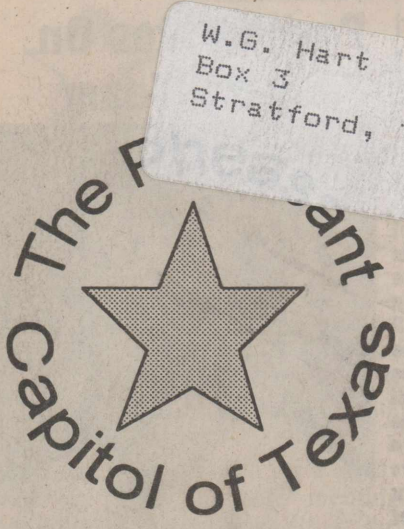
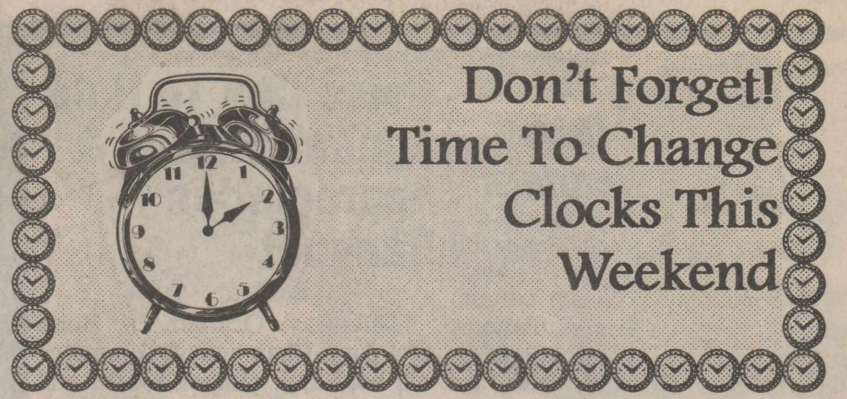

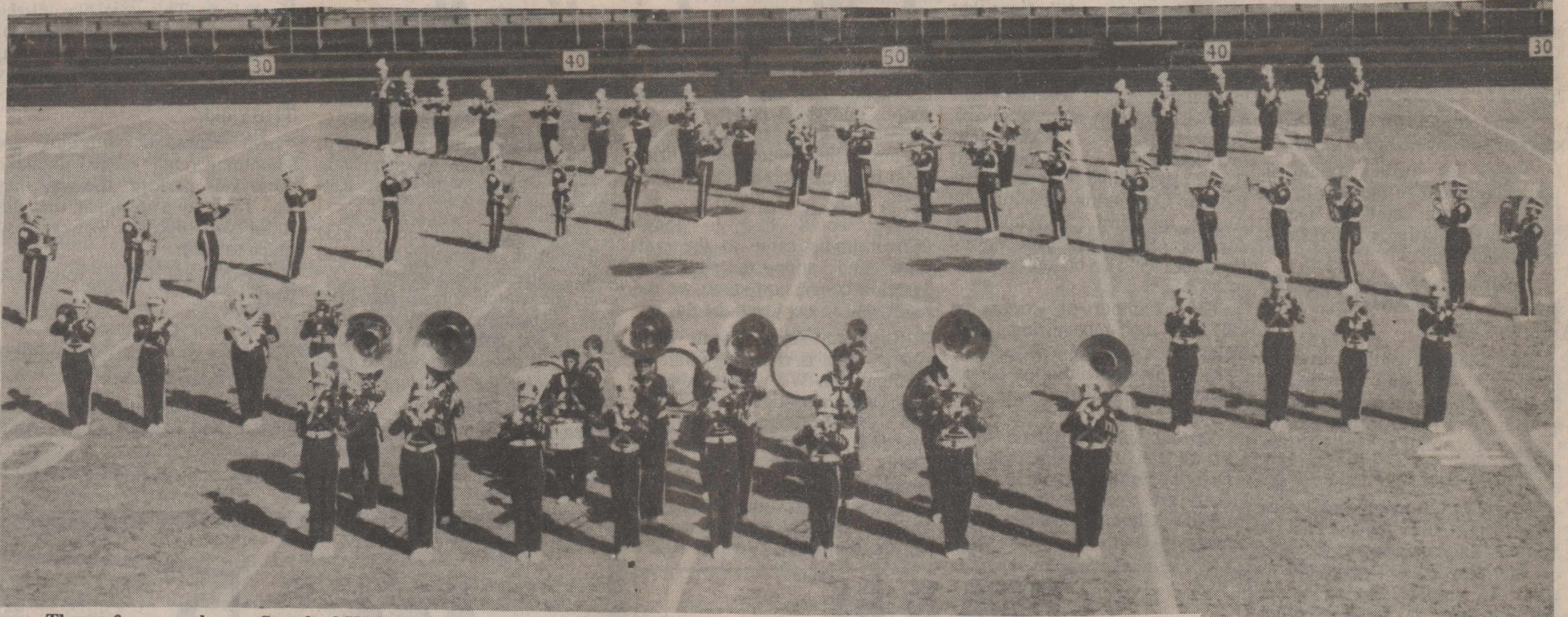

Lynn Allen from Stratford, right is shown above visiting with Rick Perry Thursday October 21 at Ag Day held at the Sherman County Barn.

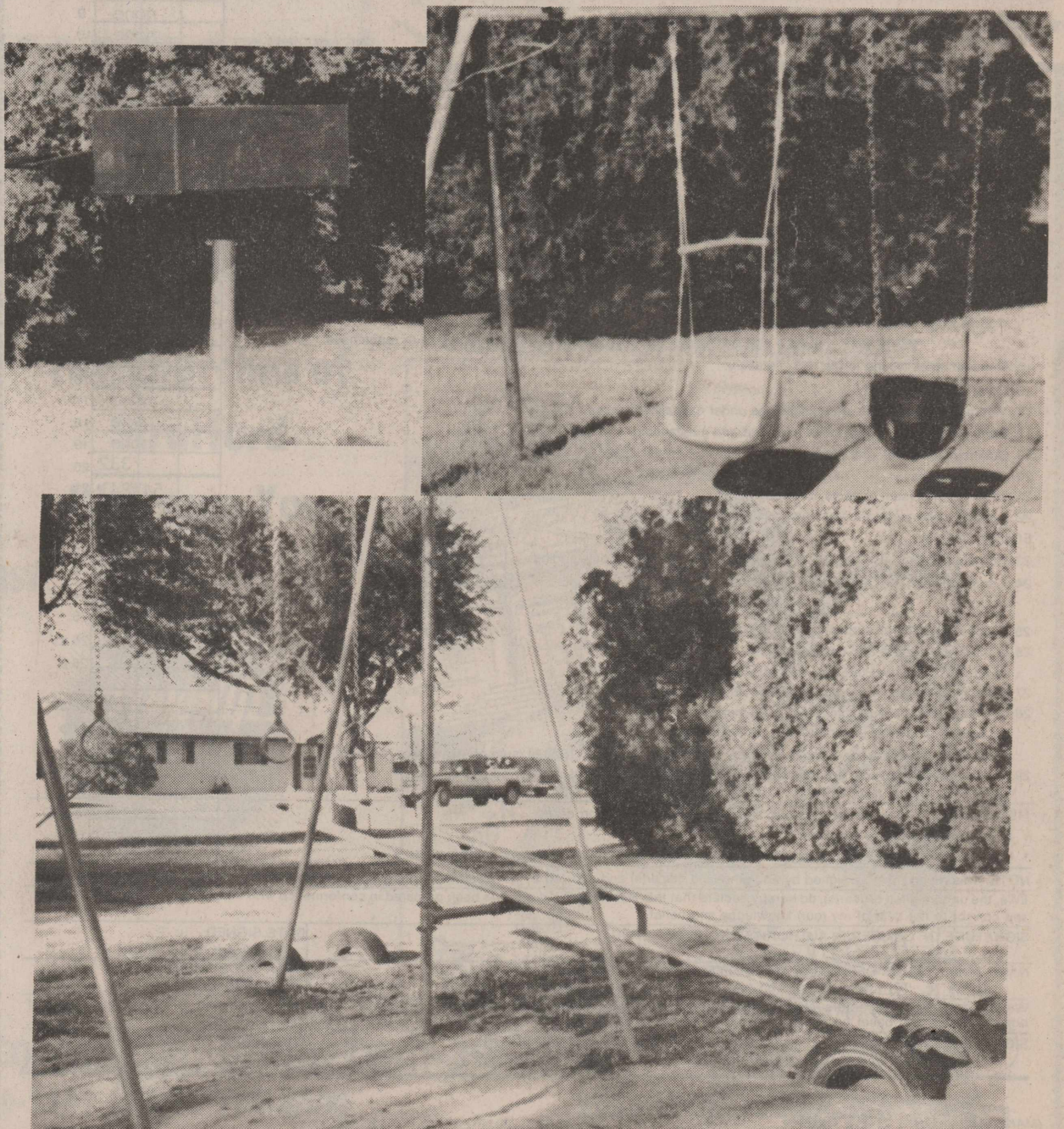
Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry was in Stratford Thursday, October 21st to speak to folks who turned out for AG Day held at the Sherman County Barn.

Commissioner Perry spoke on Proposition 16, the last amendment appearing on the November ballot. It would add \$75 million in funding to the Texas Agricultural Finance Authority. The authority is a highly successful "jobs creation" program originally approved by voters in 1989 with an initial fund of \$25 million, Perry said.

Perry, a Republican, told the audience that although Texas leads the nation in production of

Thank you for all your hard work.

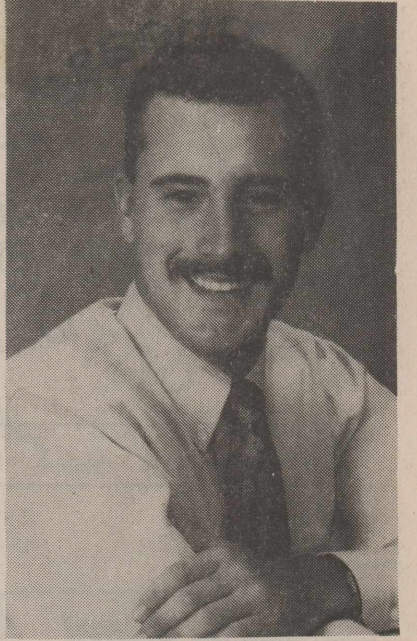

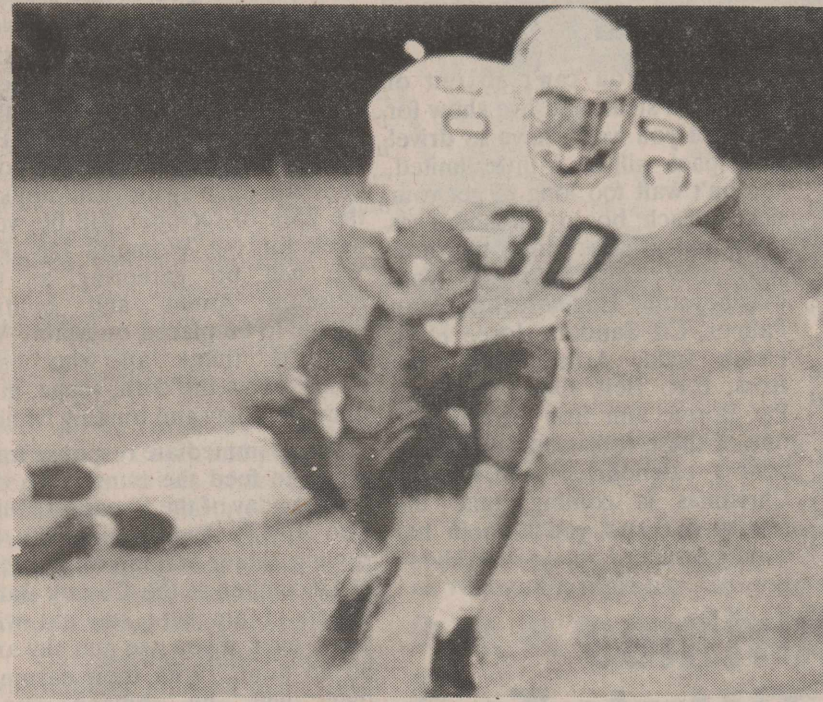


Stratford's Clint Vincent scored three touchdowns Friday night against Sunray at Sunray. The Elks stay on top of District 1-2A.

many Agricultural products, if only processes 8 percent of those products. The national average is 20 percent.

"If we reach that 20 percent processing rate, it would mean an additional \$26 billion every year for this state," Perry said. "When we reach the 20-percent level, it would mean what two superconducting supercolliders would mean."

The Texas Agricultural Finance Authority has guaranteed 34 loans since 1991 and created more than 1,400 direct jobs, generating \$463 million in economic return for Texas, Perry said. "It's a great success story."

Texas has gone from some areas being 80 percent rural to 80-percent urban. Buildings are boarded up in small towns, and there are no jobs to keep the youth in the smaller towns, he said.

"I wanted to find out if there was something we at the Department of Agriculture could do about that, or do we just have to accept it as the way it is?" Perry said. "The answer is no, we don't have to accept it."

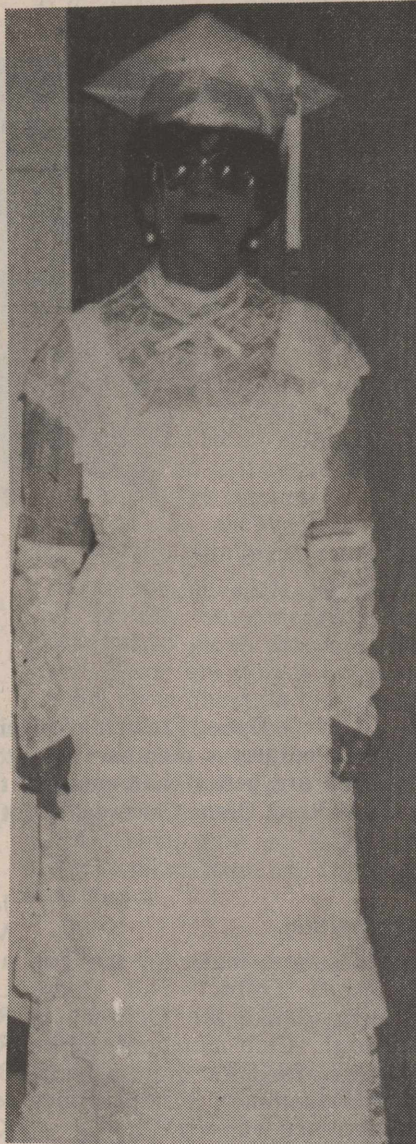
"This Nov. 2, there's an election, and I'm going to say it's one of the most important election we'll be voting on," Perry said.

Hunting Tips From National Park Service

Chief Ranger, Larry Nielson recounts a hunting violation in November 1992 in which a hunter illegally possessing and transporting a mule deer across Lake Meredith National Recreation Area has had to pay a total of \$875 in fines and court costs. The hunter claimed the large mule deer buck in his possession had been legally killed within Lake Meredith National Recreation Area hunting boundaries. An investigation, including DNA tests, proved the deer was killed illegally on private land more than two miles from the recreation area. DNA test were utilized to match tissue from the deer carcass with tissue collected from the kill site. The DNA tests were a critical part of the case Nielson reported.

probability that two unrelated mule deer will have the same DNA profile is estimated at one in more than 18 million."

The National Park Service and the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department worked together on this case with assistance from the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

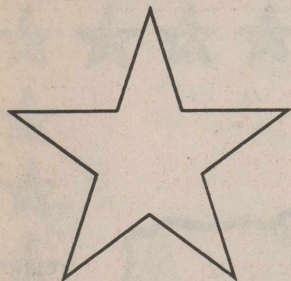

The General (gun) Deer Hunting Season within the boundaries of Lake Meredith National Recreation Area is November 20 through December 5, 1993. Please note that some areas of the state open on different dates for white-tail deer.

Due to the high fire danger some unnecessary roads in the Recreation Area are closed are closed to prevent being trapped in case of a fire. McCrary asks the hunters to have a safe and enjoyable visit; be courteous to those camping next to you, put your trash in the receptacles, or haul it back out with you. Be especially careful about your fires. Open campfires are allowed...however, everyone is asked to watch them very closely; remember it takes dirt and water to extinguish camp fires. Be especially careful in extremely windy conditions. It is important to note that leaving a campfire unattended or lighting a campfire in an unsafe area such as; near grass or other flammable material is against the law! Make sure they are fully extinguished before leaving the campsite for any reason. 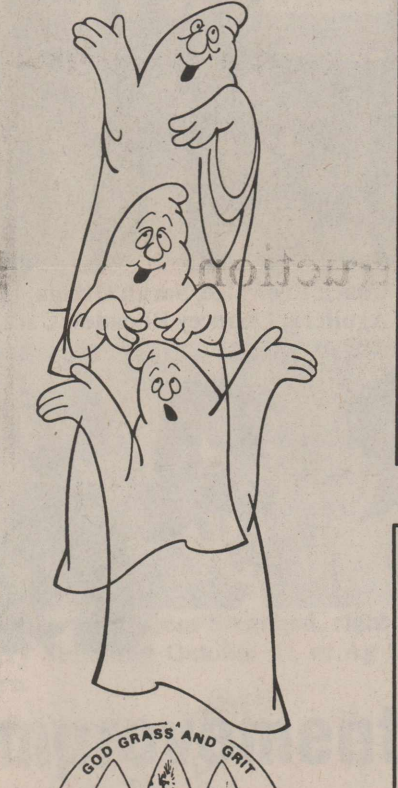

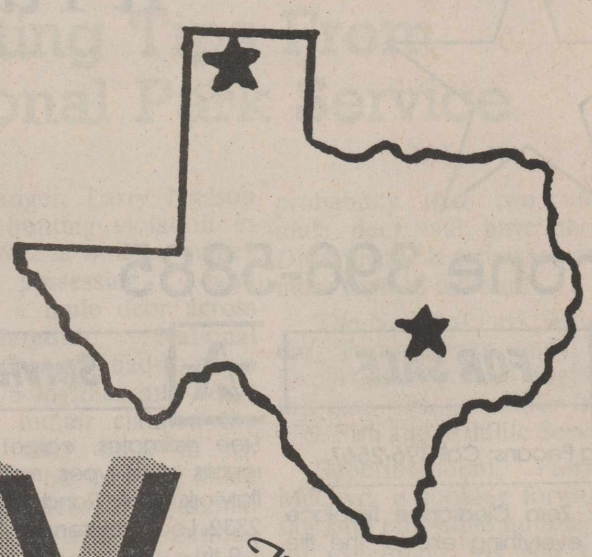

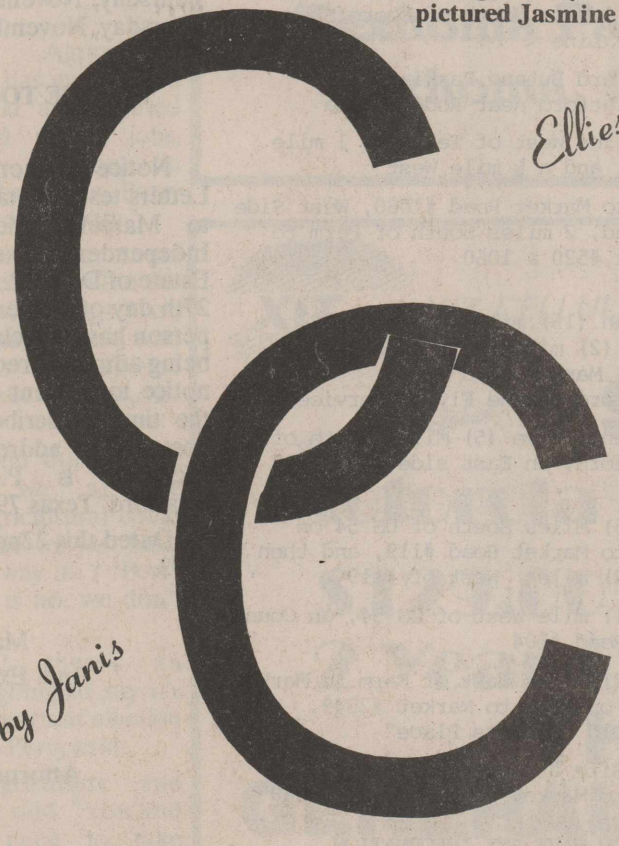
