In order to get the most good range management prabenefit from brush control, ctices, the money spent for

> ntal feed. It's a good idea to include an entire pasture in the brush control operation rather than a part. The reasoning is that livestock will concentrate their grazing in the areas where brush has been controlled, since the grass on controlled areas will be more nutritious and palatable. Soon the controlled areas will become badly overgrazed. If the entire pasture cannot be treated, it should be deferred

following control measures. Benefits from brush control amount to much more than increased grass production. These include the ease of working and caring for livestock; increased offspring nuproblems; increased food and cover for wildlife and often the number of breeding males

Deferring the treated area for one growing season will give desirable plants a chance to come back if a seed source ding may be necessary.

The county agent said several extension publications are available at his office on brush control and followup practices as well as publications on many other range management subjects.



> The first application of low volume malathion in the High Plains Diapause Boll Weevil Control Program was successfully completed on Friday, September 4. And according to Ed Dean, field service director for Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., the organization responsible to producers for the program, "this is an excellent start."

> Dean said, "It rained August 31, the first scheduled day of spraying, but after that the weather cooperated beautifully and sprayplanes flew with only minor interruptions for the next four days." The first dose of weevil killing insecticide this year covered just under 100,000 acres, about a third less than was covered by the first application in 1969.

> "Extensive surveying this year discovered fewer infested acres than were found last year," Dean explained. He cautioned however that it is impossible to tell at this stage to what extent the control zone may have to be enlarged as the season progresses. "But," he said, "we know from past experience that additional infestations will crop up and the control base will have to be broadened."
