Three Burkburnett Youths Hurt In Accident Sun.

Jack Blancett, 17, son of Deputy Sheriff Roy Blancett, suffered a severe head injury while Tommie Goins, 18, and Velma Klinkerman, 18, escaped with minor injuries shortly before 8 p. m. in a collision of automobiles on West Main.

The three youths were treated at the Wichita Falls Hospital where young Blancett was at first believed to have incurred a severe concussion, and others were found to have suffered only cuts and bruises.

Insurance Benefits Social Security Show Increase

The number of monthly old-age and survivors insurance benefits in force in the area served by the Wichita Falls field office of the Social Security Board increased by approximately ten percent during 1944, it was announced today by R. L. Surlis, manager, in a year-end statement.

There are 913 men, women and children in this service area who draw monthly benefits amounting to \$14,516 per month or \$174,192 per year. The service area of the Wichita Falls field office includes Archer, Baylor, Clay, Foard, Hardeman, Knox, Montague, Throckmorton, Wichita, Wilbarger and Young counties.

Summing up the situation on the social security front, Surlis said there is one serious cause of concern to the Board's field officers; some people do not know their rights under the old-age and survivors insurance program, and so many lose some benefits through failure to act at the right time.

Whenever a person, who has worked at any time in a job covered by the law, reaches the age of 65, he should come to see us and find out how to protect his benefit rights, even though he does not plan to retire. Whenever a worker dies, after working for some period in jobs covered by the law, some member of his family should communicate promptly with the nearest office of the Social Security Board.

The Board is concerned also, said Surlis, because some 20,000,000 Americans, farmers, farm workers and the self-employed, are excluded from the protection of the system. He called attention to the Board's recommendation to enable excluded groups to build insurance protection for themselves and their families.

A JOLT TO PUBLIC CONFIDENCE

It is unfortunate that OPA saw fit to cancel without notice the ration points that housewives have been so religiously conserving. It was, in effect, the breaking of a contract. Millions of women had been saving their points to use only if needed, as they understood the points were good indefinitely. The person who saved was therefore penalized.

On top of this, "business suspension" orders were asked by OPA for stores alleged to have sold goods in violation of the new regulation, when the only information the stores had on the sweeping changes was from news stories.

In specific cases in Portland, Oregon, the attorney for food stores said: "Enforcement officials of the local OPA had previously advised these operators that they were not being run by the newspapers and that only their own releases were official and that no changes were to be made until official notice had been given by the OPA."

Such tactics seem to be an inevitable part of bureaucracy which the people must endure as part and parcel of wartime controls. The Congressional investigation that is suggested may in some measure restore public confidence. Facts rather than secrecy are the most potent weapons in maintaining public morale.

FROM THE EARTH TO YOU

How gasoline and lubricating oil come from the raw product, petroleum, has never ceased to be a cause of wonderment to the motorist. Since the war, discussion of oil has increased and the curiosity of most of us is even greater.

In response to this rising interest, the Petroleum Industry War Council has published what it calls a "flow chart" which traces oil from the time it leaves the well until it reaches the customer. It shows the oil being pumped to the surface of the earth. It follows it through scores of machines and chemical processes that break crude petroleum into countless derivatives forming bases for everything from cosmetics to asphalt. In its simplest form the process of petroleum refining consists of heating the crude oil in a still to its boiling point, passing the vapors from the boiling through condensing pipes, and condensing the vapors into liquids. Every 100 gallons of crude oil yields approximately 44 gallons of gasoline, 36 gallons of fuel oils, 8 gallons of miscellaneous products, 6 gallons of kerosene, and 3 gallons of lubricants. The remaining 3 gallons is loss.

One of the most dramatic tales of this tragic era of war will be the story of the production and transportation of oil to our fighting forces, to say nothing of the home front. It will be a story of hundreds of ships, endless miles of pipeline, thousands of railroad tank cars running night and day. It will be a story of sweating, worried men laboring in desert sands and teeming offices. It will be a story in which the word defeat is unknown. It will be a story toward which this country will always be able to point with pride. It will be the story of American enterprise.

Pass through a train, a bus, sit in a hotel lobby or railway station, and look about at the discarded newspapers. There is generally a folded or crumpled daily with its big headlines and sensational news, having been glanced through by a traveler and thrown aside for waste, or for another to pick up and rapidly scan before discarding. 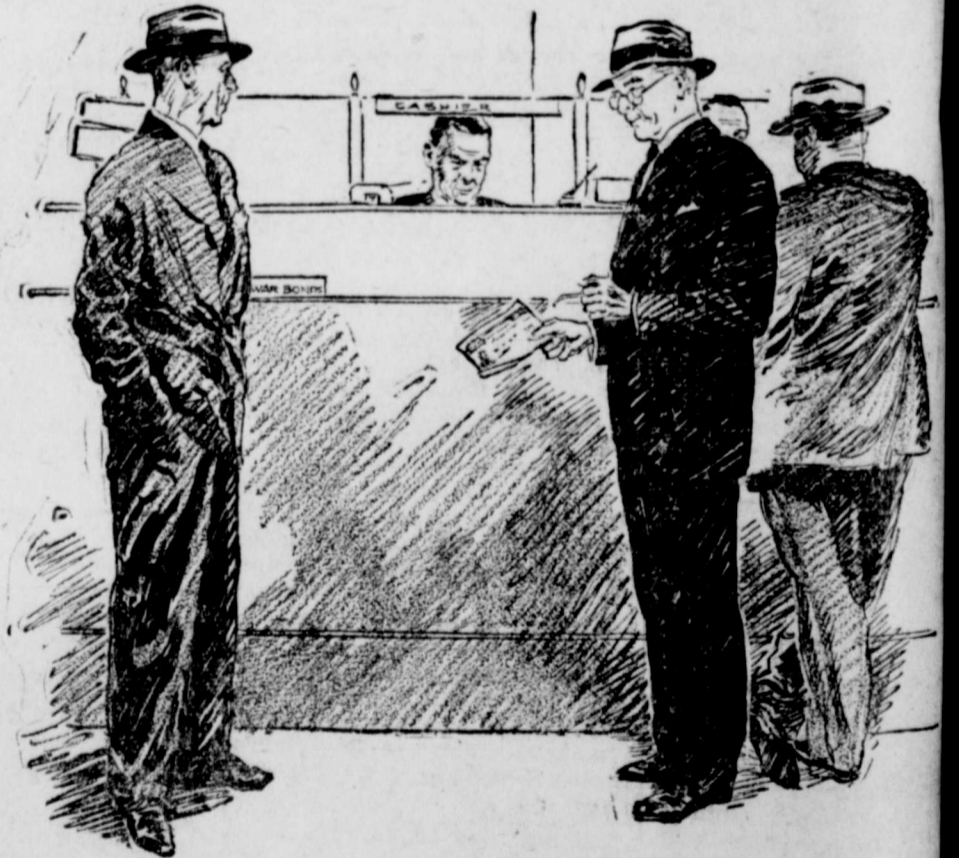

Ernie Pyle's Slant on the War: British and American Air Cooperation Strong Non-Commissioned Officers Never Become Hardened to Men's Death

By Ernie Pyle
 (Editor's Note: This dispatch was written and first published when Pyle was with the GIs at the Italian front. He is now on his way to cover the boys in the Pacific war zones.)

IN ITALY.—If you ever heard a dive bombing by our A-36 Invader planes you'd never forget it. Even in normal flight this plane makes a sort of screaming noise, and when that is multiplied many-fold by the velocity of the dive you can hear the wail for miles.

On the ground it sounds as though they are coming directly down upon you. It is a horrifying thing. The German Stuka could never touch them for sheer frightfulness of sound. Also, the Stuka has always dived at an angle. But these planes come literally straight down. If you look up and see one a mile above you, you can't tell where it's headed. It could strike anywhere within a mile on any side of you. That's the reason it spreads its terror so wide.

But our pilots have to hand it to the Germans on the ground. They have steeled themselves to stand by their guns and keep shooting. Pilots say the Italians would shoot until the bombs were almost upon them, then dive for their foxholes, and then come out and start shooting again after the bombs had exploded. But not the Germans—they stick to their guns.

Maj. Ed Bland, a squadron leader, was telling me about coming suddenly over a hilltop one day and finding a German truck right in his gun sights. Now it's the natural human impulse, when you see a plane come upon you, to dive for the ditch. But the German gunner in this truck swung a gun around and started shooting at Bland. German and American tracer bullets were streaming back and forth in the same groove in opposite directions, almost hitting each other. The German never stopped firing until Bland's six machine guns suddenly chewed the truck into complete disintegration.

Our dive bombers don't have much trouble with German fighters. The reasons are several. For one thing, the Luftwaffe is weak over here now. For another, the dive bombers' job is to work on the infantry front lines, so they seldom get back where the German fighters are. And for another, the Invader is such a good fighter itself that the Jerries aren't too anxious to tangle with it.

Flying Allotment.
 For several months the posting period back to America was set at a certain number of missions. Then it was suddenly upped by more than a score. There were pilots here who were within one mission of going home when the order came. So they had to stay and fly a few more months. Some of them never lived to finish the new allotment.

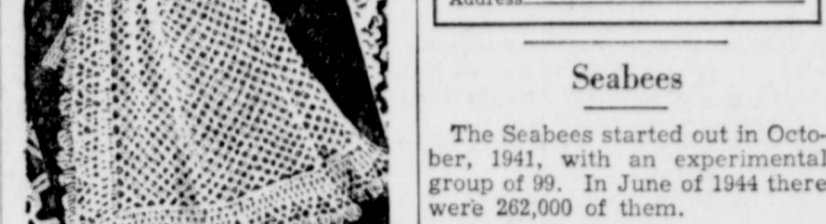
Nowhere in our fighting forces is cooperation closer or friendship greater than between Americans and British in the air. I have yet to hear an American pilot make a disparaging remark about a British flyer. Our pilots say the British are cooler under fire than we are.

They like to listen in on their radios as the RAF pilots talk to each other. For example, one day they heard one pilot call to another: "I say, old chap, there is a Jerry on the ground." To which the imperiled pilot replied: "Quite so, quite so, thanks very much old man." And another time, one of our Invaders got shot up over the target. His engine was smoking and his pressure was down and he was losing altitude. He made for the coast all alone, easy meat for any German fighter that might come along. He was just barely staying in the air, and he was a sad and lonely boy indeed.

Then suddenly he heard over his earphones a distinctly British voice saying: "Cheer up, chicken, we have you." He looked around and two Spitfires, one on either side, were mothering him back to his home field.

WEEKLY NEWS ANALYSIS Yanks Clash with Japanese in Major Battle of Philippines; Act to Solve Manpower Problem

PACIFIC: Decisive Battle Three years before, Gen. Douglas MacArthur had left Luzon in a small torpedo boat in the dead of night, with the Japanese breaking the last shred of U. S. resistance in the Philippines.

But he returned in a brilliant comeback, puffing hard on his corn cob pipe at the rail of an American warship, one of 800 vessels in a 70-mile-long convoy which poured thousands of troops and tons of supplies on the sandy beaches of Lingayen gulf in northeastern Luzon, 120 miles from Manila.

Coming shortly after the U. S. conquest of Leyte island to the southeast, General MacArthur's latest invasion was a bold stroke, setting the stage for the decisive battle of the Philippines, Japan's last great defensive bastion before the Asiatic mainland, a battle in which the enemy was expected to commit 200,000 troops.

Fleet Aids Preceding the Yanks' landings, U. S. warships subjected the crescent-shaped Lingayen beach to a murderous three-day barrage, and mine sweepers ploughed in to brush away surface obstructions.

Lack of heavy enemy resistance to the landings, and the absence of any formidable beach defenses, indicated that the Japanese command resolved to reserve its forces for concentrated onslaughts inland instead of spreading them along the shores.

Heavily reduced by previous sustained U. S. army and navy air force raids, a pared Japanese aerial fleet offered desperate resistance to the spearhead of the huge American convoy steaming toward Lingayen, with preliminary reports indicating 79 enemy planes shot down by fighters and anti-aircraft fire.

MANPOWER: Act on Shortage Its efforts to solve the nation's critical manpower problem brought to a head by the President's appeal for a national labor draft in his 12th annual message to congress, the government moved swiftly to channel workers into essential war plants, and provide additional men for the services.

Although asking for a national labor draft to "... assure that we have the right number of workers in the right places at the right times..." the President specifically recommended action to route 4,000,000 4-Fs into war work and induct nurses into the services.

Although generally opposed to a national service act, but at the same time anxious to solve the manpower problem by less drastic means, congress considered legislation to compel 4-Fs to go into essential work or face induction into labor battalions without servicemen's benefits. With 20,000 nurses needed now and recruitment drives having failed to enlist sufficient numbers, the lawmakers also reluctantly backed the drafting of nurses.

Meanwhile, selective service's order for the review of the deferments of approximately 365,000

Including authorization of 73 billion dollars for war purposes, the President asked for an 87 billion dollar budget for the 12 months ending June 30, 1946, 13 billion dollars below his request for the present fiscal year.

young farmers between 18 and 25 years of age was attacked by agricultural leaders, who said that induction of substantial numbers of this group would seriously impair food production, particularly of pork, beef and dairy products.

EUROPE: Nazis Pull Back Making use of swirling blizzards and ghostly battle-fields piled high with snowdrifts, German Field Marshal Von Rundstedt slowly pulled his recent uncrushing Nazi legions from the big Belgium bulge under the unrelenting pressure of Allied armies slashing in from the north, the west and the south.

Once but 4 miles from the Meuse and 29 miles from the historic gateway to France, the German forces, originally said to number 200,000 men, gradually gave ground as the Allied armies, under Montgomery in the north and Bradley in the south, cut into their lines, severing important supply roads and threatening to entrap the enemy's armored divisions in the western portion of the bulge.

As the Allies delivered their triphammer blows against them, the Germans, who frequently counter-attacked to relieve pressure on their lines, were locked upon to withdraw to a new defense area around St. Vith, but four miles from the German border.

Reacting quickly to the Germans' diversionary thrust in Alsace, the U. S. Seventh army fought valiantly to nip the enemy's attempt to isolate it left from its right wing, and reinforcements from the French First army rushed to the defense of the Strasbourg region.

Eastern Front Long dormant, the Polish front bestirred, with the Nazis reporting Russian movements on the road to Warsaw, but claiming to have set back Moscow's winter offensive plans by going onto the attack themselves in Latvia and East Prussia.

Principal action on the eastern front, however, continued to center in the Hungarian theater, where strong German armored forces struck at Russian lines northwest of Budapest, and the Reds tended to offset this heavy pressure by pushing forward just above the border in Czechoslovakia.

In bitter fighting in encircled Budapest, the Russians continued their block-by-block conquest of the once beautiful but now smouldering Hungarian capital, with tanks and self-propelled guns rumbling through the battered streets and troops firing from jumbled debris.

SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

Lesson for January 21

STANDARDS OF THE KINGDOM A kingdom must have laws, and here we have the laws for Christ's kingdom—the kingdom of heaven—which He shall one day establish on this earth. In the Church we have the joy of living as loyal subjects of Christ, and hence these standards are for our counsel and guidance.

The verses of this greatest of all discourses are addressed to those who have actually taken Christ as King of their lives. These beatitudes are not a substitute for the gospel. They are not laws that the unbeliever can keep and thus be saved, for this would be utterly impossible. Only he who knows and has called upon the power and grace of God in Christ can qualify to walk as a citizen of Christ's kingdom.

We note two things in this wonderful and instructive passage from God's Word:

I. The Character of the Follower of Christ (vv. 3-10). The eight characteristics of the Christian here presented are worthy of extended individual attention, but we can offer only brief suggestions. "Blessed are the poor in spirit" speaks of humility as a commendable quality. How contradictory the present-day philosophy, which calls for self-assertion and self-reliance, but Jesus was not mistaken. The way into the kingdom of heaven is not that of assertive self-sufficiency. "Blessed are they that mourn." The world does not believe that statement. It shuns the house of mourning. It tries without avail to philosophize away the fact of sorrow. The Christian, on the other hand, feels with his fellow man and thus receives a blessing. One can really learn from sorrow.

I walked a mile with Pleasure; She chattered all the way. But let me none the wiser For all she had to say.

I walked a mile with Sorrow, And ne'er a word said she; But oh, the things I learned from her When Sorrow walked with me.

"Blessed are the meek." Poverty of spirit comes when a man rightly sees himself, and has a sympathetic touch with sorrow. Then he "inherits the earth," because he truly comes to enjoy it as a place of service and Christian growth, and not because he has a deed to a single foot of its soil.

"It is the hunger and thirst for righteousness (v. 6), and not the possession of it, that is blessed" (Plummer). Self-satisfied people know nothing of the glory of having their hunger and thirst satisfied by God.

We have here also the Christian's spirit of mercy which invites divine mercy; a purity of heart, cleanness of mind, and sincerity of purpose, which enable a man really to see God even in this impure world; that Christlike spirit which makes him a peacemaker in a fighting world—yes, that spirit which makes him like the Master in sweetly bearing unjustified persecution. These indeed are the marks of the man who follows Christ as King.

II. The Conduct of the Follower of Christ (vv. 43-48). There can possibly be no more severe test of a man's Christian character than the manner in which he treats his enemies. Many who pass the other tests meet failure (at least in part) at this point.

It is no easy thing to love your enemies, but it is the standard of Christ, and He will enable us to live up to it. Now is a good time to put it into practice, not only personally, but nationally.

There can be no doubt that love for the brethren will be a more intimate and satisfying experience because they return our affection (v. 46). Anyone can do that and enjoy it. Enemies often return hatred for our love—they persecute us (v. 44). But we are still to love them. That love must move us to treat them kindly and to pray for them. Someone says, "It can't be done." Yes, it can by the grace of God in Christ, and it is being done.

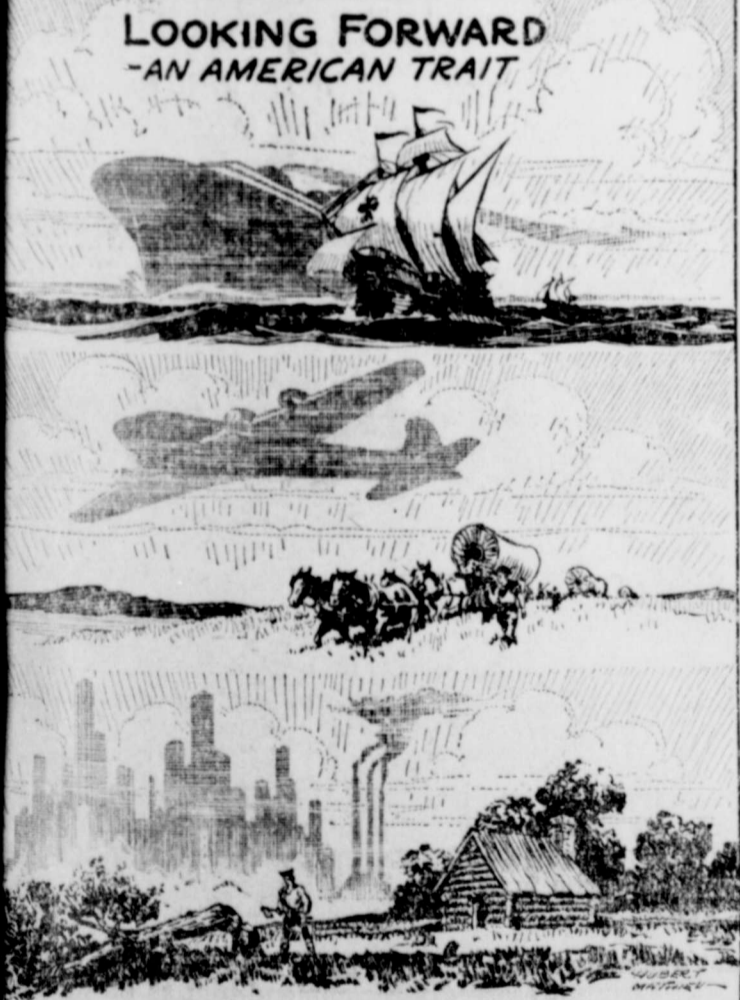

You can then remove the burned particles easily. If dishes are burned or scorched and have brown stains, borax water will remove them. Let them stand in the solution for a day and then wash with soap and water—Tin ware won't rust if it is rubbed with lard and placed in a hot oven for an hour when it is new. Wipe linoleum dry after washing it to make it last longer. Keep the burners of your stove from being clogged by using a pipe stem cleaner.

the TEXAN'S SHARE in the WAR

Tales of fighting Texan's continue to come back from all fronts where Americans are battling the Nazis and Nips. One of the best is that of Sgt. W. C. Gray, the Texarkana, Texas, boy who had to fight his way through a whole crowd of Japs in order to bury a Nipponese general.

Gray was given the task of bringing in the body of a Jap general from a cave, where he had been killed, so that it might be given proper burial under the rules of war. When he got to the cave, however, he found a large group of Japanese mourners on hand.

With a couple of other Marines Gray waded in. When the fight was over, seven more Nip officers were dead around the general's body. Sergeant Gray removed the body of the Jap General, delivered it to the burial detail and quietly reported "mission accomplished as ordered."

A Dallas pilot was one of several who celebrated the new year with plenty of noise, dropping bombs on Tokyo. He was Lt. Col. H. N. Brandon, who piloted a B-29 that bombed the Nipponese capital on New Year's eve night.

His mission helped a bit to repay the Japs for the tortures they inflicted on so many American prisoners. Lt. Roy Russell of Fort Worth and Lt. Harvey Denson of Granger are two of the few men who escaped from an enemy prison ship when it was torpedoed by a Yank sub in the South Pacific. Both are now patients at the army's great McCloskey General Hospital at Temple, recovering from effects of Japanese mistreatment.

Two other Texas fighting men who have written relatives recently from enemy prison camps are T/Sgt. Douglas Behrens of San Saba and Sgt. Cliff Jones of Lampasas. Both are in German prison camps, where they receive help sent by War Prisoners Aid, the National War Fund agency to which Texans

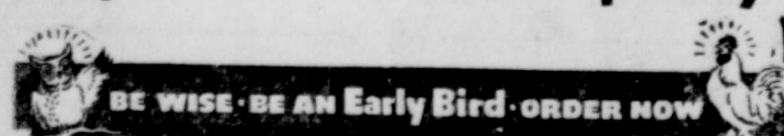
