





Obera Angel, Mary Ramos. and Cruz Sanchez are the trio behind the success of the Martin-Glasscock Day Care Center. The school days begin for the children at the Day Care Center at 8:00 a.m. and ends at 5:00 p.m.

Nineteen pupils begin the day by repeating the "pledge of allegiance" to the flag, followed by a "creative-doing" period until 9:00 a.m. The children have different games. toys, and educational tools to help in their learning.

The school began in September, 1969, and is restricted to the low-income families. When the children become three years of age, they are eligible to enter the school. It is operated by the federal government from the HEW, Department of Health, Education, and Welfare.


