



The House-Senate Conference Committee, after two and a half weeks of haggling, reached agreement October 7 on an omnibus farm bill for 1971, 1972, and 1973, including programs for cotton, feed, grains, wheat, dairy, wool, and tobacco

A study of the cotton section of the bill, according to PCG Executive Vice President Donald Johnson, reveals no clear victory for anyone. The Administration successfully imposed its will on Congress and American Agriculture in the matter of a "set-aside" program to replace the marketing quota, commodity-by-commodity acreage control system that has dominated government farm programs since 1938. 


