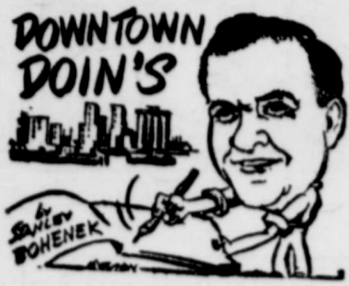

## CHAMBER HEARS OFFICIAL OF HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT

From 1960 to 1980, 64% more autos are expected on Texas highways.

And in the same period, truck registrations are expected to increase by 64%.

So said L. B. Dean, district highway engineer at the Wichita Falls office, when he spoke to the Burk Burnett Chamber of Commerce Monday.

Dean's talk on highways was met with special interest by the Burk business leaders, since the city is seeking interstate highway designation for U.S. 277.

Dean sympathized with the city's desire to be on an interstate highway. They are important, he said, and important to cities. Interstate highways are usually better arteries, better paved, better engineered, and

## G.E.D. CLASSES CONTINUE AT CENTER

The ring of school bells is once more a familiar sound in the Booker T. Washington school each Friday evening when adults from this area attend classes in math, grammar, basic science, social studies and comprehensive reading. These adults are preparing themselves to take the national general education test and obtain a General Education Diploma. This course is conducted by volunteer teachers and is a project of the Community Service Center, an Office of Economic Opportunity agency.

Anyone in the area who has not completed high school is eligible to enroll at no cost to the student. Clyde Slusher and Ken Blankinship with the assistance of specialists in such areas as reading and new math are conducting the classes.

Slusher, an Educational Specialist at Sheppard is a graduate of East Texas State College with a Bachelor of Science degree in Industrial Arts Education. He taught industrial arts in Commerce High School, Commerce, Texas, before accepting an instructor assignment with the USAF at Sheppard in 1951. In addition Slusher has taught several classes for Sheppard Base Education office in mathematics and slide rule.

Blankinship is a graduate of Southeastern State College, Durant, Okla., with a degree in Business Education. He has done graduate work in the field of education and administration at North Texas State University and Oklahoma State University.

He is presently an Educational Specialist with the Medical Service School, Sheppard.

Prior to accepting an instructor position at SAFB in 1951, he was high school principal and business teacher in the Eagle-Town Public Schools, Eagle-Town, Okla. In addition to his teaching duties at SAFB, Blankinship has taught accounting for the Air Defense Command, Langley AFB, Virginia, Pacific Air Force, Hickman AFB, Hawaii, 13th Air Force Clark Air Base, Philippines and Fuchu Air Station, Japan and Strategic Air Command, Anderson Air Base, Guam.

Thirty three adults have enrolled in the present course. Each student progresses at his own rate and when he believes he is ready for the examination he is counseled by the instructors and given a test, if both he and the instructor are satisfied with his progress the student then applies for testing at Midwestern University. Three students in the present class have satisfactorily completed the GED examination and received their Diploma.

## LOST FAMILY BIBLE

February 3, 1969

Dear Sir:

I called the Houston Chronicle and was given the name of your weekly newspaper. Maybe you can help me by advertising for a lost family Bible that belonged to my family and was evidently overlooked when we moved from Burk Burnett in 1920. We heard that someone there had found it and if possible I would like to recover it.

My father was Edward F. White and my mother's maiden name was Martha A. Reed. The birth dates of my brothers and sisters were also recorded in the Bible. Edward Thorntin White, Sherman Reed White, Nora White, Ethel White and in pencil I believe my name, Alberta White. I am the youngest and am trying to compile a genealogy of the White family.

The Bible was a rather large one with a heavy embossed cover. If memory serves me, I recall that the top cover was quite loose. It is possible that someone may have given it to the library or if you have a Historical Society perhaps it was turned over to it.

I will gladly pay for postage charges if the person who has it will send it to me. We also misplaced my father's silver cup, one which was shaped like a mug.

When we lived there we were two blocks north of main street, across from the First Methodist Church in the old R. E. Moore house. Being over 40 years ago I imagine there have been a lot of changes, but perhaps some of the 'old timers' might remember my family.

I will be looking forward to hearing from you or someone regarding the Bible.

## Congressional Supervision Needed

Congress increasingly abdicates its responsibility, in the opinion of one of its leading members, to determine policy, to set standards, and to make decisions on important issues.

Sen. Sam J. Ervin (D.-N.C.) says that Congress sets broad goals and then gives a blank check to the Executive Department or to an administrative agency to carry out programs "in the public interest" or under some equally vague standard.

Specifically noting that Congress tends to act on labor-management issues only when there is a major crisis, he said, "This is unfortunate, because the problems in labor law are real and pressing and much too important to be left to the devices of an administrative agency for solution."

The Senator also pointed out that in some federal agencies, such as the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission, "there seems to be a lack of even formal deference to legislative intent." He cited a speech by a member of the Commission, who said that his agency "has taken its interpretation of the law a step further than have other agencies."

It is hoped that the Senate Subcommittee on Separation of Powers will re-convene and take a sharp look at the various agencies, and impress upon those responsible for necessity for fidelity to Congressional will, and impress on Congress, as a whole, its responsibility for closer supervision on the work of these groups.

United States Representative George Hansen from Idaho stated: "Foreign aid's catalogue of the absurd is still growing. Washing machines can now be added to the list of snafus by the aid brigade. In Nepal, two brand-new washers were to be used for home economics instruction. The only hitch was that they couldn't be demonstrated because they couldn't be turned on—no electricity."

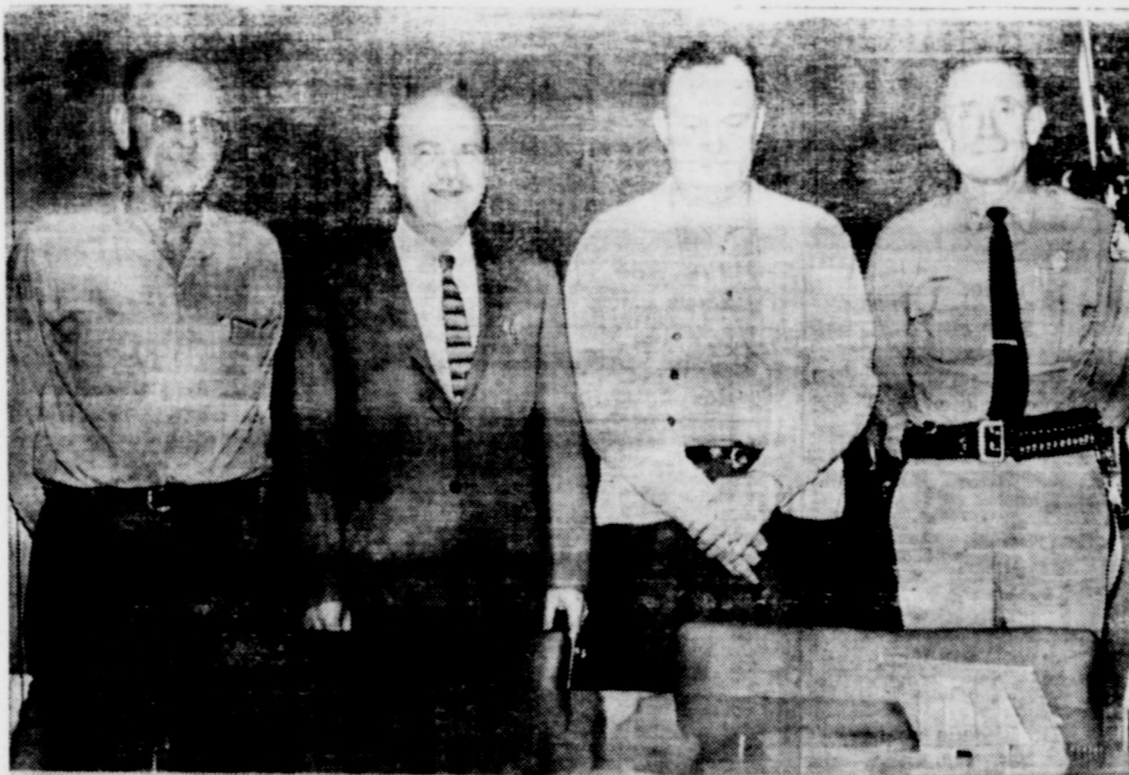
Through the Banquet the Employers become better acquainted with the work of the American Business Women's Association.

And, for information on how much to buy for your party liquor supply, Miss Adams gives a detailed-to-the-last-drink chart in her book, "The Heublein Party Guide, a complete

encyclopedia of entertaining, in an inexpensive, easy-to-use paperback edition.

If you're having 8 people for pre-dinner cocktails, for instance, you'll be serving an average of 16-24 drinks and need two ¾ quarts of cocktails, while the same number at a cocktail party will consume 24-32 drinks.

Before dinner, 25 guests will imbibe 50-75 cocktails (five to six ¾ quarts), while the same number at a drink-and-nibble bash will get away with anywhere from 75-100 of the same and require seven to eight ¾ quarts. In addition, the thoughtful host and hostess will provide at least one fifth bottle of the following: Bourbon, Gin, Vodka, Scotch and Blended Whiskey.

Miss Adams has packed her 223-page book with loads of valuable "how to" information, including 68 menus and 180 food and drink recipes. This is a regular sized paperback, published by Popular Library. The cover price is 95¢, and well worth it.

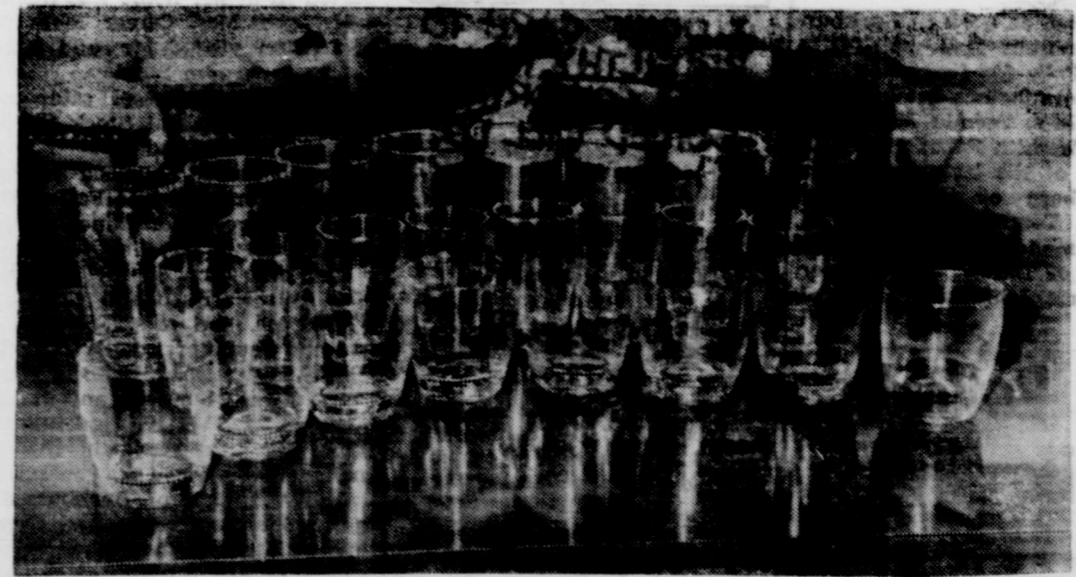

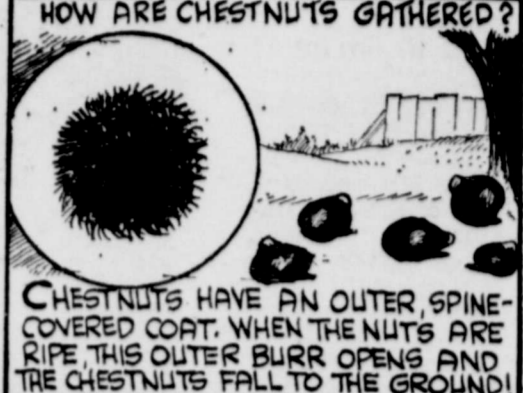
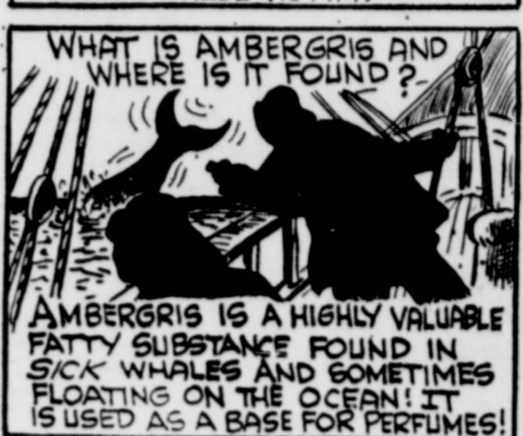
