When the plant is completed by the end of the year, it will have a production potential of approximately 400 million square feet of glass a year, and employ approximately 900 persons.

F.V. Breeze, who succeeded Hainsfurther as vice president and general manager of the glass division of PPG, said at the furnace ceremony, "In only about one month, the spot we are now standing will be filled with about four feet of molten glass at a temperature of about 2,800 degrees. That's hot, even

We are now able to manufacture float glass in the variety of thicknesses our markets require, ranging from automotive glass to large sizes






