Trustees Take Oath--Officers Elected

School Board To Study Field House Bids

The Burk Burnett School Board met in a regular board meeting April 8, at 7 p.m., to discuss several items on the agenda.

Election returns from the April 6 election were canvassed and the oath of office was

administered to Norman Roberts, who won place one with 371 votes; C.J. Lippard, who was elected to place two with 431 votes; and Charles Chittum Jr., who earned place three with 236 votes. Ira Schroeder administered the oath.

The board then elected John Gill president of the board, C.J. Lippard vice president, and Thurman Allison secretary.

Bids were opened concerning a new field house for the BHS football stadium. F&W Construction of Wichita Falls was

lowest in base bid with \$87,057. Other bidders were Hatcher-Hirschi Construction Co. with \$94,808; M.A. Vordenbaum & Sons with \$100,917; Texoma Construction with \$106,878; and Bill Buchanan Gen. Contr. with \$107,800. Bids will be considered by the board and administration later action.

The board decided to increase Tax collector's bond to the maximum \$50,000, which will cost \$250 annually.

The board unanimously agreed to adopt a policy used by another high school, which would set punishment on actions of undesirable conduct and nudity of students.

The board also unanimously accepted the proposed calendar for the 1974-75 school year. Classes would begin on August 22, with Thanksgiving Holidays on November 28-29, Christmas Holidays from Dec. 20 to Jan. 2, and Easter Holidays from March 27 to April 7. The second semester would end May 29.

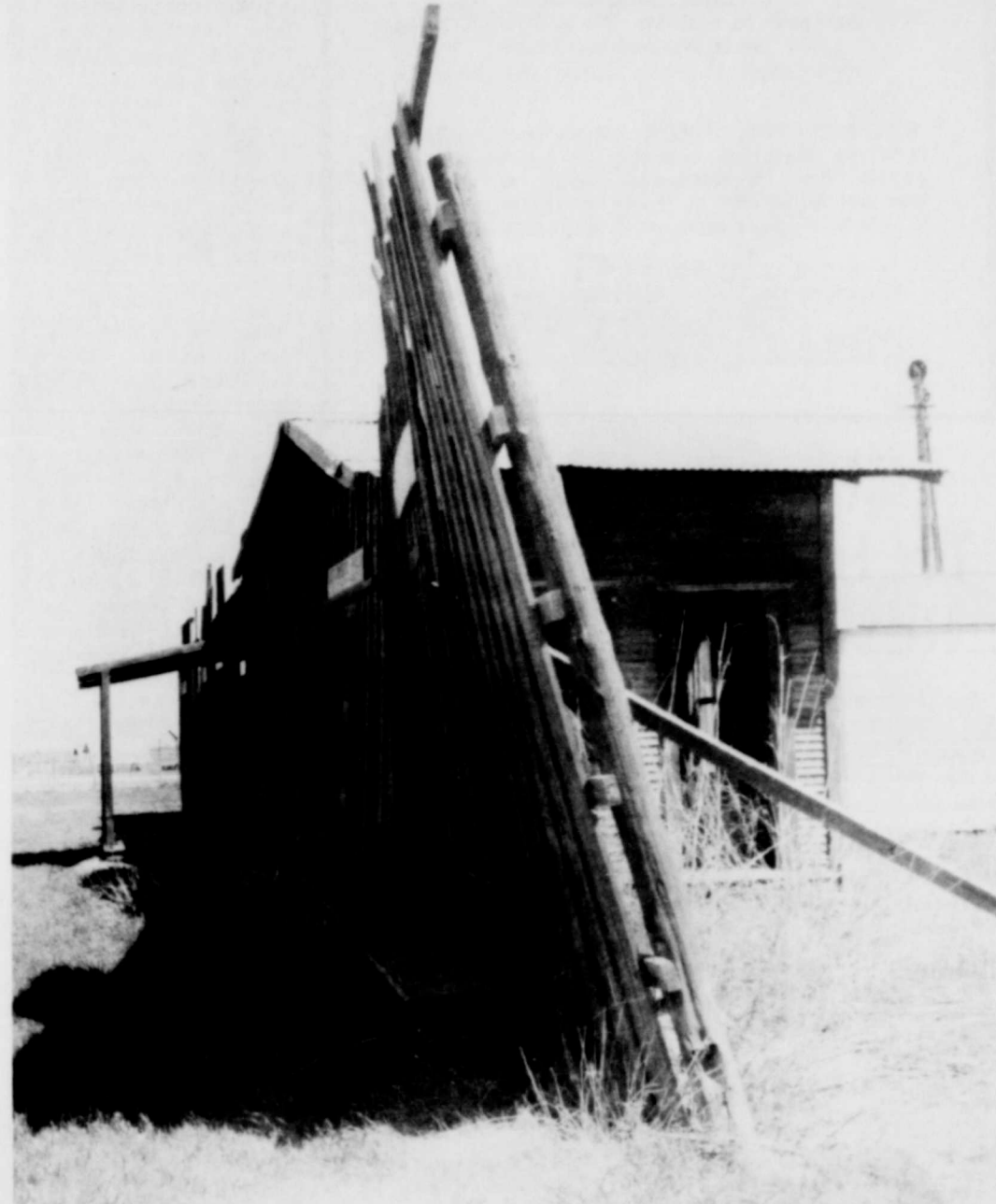
Named to the Tax Equalization Board were Bill Jenne, Rayford Young, and C.E. Vanderburg.

Board members agreed unanimously that the Driver Education Fee for summer be set at \$40. Also they accepted the resignations of Mrs. Sandra Mays, Mrs. Vieve R. Holladay (1st grade), and Sandie Pickett (secretary, Shep-Burk). They approved a one year leave of absence for Mrs. Eleanor J. M-Nabb (high school English) and approved the employment of Mrs. Marilyn A. Barfield (Shep-Burk Librarian), William R. Branum (High School Driver Ed-Coach), and Mrs. Marion J. Studebaker (Shep-Burk Secretary).

Tax collections of \$267,589.75 have been collected to date of the total tax roll of \$279,049.95, it was reported.

The board approved the minutes of the last regular board meeting, along with four special meetings. The members also approved the school financial report, BHS athletic and activity reports; and agreed to pay school and athletic bills.

An insurance committee consisting of C.J. Lippard, Frank Morton, and James Pearson was formed to investigate workmen's compensation.

City Council Sets 1974-75 Budget

The Burk Burnett City Council met Monday night and approved a salary increase of 6 percent for city employees.

The new 1974-75 city budget which was approved, totals \$887,026, and doubles the longevity bonus for employees, making it \$2 for each year of service per month.

The council anticipated that the revenues for the budget will total \$878,619, with water sales of \$285,500; tax including sales tax \$275,000; sewer and garbage revenue being \$175,250; franchise tax of \$40,000; revenue sharing being \$75,000; and miscellaneous income totaling \$37,869.

In the budget, department expenditures will total \$887,026. General government will be \$33,495 of the total; administration will be \$37,119; tax department \$20,755; city hall \$5,860; police \$124,113; fire department \$18,242; library \$22,193; street and inspection dept. \$145,750; parks and

recreation \$5,992; community center \$8,410; water wells and distribution account \$167,810; water billing and collection \$57,026; sanitation control \$70,896; sewer disposal account \$43,335; and revenue bond \$84,750.

A \$1.50 tax rate per \$100 was set on assessed evaluation of over \$12 million.

The council approved an oil permit for Toss H. Brown to drill a well just southwest of the

three-par golf course near the Oklahoma Cutoff. Councilmen also agreed to pay accounts payable totaling \$24,240.12.

At the beginning of the meeting Joe Janek gave the oath of office to Donald Pate, Brack Preston, James Spinks, and T.M. Cornelius, who were recently elected as councilmen. Cornelius was then reelected mayor and councilman McCandless was mayor pro-tem.

43 Frye-Vaughn Members Attend Spring Convention

Legionnaires and Auxiliary ladies from Frye-Vaughn Post 264 of Burk Burnett turned out in force for their annual Spring Convention in Denton over the weekend. Host Post 71 of

Denton said that 43 men and women from Burk Burnett registered for the convention.

Several routine matters were taken care of and a resolution supporting Dr. James White of Houston was endorsed by the convention delegates, supporting Dr. White as their candidate for the next Department (State) Commander.

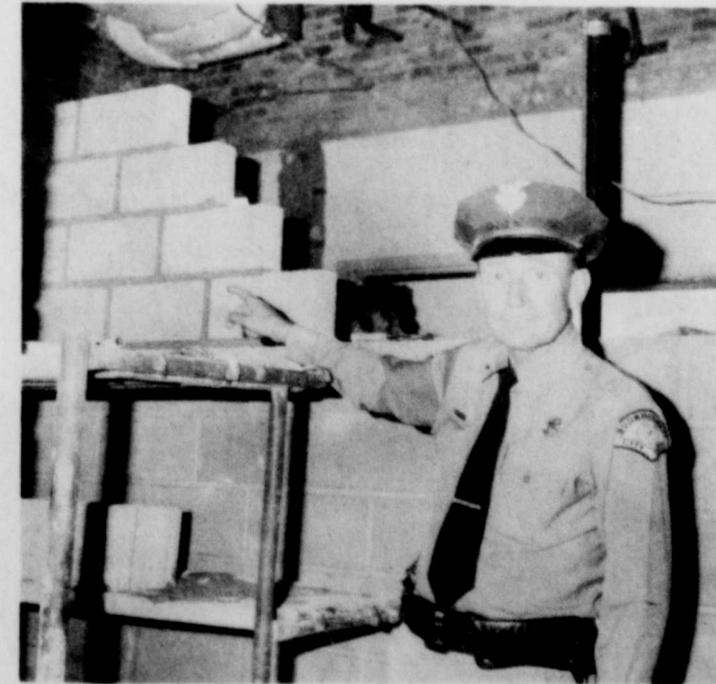

Farm Exports Bring Nation Trade Surplus

Sale of U.S. farm products abroad during 1973 gave the nation its first trade surplus since 1970. The surplus was built by the sale of \$17.7 billion worth of American agricultural products, as compared to foreign food imports of \$8.4 billion. This left a \$9.3 billion agricultural trade surplus which wiped out a \$7.6 billion deficit in non-agricultural trade, and resulted in a \$1.7 billion overall trade surplus. Commenting on the trade balance, Agriculture Secretary Earl Butz says the agricultural trade surplus is making a vital contribution to the nation and to every consumer.


TOPS Club Has Regular Weekly Meeting

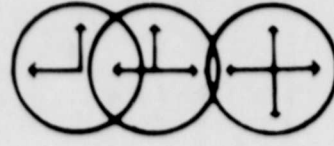

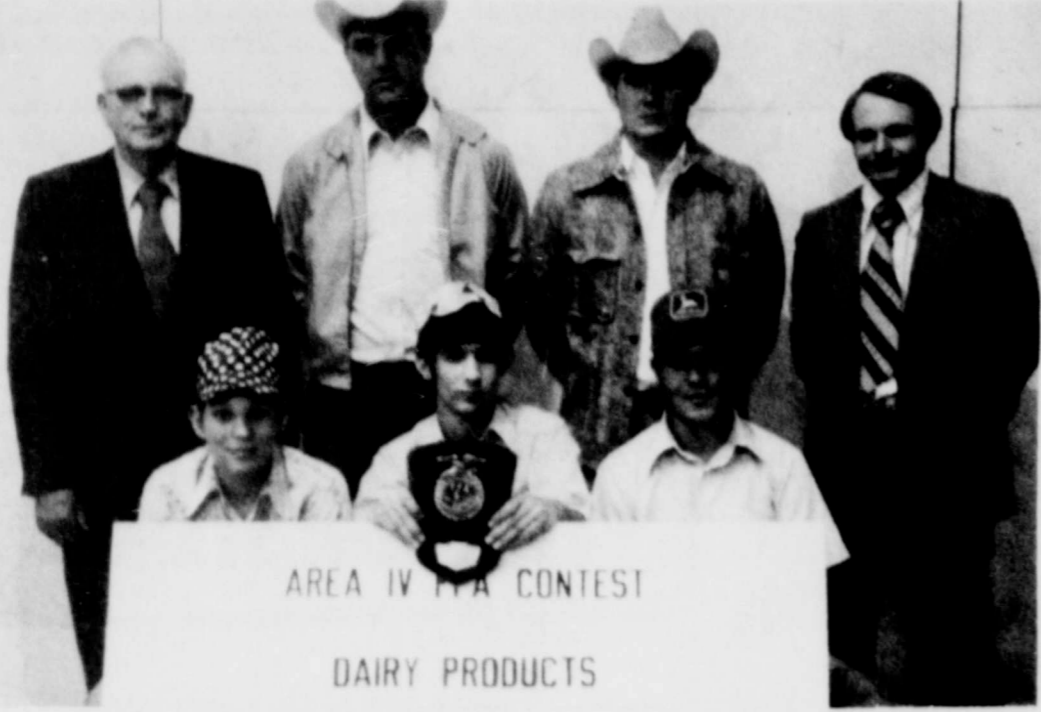

County Agent News

Although fertilizer supplies are short, be cautious in considering the use of substitute materials. Substitute fertilizer products are often called conditioners, additives, and amendments and most do not have an analysis tag to show their nutrient content.

Most fertilizer substitutes contain only small amounts of plant food and the materials are often in forms not readily available for plant use. Furthermore, the per unit cost of any major plant nutrient from these products makes them relatively high in cost. These substitutes will raise production costs, increase yields little, if any, and ultimately lower net profits.

Farmers are encouraged to take advantage of soil testing services to determine their fertilizer needs. Soil testing cartons are available at the County Agent's office, 304 Federal Building, Wichita Falls.

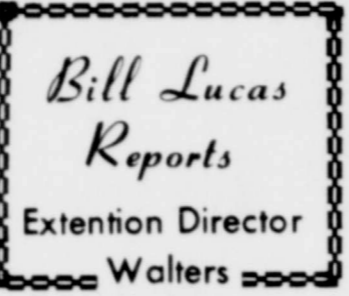

must be placed 8 to 10 feet from the concrete.

Any major shade tree should be placed 50 feet from the nearest lateral or sewer line. But this is not always possible. Smaller trees, or vine arbors could be used to provide shade. Smaller trees may be placed within 4 to 6 feet of surfacing without danger.

The average residential lot will support four to six major shade trees and three to nine smaller trees. When landscaping around your home, you need to plant the front or public area, the back or private area and the service area.

The service area accommodates such things as the vegetable garden, the wood pile, the butane tank, and possibly the children's play area.

If searching for a way to improve investment returns in the cow and calf industry, consider using hybrid vigor to improve production efficiency. This animal breeding tool combined with effective selection programs in the purebred industry could increase production efficiency by 10-25% in many commercial cow and calf herds in Oklahoma.

Using hybrids in commercial

inspected frequently, all would be treated, and all worm samples should be sent to the Screwworm Lab.

A livestock marketing specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service gives several reasons for the declining feeder cattle market in recent weeks. First, feeder animals were over-priced compared to fat cattle. Also, feeder cattle supplies were up, as reflected by a 17 per cent increase in the January sales of cattle and calves at Texas auctions compared to a year ago. The price drop in the fed cattle market further weakened feeder prices.

Warmer weather means the appearance of the mosquito and its threat as a disease carrier, especially as far as horse sleeping sickness is concerned. So, all horse owners should take steps now to protect their animals.

All horses, mules, asses and ponies should be vaccinated for the three types of equine encephalomyelitis (Horse sleeping sickness), Eastern, Western, and Venezuelan. The Venezuelan strain (VEE) caused the deaths of thousands of horses in Texas and Mexico when it first appeared in 1971.

A combined vaccine is breeding herds in the best way to use purebred animal resources. Purebred cattle must be maintained and used constantly to keep a high level of hybrid vigor.

After several generations of mating crossbred to crossbred, most of the hybrid vigor will be used up. Hybrid vigor is created in offspring as a result of mating two distinctly different breeds. Such fitness traits as hardiness, fertility, and growth tend to be enhanced by cross-breeding.

Traits high in heritability respond consistently to selection. But they show little response to hybrid vigor. Traits low in heritability usually show good response in hybrid vigor.

The level of hybrid vigor for all traits depends on the breeds crossed. The greater the genetic difference between the two breeds, the greater the hybrid vigor expected.

Having hybrid vigor in the cow herd is most beneficial because of the substantial advantage in fertility and mothering ability.

In the progeny of crossing two purebreds, some increases are realized in liveability of calf, weaning weight and post weaning gain. But the greatest return is realized when the F1 crossbred females are placed in the producing herd.

When F1 females are backcrossed to one of the parent breeds or mated to a bull of a third breed, an increase of 6-9% in weaning weight, and some improvement in carcass traits when compared to purebred calves.

Not Brag, Just Facts? Texas currently leads the nation in annual production of rice, onion, cotton, grain sorghum, sheep, goats, beef cattle, and wool. It also harvests substantial amounts of peanuts, vegetables, citrus fruits, honey, cereal grains, soybeans, turkeys, and dairy products.

available for the Eastern and Western strains of the disease and annual booster shoots should be given after the initial vaccination. A separate vaccination must be administered to protect animals from VEE. The vaccine provides protection for about 18 months. Colts vaccinated last year while under six months of age should be re-vaccinated.

Vaccines are available through veterinarians and should be administered only by them. The Texas Animal Health Commission requires that all horses moving to shows or out-of-state be vaccinated for VEE.

Symptoms of the three diseases include depression, lack of appetite and drowsiness. Animals may frequently grind their teeth and stagger when moving. They may also lunge uncontrollably and assume a "sawhorse" stance. Although there have been no horse deaths from VEE in the past two years in the U.S., a number of animals were lost last year to the Eastern and Western strains of the disease in some 25 states.

So plan to vaccinate your horses as soon as possible to give them the protection they need.
