

"functional art"-beautiful pieces of that's great." pottery that look appealing as artwork but can also be used as regular kitchenware. She says that seems to be what people are most interested in.

Williams works in high-fire clay, terra cota and Raku. Her terra cota bowls and cups are burnt orange with dark Native American figures painted on them. Many others also have southwestern themes.


"It's a more casual, livable lifestyle and art," she said. "It's not so formal, and it's almost like a place we'd all like to go back to.

"In our busy world, we'd like to get to a more simple way of life, simplistic and earthen."

Although she says her highfired, cobalt blue stoneware is her favorite, Williams also has a love for Raku, a technique that involves newspaper and sawdust and results in a showy, metalliclooking piece.

She said many don't have a taste for Raku, but she fell in love with it.

"It so much fun to do, and you Monday - Friday never get the same thing twice," she said, pointing to an iridescent vase with streaks of blue and purple throughout. "Either you like it or you think it's gross."
