**'Service Above Self'
District Governor Harbin
Speaks To Local Rotarians**

The Burkburnett Rotary Club had as a guest Tuesday during its weekly meeting T.A. "Tim" Harbin, Rotary Club District Governor. About 30 members were present at this meeting in the local Community Center.

Harbin spoke to the members using as topic "Facts of Rotary". He described how the existence of the club began in February, 1905 and how standards were set then to produce the backbone of the club today.

Harbin also elaborated on the three committees which make the club functional: Classification, Membership, and Membership Development.

He said that there are 15,772 Rotary Clubs in some 150 countries and territories today and that there are hundreds of thousands of members.

"What we need today is concern for our fellow man," stated Governor Harbin. "Service above self was what was stressed at the turn of the century also. Gentlemen, you belong to the best organization there has ever been; your efforts are my inspiration."

Harbin recalled several of the great things Rotarians have done before, which was stated in the club magazine, and told stories of events which changed peoples' lives.

District Governor Harbin has been a Rotary member since 1947 and in 1965 was named Man of the Year by the Bowie Chamber of Commerce. He said of being District Governor, "It's wonderful working with people, especially kids. I know of no better organization."

Rotary Club President Joe A. Jankke said just before Harbin's speech, "We've looked forward to having the District Governor for a long time." Governor Harbin will head a Spring Conference in Wichita Falls April 17, 18, and 19.

**Area Electric Co.'s File
Countermotion With Texas
R.R. Commission To
Defend Natural Gas Rights**

Texas Electric Service Company, Dallas Power & Light and Texas Power & Light today filed a countermotion with the Texas Railroad Commission to defend their right to a large supply of dedicated natural gas reserves owned by the three companies.

Burl B. Hulsey, Jr., TESCO president, said that the companies' countermotion is in response to a motion made to the Commission by four applicants: the cities of San Antonio and Austin, the Lower Colorado River Authority and the Board of Regents of the University of Texas system.

"The applicants' motion," said Hulsey, "seeks the aid of the Commission to confiscate and divert to their use natural gas supplies in the Permian Basin which were obtained by the three companies. Title and ownership of this gas were acquired from the Lo Vaca Gathering Company in 1970.

"This motion would take, for the benefit of others not entitled to it, fuel that we are depending on -- fuel for generating units that can use only natural gas for the continuous production of electricity.

"If we do not get this fuel, or if we get only part of our supply, we will face serious problems in providing electricity to meet the needs of all of our customers," Hulsey added. "Certainly the needs of our customers in north central and west Texas are no different and have the same priority as the customers whom the cities of San Antonio, Austin and the others seek to serve with our gas supplies. We are committed to meet our customers' needs and we plan to vigorously defend our right to fuel supplies we own that are required to help fulfill that obligation.

"Texas Electric and the other two companies have for many years expended vast sums in developing fuel sources and generating capability for their customers' needs," Hulsey said. "This has included the purchase of specific gas reserves, construction and ownership of natural gas pipelines, and more recently, the expansion of oil storage capability. For some time we have had long range plans to diversify our fuel sources to lignite and nuclear and reduce our dependency on natural gas and oil. However, because of the long lead time required to plan and build plants that use these alternate fuels it will be many years before natural gas can be replaced as a major fuel supply in meeting our customers' needs for electricity."

Texas Electric Service Company provides electric power to customers in 47 north central and west Texas counties with a total population in excess of 1,200,000. The company serves Burkburnett, Wichita Falls, Fort Worth, Arlington, Grand Prairie, Odessa, Midland, Big Spring, Sweetwater, Eastland and some 100 other cities, towns and communities.

Customers in a much larger area of Texas would be adversely affected, Hulsey noted, if the gas were not available to the three companies. Together the companies serve 99 counties and some 320 municipalities with a combined population of approximately 4 million--more than one-third of all residents of the state of Texas.

Hulsey said that consideration of the matter by the Texas Railroad Commission is expected soon.

**City Council
Amends Plumbing
Ordinance**

The Burkburnett City Council met Monday night at 7:00 and discussed a schedule to open bids on a sewer line extension. Bids were opened at 10 a.m. Wednesday. The council hopes to award a contract soon, since it is getting closer to winter.

Specified types of plastic pipe in natural gas line installation is now permitted due to an amending of the city plumbing ordinance by council. Certain types of approved plastic can now be used from the line to the riser of an individual's house. Regularly wrapped pipe must be used beginning about one-foot from the bend in the pipe.

The council granted Toss H. Brown a permit to drill a second oil well 300 feet south of a well south of the 3-par golf course.

Corporation court fines of \$30.00 and delinquent tax collections of \$40.86 were reported. The council also approved a payment of current accounts amounting to \$15,425.

A new eight-inch sewer line will be laid to the corner of Preston and Kramer, joining lines in two new sections of

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Veterans Day To Honor 29 Million Americans

Veterans Day this year will honor more than 29 million Americans, the most in the nation's history, according to Jack Coker, Director of the Veterans Administration Regional Office at Waco, Texas. Veteran population has risen to a record 1,430,000.

More than half of the 43.5 million who served from the American Revolution through Vietnam are alive today, the VA says. The oldest in this group are the less than 2,000 veterans of the Spanish-American War with an average age of 93. Veterans of World War II represent the largest group, about 14 million. The current Vietnam Era has produced 6.6 million veterans.

Once known as Armistice Day, the event commemorated the end of World War I on November 11, 1918. Following World War II, sentiment grew for the day to be a tribute to veterans of all wars. A Congressional resolution by Rep. Edwin K. Rees of Kansas was passed and signed into law in 1954.

That same year, President Eisenhower created the Veterans Day National Committee which coordinates the national ceremony and the observance within each state. "Peace with Honor" was chosen by the committee as the official Veterans Day theme and has been in use continuously since 1954.

National observance of Veterans Day was changed by Congress in 1968 to the fourth Monday in October. Many states, however, by legislation or proclamation, hold to the traditional November 11, date.

He is also scheduled to visit several ports in the Western Pacific.



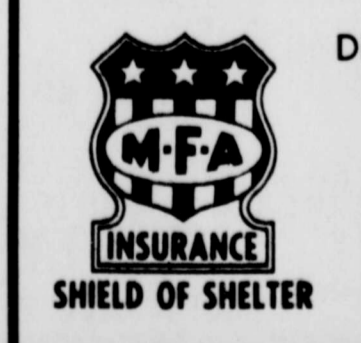

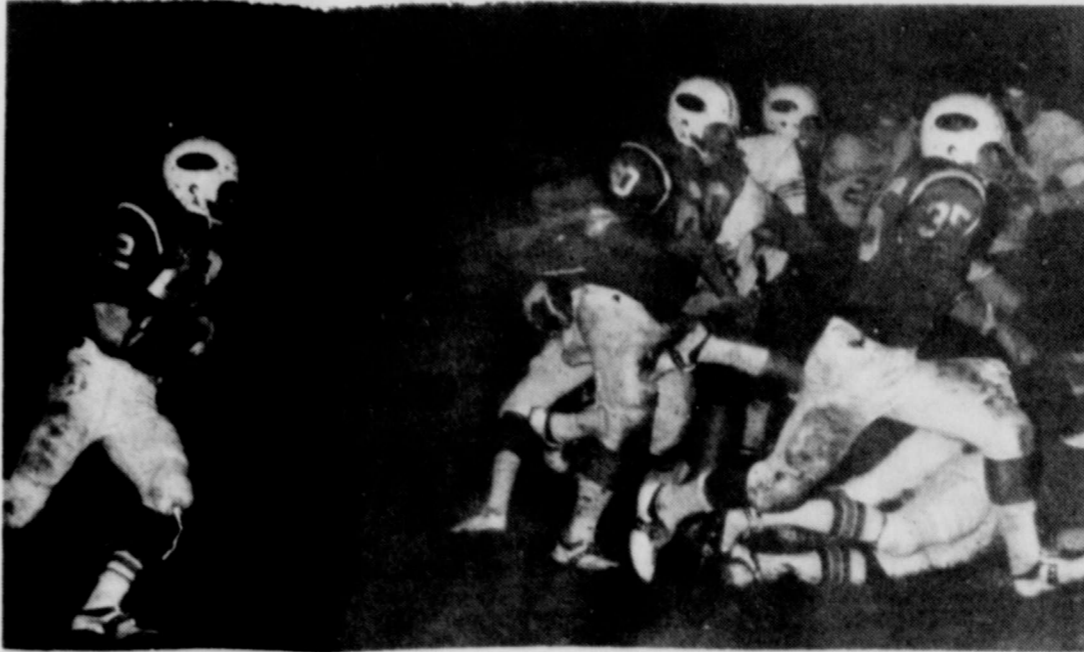

Housing Referral Office Aids In Change of Station

SHEPARD AFB, TEXAS-- The problems of moving from one base to another can be nearly traumatic for some -- worry about the shipment of household goods, the comfort of the family, and arrival in a new area where all are strangers.

But everyone has at least one friend at his new base who can minimize many of the apprehensions associated with a change of station--the Housing Referral Office (HRO).

The HRO is a service agency and a "sort of better business bureau on base," says H. Dean Jones, chief of the housing management branch of the 3750th Civil Engineering Squadron.

As part of its service, HRO sends free information packets on Shepard to persons who request them, even before arrival. Its employees can help find temporary lodging and offer information on area schools, churches, shopping centers, and community facilities.

The HRO also maintains a list available apartments, homes and trailers.

"We attempt to verify availability listings to help avoid wild goose chases," stated Mr. Jones. "All listings are verified at least weekly, others more often. We can also tell lower ranking airmen whether or not they qualify for FHA subsidized rental housing."

But perhaps the most important responsibility of Housing Referral is to protect the serviceman-investor from discriminatory or illegal practices.

HRO contacts local landlords, owners and realtors to see if their housing meets necessary standards and to find out if their property is rented or sold without regard to race, color or religion.

The office maintains a list of landlords who do not practice fair housing methods for the benefit of those looking for a home. Because of the list, "in most cases," said Mr. Jones, "we know from exper-

ience who is going to get a fair shake."

Working closely with community officials and civic organizations the Housing Referral assists in improving housing standards for everyone.

HRO also aids the military tenant in processing validated complaints of unlawful housing discrimination and unfair practices to the appropriate federal agencies.

By regulation, every Air Force member qualified for off-base housing must report to Housing Referral as part of his in-processing. He must also check with the office before entering a contract or lease for a house, apartment or mobile home or to report a change of residence.

It doesn't seem that regulations should be necessary for something as important as finding good non-discriminatory housing for a person's family. Just knowing that the Housing Referral Office exists simply to help should be enough encouragement to make use of it.

Product breakdown, especially of appliances, may often be traced to improper use and handling by the customer. Rule 6--Check the seller's reliability. The best way is to get in touch with the Better Business Bureau. The BBB system, operating in 137 U. S. cities under the leadership of the Council of Better Business Bureaus, has had years of experience in handling consumer/business disputes and their reliability reports are very accurate. Rule 7--Ask who services it. This is a major source of customer dissatisfaction. Ask for a BBB reliability report on the firm if you question its servicing capabilities.

As a consumer spokesman has noted, "In today's huge and bewildering marketplace, intelligent buying has become an art in itself, and the successful shopper takes time out to learn a few ground rules." The wise consumer also turns to the Better Business Bureaus for information, advice and arbitration if a difficult consumer and business disagreement should arise. With so many aids at our fingertips, we should be able to guide our shopping carts with a greater ease and confidence than ever before.



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
