Sherman County is just


one of 29 counties which makes up the 31st senatorial district. Bivins has traveled to each of the counties several times, visiting with citizens, and listening to their concerns.

Talking and understanding the language of beef cattle grades is vital to good communications between cattlemen and buyers. That's why the Texas Agricultural Extension Service is conducting a Beef Cattle Grading School at Texas A & M University September 8 and 9.

"The school is designed to teach common terminology and specifications of feeder and slaughter cattle and beef carcass grades," said Dr. Ernest Davis, an economist in livestock marketing with the Extension Service.

"We want producers to be able to determine the grades and value of their cattle so that they can better deal with buyers, " Davis said. "This will help them as well as buyers when transacting business."

The school will begin at 9 a.m. on September 8 at Pearce Pavilion on the Texas A & M west campus.

Participants in the school will have an opportunity to take part in several grading exercises of feeder and slaughter cattle. They will also evaluate beef carcasses.

In addition to discussions on feeder and slaughter cattle grading and carcass evaluation, topics will deal with selecting replacement heifers, preparing cattle for market, and review of comingled feeder-stocker sales and the beef cattle

market outlook. Cooperating with the Extension Service in conducting the school are Texas A&M's Department







Opal Ellison Bryant is a daughter of Ashley H. and Mollie Ellison. She was born June 9, 1903 at Pleasant Hope, Mo. One of nine children, she is the oldest girl and second child. Others were Floyd, who died in 1933; Oma 'Whitey', Stratford; Verley 'Pete', who died in 1985; Agnes Liggenstoffer, Kiowa, Ks.; Ernest, who died in Jan. 1988; John, Norwalk, Ca.; Tom, Texhoma; and Elsie Pickens, Stratford.

Opal says that her parents showed no partiality to states, three were born in Missouri, three in Kansas and three in Oklahoma! her folks made two trips to Kansas from Missouri in a covered wagon. Opal was two years old the first time, ten the second time.



In May of 1906 Mrs. Tim Flores traveled from her "no man's land'' Oklahoma home to her parent's house in Vernon, Texas. There she gave birth to her first son, James Wendell, on May 31, 1906.

Wendell's parents were Tim and Hattie Flores. Except for about eight years in Swisher County, the Flores family made their home in this area.

Hattie Gamble Flores served as the first Old Timer Queen in 1960 along with Percy Pronger. Her brother, Graydon, was King in 1979. Wendell had two brothers

and four sisters. They are Fay Lynn, deceased; Hosea, deceased; S.F., who lives at Midland; Mary Modean Munger, Canton, Ohio; Sybil Dayle Bonen, Sunray; Emma Lou (Babe) Cannon, Amaril-10.




