Two convicted of drug usage, distribution

Two Reese airmen were sentenced to confinement at hard labor after being convicted in general court-martial proceedings here last week.

A1C Michael J. Strong and A1C Kevin D. Ostrom were assigned to the 64th Organizational Maintenance Squadron when they were convicted in the Reese Federal Court Room of using and distributing drugs.

In United States vs. Strong, which concluded Aug. 20, Strong was found guilty of using marijuana, using cocaine, and distributing cocaine and amphetamines. He was sentenced to two years confinement at hard labor, reduction from E-3 to E-1 with total forfeiture of pay and will receive a dishonorable discharge.

In United States vs. Ostrom, which concluded Aug. 22, Ostrom was found guilty of 12 different drug specifications, including distribution of marijuana, cocaine and amphetamines. He was sentenced to five years confinement at hard labor, reduction from E-3 to E-1 with total pay forfeitures and will receive a Bad Conduct Discharge.

Both had previously received non-judicial punishment under Article 15 of the Uniform Code of Military Justice for the wrongful use of marijuana. The uses were discovered through the Drug Urinalysis Testing Program.

Drug use is not compatible with service in the United States Air Force and officials in the Staff Judge Advocate's office say that users will be prosecuted to the fullest extent possible.

"If you believe you are too smart to get caught, there are two former OMS troops who would beg to differ," said Maj. Robert Schwartz, staff judge advocate. "You should learn the hard lessons that Airmen Strong and Ostrom should have learned."

"It just isn't worth it," he

"The civilian regrading actions will be the first to take place," said Lt. Col. Michael Vizzone, director of personnel. "Similar regrading actions will be applied to military personnel upon identification of access requirements of the position to which the individual is assigned.'

According to Capt. Jerry Sehon, commander of the 64th Security Police Squadron, the organization charged with accomplishing the changes, "This is strictly an administrative policy change to reduce the clearance under the secretary dividual's future eligibility number of clearances in effect by relating each clearance to the access requirements of the position to which an individual is assigned. We will visit all unit security managers and screen their civilian positions. The net result will be that if an employee has too high a security

Air Force officials said they need about 400 five-level (5-4s and E-5s) and 875 seven-level (E-6s and E-7s) retrainees. Officials have identified 37 Air Force specialty codes that career and second-term airmen can now retrain out of.

Volunteers for retraining will be eligible for a base of choice reassignment officials said. However, assignments are not guaranteed.

"The primary reason for retraining is to balance the career field," said CMSgt. Robert E. Unger, enlisted skills resource manager.

Some AFSCS have too many people at a certain skill level, others have too few, Chief Unger explained.

started April 15 and merged the Air Force's various career and second-term Airman Retraining Programs into a single program. That revamped program has already accounted for more than 1,000 approved retraining requests, according to officials.

"We were extremely pleased with the results of Phase One," Chief Unger said.

During Phase One, officials identified about 17,000 people in certain AFSCS and invited them to apply for retraining, into any one of 36 specialties.

Phase Two began in August. Officials again sent letters to career and second-term airmen inviting them to retrain. They contacted fewer people than in phase one.

'We only sent letters this

The revamped program time to about three times as many people as we needed to retrain," Chief Unger explain-

If necessary, Phase Three would involuntarily retrain people into shortage specialties. Chief Unger said officials would use involuntary retraining "only as a last resort." Air Force officials will decide whether or not involuntary retraining is necessary in late September.

People receiving leters inviting them to retrain during Phase Two were also told how vulnerable they were for involuntary retraining. Officials told them how many retrainees were needed out of their AFSC and where they ranked within their AFSC for involuntary retraining-for instance 3 of 27.


The new policy, effective immediately, affects only checks cashed at the point of sale, i.e., the cash register in facilities where AAFES accepts checks.

BOP change affects first-termers

RANDOLPH AFB, Texas (AFNS)—First-term airmen will have to be on station two years to qualify for a base-of-preference assignment under a change to the BOP Program.

Air Force will increase time-on-station requirement from 12 to 24 months Oct. 1 for airmen applying for a BOP in conjunction with career job reservations.

First-term airmen also will be required to have 17 months base residency when applying for the BOP assignment. Air Force Manpower and Personnel Center officials here said a Defense Department study showed the changes could cut in half the \$13 million first-term BOP budget and improve personnel stability.

Air Force regulation 39-11, Airman Assignments, will include the changes later this year.

Officials said the changes do not affect the 12-month time-on-station requirement for first-termers requesting a

BOP in conjunction with retraining under the Career Airman Re-enlistment Reservation System.

The changes also do not affect the career airman Base-of-Preference program that allows airmen to apply for a BOP after three years and five months on station.



DoD weighs cost of terrorism

Every 17 days, terrorists organizations and their trainstrike against U.S. government officials and installations abroad. During the past 15 years, terrorists have killed or maimed 1,000 U.S. military personnel, public servants, businessmen, educators and the clergy.

Each year, the statistics get increasingly grim and the terrorist incidents become increasingly lethal.

Fred C. Ikle, under secretary of defense for policy, recently told Congress the threat of terrorism comes principally from two distinct ideologies; communism and Iranian Islamic fundamentalism. Both use terrorism as a form of warfare with knowledge that democracies, their main enemies, are especially vulner-

The cost of terrorism goes far beyond the carnage and destruction caused by individual incidents, Ikle explained.

"When the United States is the target of such actions, the cost of terrorism must be measured not only in loss of American life or damage to U.S. installations and property but in less tangible, though no less meaningful, termsloss of American credibility and a diminished capacity of the United States to influence international events.

Ikle said each terrorist attack-each bombing, each assassination, each incident that brings international humiliation to Free World institutions - undermines public confidence in the established government and erodes national resolve and faith in its leader-

He said the Defense Department is responding to the terrorist threat with two forms of positive action:

• Anti-terrorism - actions that reduce the vulnerability of people and facilities, such as barriers, gates, armed guards and travel and visa controls; and

• Counterterrorism - actions in response to terrorist acts, which include collecting intelligence about terrorist

ing facilities, and apprehension of those caught prepar-

ing a terrorist attack.
"Terrorism is at bottom a form of warfare, and it is directed at the United States and its friends," Ikle said. "It is unprecedented to argue that we shuld not defend ourselves against these kinds of hostility, or to help others do so on the specious premise that to

do so is to violate the sovereignity of that nation from which the hostile action ema-

"Sending a terrorist team across a border to attack one's neighbors is not different in principle from sending an army. To suppose otherwise is to encourage terrorism. That would be to assume a grave responsibility indeed.'







Smokers warned again . . . and again

You've just dropped your last bit of change into the cigarette machine and selected your favorite brand. After waiting a second or so, the package slides into the tray below. You pick it up, and there's "that message" staring at you again..."Warning: The Surgeon General has determined that cigarette smoking is dangerous to your health."

You ignore it. You've read it dozens of times before. So what! You're gonna smoke until, you die anyway. Right?

That's probably true, but while you're at it, the Surgeon General wants you to think about the risks you're taking.

So, beginning this October, cigarette packs will carry one of four new warnings. The warnings will be alternated every three months, as provided by the Comprehensive Smoking Education act passed in 1984.

They are:

1. Surgeon General's Warning: Smoking causes lung cancer, heart disease, emphysema, and may complicate preg-

2. Surgeon General's Warning: Quitting smoking now greatly reduces serious risks to your health.

3. Surgeon General's Warning: Smoking by pregnant women may result in fetal injury, premature birth, and low birth weight.

4. Surgeon General's Warning: Cigarette smoke contains carbon monoxide.

Phony doctor indicted because of claims

WASHINGTON (AFNS)-A grand jury has indicted a New Jersey man for impersonating a psychologist and causing medical claims to be filed with the Civilian Health and Medical Program of the Uniformed Services.

James Bethea Epstein, alias "Dr. Epstein," was charged with eight counts of theft by deception and perjury. According to Department of Defense Inspector General Joseph H. Sherick, Mr. Epstein misrepresented himself to clients as a practicing psychologist and

psychotherapist.

An investigation into the claims against CHAMPUS showed Mr. Epstein had no formal education or training in psychology or psychotherapy, nor was he certified or licensed by any professional organization or state agency to practice in New Jersey.

The DoD official said Mr. Epstein could face the maximum penalty of up to five years in jail and a fine of \$7,500 for each of the eight counts if found guilty. (AFNS)

Hot weather not over yet

Although Labor Day traditionally marks the end of summer, Reese can still expect some daytime temperatures exceeding 100F.

Temperatures at selected areas, such as the flightline and aircraft cockpits may reach up to 120F to 140F. It is important for everyone to be aware of the physiological impact of this heat and reasonable measures to prevent the consequences.

There are several different heat disorders. They include:

Heat Syncope

Heat Syncope occurs when a person becomes dizzy or suddenly tired while exercising in the heat. As soon as he is removed from the heat and lies down, he recovers. This is the most common in people who have lack of acclimatization. Treatment includes rest, cooling and extra fluids.

Heat Exhaustion

This may take longer to develop than heat syncope (up to several days). It results from loss of fluid that has not been replaced.

Most prone to this problem are those who have no facilities to cool down such as no available air conditioner at night. Essentially, the body's ability to cope with heat is ex-

Symptoms include thirst, fatigue, giddiness, elevation in the body temperature, confusion, and finally delirium.

These individuals are more prone to careless mistakes early on in the problem.

These individuals require medical care which includes cooling, replenishment of fluids and bed-rest. Prevention is a matter of insuring an adequate fluid intake to replace losses from sweating. These losses can be as high as six to eight quarts per day in men working in hot, dry conditions. Thirst is an inadequate guide.

On extremely hot days, there should be mandatory rest

breaks that include the consumption of eight to twelve ounces of water. Lack of acclimatization again is a major risk factor. This includes everyone on the first several days of extremely hot weather.

Heat Stroke

This is a medical emergency where the individual may die if not rapidly treated. Heat stroke occurs when the body's ability to dissipate the heat is exceeded. The body behaves like an overheated engine that easily burns out.

Symptoms include faintness, dizziness, staggering, headaches and nausea. This can lead to mental confusion, lethargy or irrational agitation to final coma and convul-

The body's temperature shows a rapid rise with an initially rapid pulse. It might be noted that obesity increases heat storage. Residual effects include damage to the brain, spinal cord, kidneys, stomach and intestines. Muscle damage is also possible.

Rapid cooling is mandatory, but do not give anything by mouth if the individual is mentally depressed, as he may vomit and suck the vomitus into his lungs causing further problems.

Call for immediate medical care while removing the individual from the heat. Cool him

with whatever is availablesuch as a garden hose, ice, swimming pool, ect...Do not delay. Time is of the essence.

Flight personnel should strive to adhere to guidelines that ensure optimal performance without jeopardizing individual health and flying safety. Disregarding them is unprofessional and hazardous. All flight personnel should give their bodies the same respect, consideration, and care that they give their air-

It is strongly recommended that each individual consume at least eight to twelve ounces of water before and after each flight. An attempt to avoid caffeine containing fluids should be made, as caffeine leads to dehydration. Remember that high altitudes are dry and therefore dehydrating.

Flightline personnel should pace their work, becoming fully acclimatized before they go all out. Supervisors should ensure frequent breaks in a cool area. Large quantities of cool fluids should be easily available and their consumption should be encouraged.

These guidelines have been established to minimize the effects of the heat on the people here. Only their free acceptance on all levels can prevent tragic and unnecessary


out what the program is and can offer if they need it.
