

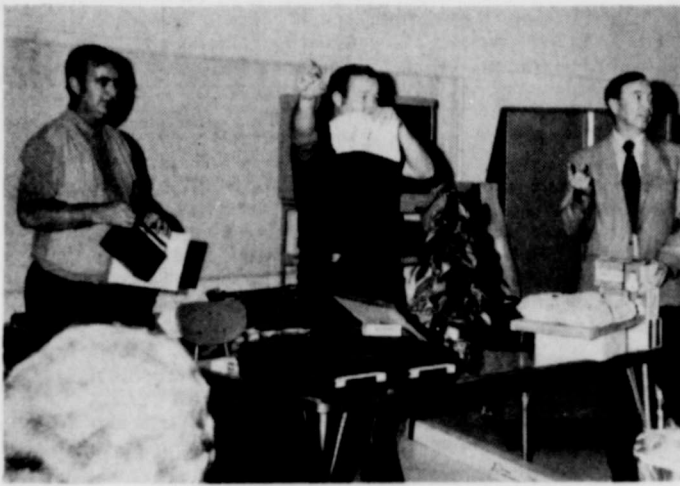

Soccer Team In Burk Unheralded

During the present annual football mania, when it seems that everyone is concentrating on the fortunes of this year's fine Bulldog varsity team and their race for the 4-AAA district title, we suspect that few people in Burkburnett realize or even suspect that there is a second football season in progress in the city.

This second season is one involving a team from Burkburnett High School in area competition in soccer, known as "football" in almost every land outside the United States.

The BHS Soccer Team, almost completely unheralded in the city, is compiling a very good record in area competition this year, and is in first place in the area at the present time. Last week the team defeated the Hirsch High team by a score of 6 to 0, and this past Sunday they overcame the Notre Dame High School team by a 4-1 margin.

Star players in the Notre Dame game were Shane Ford, who scored Burk's first two goals, and Randy Marsh, credited with the last two goals. The Burkburnett players got the ball past the Notre Dame goalkeeper four additional times, but the goals were not scored because of offside penalties in each case.

This Sunday, Oct. 31, the local team will play Rider High at 2:00 p.m. at the south end of J. C. Park. To see a completely different and very exciting game of "football," attend the game and cheer the boys on.

Oil Park Bar-B-Que Held Mon

More than 200 people gathered Monday at the Burkburnett Oil Park for a barbecue lunch and a tour of the Park, highlighted by the old MK&T depot, which is now in the process of being renovated.

Besides those attending the regular monthly Chamber of Commerce meeting, replaced this month by the Oil Park affair, many persons from the Sheppard AFB - Wichita Falls area visited the reconstruction of the original Boomtown. Among the guests were Maj. Gen. Jerry D. Page, commander of Sheppard Technical Training Center, Representative Vernon Stuart and members of an oil park committee from

Bowie.

The barbecue lunch was held to help decrease the \$600 debt incurred by the Oil Park in transporting the depot to the Park from its original site in downtown Burkburnett, with all proceeds from the affair going for that purpose.

The undertaking proved to be highly successful, according to Mrs. Edward Richter, president of the Community Service Council. She and Mmes. Frank Miller and Frank White, co-chairmen for the luncheon, have announced that approximately \$400 was cleared from the affair, thus sizably reducing the outstanding debt.

The old depot was a landmark in Burkburnett for more than 65 years, until the Community Service undertook the task of moving the structure to save it from being demolished by the MK&T railroad.

The Council is now involved in the restoration of the building. Only the original two rooms were salvaged and moved, and a ten-foot-wide loading platform has since been built part way around the building to increase its authenticity.

The interior of the depot is being converted into a museum containing railroad relics, which will include the old waiting room seats.

The transporting of the depot was directly overseen by the Finance Committee of the Oil Park. Members of that committee are Loetia Hunt, Lamoin Champ and Adrean Dunn.

Mrs. E. C. Mallett, Nelson Boyle, Dick Chambers and Newton Crane, members of the Community Service Council, have assumed responsibility for the restoration and maintenance of displays in the Park.

As well as helping to raise funds for the Oil Park, according to Mrs. Marjorie Kauer, chairman of the Oil Park committee of the Chamber of Commerce, the annual barbecue also gave townspeople and visitors an idea of what they can see at the Boomtown replica. Hopefully it will excite their interest enough to make them want to come back again.

Donations to Monday's barbecue luncheon were received from every woman's club in Burkburnett.

Rev. David Stout Attends Assembly

The Rev. David Stout, pastor of the First Christian Church, attended the General Assembly of the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) recently in Louisville, Kentucky, as a delegate from the local congregation.

The Assembly meets bi-yearly for fellowship, worship and business.

Many things of significance occurred during the Assembly. The churches reaffirmed their interest and concern regarding evangelism and renewal, peace and world order, reconciliation of man to man, leadership and ecumenical involvement.

In an historic event, the General Assembly elected as its moderator Dr. Walter Bingham, a black minister from Louisville, Kentucky.

It was a spirited assembly, placing emphasis on youth and layman involvement. District 19 of the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) in Texas will hold its fall assembly at the First Christian Church in Iowa Park this Sunday, Nov. 7. Several members of the Burkburnett church plan to attend. Rev. Stout, local pastor, is the vice-president of the district organization.

Also included in Burkburnett Christian Church's plans for the near future is a revival, to be held Nov. 14-21. Finals plans have been made, and the Reverend Bryan Rose, minister of Park Place Christian Church, is to be the revival leader. David Yeary, Burkburnett High School choir director, will lead the singing. The public is invited to participate.

Burkburnett Travels To Iowa Park Friday

DOGS REMAIN ON TOP IN DISTRICT 4-AAA

Underrated is the feeling of Bulldog fans toward Stephenville after Friday night's game. The Bulldogs, overlooking the winless Yellowjackets and thinking of Iowa Park, were almost upset but were strong enough to come back in a strong second half effort to continue their lead in district 4-AAA.

Burk was unable to score in the first half, while the Yellowjackets racked up a 43 yard field goal and capitalized on a Bulldog fumble for a 9-0 lead.

After the first half homecoming activities, the Bulldogs regained their balance when on a fourth and three play, quarterback Sam Hancock, broke for a 31 yard first down and set up the Bulldogs first score. The score, a 19 yard pass from Hancock to Deryl Nicholas, was brought to 9-6.

The second Bulldog touchdown came from seven yards out by Sam Hancock, with Rusty Barrett adding the extra points, making the score 14-9.

The Jackets had a opportunity to score in the fourth quarter when the Bulldogs fumbled a Jacket punt on the Bulldog 11 yard line. A tough Bulldog defense and a five yard penalty prevented the Jackets from scoring.

With a one and 10 on their own 12 yard line, the Bulldogs took possession of the ball, but were unable to move out for the first down.

Burk, trying to avoid a blocked punt or fumble, decided to give the Jackets a two point safety and settle for a three point lead.

After giving Stephenville the two points, we were able to kick from the 20 yard line and gamble that the Bulldog defense would be able to hold the Jackets final effort to score.

Stephenville's final effort consisted of four passes, all broken up by the alert Bulldog defense.

Head coach Froman commented that the Jackets had a fine team and had been plagued with bad breaks all season and had almost caught the Bulldogs off guard.

The Bulldogs remain tied with Brownwood for first place in the district, both with 4-0 records.

Froman stated also that this had been the best game that the Jackets had played all year.

Looking toward Friday night, the Bulldogs will be playing the Iowa Park Hawks, who have a 3-1 record.

The Hawks gave up the only loss to Brownwood AT

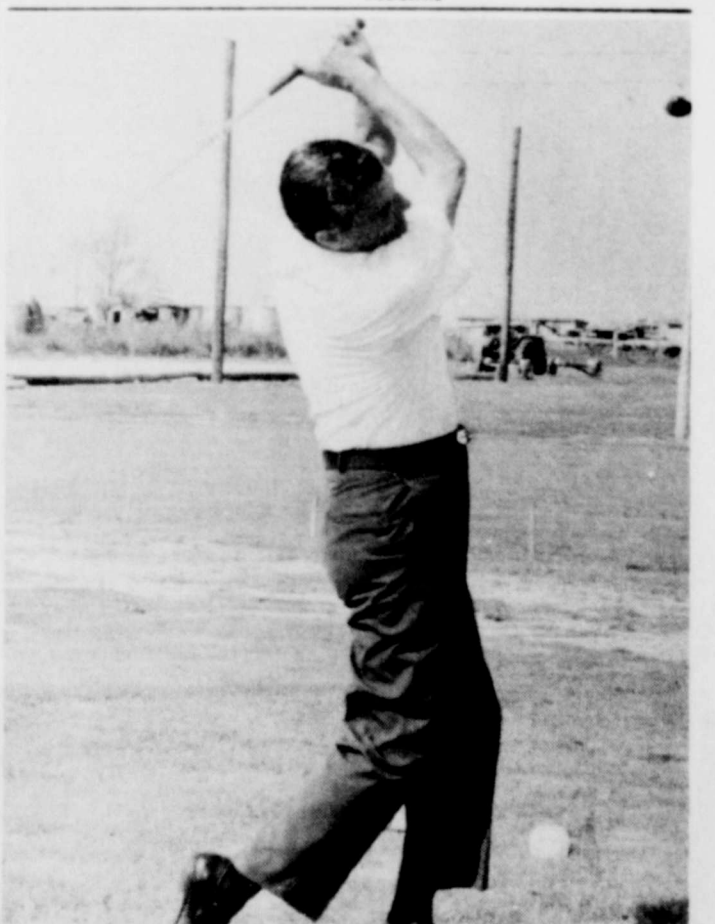
BROWNWOOD. Froman felt that the loss of #51 Allen Fourmier would hurt the Bulldogs, but the other injuries looked to be much better.

The Hawks loss of Steve Webb, tailback and linebacker, to a knee injury will no doubt hurt the team.

Froman also stated that breaks would probably be the

difference in the two teams. Iowa Park will no doubt be up for the game as it will be their last chance to stay in the District 4-AAA race with Burk and Brownwood.

The game will be played in the new Hawk stadium, located in West Iowa Park. Exit expressway on Johnson Road and turn left, go south for two blocks.

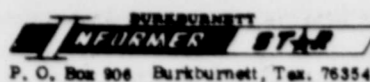
"Shakespearean Age" was the theme of the Junior class float. Riding on the float was Miss Cindy Long, the junior princess.

Amanda Crawford was born May 14, 1842, Angelina County, Texas, married Edward Dansby on November 2, 1866, and died in 1931, Erath County, Texas. She is buried in a country cemetery near Stephenville. Edward was born in 1844, Angelina Co., died July 3, 1886, and is also buried near Stephenville.

Their son, James Madison Gilliam, was born on Jan. 12, 1863. There was also a daughter named Nan, who married Harris Steed, but this is only from family tradition. Sarah Elizabeth Butler Gilliam died while James Madison Gilliam was very young and he lived with a family named McPherson. Madison Carroll Gilliam served in the Civil War, having enlisted at Clarksville, Texas. On Jan. 2, 1865, he applied for a marriage license to marry Anne V. Henderson. They are shown on the 1870 census of Clark Co., Ark., as follows: M.C., age 35, born in Texas; Anne, age 48, born in Kentucky; Henderson, V.P., age 17, born in Arkansas (evidently the son of Anne by a previous marriage).

Madison Carroll Gilliam was married again to Laura Little on Feb. 5, 1871, in Clark Co., Ark., so Anne Henderson Gilliam must have died before that date. According to family tradition, Madison Carroll Gilliam was married to Nancy Columbia Little, and their son, William C. Gilliam, was born in 1872, and died in the WDW Hospital in San Antonio, Texas, July 21, 1928.

- 1 cup butter or crisco
- 2 eggs
- 1/2 tsp almond extract
- 1/2 tsp baking powder
- 1/2 tsp soda
- 1 1/2 cups sugar
- 1 cup (1/2 pt) sour cream
- 1 Tbsp vanilla

Sift together flour, salt, baking powder and soda. Cream butter and sugar until light and fluffy.

Beat in eggs, vanilla and almond extracts.

Add dry ingredients alternately with sour cream; blend, chill thoroughly.

Drop level tablespoons of dough 2 inches apart on greased baking sheet. Keep dough well chilled until baked, taking a portion of dough out of refrigerator at a time, if necessary.

Bake in moderate oven, 375 degrees, 10 to 12 minutes, cool. Spread tops of cookies with butter frosting. Makes about 6 dozen cookies.

The first three of every four quilts are made for individuals with a charge attached. The money received is put into the quilting fund to help pay for the "give-away" quilt.

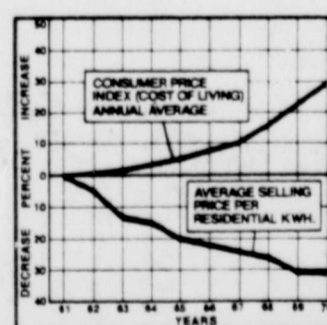

UP, UP & AWAY

Three weeks ago I had the experience of being a teacher. They live near Boulder, Colo. This was the first time I had been up in some three years, and on top of all that I had been in planes with very few instruments and controls. I was nervous as a cat in a breadbox.

In fact, it was the first time I had flown without an instructor. I was not supposed to be used in class, and I did not know the controls, and that performance was not the best one.

Mrs. Goode was with me, and I was doubtful about my chances of making a good landing, but it seemed to go well. I flared out good and made a very smooth landing.

After asking Goode to follow me through in case I needed help, I don't think he took me seriously enough to be that little bit worried. The feeling seems to be embedded in one's bones like balancing oneself on a tightrope and the swimming motion.

It may not be the best flying plane, but for the time being I would feel at ease in the cockpit.

It makes a lot of difference to me when the whole job is if I do not have to spend a lot of time searching for various controls that I have never used. The previous flight 20 hours of flight work would be sufficient to give me the feeling I have on other land in Piper J3, Taylorcraft, Apache and other light planes used for student instruction.

Should I give dual in one of the modern many-instrumented, 160 to 180 mph planes, the student could easily sense my worried feelings and his confidence would be weakened so that he would not progress properly.

What success I have had as a flight instructor, in my opinion, can be laid to the "gut sense" feeling I have been able to instill in my students.

I'm sure I could quickly master the Cessna 180 trainer to the extent that I would have little, if any, apprehension when an emergency arises.
