Director J. EDGAR HOOVER has released some very interesting as well as tragic figures on law enforcement casualties in 1969. There were 86 officers murdered, a 34 percent increase over 1968. The tragic total of policemen stain last year brings out crucial points that all officers should remember, HOO-VER said. Complacency is most dangerous and there is no such thing as a "routine" arrest. Twenty-five of the 36 officers killed were attempting to make arrests. Thirteen officers were slain by their own weapons which were seized and used against them.

It has often been said that teams in the Lone Star Conference play the toughest collegiate basketball in this part of Texas.


