The I Dare You Leadership Award is made available each year by the American Youth Foundation in cooperation with Principals, Headmasters, and 4-H County Agents across the country. The Award was offered in 1941 by William H. Danforth, founder of the Ralston Purina Company in St. Louis, who dared young people to achieve their highest potential and to influence others through lives of services. The Award takes its name from the book, I Dare You!, written by Mr. Danforth, in which he commends the balance life of mental, physical, social and spiritual development at the backbone of leadership.

In addition to a Certificate of Recognition, Kyle receives a copy of Mr. Danforth's inspirational book, I Dare You!, and a scholarship opportunity to attend the American Youth Foundation's International Leadership Conference at Miniwanca in Michigan or Merrowvista in New Hampshire. Over 8,000 schools and 4-H programs participate in the I Dare You Leadership Award each year.
