## Bulldogs Win District Opener Friday 21-13

The Burk Burnett Bulldogs, one of the four unbeaten district 4-AAA teams, upset the Graham Steers homecoming game with a 21-13 victory last Friday night. The Bulldogs scored early in the game, as the Steers goal line defense was unable to contain Bark number 25, Lawrence Washington.

The Steers returned on the next series, with six points scored by Gary Burgess. The extra point by Pevey Moody was good and the Steers took the lead, 7-6.

The second Bulldog score was tallied when signal caller Sam Hancock connected with senior end Rodney Roberts. Washington carried for the extra points.

Shortly before the half, the quarterback Hancock scored again for the Bulldogs and Rusty Barrett kicked for the extra point, making the score 21-7.

Returning from the half, the Bulldogs were unable to score again against the tough Steer defense. The Steers were able to score only once more, making it a 21-13 game.

While the Steers were able to score on the Bulldog defense in the second half, it came only after several tries.

On three different series, the Steers got inside the Bulldog 10, but were held back by the stronger Bark defense.

This week the four winning teams will be matched against each other, with Iowa Park playing Brownwood and Burk Burnett meeting Weatherford. This should go a long way

toward telling which team will represent District 4-AAA in state competition. Burk Burnett head coach Bill Froman stated this week that it is highly possible that the winner of this district could have a loss with as many good teams as there are in District 4-AAA. This week the Bulldogs go against the Weatherford Kangaroos, who have a 1-0 record in district play. After losing their first 3 games, the Roos won their district opener against Stephenville 28-0. "The Kangaroos have improved with each game they have played," noted Froman, "and have a fine ball club." Froman also stated that he felt that the game between the Roos and the Bulldogs would hinge on Burk's ability to move the football on offense. The Weatherford team boasts two outstanding backs in returning starter Strout and tailback Worthinga, 9.9

100-yard sprinter. The Bulldogs injury list will hold them back this week, with #71 Rusty Barrett, the Bulldogs' 223-lb. junior tackle out with a sprained ankle. Barrett has held down the offensive tackle post quite well for the Bulldogs, as well as being their number one kicker. Also on the injured list are Deryl Nicholas, #35, with knee problems; Mike Howard, #65, with a shoulder pull; and Lawrence Washington with a thigh bruise. Froman reports that, with the exception of Barrett, all of those on the injured list will probably start in this week's game. It was stated by Froman that the Bulldogs would use Vernon Fournier, #70, and Rick Bear, #75, as offensive tackles, alternating them. He said that this was extra work for the two, but that they are good athletes and that he has a great deal of confidence in their ability.

## Adams Named To ABFP

KANSAS CITY, MO.-- Dr. Jerome M. Adams of Burk Burnett, has been named a charter diplomate of the American Board of Family Practice as a result of passing a certification examination administered under the aegis of the ABFP. To achieve diplomate status Dr. Adams through an intensive 2-day written examination, proved his ability in the areas of internal medicine, surgery, obstetrics-gynecology, pediatrics, psychiatry, preventive medicine and other traditional specialties and now is certified in medicine's newest specialty -- Family Practice. The 3,285 doctors, nationally, who earned their diplomate distinction, are the vanguard of a new type of highly competent "people doctor" who accepts responsibility for the patient's total health care and serves as the natural point of entry into the complex medical system. These specialists must continue to show proof of competency in the field of comprehensive, continuing care of the family by taking another exam and being re-certified every six years. No other specialty requires its diplo-

mats to prove their competence on a continuing basis. The ABFP is unique among certifying boards because it offered no "grandfather clause" which allows doctors practicing in the specialty when a board is created to become diplomates of that board without examination. To qualify for the examination each doctor completed a 3-year family practice residency, or has been in family practice a minimum of six years and has successfully completed 300 hours of post-graduate medical education. The list of charter diplomates released by the ABFP, the twentieth specialty board approved by the American Medical Association and the American Board of Medical Specialties, includes successful candidates from the first certification examination given in 1970, as well as those passing this year's examination. Most are members of the American Academy of General Practice, the national association of family physicians headquartered in Kansas City. The AAGP is the organization chiefly responsible for securing specialty status for Family Practice in February, 1969.

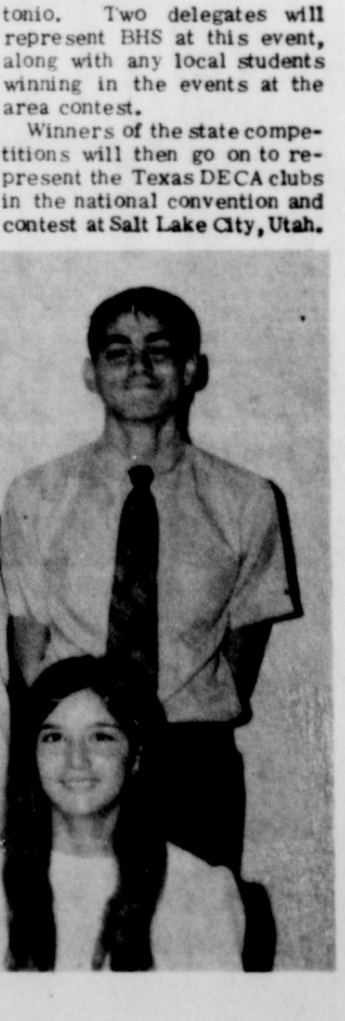

## DECA Officers Elected

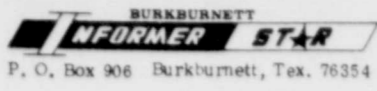

Regular monthly meetings of the Pack are held in the Community Room of the Burkburnett Bank every fourth Thursday at 7:30 p.m.

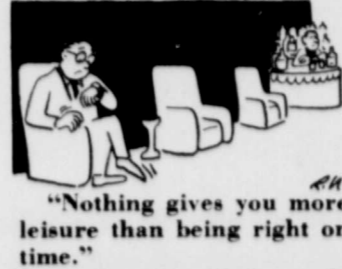

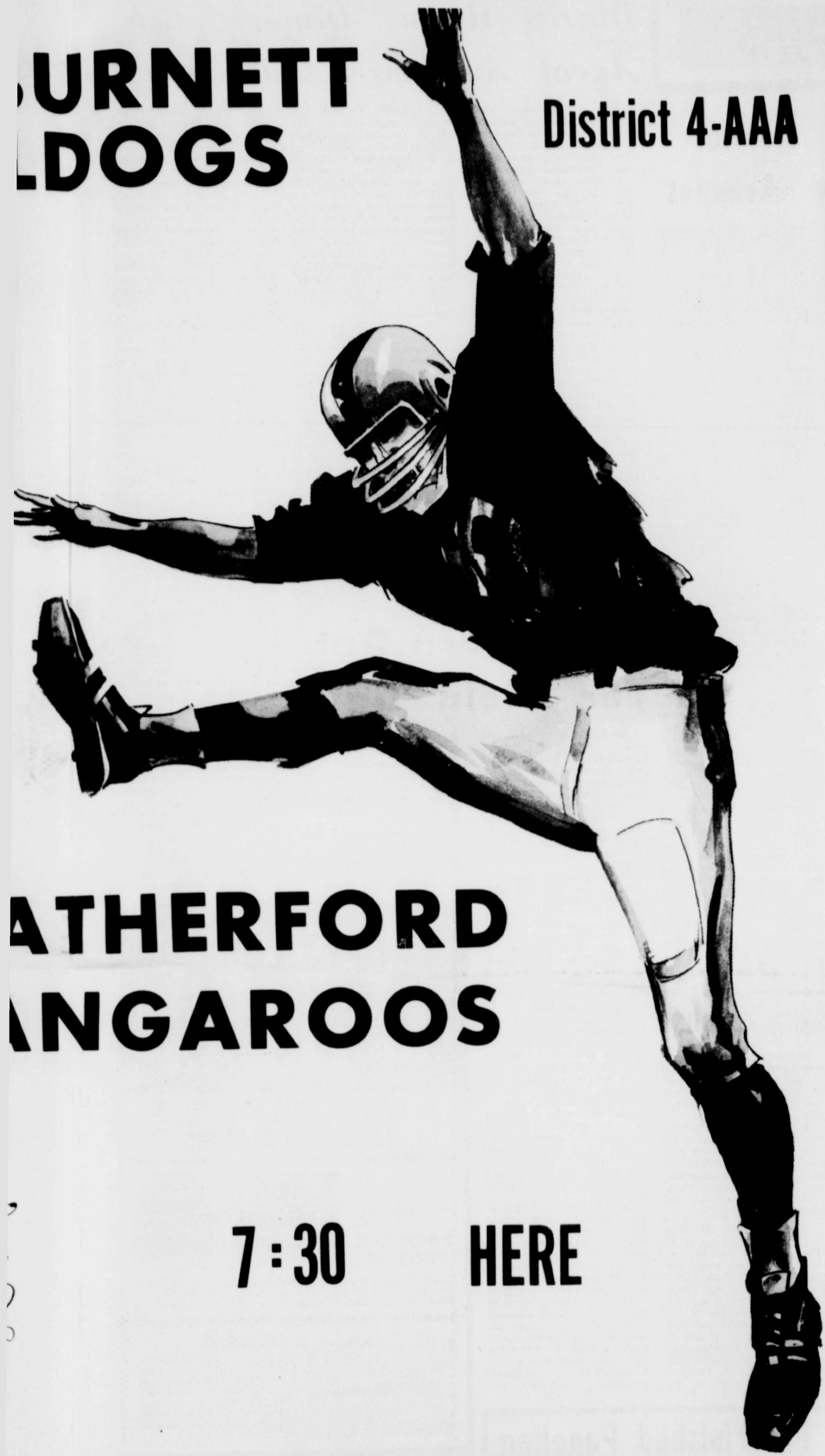

## Student Aide Program Offers Services to Amn.

SHEPPARD AFB, TEXAS--- Those noncommissioned officers seen around the 3750th Technical School student squadrons are student aides, participating in a pilot project to improve the everyday life of the student airman.

The Student Aide Program, a joint brainchild of 3750th Technical School commander, Col. Thomas B. Miller and the school's sergeant major, CMSgt. Alfred E. Koeler, has sent NCO instructors to the student squadrons on a full-time basis. The sole duty of these student aides is to counsel and assist airmen on an informal and personal level.

"We started this program as another means to assist our students in adjusting to Air Force life. It's also providing them another means for solving the day-to-day problems that come up," said Colonel Miller.

Heading the program, which is new in the present day Air Force, is CMSgt. Robert A. McClelland. "The job of the student aide is basically to help each airman in any way he can to make the airman more productive and satisfied," Sergeant McClelland stated. We try to give

the students a feeling that experienced service men care about their welfare and well-being, Sergeant McClelland emphasized.

"Most of the student aides have offices in dormitories of the assigned squadrons, and are easily accessible to students," Sergeant McClelland pointed out.

"These aides," explained Sergeant McClelland, "are all of staff sergeant grade or above, and have been in the Air Force long enough to know how to help students solve their problems."

"If a student has a problem with pay, for example," said Sergeant McClelland, "the student aide might go with the airman to accounting and finance to get the problem solved."

Student aides are all volunteers, stressed the program head, and have all shown an interest in the welfare of young airmen in their jobs as instructors. "If a man applies for a job as a student aide because he is dissatisfied with his present instructor job, we can't use him," said Sergeant McClelland. "We're looking for people who genuinely want to help the airmen."

Colonel Miller emphasized that the Student Aide Program is designed to give a very valuable assist to the squadron commanders in looking after the welfare of their airmen.

Second Lieutenant Richard J. Joyce, commander of the 3761st Squadron, in commenting on the program stated; The squadron leaders are usually preoccupied with our problem children, and that leaves us with little time to adequately answer the questions of the 500 or so men who are not getting into trouble. The student aide takes up the slack.

"Another advantage of the program," explains Lt. Joyce, "is that airmen confide in the student aides without fear of disciplinary action. We find the students are talking to student aides about things they would hesitate to discuss with the first sergeant or technical instructors."

The response to the program has been highly favorable. "I'm extremely happy with the program," said Col. Miller. "It is a personal one, and the airmen can see immediate results. I think it's one of our finest ones."

chief nurse at the U. S. Air Force Hospital at Reese AFB, Tex.

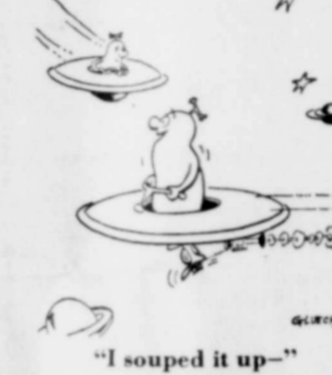

Not far from the banks of the Red River live two families who like flying, and who have just returned from a four-day trip to California, via Los Vegas and other points of interest.

One of the families, the Robert L. Eastman's, live in Wichita Falls, Texas. North of the Big Red, Mr. and Mrs. Robert Goode live on a farm near Randlett, Okla.

These four friends took off for California, and I listened to a most interesting account of their experiences, both in the air and on the ground, from

Goode, who has nearly 250 flying hours as a private pilot. The trip was made in a Cherokee, and at times they were at altitudes of between 14 and 15 thousand feet. Eastman owns the plane which took them on this jaunt.

The Goode family are in partnership with Shep Beber, one of Cotton County Oklahoma's three road commissioners, and they own a Comanche. Plans are in the wind for them to construct a hangar near Randlett and use the closed portion of the paved highway just south of town for their landing strip. Beber is still flying on a student permit. Maybe he can see fit to get his private license some of these years.

Something about acrobatic flying --- I'm positive one will never get very proficient at doing four leaf clovers, falling leaves, and for that matter, any other major acrobatics until there is no dread of flying with one's head pointed toward the ground. It ain't gonna happen if you're not use to it.

## Amn. Curtis Receives Discharge

SHEPPARD AFB, TEXAS--- Amn. Willie Curtis was sentenced by a military court at Sheppard AFB Friday morning to receive a Bad Conduct discharge, to be confined at hard labor for 18 months, to forfeit all pay and allowances due, and reduction to the rank of basic airman.

Airman Curtis had been found guilty by the court Thursday evening of willful disobedience of a superior commissioned officer. He was found innocent of a more serious charge of mutiny.

The charges stemmed from a disturbance which occurred at Sheppard June 13, involving a large crowd.

Maximum sentence for the offense of which Airman Curtis was found guilty would have been a Dishonorable Discharge, five years confinement at hard labor, forfeiture of all pay and allowances, and reduction to basic airman.

The sentence is subject to automatic review in accordance with established military justice procedures.
