clothing.

The human body gives off heat, about 390 Btu's per hour for a man, 330 for a woman. Dressing wisely can help you retain natural heat.

Wear closely woven fabrics. They add at least a half degree in warmth. For woman, slacks are at least a

degree warmer than skirts.

For men and women. A light longsleeved sweater equals almost two degrees in added warmth, a heavy long-sleeved sweater adds about 3.7 degrees; and two lightweight sweaters add about five degrees in warmth because the air between them serves as insulation to keep in more body heat.




