# 3,200 Attend July 4 Celebration

An estimated 3,200 individuals attended or participated in the first annual July 4th Celebration held in Burk Burnett Thursday afternoon and evening. The festivities consisted of club booths, bands and musical groups, a barbecue, a flag-burning ceremony, and an hour-long fireworks display.

Although barbecue ticket sales were going very slowly until the day before the

celebration, over 1,250 persons bought tickets and were served barbecue on July 4. The Chamber of Commerce, which sponsored the barbecue and fireworks display, broke even and profited almost \$100 which will be used later in the year for promotional purposes for Burk Burnett. The reason the Chamber of Commerce was worried about the number of tickets to be sold was that the

fireworks display and insurance cost almost \$1,140.00 and over 700 pounds of beef were purchased, according to Chamber Manager Jim Lemley. Lemley said that all the clubs made money on their booths and seemed to be pleased with the results. He added that everyone seemed to enjoy themselves at the celebration, and stated, "I'm pleased with the whole operation."

Around 1 p.m. club booths opened for the public to enjoy and men started to barbecue the 700 pounds of beef. Around 5 p.m. there was a turtle race in front of the American Legion booth, and at 6 p.m. barbecue was served. Bands and musical groups began to perform at 6:30 p.m. and around 8 p.m. there was a shoot-out on Williams Drive and a gun show in which Paul Drake shot out balloons which surrounded his wife.

## Water Relief Comes

The City of Burk Burnett started receiving water from Wichita Falls Monday afternoon, after tests of the water proved good. Therefore, the water shortage in Burk Burnett has eased and the new million-gallon ground storage tank is full.

According to City Manager Gary Bean, all water from Wichita Falls will be pumped into the ground storage tank, and water from local wells on the Red River will be pumped into the overhead water tanks. Wichita Falls water will supplement the water from Burk Burnett wells, which will be used to capacity.

The City Manager noted that a demand rate will be set from the highest rate from one day of Wichita Falls water used.

A four-month delay in finishing the pipeline system from Wichita Falls due to the steel shortage set the completion date into summer months when water is needed badly. The water situation reached the critical point about two weeks ago just as completion was made. After painting the storage tank and waiting two weeks for it to "cure" Burk Burnett was extremely dry and residents were urged to limit yard watering and conserve water. Some relief came Monday when the new tank was filled and the tested water was approved.

Gary Bean stated Tuesday that residents are using more water than was expected with the new system in effect. On Monday, the first day of

operation of the new water system from Wichita Falls, Burk Burnett used 500,000 gallons of Wichita Falls water. The early estimate before the system's construction began was only 100,000 gallons per day.

Recently the city has been using a total of 2 to 2.1 million gallons of water per day. Monday a total of 2.6 million gallons was used. That is half a million gallons more than before.

The demand rate on the Wichita Falls water will be set by the one day of the year when the largest amount of water is used. This rate will be retroactive back to January. Therefore, Bean urges citizens to cooperate in keeping the demand rate down by not wasting water. Water bills will be lower if the demand rate is lower, and will be higher if the demand rate is higher.

## School Board Tables ID Card Decision

During the regular monthly meeting of the Burk Burnett School Board Monday night, trustees discussed the possibility of making the purchase of a student identification card (ID card) mandatory upon entering school in the fall. High School Principal Bill Darland reported to the board that in the past two years there has been some opposition to ID cards by various individuals and

that he has been unable to force students to purchase them. He stated that the ID card helps identify the student when library books are checked out, at dances, and at other activities. He said, "We feel it is a good check and balance on student activities."

The cards have been purchased in the past for \$2.00 each by students, 85 cents of which was used to pay for the

card and the rest was used to pay for school newspaper expenses. The students with ID cards were then given a school newspaper at no charge.

Superintendent James Pearson pointed out to the board that the rumor stating that the cards are worth a discount for students at different places in town was a misconception. He See **SCHOOL BOARD** Page 3

# ★ PPG Lights Furnace, Begins Production ★

PPG Industries lit the fire in the first of two furnaces at the Float Glass Plant located south of Burk Burnett last Tuesday, July 2, to initiate getting the plant into production.

The fire-lighting ceremony was held inside the furnace which will later house more than

1,600 tons of molten glass.

Robinson F. Barker, chairman and chief executive officer of PPG Industries, and Robert M. Hainsfurther, recently retired vice president and general manager of PPG's Glass Division, touched a Texas brand to a gas lance in the furnace to

ignite the flame.

Senator John Tower of Texas heated the brand by touching a silver star (designating the plant) located on a 4 by 5-foot touch control panel of PPG's Solargray glass featuring a silkscreened map of the United States.

The furnace lighting is the first step in a complicated month-long procedure which will bring the first float line into actual production at the nearby plant. When the plant is completed by the end of the year, it will have a production potential of approximately 400 million square feet of glass a year, and employ approximately 900 persons.

F.V. Breeze, who succeeded Hainsfurther as vice president and general manager of the glass division of PPG, said at the furnace ceremony, "In only about one month, the spot we are now standing will be filled with about four feet of molten glass at a temperature of about 2,800 degrees. That's hot, even by Texas standards."

He continued, "A firelighting is a symbolic event, and a very meaningful one. It means that the work of building has been completed and that a multi-million dollar investment will begin paying off not only for PPG, but for the Wichita Falls area. The primary mission for Works Four will be to serve the residential and commercial markets. When the second of two lines goes on stream later this year, this will be PPG's most productive glass plant."

The Glass Division, which is the historical nucleus of PPG, employs about 13,000 people and consists of 16 domestic production and fabrication plants and one architectural metals fabricating plant. It operates 150 distribution warehouses in the U.S., and has 13 glass manufacturing locations in other countries of the world.

The area PPG Plant is 28 acres in size and will turn out

about 400 million square feet of glass annually when the second line of Works No. 4 is in operation by the end of the year.

Breeze concluded, "To all those involved in making today possible, I extend my personal gratitude and thanks. May PPG's new home on the range live a long and productive life for the benefit of all."

Following the furnace lighting, there was a luncheon at Wichita Falls in which Robinson F. Barker, chairman and chief executive of PPG Industries, was main speaker. Barker told the approximately 200 guests, "The year that marked our groundbreaking at Wichita Falls proved to be the best year in PPG's history, resulting in record sales and earnings. Things also moved steadily ahead as our new plant began to fill the horizon on the Texas range."

He continued, "There are a number of reasons why things went so smoothly at Wichita Falls. First of all, we think we're the best at building glass plants. When completed, this facility will house our two newest glass lines which will strengthen our position as the world's largest manufacturer of flat glass."

Noting that the Pittsburgh Plate Glass Company introduced the revolutionary float glass process into the United States, Barker said, "Our research programs have brought versatility to the float glass process itself. We are now able to manufacture float glass in the variety of thicknesses our markets require, ranging from automotive glass to large sizes

said that as far as he knows, they were only for identification purposes.

Trustee John Gill stated that he didn't see any difference in a high school student having to buy an ID card and a second grader having to buy a workbook.

Board member Charles Chittum then replied that he didn't think students should be forced to buy a school newspaper and that the ID card has nothing to do as far as education is concerned, whereas a workbook does.

He continued, "If we pass this, it should be mandatory for everyone."

After discussion concerning

the legal aspects of making the purchase of the ID card mandatory, the board agreed to table the matter until later so that more information can be investigated.

In other action, the board opened bids for the reroofing of Southside Elementary School. Armored Roofing Co. was lowest bidder with \$7,000 for gravel roofing.

The board received a bid of 40.05 cents a gallon for gasoline from Mullins Butane Co. of Burkburnett, which was approved; and voted to file for Federal Programs for the 1974-75 school year.

Trustees unanimously approved the transfer of Bob Carpenter, counselor, Thelma Campese, diagnostician; and Arbuary Ritter, vocational adjustment coordinator, to the Plan A program. Also in the Plan A program Mrs. Mary Burrus and Mrs. Eddie Horton were hired as resource teachers.

The minutes of the Regular Board meeting of June 10 and Special Board Meetings of June 13 and June 24, the financial report, the athletic and activity reports, payment of school bills, and tax collections totaling \$281,000 were all unanimously approved.

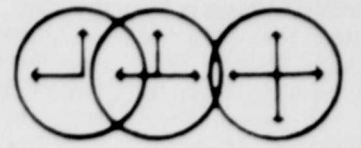
The board approved the firm of Rariden and Elam of Burkburnett to do the school's auditing in August, and accepted the resignation of Mrs. Nancy Burk.

The commitment of the School Board to pay \$1 per 80 students enrolled to the Region IX Media Center for the use of the film library and other facilities was approved as were gas line alterations at Southside, structural repairs on the football stadium bleachers, and installation of carpet in the new portable classrooms.

Board member Norman Roberts was not present for the meeting.

for a variety of architectural applications. We are even able to produce one family of coated glass architectural products."  
"Still another reason for the smooth going at Wichita Falls has been the quality of people involved in the project. From the very beginning, the people of this area have backed their promises with deeds, a quality all too lacking in much of our

society today," said Barker. He added that the manufacture of float glass will be a pioneering venture in Texas and described several facts about the plant.  
"As you know," he said, "the glass literally floats on a bath of molten tin, which like everything else these days, costs lots of money. There will be about \$3.5 million in tin alone utilized when both glass lines are in full operation."

Barker concluded, "I think that it is a tribute both to PPG and to Texas that we have come so far together. And, as the current song title so aptly puts it, "We've only just begun."  
The Wichita Falls plant will receive 36 train-car loads of materials each week (containing sand, soda ash, lime, dolomite, and salt cake) and will export approximately 30 to 35 truck-loads of finished glass and glass products each day.

Works No. 4 plant officials include Ralph Siebach, plant manager; J.M. "Jeep" Ellett, assistant plant manager; Jim Maloney, director of employee relations; Ken Keiser, director of quality control; Mel Earnest, director of maintenance; W.B. Gibbs, manager of the tank dept.; Stan Degreve, warehouse director; Jim Fenwick, finance director; and R.C. Roland, supervisor of manufacturing services.



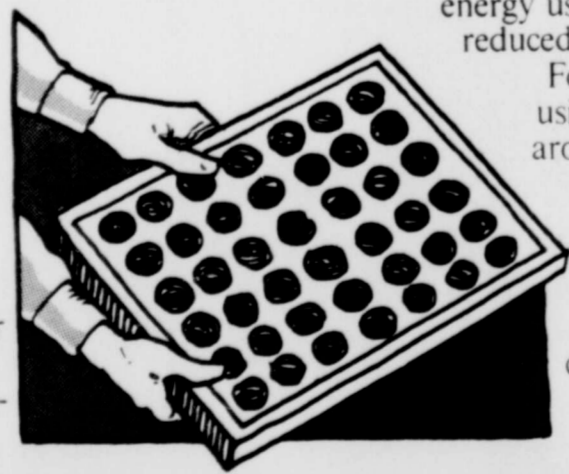

More than 7,000 firms are engaged in the search for and production of oil and natural gas, with the largest producer accounting for only about 10 per cent of the total, an oil industry spokesman recently stated.

Dr. Wilson Laird of the American Petroleum Institute told a Kent State University audience the petroleum industry is one of the most competitive in America. For example, in petroleum refining, he stated, there were 128 companies operating 252 refineries in 40 states at the start of 1973. The largest of these refining companies accounted for less than nine per cent of total refining capacity.

local VIA Chapter #91. Decorations were in a Boomtown motif to carry out the meeting theme "Come To Our Boomtown Ball."

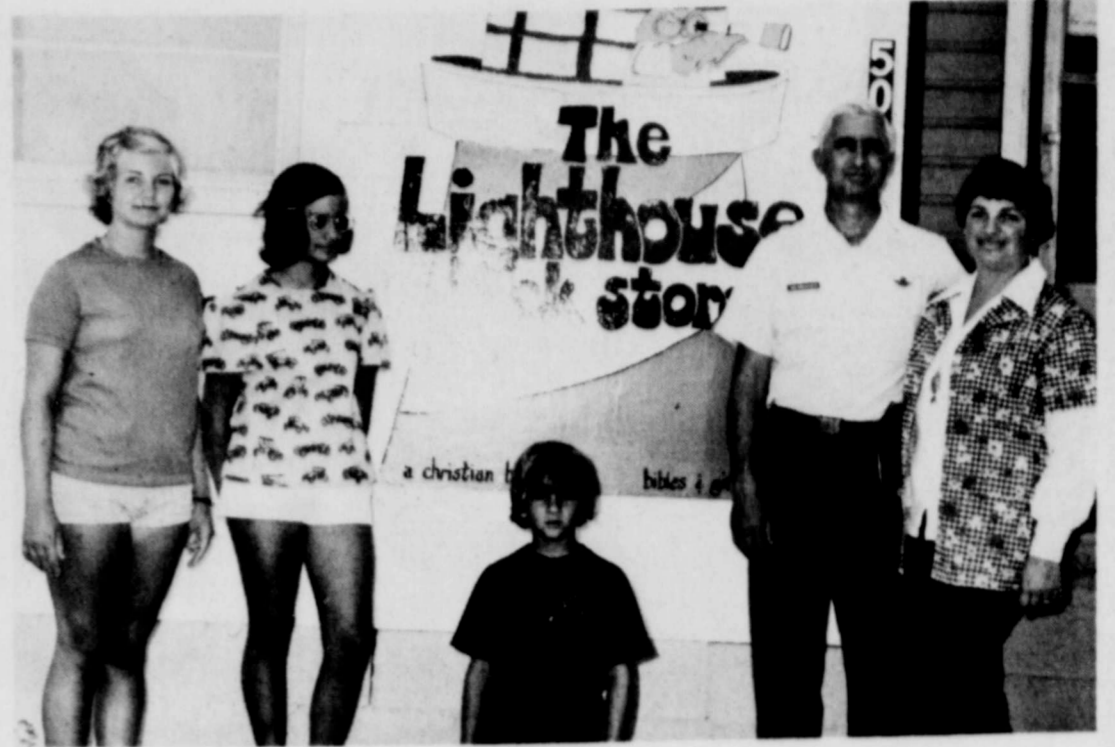

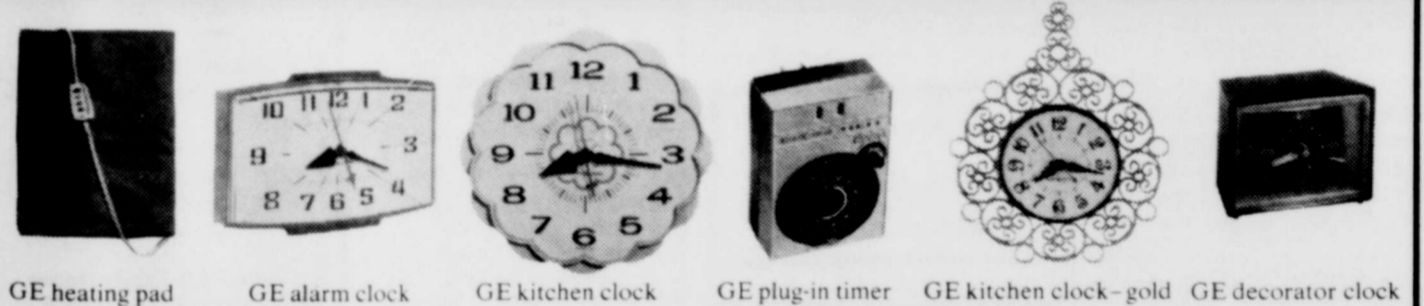

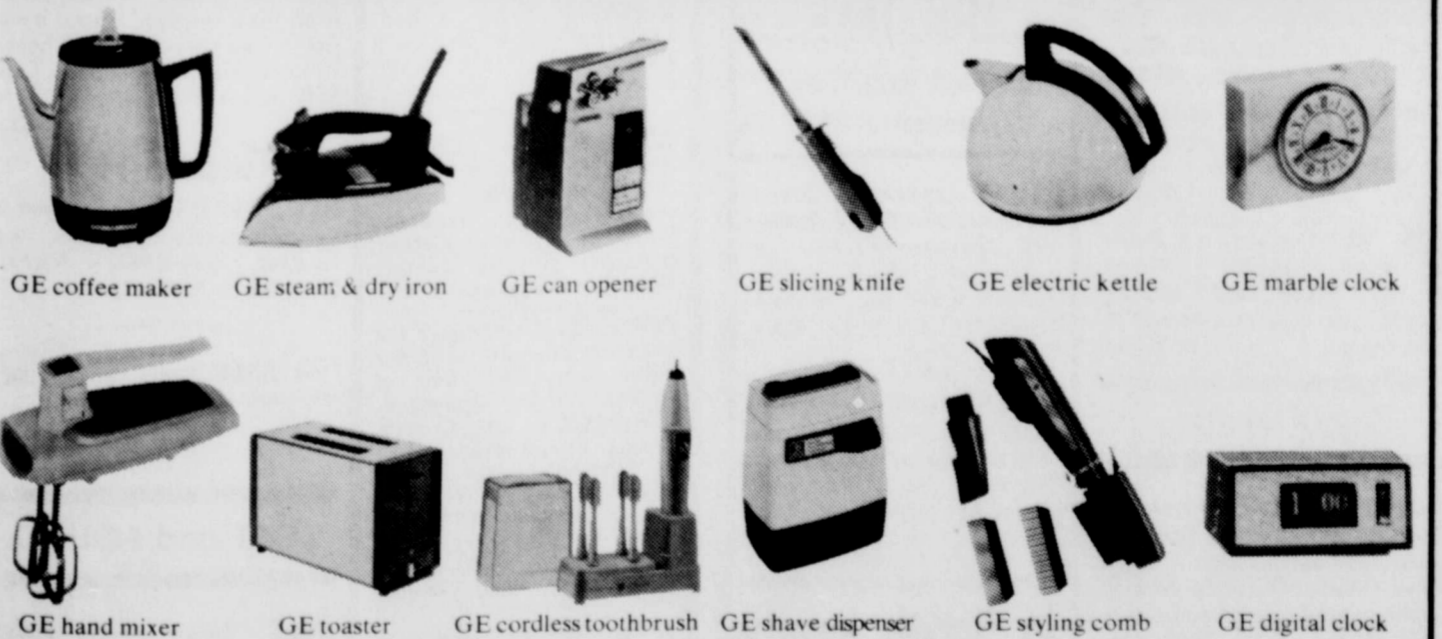

**To Spend \$64,000  
On Cable Projects**

Southwestern Bell is taking  
about \$64,000 and running it  
right into the ground in  
Burkburnett. But does this  
bother C.A. (Dub) Deuschle,  
manager of the telephone  
company? Not at all. He's  
actually proud of the fact.

"It's all in the name of good  
service," Deuschle said,  
"because that's how much  
we're spending on two local  
underground and buried cable  
projects that are in progress."

Deuschle said the cables will  
provide service to customers in  
the growing residential  
developments in southeast and  
southwest metropolitan Burk-  
burnett area. The capacity for  
additional new lines will greatly  
increase when the projects are  
completed toward the end of  
summer.

One project—at an expendi-  
ture of about \$29,000—is  
concentrated along Sycamore  
Street and will provide  
improved and new service to  
customers in the southeast area.

The second underground and  
buried cable project, located  
south of Avenue D and Kramer  
Road, is also giving service to  
customers who are part of the  
residential growth in the  
southwest area of town. Its cost  
is about \$35,000.

"I'd say 90 per cent of our  
residential cables are being  
buried today for a couple of  
reasons," Deuschle said.  
"First, they wear better which  
means more reliable service,  
and it saves us maintenance  
work due to weather damage.  
Plus ecologists like it because  
the wires are out of sight."

However, the telephone com-  
pany manager said the one  
problem with buried cable is  
the accidental digging up of lines  
that sometimes occurs in rural  
areas.

Telephone company officials  
recommend that persons who  
plan to do extensive digging  
notify their local business office  
so buried cable can be located to  
avoid accidental cuttings.

grasses remain green and fresh  
during warm weather. Rainfall  
is used three to four times more  
efficiently when pastures have  
been adequately fertilized. In  
addition to drought tolerance,  
fertilizer improves the total  
amount of forage produced.  
With improved forage quality,  
livestock have more forage  
available to select - when  
grazing, and they prefer grass  
that has been fertilized.

Another important aspect of  
pasture fertilization is the  
possibility for harvesting hay  
from excess forage. During late  
spring and early fall, fertilized  
pastures grow much faster than  
livestock can consume the  
forage. If part of the pasture is  
fenced separately, a cutting of  
good quality hay can be made  
from excess forage growth.

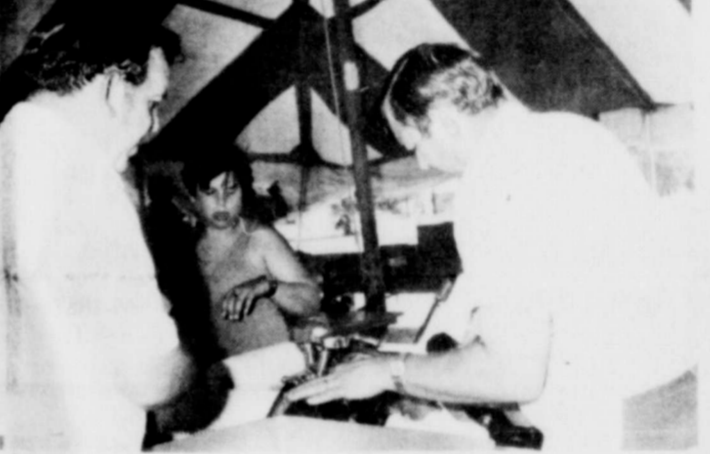

## TESCO Power Plant Hearings Scheduled

The Atomic Energy Commission has set 10 a.m. July 31 at the high school in Glen Rose for a public hearing on environmental effects of the proposed nuclear power plant in Somervell County, R.T. Martin, vice president of Texas Electric Service Co., said today.

number of federal, state and local agencies. The statement is available in the Somervell County Library at Glen Rose.

Robert M. Lazo, who holds doctorate degrees in radiation chemistry from Notre Dame and in law from Rutgers, is chairman of the Atomic Safety & Licensing Board panel of the AEC which will conduct the environmental hearing.

Other members scheduled for the panel are Dr. William E. Martin, a graduate in botany from Rutgers and senior ecologist at Battelle Memorial Institute in Columbus, O., and Lester Kornblith Jr., an electrical engineer from Massachusetts Institute of Technology and former assistant director of the AEC's division of compliance.

The \$779 million nuclear-fueled plant, to be owned by TESCO, Dallas Power & Light and Texas Power & Light, will generate electricity for the one-third of Texas served by the three companies.

A request has been made to the AEC by the power companies for a "limited work authorization" which, if issued, will allow site work and work on the dam to begin prior to issuance of the final construc-

tion permit. Following the environmental hearing, the board may determine if the authorization can be issued, the TESCO official said.
