

An animal with hardware disease may show no symptons until it gets pregnant. Then, the weight of the fetus may force a sharp object like a nail or wire to pierce the stomach wall and enter the heart. This is called "traumatic pericarditis" and generally will kill the animal in a short time.

How can hardware disease be detected in animals? Some symptons include arching of the back, tucking up the belly and trembling of muscles in the back of the front legs. Animals may also have pain in the heart area when the ribs over the heart are pushed with the fit. If the heart is affected there may be a noticeable pulsation of the jugular vein. Splashing sounds in the heart area may be heard if the animal is restrained and checked

If viewing the house or apartment without spouse or roommate, a checklist is useful. On this note any facts, opinions and presence or absence of special features.

Obtain a copy of the lease and read it carefully before signing it. Note particularly its length and the conditions nated by the landlord or ten-

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

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
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

If the rise had been as fast as hourly pay, the figure would be \$80,60.

Compared to the cost of having a baby, steers would be bringing \$119.13.

Compared to the daily cost of hospital service steers would

bring \$179.69. 



Fatigue, weakness, coughing, and weight loss can be symptons of active disease. Spitting up blood in the sputum and loss of appetite may be signs of well-developed disease. Drug therapy can cure the disease; but many older people do not receive proper medical care.




