Mitchell said that converting his center pivots to LEPA for a demonstration had impressive results. He said his irrigation efficiency, which had been about 80 percent with his pivots, went to 97 percent with LEPA.

"Through his research, Bill Lyle hass helped protect and stabilize our scarce water resources," Dr. John Abernathy, resident director of research for the Experiment Station at Lubbock, said in the magazine article. "Literally thousands of farmers are now using LEPA systems. > Because of the efficiency of LEPA, the cost of converting a pivot system can usually be recovered in one growing system, the magazine said.

Lyle has been with the Experiment Station at Lubbock since 1976. His research has dealt with many aspects of irrigation, including soil, water and plant relationships; irrigation system design and efficient water utilization.

He holds degrees from Texas Tech University and Texas A&M University. Before joining the Experiment Station, he taught agricultural engineering at Tech, farmed and was an agricultural engineer with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

He is a registered professional engineer and is a member of the American Society of Agricultural Engineers, American Society for Engineering Education, and the Texas Section, American Society of Agricultural Engineers.

He has previously been honored as outstanding professor in agricultural engineering at of the Year, by Texas Section of ASAE; Agricultural Research Scientist of the Year, by the High Plains Research Foundation; received the Texas A&M University System distinguished Performance Award for Research. and was named Man of the Year by the Irrigation Association.
