

Oklahoma Boy and Wisconsin Girl Win Highest 4-A Awards



Doris Ester Clark, 18, of Goodman, Wis., and Hugo Graumann, 20, of Granite, Okla., are the national 1933 4-H girl and boy leadership champions and winners of the H. A. Moses trophies. Doris completed 15 projects in five years and Hugo completed 48 projects in eight years enrollment.

GIRL AND BOY 4-H CHAMPIONS

Chicago, Dec. 14.—The grit of rural boys and girls in finding opportunities for self advancement against obstacles is graphically illustrated in the records of the national 4-H champions in leadership and achievement just announced by the National Committee on Boys and Girls Club Work which conducts the contests annually in cooperation with state and federal extension agents.

The boy leadership champion, Hugo Graumann, aged 20, of Granite, Oklahoma, determined not to let 4-H club work suffer when, in 1931, the county commissioners voted out the county agent. He rallied his club mates, laid out a program and with their help carried on so successfully that his county became a famous 4-H center in the state. It sent demonstration teams to the state fair which captured two championships. The 4-H county fair was conducted with great success in spite of decreased premiums. To climax his efforts Graumann ran a club mate for state 4-H president and had him elected. Now he has succeeded in having a county agent voted back. At the same time the boy has carried on a heavy program of practical projects. The total income of his 8 years of work is \$4,423.75.

Doris E. Clark, age 18, Goodman, Marinette County, Wis., chosen national girl leadership champion, succeeded in three years as a local leader in creating a live interest in 4-H work where it had been looked down upon. She travelled 5,577 miles visiting parents and club members, and staged many demonstrations and plays to visualize the value of 4-H training. Her success opened a way to continue her education at the University of Wisconsin.

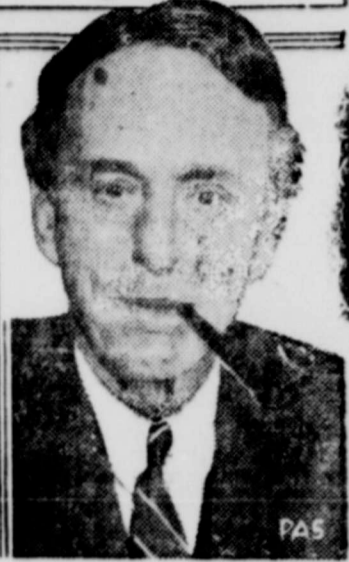
Marcus Teeter, Jr., age 18, Granada Martin county, Minn., is national achievement boy champion. Gross income in his 8 years in club work is \$5,238.00, a major part of which was received from handling the farm flock of turkeys, from which he received 10 per cent of the gross receipts from his father. In 8 years he produced 7,900 birds which was finished for the best markets.

Lillian Murphy, age 19, Bremen, St. Joseph County, Ind., national girl achievement champion, acquired such skill in home arts that she was chosen a junior leader. In this capacity she trained 22 demonstration and judging teams which made fine records. In coaching them she often had to travel distances and face hard weather. She personally took part in 44 public exhibitions and contests, and through her work found a way to enter Purdue University this fall.

Beautiful silver trophies from President Roosevelt are awarded the national leader champions, and similar trophies the achievement champions by H. A. Moses, West Springfield, Mass., paper manufacturer, who was once himself a struggling farm boy.

BASED on the fair exchange relationship with prices of things farmers buy, hogs during the past decade have had materially less purchasing power than they had in the pre-war period. In 1933, it took about eight hogs to buy what three hogs would buy in the 1910-14 period as indicated above. In all the years since 1920-21 (excepting in 1925-26 when there was a temporary reduction in hog supply) the purchasing power of hogs has been on a general downward trend. In 1932, the fair exchange value of hogs was \$7.75 per hundred weight. The prices of things farmers buy averaged slightly above their pre-war level. But the actual farm price of hogs in 1932 was only \$3.47 per hundred weight, or \$4.28 below fair exchange value. Fair exchange value means the pre-war price for hogs only when the price of things farmers buy is at the pre-war level. If the prices of things farmers buy become double their pre-war level, then the fair exchange value will be double the pre-war price of hogs. The corn-hog production adjustment program under the Agricultural Adjustment Act seeks to raise hog prices to the current fair exchange value. This may be done by bringing production into better balance with the most profitable demand through a reduction in 1934 of 25 percent in hog production and 20 percent in corn acreage.

The new Ford V-8 for 1934, went on display last Saturday at more than 7,000 dealers throughout the United States, one now being in the showroom of the Eiland Motor Co., in Stanton.

As revealed by Henry Ford and his son, the new Ford has greater power, more speed, quicker acceleration, smoother performance, more miles per gallon, especially at higher speeds, and quicker starting in cold weather, plus refined body lines and a new built-in system of clear-vision body ventilation.

The improvements in engine performance are the result of the use of a new dual down-draft carburetor and dual intake manifold which increase the engine's power approximately 12 per cent and provide a remarkable improvement in pickup.

"The new car is the best car the Ford Motor Company has built," the Ford president said. "Basically, it is the same car as the hundreds of thousands of other Ford V-8s now on the road. It simply incorporates numerous improvements in engine and chassis design, the new body ventilation system and refinements in body styling and appointments which have been brought to a proper stage of development during the past year in our engineering research."

The new Ford ventilation system which is built into the body, permits clear vision, prevents drafts and provides the desired amount of fresh air in any weather. Individual control is provided for both front and rear side windows.

When ventilation is desired the window glass is raised to the top. Then the handle is given an additional half turn. This slides the glass back horizontally to form a narrow slot between the glass and the frame. Through this slot air is drawn out by the forward motion of the car.

This simple system of a draft-free circulation of air and prevents fogging windshield and windows in cold or stormy weather. Both windshield and cowl ventilator can be opened to supply additional air for warm weather driving.

The distinctive lines of the Ford V-8 have been refined in the 1934 car by a newly designed radiator shell, grille and other features. Interiors

reveal new tufted upholstery and garnish mouldings, cove-type head lining, new instrumental panel, arm rests, door pulls and hardware. Sun visors are provided in all closed cars, those in the de luxe cars being of swivel type to prevent glare both from the front and sides.

Fenders on de luxe cars now are in color to harmonize with the body colors. Wheel colors are optional. A new enamel finish is used on all bodies. This has greater wearing qualities, a more enduring lustre and requires only washing to restore its brilliance. Bodies are of steel, electrically welded one-piece construction. Eleven body types are available. Included are both standard and de luxe types of the Tudor, Fordor, 5-window coupe; the de luxe roadster, phaeton and 3-window coupe, as well as the cabriolet and victoria. The victoria body has been newly designed to afford additional passenger room. A large luggage compartment is provided in the rear.

All body types are equipped with safety glass windshields, while the de luxe body types are fitted with safety glass throughout.

Because of the increase in engine power over the whole speed range, an appreciable increase in top speed is attained. The flexibility of the car—its ability to pick up speed quickly in traffic or to cruise in crowded streets without shifting out of high gear—also has been materially improved. The increase in top speed, without sacrifice of safety, permits driving at relatively high speeds with increased safety and without engine strain.

The carburetion system and other engine refinements not only give better gasoline mileage and oil economy but also insure smoother operation at all speeds particularly at normal driving periods. Gasoline economy is increased two or three miles per gallon. Test runs show that the new engine will give 20 miles per gallon at 45 miles an hour.

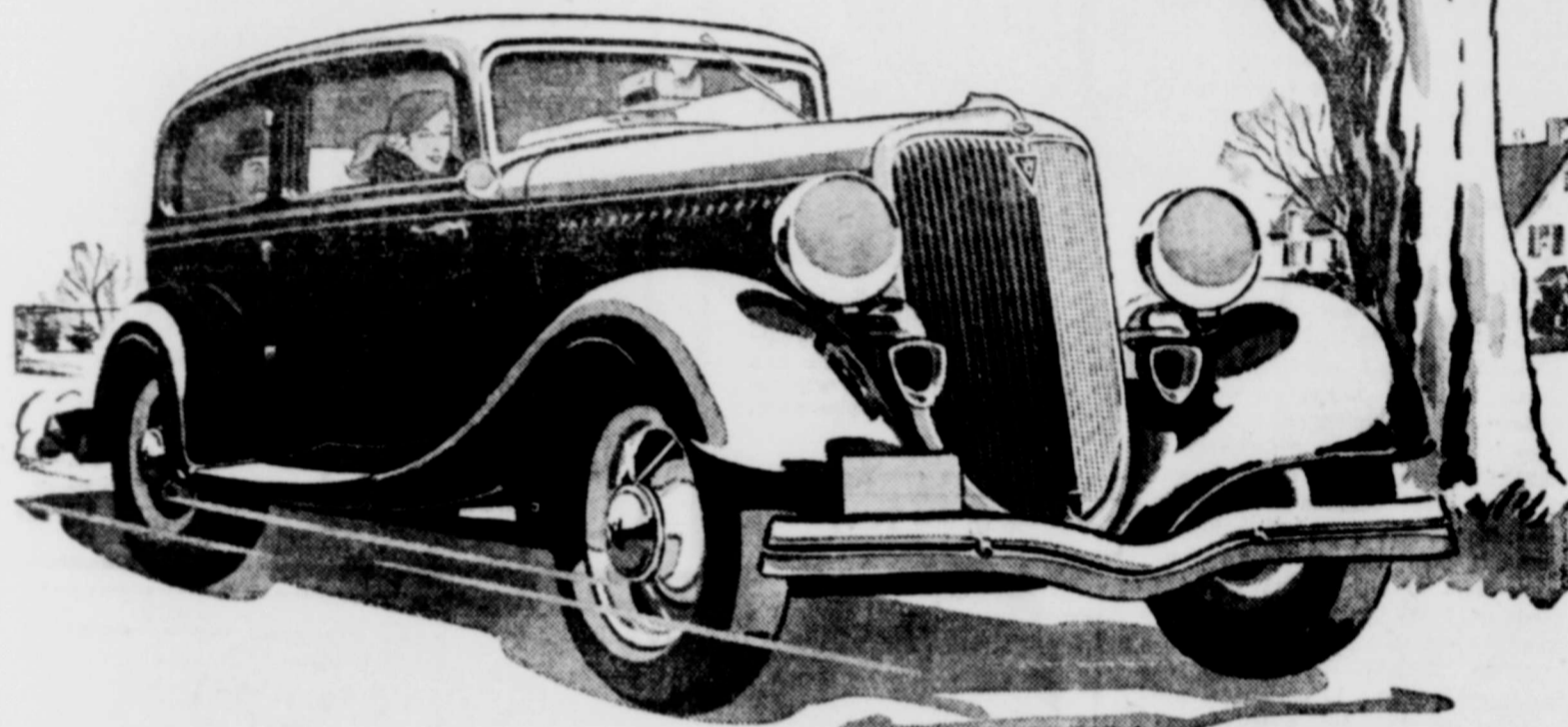
Driving ease has also been increased by the use of a new 15-to-1 steering gear ratio. Brakes are of the mechanical type with 186 square inches of braking surface.

They are congratulating each other on the recent decision of the Supreme Court upholding the franchise tax law which puts extra millions into the state treasury. Mr. Van Zandt was the author of the law, passed in 1930, and Witt was in charge of it in the senate. Secretary of State Heath estimates that the law increases franchise taxes (largely on foreign corporations and public utilities) in excess of \$400,000 per year, amounting since its passage to approximately \$2,000,000. This sum has heretofore been held in a suspense account, but will now be turned into the state's general fund.

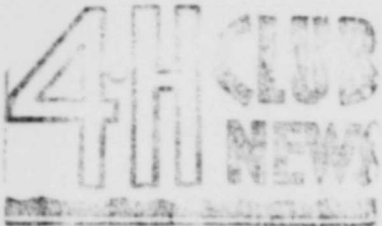

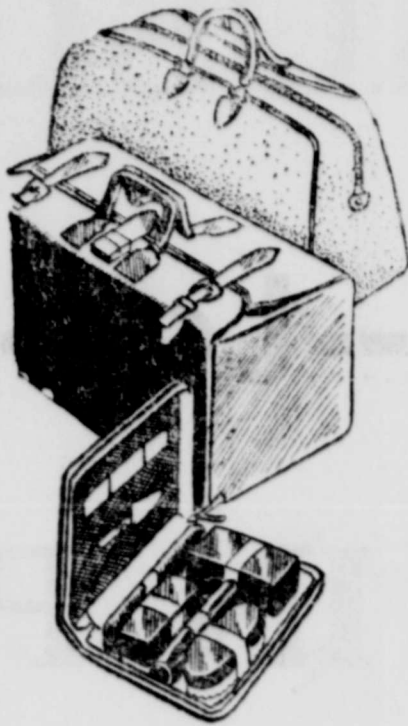

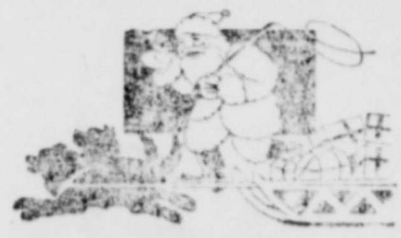
