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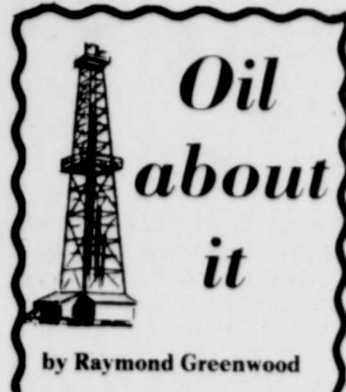

School Puts Patrolman At Underpass Crossing

Parents at Southside Elementary sighed in relief this week as Monday night the Burk Burnett school board members voted to place a patrolman at the school crossing the expressway underpass.

Describing the underpass as an extremely dangerous situation for the school children, three members of the Southside PTA Underpass Committee, Mrs. Sandy Worth, Mrs. Jo Anne Turnbull and John Polito, were present for the regular monthly meeting and asked for the school's help and advice in eliminating the problem.

A patrolman will be on duty there in the morning and again in the afternoons as school lets out to help children at the crossing. Drivers who travel in that area are asked to pay special attention to the school crossing.

The board also gave approval to the selection of the text book committee which will select books for the 1975-76 school year. The committee consists of 15 teachers and administrators from the local school district. It was pointed out that the state selects five text books per classification and these are sent to the local school districts for their selection as to which one will be used in the local school district.

A leave of absence was granted to Mrs. Irene Dunn for the period of Nov. 11 to Jan. 4.

Linda Leonard's transfer from an aide position to that of teacher for Mrs. Dunn's fourth grade class was also

approved. A special committee then will make the selections with the aide of these nominations.

Reeford Darter, Vernon Duncan and Gary Owen were appointed as election judges to canvass the ballots in the upcoming chamber directors election. Chamber members were reminded that all ballots must be in by 10:00 a.m. Monday.

Chamber directors also designated Nov. 30 as the beginning date for Christmas lighting in the city. Local merchants will be competing for cash prizes of \$100, \$75, and \$50 for the best decorated businesses.

In a September meeting directors had voted to not erect decorations on the

given board approval.

Employment was also approved for Mrs. Phillis H. Beeman as a teacher aide for Hardin Grade School. The board also accepted the resignation of Mrs. Anita Pate as a remedial reading teacher at the junior high.

Board members reviewed the energy conservation plans concerning the use of the local gyms adopted last year at the request of the Governor. Board members voted to revert to the policy used in prior years which will permit the public and organizations to use the school gyms. Permission for the gym's use must be obtained from the superintendent of schools.

Hardin PTA gained approval for its request to replace the old dilapidated chairs in the Hardin Grade School auditorium. The PTA had asked the school to purchase 100 chairs and the PTA would purchase the other 100 needed for the auditorium.

The contract for black-topping the area around the new field house was not let at the meeting. Only one bid had been obtained for the work and members voted to wait action until other bids could be received.

High School Principal Bill Darland presented board members with detailed information concerning the new quarter system that will go in effect at the local high school when school begins next year in August. The new system, which is designated by the state will provide for 55-minute periods of instruction.

"The kids will still go to school 180 days a year," stated Darland, "but they will actually have three 60 day quarters instead of two 90 day sessions as now. Basically the quarter system is designed to give the student more opportunity to take more subjects."

In other board action, two new sewing machines were

Directors Set Annual Banquet

The directors of the Burk Burnett Chamber of Commerce in their regular monthly meeting Thursday tentatively set Friday, February 7, 1975 as the date for their annual installation banquet.

Directors will decide in next month's meeting whether or not a special speaker will be obtained for the banquet as well as decisions on the many other areas of the banquet.

Directors voted to again let the public assist in the selection of persons to receive the special awards as Man, Woman, Employee or Senior Citizen of the Year. Nominations may be sent to the Chamber of Commerce Office. A special committee then will make the selections with the aide of these nominations.

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In a September meeting directors had voted to not erect decorations on the

utility poles as was done in past years, due to the deteriorated conditions of the present decorations. It is hoped by the directors that local businesses will compete in the decoration contest which will enhance the Christmas spirit.

Directors have spoken of plans to try to purchase new decorations for the city streets for next year.

In hearing the report of the Chamber's Halloween activities, the directors learned the poster contest was a great success, but the costume parade had only 35 to 40 entrants.

It was the general consensus of those present that next year, emphasis should be given to Fire Prevention Week instead of Halloween. The emphasis on fire prevention would help on the Key Rate for fire insurance for local citizens.

New officers for 1975 will be selected in the next few days by the outgoing officers, which include C.J. Lippard, Mickey Cornelius, Gary Owens, Bob Carter and Joe Gillespie.

Today at 2:00 p.m. the budget committee will meet to finalize the new year's budget.

Directors also voiced approval to a special Christmas promotion where by gift certificates will be given away on four separate Saturdays in December.

Bulldogs Set Eyes On District Basketball Title

Football has just ended in Burk Burnett but new basketball coach Ernie Chesney hasn't been just waiting around to start preparing for a district title in 4-AAA roundball action.

Chesney and his Bulldogs are predicted to lead the conference this year with Brownwood and Weatherford close behind. Graham, Vernon, Iowa Park and Stephenville are expected to round out the conference standings in that order.

The Bulldogs finished last season with a 19-7 record and an 11-3 district mark.

Returning starters Chris Berg, a junior at 6-3 averaged seven rebounds per game last year. He was selected to the All District

team last year.

Big 6-4 senior Paul Taylor who was an outstanding player last year and hopefuls Tim Kormos and David Ray add greatly to the ability of the Bulldog team.

Chesney has been working with the basketball boys since mid-October in preparation for their first game on Nov. 21 with Childress.

As stated earlier, this is the first season in Burk Burnett for Chesney, the big 6-7 former college player who has his eyes set on the district crown.

A native of Prosper, Chesney graduated from high school there and then received a B.S. in education

CLOVIS, N.M. -- Staff Sergeant Larry A. Lange, son of Mr. and Mrs. A.E. Lange of 106 Terrace, Burkburnett, Texas, is scheduled to participate in the 1974 Strategic Air Command (SAC) elite bombing and navigation competition at Barksdale AFB, La., Nov. 10-16.

Sergeant Lange is an aircraft maintenance technician on the hand-picked team that will support the F-111 fighter-bomber crew representing the Tactical Air Command's (TAC) 27th Tactical Fighter Wing at Cannon AFB, N.M. He was selected for the meet on the basis of his technical skill, proficiency and duty performance.

This will mark the first time that TAC aircrews have taken part in the SAC event which tests the bombing accuracy and navigational skills of the top bomber and tanker crews in the Air Force. Also participating in the competition will be Vulcan bomber crews from the British Royal Air Force.

Dr. Frank Orts, Meat Specialist from the Texas A&M University will be one of the speakers. Mrs. Bonita Laske, Home Economist with the National Live Stock and Meat Board in Chicago but now living in Oklahoma City will have several Beef cuts on hand to discuss, cook, garnish, and give away as door prizes. Dr. Orts and Mrs. Laske will be answering the questions most asked by homemakers. Money saving techniques and shopping tips will be told. She will show how a new Uniform Retail Meat Identify Standards Program initiated by the Meat Board can help you at the meat counter. They will explain and show how the high quality protein of Beef can be served every day to families on a low budget. Very handy and helpful materials will be available for your shopping files. "This week's topic has become very important to the conservation of home heating and cooling fuel." County Agent News

November is a good time to review your income tax situation for year-end tax management. If you file your own tax return you probably have an old set of 1973 forms which you can fill out and estimate this year's tax. If you used a tax practitioner to complete your tax returns a short visit with him will probably return you much more than his fee will be. The main thing is to get all of your income and expense records up-to-date, review your tax situations and make those actions such as prepaying expenses, deferring sales, etc. that are required to minimize your tax liabilities.

Although there is still a possibility that more tax changes will be made for the 1974 tax year, there are very few that affect farmers and ranchers at the present time. One of the changes for 1974 is an increase in rates for the standard mileage rate increased to 15 cents per mile for the first 15 thousand miles and 10 cents for each additional mile. The previous rate was 12 cents and 9 cents respectively. The rate for use of an automobile for charitable, medical and allowable moving expense has increased from six cents to a new rate of seven cents per mile.

The winter tick as its name implies is found on cattle during the winter. It is also found on horses, deer and coyotes. On cool nights in September and October the larval ticks attach to a host. The tick remains on the same host through the larval, nymphal and the adult stages. The total parasitic period is usually five to seven weeks, but may be as long as 18 weeks. Peak infestations usually are present on cattle from late November through December. The adult female leaves the host after engorgement and fertilization to deposit eggs.

Winter ticks are blood-sucking parasites that cause losses to cattle through loss of blood, weakened condition, reduced feed efficiency, and increased susceptibility to disease and nutritional disorders. The winter tick through its feeding activity causes an extra burden on cattle during the winter.

When heavy infestations are present, control measures should be applied as early as possible to minimize losses. Effective tick control can be accomplished with several spray and dip materials. Thorough coverage with the insecticide is necessary for best control results. Dipping assures coverage but sprays can be effectively used if careful attention is given to thoroughly wetting the hair coat to the skin.

Before purchasing an insecticide for tick control, carefully read the label and pay particular attention to the precautions, restrictions and slaughter interval.

Information on tick control material is available from the County Extension Office.

Reporting house plants can keep them healthy, vigorous and beautiful during the winter months. Use a suitable container that has good drainage along with a good soil mixture. Place a layer of fine gravel or crushed stone in the bottom of the container to promote drainage. After repotting, remove diseased and broken branches from the plant and cut back long stems to give it a natural shape.

Proper home maintenance can reduce the heating bill this winter. Adequate insulation, tight-fitting storm windows and doors or double-glazed windows as well as weather-stripping on loose-fitting window and door frames. Caulking also helps minimize heat loss from loose-fitting windows. Rooms that are not used frequently should be closed off, and draperies and window shades should be shut at night. Limited use of kitchen and bathroom exhaust fans are also recommended to conserve heat.

Local Girl Becomes Team Trainer

DENTON--All of a sudden, North Texas State University's athletes are asking for massages when they only need their ankles taped. And they've even cleaned up their language around the dressing rooms at Fouts Field.

Why the sudden changes? For the first time, the male athletes have two female trainers.

Physical education majors Donna Ramsey, Dallas junior, and Cheryl Lafitte, Burk Burnett freshman, started working with NTSU Trainer John Porche this fall, learning about injuries, how to treat them and how to prevent them.

"We do everything from taping ankles and washing towels to giving massages and sound treatments," Miss Lafitte said. "I enjoy the work and I've learned a lot in the five weeks we've been working with John."

The two, who will travel with the NTSU women's athletic teams, have to have 1,300 hours training under Porche and then take a test to become licensed trainers.

Miss Ramsey, who also plays on the NTSU volleyball team, said she has an interest in becoming a trainer for a long time. "I've always wanted to do this," she said, "but there wasn't a chance until this year."

How do the men like the females treating their injuries? "I have no trouble getting the guys to come in for their treatments now," Porche said. "I used to have to call them at the dorm, but now they stand in line."

"The guys kid us a lot," Miss Ramsey said. "They realize what we're there for, though, and they know we're serious about it."

Not only will the two work mainly with the women, but they will help out with the men's basketball team.

"My plans are for Donna and Cheryl to help us in all sports," Porche said. "They will travel with the women and be there to take care of any injuries. This would take a load off the coach and it's a great help to me. I wouldn't have been able to handle the women's sports without them. It's just too much for me."

This is the first year the women will have trainers traveling with the teams to games. Before, if a player got hurt she had to wait to

get home and go see a doctor, according to Miss Ramsey.

They are doing a fine job, and should be commended for their excellent work," she added.

"Both of the girls are doing an outstanding job," Porche said. "They've caught on fast and they have a keen interest. In fact, they are sort of pioneers in their field."

"With the new athletic director in the women's department, and us working to be trainers, it's a step in the right direction to becoming a better program," Miss Ramsey said.

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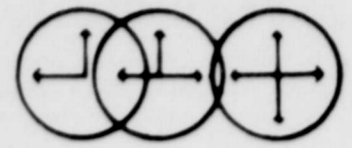

Oilers Defeat Eagles 12-0

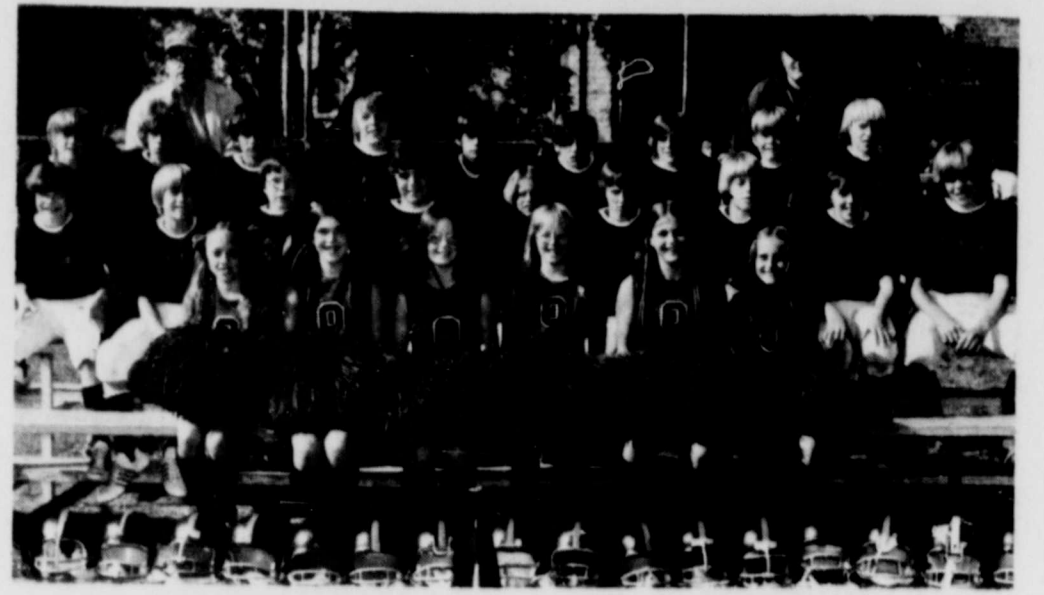
