Talon to get new lease

Suppose you bought a new Cadillac in 1959, used it continuously since then, and intend to teach your son and grandson how to drive it so they can use it another 25 years. Sound impossible?

Perhaps it is impossible to expect a car to run that long, but the Air Force intends to make an aircraft, the T-38 Talon, do just that. In fact, they expect to fly the plane until the year 2010, with the help of a program called PACER CLASSIC.

meets the needs of the Air Force. But, unfortunately, time has taken its toll and the plane is beginning to show its age-and it's no wonder. This swept-wing, supersonic aircraft ushered in a new era of pilot training a quarter of a century ago. Since then, more than 50,000 pilots have trained in it.

The dual engine aircraft was originally designed to fly 15,000 hours and land 30,000 times in its lifetime. However,

After 25 years the T-38 still new information on ATC's mission use shows current usage about three times as severe as originally expected.

> Based on operational costs, the T-38 has reportedly saved the taxpayers \$1 billion. It will take approximately \$726 million to modernize the 800-plus T-38s over the next 11 years. But that's about onefifth the cost of replacing the aircraft, according to ATC logistics officials.

> PACER CLASSIC embodies all of the major

the aircraft to fly until the year 2010. Eighteen different aircraft modifications or repairs and six engine improvements are either planned or are already in progress, officials said. That list may

The modifications and repairs fall roughly into three groups: structural, engines and avionics.

Structurally, fatigue cracking in the dorsal longeron, the backbone of the aircraft, was discovered in the AT-38 leadin-fighter program at Holloman AFB, N.M. Since the aircraft must be disassembled to inspect this area, an effort is under way to reinforce the longeron so that it won't have to be inspected so often.

According to command officials, the ATC T-38 fleet has not yet exhibited cracks, but the cracks will show up with time they added.

The cockpit longeron has also shown three areas of stress corrosion and fatigue cracking. Hence, a new, redesigned longeron has been pro-

Other fatigue critical components will also be replaced or repaired. For example, the cockpit will be improved from as a safe, economical, high floor to canopy.

Avionics will be updated with "state-of-the-art" sys-

Other modernizations include improved brakes and a lightweight battery. Plans Randolph AFB, Texas.


modifications that will enable are also underway to replace the honeycomb filler material between the outer skins of the wings with composites or other suitable materials.

In the area of engine enhancements, the Air Force is saving time and money by improving the current J-85-5 engine rather than developing a new engine or buying one "off the shelf."

The temperature controlling amplifier on the engine is to be relocated from the engine to the airframe to reduce the effect of engine vibration and heat. This will save significant time in maintenance.

One of the most exciting benefits of PACER CLAS-SIC, according to officials, is the pay-off in the depot economy repair program. While the aircraft is disassembled, many modifications or repairs normally done in the field are accomplished at the depot. This program saves extra maintenance costs because the aircraft won't have to be disassembled again in the field. Additionally, it improves operational readiness.

The T-38 has a reputation performance jet trainer. Through component replacement, modification and repair it will continue to meet the Air Force's needs past its 50th birthday. - (ATCNS)

Command notes dress violations

Two frequent violations to AFR 35-10 are occurring throughout the command-improperly wearing the flight cap and wearing open-necked collars with the lightweight blue

According to 35-10, the flight caps for both men and women are worn slightly to the wearer's right. The vertical crease of the cap is to be at the center of the forehead in a straight line with the nose. The crown of the cap should not be crushed.

Women must wear the cap one and one-half to two inches above the eyebrow, while men are required to wear the cap approximately one inch above the eyebrow. Women's hair may protrude in front of the cap.

With colder weather in store, both men and women should be aware that all Air Training Command members must wear either the tie (for men) or tie tab (for women) with the lightweight blue jacket, except when wearing functional uniforms.

Other Air Force members who are not in ATC must also comply with this policy when on an ATC installation, including those who are TDY or students attending courses. - (ATCNS) Randolph AFB, Texas.

Thirty-four to STEP up in ATC during fiscal 1985

Thirty-four Air Training Command enlisted members will be promoted under the Stripes for Exceptional Performers program during fiscal 1985, according to command personnel officials.

ATC commanders will be selecting individuals for promotion to the grades of staff through master sergeant.

The command's STEP allocation is down two from last year due to a drop in the number of senior airmen through technical sergeants in ATC.

The Air Force-wide STEP quota is 455 promotions, also down two from last year's

STEP was established in 1980 as a test program to give major command and separate operating agency commanders an opportunity to give "on-the-spot" promotions to their most outstanding performers.

Unit

In 1981 the Air Force chief of staff approved STEP as a permanent program and allowed major commanders to delegate the selection authority to the lowest appropriate level.

Under that guidance, commanders of ATC wings and centers with large enlisted populations can approve STEP promotions themselves. STEP allocations for each of these units have been established on the basis of the total number of senior airmen through technical sergeants assigned.

Commanders of smaller units may nominate airmen for STEP promotions to ATC headquartes, where the ATC commander will make the final promotion selections. Two of ATC's 34 STEP allocations have been set aside this year for nominees from smaller

Commanders may waive all normal promotion eligibility criteria except minimum timein-service requirements.—(ATCNS)

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
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Protect yourself—know tenant rights

As a tenant, you have certain legal rights which can't be waived and you have additional rights depending on the condition enumerated in your

Don't be afraid to bargain with the landlord for favorable lease provisions. A lease can be written or oral. When a tenant makes monthly payments and has not entered into an agreement to the contrary, the tenancy shall be construed as a month-tomonth tenancy. Any agreed tenancy longer than a year must be in writing to be enforceable.

A written lease is usually to the advantage of the landlord but military members who are tenants have an important interest in having a written lease because military members need military escape clauses. These clauses allow members to get out of their leases due to moving on base or PCSing.

Don't be afraid to negotiate a military escape clause. This clause and other provisions are important to protect your rights. Try to negotiate other provisions including utilities, warranties, repairs

A Texas security deposit law requires the landlord to return the tenant's deposit within 30 days after taking possession unless a deduction is made for unpaid rent or damages. If the landlord withholds money, he must provide the tenant a list of the deductions within 30 days. The landlord has the burden of proof in court to show that the deductions were warranted. If the tenant does not receive a list of deductions or his deposit within 30 days, the landlord would have the burden of proving he was not acting in bad faith, should the case go to court.

A tenant may recover \$100, attorney's fees and three times the amount of the security deposit. Moreover, the landlord could be denied any claims he may have against the tenant. But you must exercise caution. Read the lease carefully. If it has a conspicuous provision requiring notice to vacate, you must comply with its provisions or else you will lose the protections of the security deposit law.

You have more rights including utilities, warranties, repairs and remedies. Try to find a landlord

who pays the utilities. If you pay for the utilities directly to the company, the landlord cannot interrupt them.

You also have an implied warranty of habitability unless the landlord disclaims it. This warranty means the premises are livable and there are no hidden defects.

Regardless of the warranty the landlord has a duty to repair conditions caused by wear and tear which "naturally affect the physical health or safety of an ordinary tenant." If these conditions exist, give the landlord written notice. If the repairs are not done after a reasonable time, give additional written notice that in seven days you will terminate the lease or sue if repairs are not done. Do not withhold rent because you are obligated to pay

Other tenant rights include protections against being locked out, defenses against landlord liens and your protections in the eviction process.

Before you sign a lease or take any action concerning your lease, coordinate with the legal office, Ext. 3505. You have more rights and you can protect yourself in more ways than you may know.

CHAMPUS can now help pay for ambulances even when the cost exceeds \$100, according to a new regulation which became effective on Oct. 23.

CHAMPUS claims processors begin handling claims under the new rule on Jan. 1.

CHAMPUS can now share the cost of ambulances from a civilian hospital to a military hospital. The civilian hospital can be inside or outside the hospital's health care and zip code zone, but the military hospital must be the closest one to the civilian hospital.

CHAMPUS cannot help pay for an ambulance if the military hospital orders it. If someone at a military facility orders the ambulance, the military hospital must pay for

By making it easier for patients to get treatment in a military hospital, the rule change could help save money for military families.

Previously, CHAMPUS shared the cost of ambulance transfers over \$100 to hospitals only when the patients were being moved from a rural or remote area to the hospital that couldn't provide the necessary treatment.

The cost of the extended ambulance coverage will be minimal because the new costs of local ambulance will be offset by the savings in patients using military instead of civilian hospitals.

Ambulance service is ed personnel. always cost-shared as an outpatient service under CHAM-PUS rules. The transportation must be medically necessary (that is, the patient would be at risk if another form of transportation were bulance service if the am-

nearest hospital, or from a used); the patient's illness or injury must be covered under CHAMPUS; and the ambulance must be considered "professional" under state or local law. This means it must contain a stretcher, linens, first aid supplies, oxygen and other life-saving equipment, and must be staffed by train-

> Taxis, medicabs and ambicabs do not qualify as ambulances under CHAMPUS rules. And CHAMPUS will not share the cost of am

bulance is used instead of a taxi or private transportation for the convenience of the patient.

Under the new rule, boats and airplanes could qualify as ambulances when the pick-up point is a long distance from a hospital or when the patient's condition requires speedy hospital admission.

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Space-A better than ever

A flight to Europe for \$10 may already seem like a good deal, but recent changes promise to make space available travel an even better bargain, according to Military Airlift Command officials here.

Officials said that some 500,000 passengers travel MAC's friendly skies each year. And as of Sept. 1, these people no longer have to stay in the terminal for every Space-A flight call.

Travelers need only sign a Space-A roster every 15 days to revalidate their intent to travel. Travelers, except retired members, can stay on the roster for 30 days and sign up for as many as five destinations. Retirees can stay on the roster for up to 45 days, officials said.

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Another change places Department of Defense dependent school teachers and unaccompanied family members in Category 2C, behind active-duty members on leave, during the summer break. This should lessen competition for Space-A seats during the busy summer season, officials said.

MAC plans to further improve Space-A services by upgrading facilities and automating procedures.

"Our present facilities are old, small and not designed for wide-bodies aircraft loads and peak passenger operations," said Capt. Shirley Poff, passenger movement and staff transportation officer.

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Students lay foundation for robotics research

Wright-Patterson AFB, Ohio

How will aircraft be serviced in the year 2000? Perhaps a mobile autonomous (selfcontrolled) robot will perform part of the

Two graduate students in the Air Force Institute of Technology's School of Engineering at Wright-Patterson AFB, are laying a foundation for mobile robotics research.

Capt. Hubert G. Schneider III and 1st Lt. Thomas E. Clifford have two goals: to create an autonomous mobile robot and establish a permanent robotics laboratory at AFIT.

According to Captain Schneider, the feasibility of robots servicing aircraft was investigated in 1982. The following year AFIT demonstrated a robot creating a map of its environment. This year the officers designed a new body for that robot.

"We enhanced the robot with a new central processing unit and expanded its capabilities," explained Lieutenant Clifford. "Another computer will be added on board to handle the sensory information from seven sonar transducers.'

In addition to upgrading the robot, the officers have also created a mobile robot laboratory and test facility.

"Although every individual component of the robot may not be state-of-the-art," said Captain Schneider, "our total laboratory setup rivals any mobile robotics research facili-

Captain Schneider said he and the lieutenant want to understand the principles involved and the resources necessary to control and support the robot.

"Some people think robots should emulate humans," he said. "We're approaching it from the standpoint of giving the robot limited sensory information about the environment."

Lieutenant Clifford added that robots will not replace the human workforce, but will free man from monotonous or dangerous jobs.

Lieutenant Clifford and Captain Schneider had no experience working with robotics prior to coming to AFIT, but both are experienced in fields that form robotics. They are pursuing master's degrees in electrical engineering with emphasis in digital electronics, pulse power and pattern recognition.

Let's take a bite out of crime

Officer McGruff, Crime Prevention NCO Sgt. Anthony Simmons was there to help the crime fighting dog. The 64th Security Police Squadron declared November Operation Identification Month in an effort to curb the rising Reese crime rate.

Eighteen members of the Reese community found out that the Air Force, more specifically Reese, takes such actions as failure to go, drunken disorderly and damage to property seriously.

Article 15 actions were processed against those 18 from July through September of this

Article 15 punishment is designed to provide swift corrective action. They are not limited to enlisted or officer personnel.

In September, there were six articles processed for individual actions ranging from assault and battery and failure to go to derelict, false statements and false swearing.

There was even one case of driving while in-

In August, seven of the 18 received their Article 15s for actions ranging from failures to go, false statements and damaging government property.

In July, there were five articles processed for such instances as a breach of peace to damaging of others' personal property.

Reese legal authorities have recorded 72 Article 15 actions here just since January. If anyone has a question about Article 15s, the point of contact for the Judge Advocate's Office is Capt. William Phillips or TSgt. Janet Alcares at Ext. 3505.

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


