## **Correct English Aim of** Intermediate Grades

By Miss Mary McGinnis One of the most important functions of the school is to teach children to use the mother tongue with ease and correctness. This aim is found with more or less prominence in every activity. Its paramount importance, however, makes it necessary that the teachers keep it in mind during activities designed in the main to develop other specific subject matter. The teacher must also make definite provisions for activities which will of themselves develop appreciation of good English and provide for adequate expression, oral and written.

Applying practical modern standards to time allotment in oral and written English, it is obvious that forme should be stressed more the school than the latter. For majority of persons, speech has a more prominent place in life than written English. Children not only talk more in school, but constructive oral English, designed to improve speech, should be allotted more program time. In addition to the training afforded through class recitations in content subjects, and the social situation incident to social life in general, oral English has a distinct place in the daily program. It may be used to develop innumerable talent abilities in a child, for instance, observation, mental alertness, accuracy, reasoning power, coordination of mind and muscle. A thoughtful teacher of oral English varies her topics so as to promote the growth of more than one of these, and assigns her lesson with two definite purposes in mind, first and more immediately, to make the child a good speaker of good English; second and more remotely, to evoke the child's dormant powers, which of course is the aim of all education. Many devices and plans may be utilized to make the oral English lesson not a burbear but a joy to the pupil, from which he will derive real benefit. Children who have enjoyed the advantages suggested above show considerable fluency in written expression by the time they have reached the sixth grade. That formidable difficulty of having nothing to say need not occur if writing is postponed until oral practice reveals to children that they have much to say. Children should not be allowed to write long-drawn-out compositions in the lower grades. The scope of the theme should be limited very definitely. Frequent writings of brief units under favorable conditions through fourth, fifth and sixth grades will reach a desirable standard of fluency and effectiveness. Composition, both oral and written is closely allied with everyday interest and situations. School comerally are the older ones and when positions, if it is to mirror life, must therefore place before the child assignments that seem worth while and practical.
