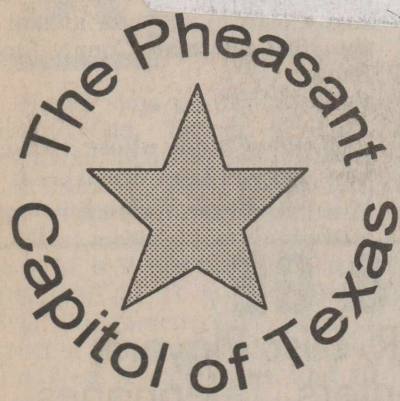

## Memorial Hospital Administrator Nominated For Prestigious Honor

David D. Clark, Memorial Hospital's administrator since September, has been nominated for the prestigious Robert S. Hudgens Memorial Award, given each year by the American College of Healthcare Executives. The award is presented to the person judged as the outstanding young health care executive in the country.

Clark was nominated for the honor by Carol Edward, president of the Texas Western Regional ACHE group. The nomination was supported by accolades from a large number of administrators and others Clark has worked with over the years. Charley Trimble, president and CEO of St. Mary of the Plains Hospital in Lubbock, said "David is by far the best young man with the most potential for a career in health care that I've seen in many years."

Carl Stem, dean of the College of Business Administration at Texas Tech University in Lubbock, said "David Clark has demonstrated exceptional innovation and creativity in healthcare management, especially in his success...in the development of a high-quality, viable healthcare clinic hospital in Crosbyton."

"I am really thrilled with the nomination," Clark said. "The letters of recommendation from several of my colleagues is one of the highest compliments I've ever received."

Clark, who has a Masters of Business Administration from Texas Tech University, was instrumental in the dramatic financial turnaround at Crosbyton Clinic Hospital, where he was the administrator for four years before coming to Dumas. "He brought us from near bankruptcy to a healthy institution," Brooks Ellison, chairman of the board of Crosbyton Clinic Hospital, said.

Marvin Cole, vice president of the Texas Hospital Association, said "In spite of a minimum population base, a flat economic environment, and personnel and physician recruitment barriers, David has successfully met the challenge of turning the Crosbyton Clinic Hospital into a strong community-based provider."

The American College of Healthcare Executives is the national organization of healthcare management professionals. Only selected administrators, who meet a designated criteria, are accepted for membership in the group. "David's nomination recognizes his outstanding ability as an administrator," Gladwin Gillispie, chairman of the board of Moore County Hospital District, said. "We're very excited about his leadership at our Hospital District, and look forward to a bright future with him in the leadership role of our institution."

The winner of the Robert S. Hudgens Memorial Award will be announced in January.

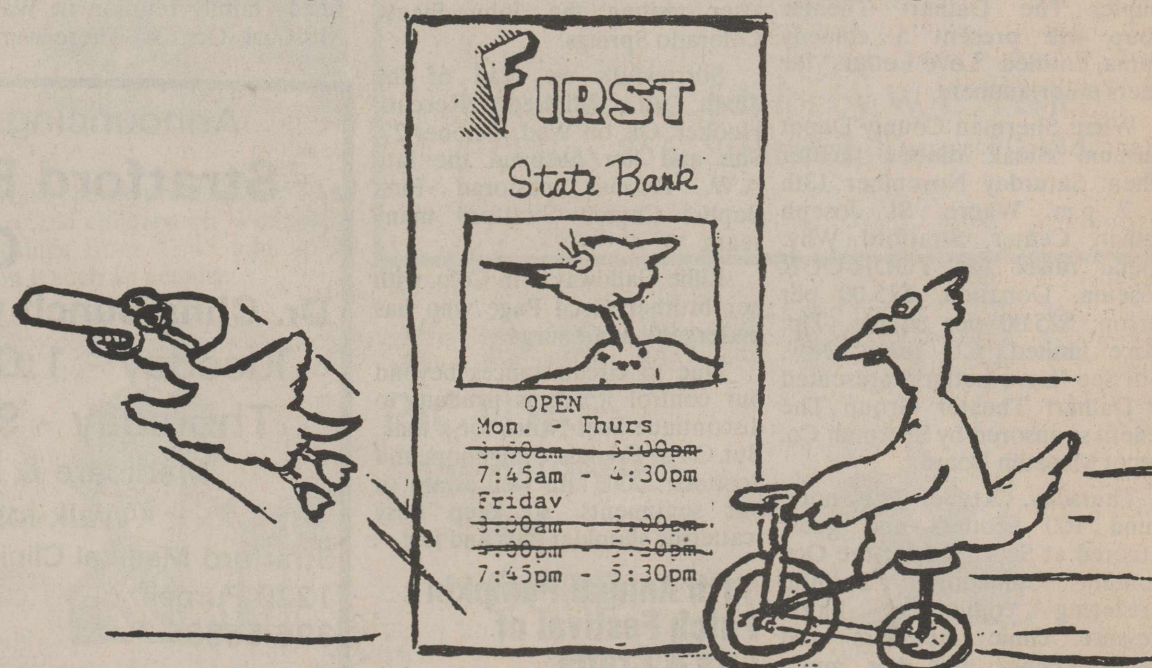

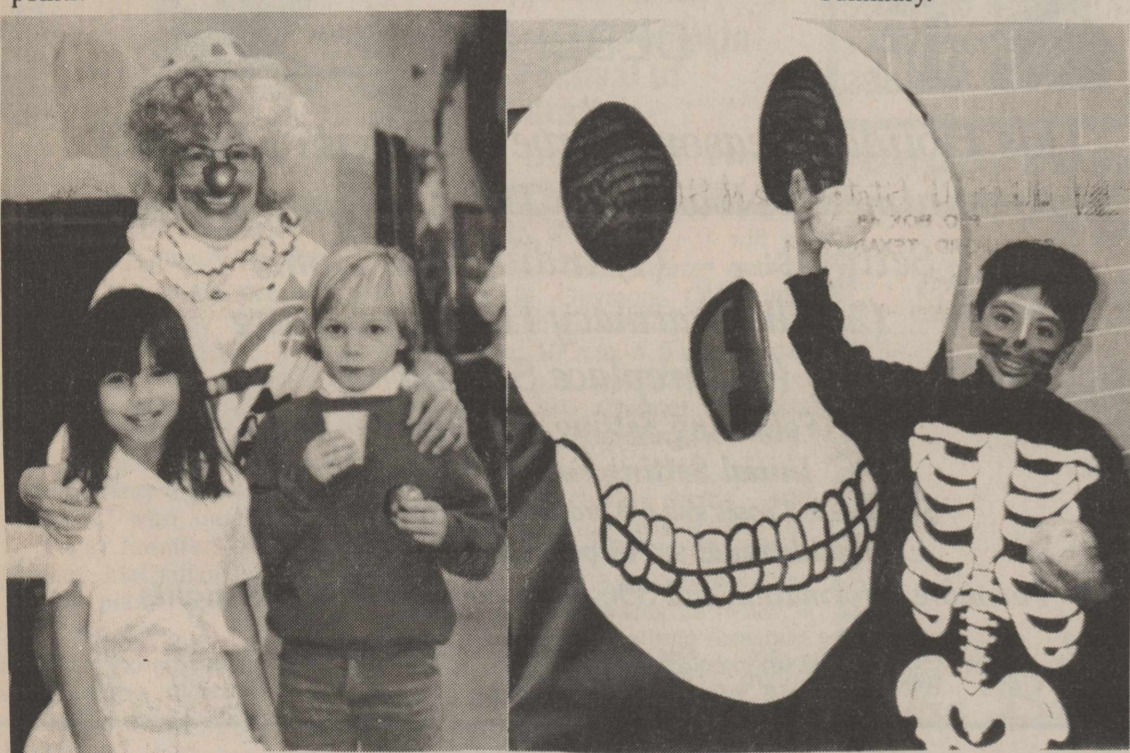

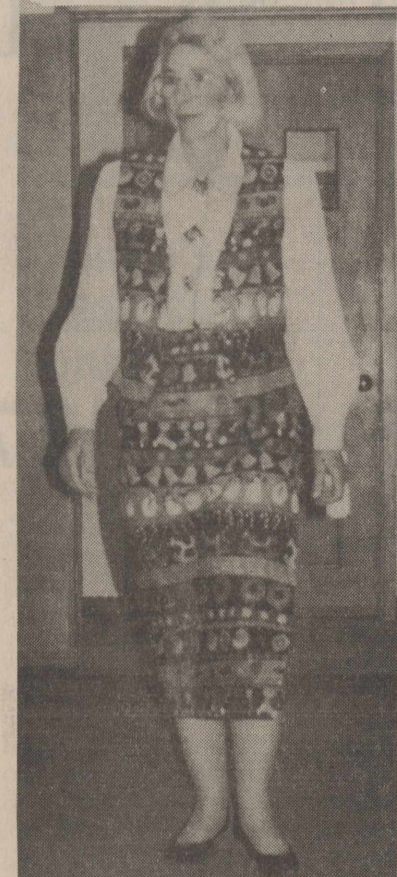

## Smith Is Deploying To Somalia

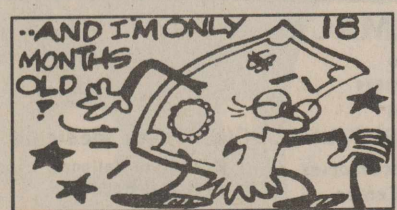
Navy Chief Petty Officer Wayne L. Smith, son of Dean Smith of Stratford, Texas, is deploying to Somalia with Commander, Amphibious Squadron 8, NAB Little Creek, Va. The Squadron staff is directing the operations of the USS Guadalcanal Amphibious Ready group (ARG).

Smith is joining other U.S. forces ordered to Somalia in response to recent hostile actions against American and other military personnel there. Naval forces being sent to Somalia include the aircraft carrier USS Abraham Lincoln and the guided missile destroyer USS Chandler; the USS Guadalcanal's three-ship (ARG) with the 22nd Marine Expeditionary Unit (MEU) embarked; and the four-ship USS New Orleans ARG with the 13th MEU embarked. Each MEU has more than 1800 Marines.

When the redeployment was ordered, the USS Guadalcanal ARG was operating in the Mediterranean; USS Abraham Lincoln was in the Persian Gulf; and the USS New Orleans ARG was in the South China Sea.

This redeployment demonstrates the flexibility and mobility of naval forces. The Navy and Marine Corps are full partners in joint operations and can operate overseas to respond swiftly to crises in distant lands, from the sea.

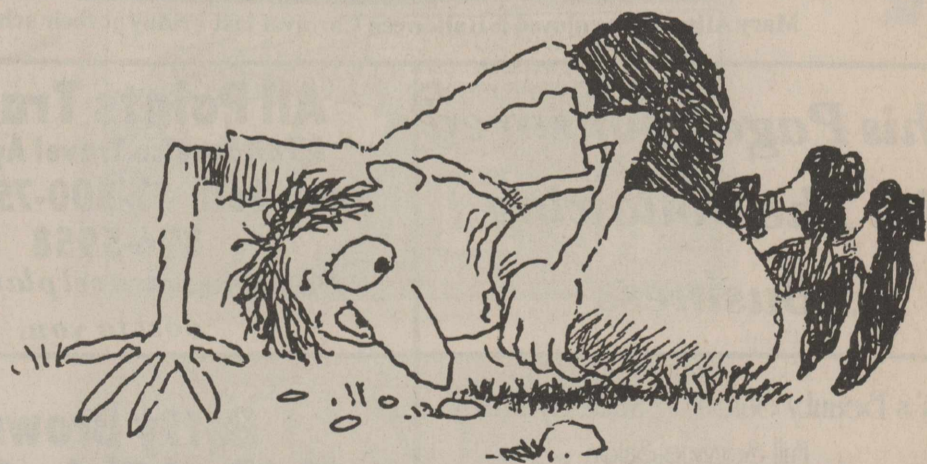

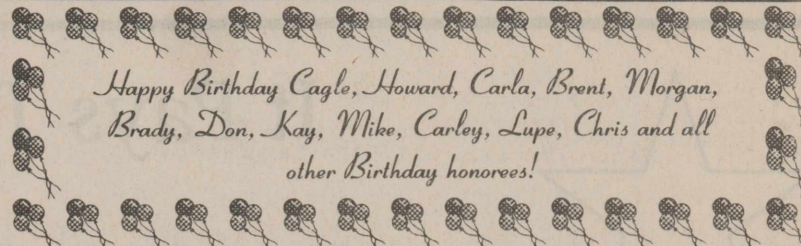

Weather permitting, the fall foliage should be gracing the poles on Main and at the Museum

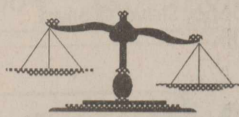
parking lot and at the south end of main, off of highway 54. This is a project of the Women's Division of the Chamber, and the third year for this event.

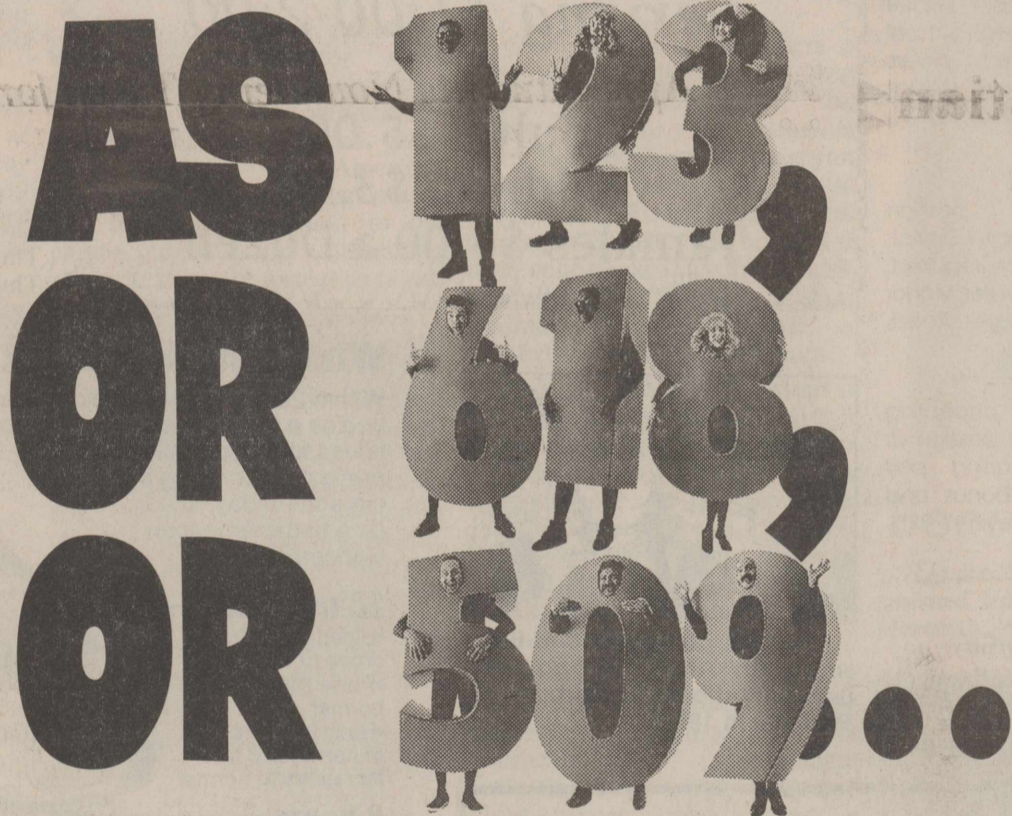

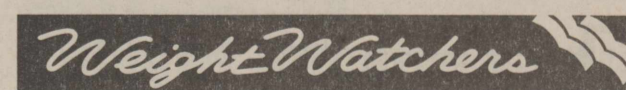

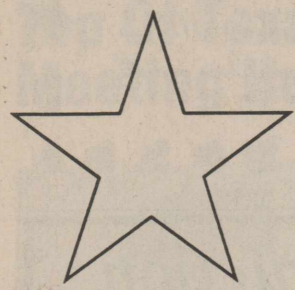
