Feterita stalks are rich in food value, and this makes the crop an excellent one for ensilage or forage. When grown for forage purposes, it can be left from four to five inches in the row and the rows can be somewhat closer together. When planted in this way upon good ground, it yields better than either kaffir or milo. It is especially valuable for forage purposes in the dryer sections of the State.—Bulletin No. 3, Texas Industrial Congress.





#### Tea Plantation at Big Fair

San Diego, Cal., April 14.-Sir Thomas Lipton will be one of the exhibitors at the San Diego Exposition, his exhibit taking the form of a Ceylonese tea garden, surrounded by a tea plan-

"Tea plants can be successfully grown in San Diego," said Sir Thomas at the time of his recent visit to San Diego. "I will demonstrate this fact during your exposition in 1915," he said and when he reached Chicago, a few days later he instructed his American agent there to come to San Diego and make arrangements for two acres of ground on the site of the San Diego Exposition.

The ground is now being prepared for tea plantation, doubtless the first of the sort in the United States of America. Tea plants of mature growth will be shipped from Ceylon, where Sir Thomas has immense tea plantations, direct to San Diego, and upon arrival here will be set out on the exposition grounds. By January 1st, 1915, on which day the San Diego Exposition will be opened, the tea plants will be ready for the first harvest of tea leaves. Visitors to the exposition in San Diego will then be given the opportunity of seeing th whole operation of the tea indus-
