## South Side of Model Two-Room Rural School

 It costs no more money and no more labor to build a mod-e school house than it does to build one of the same size but of less desirable arrangement. The construction, heating, lighting and sanitation of school buildings present special problems
which the general architect and even the physician are not al which the general architect and even the physician are not al-
ways prepared to meet. In the home only two or three people are in one room at the same time, and these are usually moving about.
